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Labour Shadow Schools Minister Visits UTC

Labour's Shadow Schools Minister has heard how high demand for technical education has created cost and catchment issues at UTC South Durham in Newton Avcliffe. Catherine McKinnell MP heard, during a visit last Friday, that the University Technical College has shrunk its catchment area due to a high demand for Year 10 places. UTC South Durham is also having to spend a quarter of a million pounds on transporting students, who live across the North-East.

McKinnell was impressed by the UTC, praising the 'fabulous' tour she was given

by Year 10 students Chloe Vaughan and Lennon Gamble.

Speaking after the visit, McKinnell said: "It's been great to see young people so enthusiastic about their education, happy to come to school every day, and really getting stuck in on building not just their skills for today but their skills for life."

The Newcastle North MP was joined on the tour, which took place during National Apprenticeship Week, by Kim McGuinness, Labour's candidate for North East Mayor, and Alan Strickland, who is Labour's candidate for the Newton Aycliffe & Spennymoor Constituency, as well as the UTC's leaders and supporters.

Chloe and Lennon showed the group around the UTC's state-of-the-art engineering facilities and highlighted how there was an atmosphere of support, respect for students and focus on careers at the UTC, which they had not found in their previous schools.

McKinnell was told how the UTC, based on Long Tens Way, attracts students from a wide area of the North-East due to strong employer links with major local firms such as Hitachi Rail and manufacturer Gestamp Tallent.

This demand for places is behind the school's shrinking catchment area and why it has to spend £250,000 a year on transport, McKinnell was told.

With UTC South Durham's leaders and



representatives from UTC support body the Baker Dearing Educational Trust, McKinnell also discussed the need for more funding to deliver technical subjects at pre-16 and Labour's pledge for a curriculum review if it wins the next General Election.

Baker Dearing also raised its proposal for UTC Sleeves, which replicate the technical education that UTCs, like South Durham, deliver within an existing school. The UTC Sleeve demands fewer resources than an entirely new school and can help expand the delivery of technical education to a wider number of students.

UTC South Durham Principal, Tom Dower, commented: "It was fantastic to welcome Catherine McKinnell MP, Kim McGuinness and Alan Strickland to UTC South Durham. Our students were excellent ambassadors for the employer-led education we provide and the visit also provided a perfect opportunity to discuss the pressures that schools are dealing with at the moment. The curriculum we deliver and our strong links with local employers help prepare our young people for their careers and life journeys. Last year, six times more of our students progressed onto apprenticeships than the national average."

PCC Secures Temporary Base for Aycliffe Police Station

Police and Crime Commissioner Joy Allen has announced a new temporary home for Neighbourhood and Response policing teams in Newton Aycliffe as work continues to identify a permanent police base in the town. The County Durham and Darlington PCC and force have been working hard to identify a 'cost-effective and operationally sound' alternative after Durham Constabulary's 10year lease at Durham and Darlington Fire and Rescue Service's Central Avenue Station in Newton Aycliffe came to an end. Agreements have now been reached for both Response and Neighbourhood Policing Teams to move into temporary accommodation in GLOW on Aycliffe Business Park. Works will now commence in preparation for a scheduled move in the week beginning February 19th 2024.

The Commissioner recently polled Newton Aycliffe residents to help identify a solution that would be supported by the town. Nearly half of those who responded to the online survey said they preferred a police station within the confines of Newton Aycliffe to accommodate Response Officers and the Neighbourhood Policing Team, with an additional public contact 'hub' point on Central

Avenue.

Commissioner Allen said: "The scheduled move into GLOW is temporary and will ensure both teams remain in the confines of Aycliffe to be able to respond urgently and effectively when needed by the public. However, those who wish to visit the police station itself, either to report crime or present documents and so on, will still need to do so at Central Avenue as GLOW is not open to the public. "Residents have made clear their expectations for a fully functioning police station within Aycliffe and my team will continue to work with the force to identify a permanent solution with a hub in the town centre to keep officers in the heart of the communities they serve. "In the meantime, business will continue as usual, with members of the Neighbourhood Policing Team in Aycliffe Fire Station on Central Avenue where officers have office space, an interview room and a front counter. "As previously stated, I am absolutely committed to maintaining a strong policing footprint in Newton Aycliffe. I hope this announcement will reassure residents we are not leaving the area and continue to work hard to protect the strong and accessible policing they deserve."

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Major A167 Upgrades Get Underway

A major upgrade of Newton Aycliffe's road network is set to get underway.

The Durham County Council works will deliver improvements along the A167 at its Central Avenue and Ricknall Lane junctions, and the A167/A689 Rushyford roundabout.

The scheme will provide additional road capacity in the area, unlocking the potential to develop up to 1,400 new homes on the Low Copelaw site to the east of the town.

Vegetation and tree removal works are taking place near the Central Avenue junction before final utilities diversions start later this month.

Construction work at the Central Avenue junction will then follow, quickly followed by work starting at the Rushyford roundabout and Ricknall Lane junction.

The work at the A167's Central Avenue junction will introduce a new link road providing access to the future housing site, as well as a traffic light-controlled entry and improved pedestrian crossings.

New traffic lights will be introduced at the A167's Ricknall Lane junction, along with improved pedestrian crossing facilities. All approaches to the A167/A689 Rushyford roundabout will be widened to three lanes, and improvements will be made to the roundabout's layout. There will be new line markings too. Full details of the traffic management measures needed to enable the scheme to be delivered will be communicated throughout the project.

Durham County Council has secured £7million from the Government's Housing Infrastructure Fund (HIF) to deliver the scheme, which is scheduled for completion later this year. The scheme also includes plans to plant nearly 1,000 trees, as well as hundreds of shrubs, and lengths of hedge.

101 Waiting Time Reduced

The average time taken for Durham Constabulary to answer 101 calls has fallen by more than 80 per cent over the last ten months after significant investment in the Force Control Room.

Since March last year, the force has recruited an extra 29 call handlers and six switchboard staff to work in the Force Control Room, alongside a new switchboard triage system. Nine further call handlers are currently going through training and will join the Force Control Room later this month. It means that non-emergency calls made to

the force are now answered, on average, within 51 seconds.

This marks a reduction of 81 per cent compared with March last year, when the average time to answer a 101 call was fourand-a-half minutes.

Calls made to 999 have also showed a significant improvement.

Chief Inspector Laura Backhouse, from the Force Control Room, said: "Public confidence starts with people being able to contact us quickly when they need us, not just for 999 emergencies but for those non-urgent 101 calls too. We knew we needed to improve the service we provided so, over the last year, we have implemented additional resources and revised a number of processes. "This has resulted in significant

improvements in this area - we used to

measure our average call handling times on 101 in minutes, now we measure it in seconds.

"We are also in the process of moving towards the Single Online Home website, which will allow members of the public to submit some queries and applications online, freeing up more Control Room staff to deal with 101 and 999 calls. We know we have further to go, and more improvement needs to be made because every call matters, but we're confident we are heading in the right direction."

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New Accessible Changing Places Toilet Opens at Locomotion



A new accessible Changing Places toilet has opened at Locomotion in Shildon, improving access and inclusion for all visitors, as the museum undergoes a multi-million-pound programme of investment. Visitors to the museum will now be able to access a new Changing Places facility, equipped with a hoist, changing bench and a peninsular

toilet, in the museum's Main Hall. Funded by a grant from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities with support from Durham County Council and Muscular Dystrophy UK (MDUK), the museum converted a storeroom to make way for the accessible toilet.

The new Changing Places toilet is part of a multi-million-pound programme of investment that will completely transform the museum with a new building and improvements across the site. Currently under construction, New Hall, which will open in the spring, will be a new 2000 sq metre building that will house up to 50 additional rail vehicles, creating the largest museum collection of rail vehicles in Europe. Locomotion, which is part of the Science Museum Group, is committed to being open for all and creating spaces that are open and accessible for everyone. Across the group of museums, there are now Changing Places toilets at four out of the five sites, with future plans to open one at the National Railway Museum in York.

Visitors to Locomotion can currently get up close to more than 70 legendary locomotives from across the history of rail and engineering and follow trails around the site to find important landmarks and learn about the world's first railway town. The museum is currently open Wednesday to Sunday from 10.00-16.00, and entry is free.

Usually, this column covers the week before the one it is printed, in this case up to Sunday 11th February but, as the Prime Minister visited us on Monday 12th February, I have included that this week. It was great to see Newton Aycliffe chosen as the first venue for the public engagement sessions that the Prime Minister is having. Stephen Dixon, a northerner and a journalist who hosts the breakfast show on GB News, hosted the 'GBN People's Forum: The Prime Minister', in front of a live audience. The Forum was advertised, via GB News, as being 'at a venue near Darlington at 8:00pm on Monday 12th February' and applicants needed to complete a form online to be able to attend the

event. The event was broadcast live on the GB News Channel and it was fantastic that it took place at the Big Club in Newton Aycliffe. The Prime Minister had great engagement with the forum of representatives from across the UK. It was a lively session with some difficult questions, and I am sure the Prime Minister was pleased with the exit poll from the audience of 100 participants - in that 50 would vote Conservative, 36 undecided and only 14 would vote against him.

Prior to Monday's forum, my week, to 11 February, was spent in Japan with the Transport Select Committee. This is the crossparty committee whose role is to scrutinise the Department for Transport and suggest areas of focus. The travelling group was five Conservative, three Labour and one Scottish National Party. The journey out took 25 hours, starting on Saturday and arriving in Tokyo on Sunday.

On the Monday we were briefed by His Majesty's Ambassador, Julia Longbottom and her team before transferring to the Tokyo Metropolitan Government Building where we met with members of the Tokyo Metropolitan Government and also saw some displays from the Olympic and Paralympics. Tuesday's meetings were with Nippon Yuen Kaisha, a major shipping company, where we heard about their approach to reducing carbon and Japanese use of domestic shipping. Then it was off to the Ministry of Land, Infrastructure and Transport to hear their approach to transport and economic development and their consideration of social outcomes. We then went to the offices of Nissan where the discussion focused on electric vehicles as well as autonomous vehicle development and policy. Then it was back to the British Embassy to meet various stakeholders in Japanese transport.



Wednesday, we went to Tokyo Railway Station, the busiest in the world, to see the control centre and understand the scale of operations. Around 2.7m people use the station every day. We also heard about the Shinkansen (or Bullet Trains). Everyone knows about the speed of these but what is less appreciated is that there are over 300 trains, one leaves the station every five minutes and each one holds around 1300 people. We then travelled on one of them to Osaka where we met with Hankyu Railway Corporation and Carolyn Davidson the Consular General. The discussions were around the integration of transport and infrastructure investment.

Thursday, we met with the Osaka Government before getting back on a Shinkansen to return to Tokyo, there we met with Hitachi to hear about their ethos and approach to transport investment, they certainly live up to their tag phrase of 'Inspire the Future'. In my opinion, theirs was the most impressive of all the presentations we received. After this we met with the MPs from the Japanese Transport Committee. Later that evening I was then able to have another meeting with Hitachi, where our Chair of the Select Committee accompanied me.

Friday saw us at Haneda Innovation City where we saw various innovations including autonomous buses. With visits completed, it was off to the airport for a 21-hour return trip to Newcastle. A very busy but worthwhile week with many many learnings for the Transport Select Committee. 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Funding Plan

Police and Crime Commissioner Joy Allen has put forward her plans to protect policing levels across County Durham and Darlington in the forthcoming financial year as the force continues to miss out on crucial extra government funding.

The Commissioner is recommending increasing the policing portion of the money people pay towards council tax by 5.1 per cent which equates to an extra 25p per week (£13 a year) for a Band D property. Many householders will pay less than this (£8.67 per year) due to a higher proportion of Band A properties within the force area.

The increase, which is in line with government assumptions, will generate vital income to enable the Commissioner to maintain police officer numbers at 1,368 until at least April 2025 and PCSO numbers at 146. It is also necessary for the recruitment of extra control room staff to improve public

contact processes and the continuation of IT upgrades, that are essential for ensuring the public receive the urgent help needed when they call for help. More than half of the 1,935 people who

More than half of the 1,935 people who responded to the Commissioner's recent budget survey supported increasing the precept either by £15 or more, acknowledging the difficult job she has in balancing the books in the face of historic underfunding. In announcing her plans, ahead of a Police and Crime Panel meeting, Commissioner Allen drew attention to the ongoing adversity facing Durham and other low tax base forces who she described as being continually 'left out in the cold'.

Despite the limitations of central grant funding and council tax revenue, Commissioner Allen still successfully brought in more than £5.1m of extra funding through Ministry of Justice and Home Office streams last year, helping the force to retain its high performing position. The policing grant allocated to the force has increased by 6.19 per cent to £118.4m for 2024/25. If the panel approves the precept increase, the total revenue funding will increase from £157.4m to £167m - an increase of £9.6m or 6.1 per cent. This compares to an average national increase of 6.7 per cent - which means Durham receives a lower increase than the average, as has been the case since 2010 due to its low taxbase.

The money people paid towards policing in 2023/24 helped the Commissioner to instantly strengthen the frontline by taking on more transferee police officers from other forces. These are trained and experienced officers who can make an immediate impact in their communities but cost more to employ. It also funded an increase in training across the force, an uplift in Special Constables, an extra five police officers, boosted resources in the force control room and supported the launch of Operation Snap - the new public portal introduced by the force allowing people to upload journey cam footage they have obtained to support the prosecution of illegal drivers.

In drafting the 2024-25 budget, the Commissioner has backed Chief Constable Rachel Bacon's determined focus on neighbourhood policing, supporting her plans to recruit more officers and PCSOs. Commissioner Allen added: "In an evolving and challenging world, I am proud of our achievements and Durham's position as a national leader in fighting crime. Residents have made clear their priorities in my recent budget survey and this budget will deliver on those key areas and more as we continue to make our county and borough safer."

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Could You Be a Community **Champion?**

An initiative which recruits local people to become trusted sources of public health information within their communities has been relaunched.
