G.N.A.A.S. - Busiest Year On Record



The Great North Air Ambulance Service (GNAAS) had its busiest year on record after responding to more than 2100 incidents in 2023. This is an increase of over 260 incidents compared to 2022's figures and is a consequence of the charity's expansion of their service. At the start of January 2023, GNAAS began operating seven nights a week in the North East and later that year extended their night-time service in Cumbria to four nights.

The charity currently provides air ambulance services across the region, mainly in hours of daylight, while on a night-time, from 8pm to 8am, the team transfer to a rapid response vehicle.

The car carries the same life-saving equipment as its airborne counterpart and is staffed by a highly skilled paramedic and doctor team who can deliver blood, anaesthetic procedures, and other advanced treatments, to critically ill or injured patients.

David Stockton, chief executive officer at GNAAS, said: "We're very proud of the fact that we have been operating a 24/7 service in the North East for over a year and we're hoping to replicate this in Cumbria in the coming months. Our rapid response vehicles were deployed nearly 300 times more last year in comparison to 2022. This is a direct result of our night-time expansion and just proves how vital it is for our team to be able to deliver a high level of pre-hospital care to the public 24 hours a day, seven days a week."

In total, the charity's critical care teams, which are based in Eaglescliffe in the North East, and Penrith in Cumbria, responded to 2124 incidents in the North East, North Yorkshire, Northumberland, Cumbria, Scotland and the Isle of Man. The bulk of incidents were road traffic collisions, followed by cardiac arrests, falls and assaults.

Mr Stockton added: "As a charity, we do not receive government funding, and must therefore raise £8.5m per year to keep the service operational. While it has been challenging to raise funds over the past few years, with factors such as Covid, the war in Ukraine, and the cost-of-living crisis impacting us, I just want to say how truly thankful we are to those who have either donated or fundraised for GNAAS. We're coming up to our 22nd year as a charity, and it would not have been possible without the fantastic support of the public."

Help Create Peace Doves for Summer Installation

Over 15,000 paper doves, created by visitors with messages of peace will be suspended in Durham Cathedral this summer.

Peace Doves, a mass-participation artwork by Peter Walker, is set to take centre stage in the Nave of the cathedral from 25th July. It will be made up of thousands of individually handmade paper doves which will be suspended above the Cathedral's historic Nave.

The artwork will be set to music by composer David Harper making it an even more atmospheric experience. However, before that date, each of the 15,000 paper doves will need to be created by visitors to Durham Cathedral.


Andrew Usher, Chief Officer: Visitor Experience and Enterprise at Durham Cathedral, says, "We're delighted to be showcasing the Peace Doves installation this summer and we're aware that it will take a long time to handcraft the amount of doves needed. So we're now asking for the help of visitors, schools and local communities and inviting everyone to come and create one of the 15,000 doves that make up this meaningful installation. As a mass-participation artwork, it's a unique opportunity for people to be involved in creating something truly special." From Easter Monday, 1st April visitors, groups and local communities are invited to head to Durham Cathedral and create a dove for the installation. People will be given a paper dove on which they will be encouraged to write a message of peace, love,

friendship or hope.

The Very Revd Dr Philip Plyming, Dean of Durham, says, "Jesus said 'blessed are the peacemakers' and certainly, in our world today, peace is needed more than ever. The Peace Doves installation represents a chance for people of all faiths and backgrounds to come into this historic house of prayer and offer their own different voices, wishes and prayers in the cause of peace. I am looking forward to welcoming people from across our communities to Durham Cathedral to be part of this remarkable artwork and offering to God." The final result, which will be installed on 25th July, will give the sense of serenity and peace. As the paper doves are illuminated and hung from the Nave, visitors are invited back to the cathedral to see if they can find their dove and reflect upon other public messages of peace - making this installation unique to those who took part.

A programme of events will accompany the installation, including late night openings, family activities and a special Evensong on Sunday 28th July, 3.30pm, to reflect on the artwork and pray for peace. Visitors will be able to make a Peace Dove every day in Durham Cathedral from Monday 1 April to Saturday 20th July. The installation will open to the public at Durham Cathedral this summer, from Thursday 25th July until Monday 9th September. There is no admission charge to enter the cathedral, but donations are welcome. For more information visit:

I am all for citizens' rights but, Cllr Hawkins' comments are way off the mark, however well meaning.





Councillor's Rights Largest Collection of Charter for Thieves Historic Rail Vehicles



Locomotion in Shildon, County Durham, is to undertake the museum's biggest ever rail shunt to create Europe's largest undercover display of historic rail vehicles.

Managed by specialist teams from Locomotion and the National Railway Museum, the shunt will see 46 vehicles (and one road vehicle) moved carefully inside the newly constructed £8m New Hall. Locomotion is a partnership between the Science Museum Group and Durham County Council, with the latter having provided significant funding towards New Hall.

Situated opposite the museum's existing collection building, New Hall is scheduled to open to the public on 24th May 2024. Before then, the hall needs to be filled with the collection of rail vehicles in a complex shunt that will take more than four weeks to complete.

With a crane, two snow ploughs, a pair of track inspection velocipedes, historic steam locomotives, numerous freight wagons and even a tracked Bren Gun Carrier, the lineup is sure to include something to complete every train set. When added to the vehicles already at Locomotion there will be 99 rail vehicles - creating the largest undercover display of historic rail vehicles in Europe.

New Hall will open in time to celebrate the museum's 20th anniversary in September this year. The museum is also built close to the site of Shildon Works - once home to a thriving railway workshop, employing thousands, which closed in June 1984.

To mark this important link, the new building and the vehicle display will recognise the important role of railways in shaping communities in Shildon and across the North East, as well as the development of the railways across the UK. The interpretation will also tell new stories of the significance of coal in the development of the railways along with related stories of industry and freight transportation.

Durham County Council successfully applied for £20m Levelling Up funding to allow it to invest in Locomotion, including the creation of New Hall. The council seeks to promote the county and its assets to visitors as part of its Inclusive Economic Strategy.

Once rail vehicles are in place, New Hall will receive new interpretation, seating, wayfinding, lighting and other finishing touches ready to open for visitors on Friday 24th May 2024.

New Hall is the centerpiece of a site-wide programme of improvements at Locomotion which incorporates historic coal drops, a collection of railway buildings and Gaunless Bridge - one of the world's oldest iron railway bridges. A restoration project is taking place to repaint and display the bridge which was originally part of the Stockton and Darlington Railway. This is being funded by the Ironmonger's Company and members of the public.

As well as New Hall, visitors to Locomotion can see many highlights from the national collection - from the world's fastest diesel locomotive, HST 43102 The Journey Shrinker to Stephenson's original Rocket and Locomotion No.1, which hauled the first train on the Stockton and Darlington Railway in 1825.

The new building will be a key part of plans to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the opening of the Stockton and Darlington Railway in 2025 as part of Railway 200.

Locomotion's New Hall has been generously supported by Durham County Council (Lead Funder), The Friends of the National Railway Museum (Major Funder), Wolfson Foundation (Major Funder), The Foyle Foundation (Major Funder), Sir James Knott Trust (Associate Funder), The Catherine Cookson Charitable Trust (Associate Funder), The Platten Family Fund at the Community Foundation Tyne & Wear and Northumberland (Funder), and Northumbrian Water Branch Out Fund (Funder). ASB 'Hotspots' Receive Floral Makeover

Communities prone to anti-social behaviour across County Durham and Darlington have been treated to floral makeovers thanks to funding from Police and Crime Commissioner Joy Allen.

The County Durham and Darlington PCC secured Government funding, some of which has funded a bulb planting scheme in ASB hotspots across the country as part of her plans to build pride in the local community and deter crime and nuisance behaviour

The planting was carried out by people who have offended and are currently subject to Community Payback. This is part of a programme of reparative activity which encourages the volunteers to give back to their communities and make amends for their past behaviour.

Durham County Council's Clean and Green team and Darlington Borough Council's Street Scene Service worked alongside the National Probation Service to enhance the entrances to 34 locations and specific areas where ASB occurs.

The bulbs, sourced from suppliers based in Amsterdam, were planted in mixed designs to achieve longevity of colour over a longer period, typically from February to July.

Three specific mixes, containing a selection of Narcissi (daffodils), Alliums and Camassias, were used. The different varieties flower in sequence and provide a change of colour and height throughout the flowering months.

Commissioner Allen said: "I am proud to back this project which not only supports the rehabilitation of people who have offended, but also helps to discourage and prevent further unwanted behaviour in these areas. I know that floral displays enhance and improve the quality of life in communities in so many different ways. This continues my well-known support for bloom. When I was a County Councillor I drove the project which saw us win Best Large Town Category in the Northumbria in Bloom competition.

"Reducing ASB is a key priority for me and helping to restore a sense of pride in our neighbourhoods is one of many strategies we are employing to improve safety. If we don't care about our public spaces, then we are unlikely to care about other issues that impact negatively on people's lives and will invite others to treat those areas with contempt. Residents are in for a real treat in the coming months as these displays bloom."


Methodist Church Update



N.A.F.C. REPORT

Saturday 6th April **Bridlington Town 3 v Newton Aycliffe 5**

Newton Aycliffe were the victors of an eight goal thriller in Bridlington. The final away game of the season made great viewing for the Aycliffe supporters who had travelled in numbers to back Brian Atkinson's side as they look to secure a playoff spot.

Ethan Wood opened Aycliffe's scoring after 37 minutes with a rocket of a finish. He was teed up in the centre of the D by Cole Kiernan, and Wood's shot saw the ball fly above every Bridlington player in the box to sweetly hit the top corner. Four minutes later and Aycliffe saw their second come from Liam Jarvie at even further range than Wood's finish. Jarvie jinked past Tom Algar and Pete Davidson with ease to fire from distance. At the other end, Winter, yet again, exhibited brilliant reflexes to deny Norfolk's free kick on the cusp of half time.

Aycliffe remained the dominant side going into the second half and they made it 0-3 in the 59th minute. Cole Kiernan got his second assist, this time his pass found substitute Cieran Jackson who wasted no time in firing it past Hitchcock. Winter was once again proving resolute in the Aycliffe net, reacting at just the right time to stop Lewis Dennison's potentially dangerous run. Cole Kiernan was proving a tricky customer for Bridlington to handle, Toby Pascoe crossed the perfect ball which found Kiernan's head to make it 0-4 in the 63rd minute.

It should have been plain sailing by the seaside for Aycliffe after this, until Bridlington pulled one back courtesy of Andrew Norfolk who fired a strong shot to make it 1-4. It seemed now the wind was firmly in the sails of Bridlington.

Will Sutton launched a cross into the box that hit the crossbar and fell to the feet of Lewis Dennison who scored with a tap in to make it 2-4 in the 89th minute. Aycliffe were on the ropes now and in the 91st minute Ali Aydemir dribbled past several Aycliffe defenders to fire a low shot past Winter to make it 3-4. The final goal went the way of Aycliffe, Kyle Davis fired the ball past Hitchcock at such velocity all Bridlington's Benn Lewis could do was poke it into his own net to make it 3-5 with the referee blowing his whistle soon after. Aycliffe now have three home games to finish their first NPL season. Carlton Town visit Moore Lane on Saturday 13th April, with Dunston returning on Tuesday 16th to try again after the Easter Monday game was abandoned. Pontefract Collieries conclude the season on Saturday 27th April.

Week commencing 1st April started with Easter Monday when I was at Ferryhill and Sedgefield, then it was constituency work on Tuesday. This started with a local business coming to see me at the office before I then went to Hitachi for another meeting with the Union team. We were joined by management, but I then had separate conversations with the shop stewards. Despite the worrying circumstances, these meetings are convivial with all parties looking for how we find the best way forward. I ensure that all outputs from these conversations are communicated to the Secretary of State and his team to maximise the possibility of success. Meetings with all parties will continue to explore all options over the coming weeks.

I then caught up with a constituent and his mum in Costa at Newton Aycliffe before going to Aycliffe Village Hall to meet residents, in particular about the smell from the quarry, I will be meeting the Environment Agency on 11th April to see what they are going to do next as this has gone on for far too long.

This was followed by a catch up with my team, to discuss casework and plans for the week as I was taking a few days away over Easter. When I return there will be more constituency work, with issues including the Arriva bus connections, in particular between Trimdon Fishburn, Sedgefield and Newton Aycliffe, but also to Cornforth and Ferryhill etc. I am encouraging Durham County Council to either get a resolution with Arriva or find another way to reconnect people. I will be going to the Aycliffe Community Hub meeting before the regular session between Durham County Council and all their MPs before a couple of constituency meetings and then it is the Darlington Mayor's Ball. Sedgefield Constituency is about 40% in Darlington Borough Council and 60% Durham County Council, by area.

When I head to Westminster, on Monday 15th April, we will start with questions to the Home Secretary and then to the business of the week. The Palace of Westminster itself is a particularly interesting place and here is a little glimpse into the history of Big Ben and the Elizabeth Tower

Following the Great Fire of 1834, which was caused by the unsupervised burning of two large cartloads of wooden tally sticks (a form of medieval tax receipt) that destroyed most of the Palace of Westminster, the architect Charles Barry won a competition held to choose a design for the new building. The Astronomer Royal, Sir George Airy, judged another competition to build a clock for inclusion in Barry's design. Although the clock is commonly referred to as Big Ben, Big Ben is in fact the Great Bell which sounds the hour. Big Ben is thought to be named after Sir Benjamin Hall, Chief Commissioner of Works at the time the bell was installed. The first bell, cast in 1856 at Stockton-on-Tees, was brought to London by rail and sea. During tests in New Palace Yard a fatal crack appeared. The bell was broken up and a second bell was cast at the Whitechapel Bell Foundry. Edmund Denison, an amateur horologist, designed the Great Clock and the clockmaker Edward Dent constructed it. The Great Clock was installed in 1859 and started on 31st May. The Great Bell, Big Ben, began striking on 11th July 1859. The BBC first broadcast the Westminster Chimes on New Year's Eve 1923. In 2012, the Clock Tower, at the north end of the Palace of Westminster, was renamed the Elizabeth Tower in recognition of HM The Queen's Diamond Jubilee and stands as a symbol of not only the United Kingdom, but of democracy. The bells of Big Ben have been ringing for over 160 years, despite the effects on the building of bombing during the Second World War, as well as weather and pollution. But, like other buildings of a similar age, the Elizabeth Tower suffered from problems that needed to be overcome and, in 2017, the largest and most extensive conservation of the Elizabeth Tower began to preserve the clock tower for future generations. In 2022 Big Ben was brought back into regular service and the conservation was completed in the same

Railways, Castles and the Plague



Sunday's Around Town was both informative and entertaining. Our guests were Margaret Fenwick and Caroline Hardie from Friends of Stockton and Darlington Railway. In conversation, we learned about the history of Heighington Railway Station, its status as a Grade Two Star listed building, and its place in the history and development of the railways nationally, and around the world, and the future plans for what is a major historical building, Caroline was able to share both anecdotal and factual stories of the development of the railway story in Aycliffe, Darlington, Shildon and the surrounding areas. How Middlesbrough eventually became a bustling port town, and how the country faced a major lockdown in the 1800's when a ship docked at Sunderland and unloaded the plague, as well as their cargo, which quickly spread throughout the country.

We learnt how Caroline was bought Scargill castle, by her future husband, for the princely sum of one hundred pounds plus tax. As with most castles, it was a bit of a doer upper and required more than a little TLC, primarily because of its age, and because, during the second war the home guard tried to kill it by using it for target practice. The internationally successful Time Team television show recorded an episode of the programme at Scargill Castle entitled 'The Wedding Present' which is available to view on YouTube. The castle has been fully renovated and is now available as a holiday or short break let. 



It's been an eventful time, I have managed to release some to safe, support fed gardens, Willow, Keira, Summer and Lucky, Lilly has gone to Durham, these are places that they can adapt to being wild again, they all came in as very small babies, they will be supported fully. I have more releases but the weather is against them at the moment, I also have some here that still need to finish treatment.

Here is an example of what not to do if you see a hedgehog out in the day! Do not watch him or her for 48 hours plus, then contact a rescue. This happened to me last Monday, I received a call at midday from a Darlington lady who said she had seen a hedgehog, when I questioned her further she said her first sighting was Saturday. I asked her to bring the young hog in, supplied my address, she arrived three hours later. This poor little soul spent two hours here before passing away. This is unacceptable behaviour. I need people to know that whilst they look ok to the naked eye, there is a time bomb ticking inside them, when they need help they come out in the open so they can be picked up to get that help from rescuers. Had I admitted her the same day she saw her, she would have stood a chance.

A big thank you to all of you who have made donations, you have kept these beautiful creatures fed, warm and with the medical attention they need to grow and get that second chance in the wild, as a rehabilitator who has put massive amounts of work into these hedgehogs, if I feel the release sight isn't suitable I have some wonderful places to let them free. You, as finders, will be informed, of course. We all need to protect them and give

them a safe and happy future.
This rescue works with Grange Vets, if you are unable to reach me, they will admit a hog for you without any cost implications, Angela and her team are excellent at what they do. I would like you to meet my smallest hedgehog, she came in as a baby last year, she is called Autumn, she is very nice natured and no problem at all.

Homelessness Support

Over £6 million is being committed to tackle homelessness in County Durham after its council was successful in a bid for funding. Durham County Council has been awarded funding from the government's

Single Homeless Accommodation Programme (SHAP) to create new accommodation and increase support for those who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

The objective of SHAP is to increase the supply of high-quality accommodation and support for adults, and younger people aged 18 to 25 years, who are either rough sleeping or at risk of rough sleeping. Included in the funding is £2,762,382 from Homes England for the provision for 32 new bed spaces in supported accommodation. As part of the council's emerging Homelessness and Rough Sleeping Strategy, which outlines a commitment to reduce homelessness and an ambition to ending rough sleeping for good, the council will also allocate £1,841,588 towards the cost of providing this accommodation.

The Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) will also provide £1,656,181 over three years for the provision of specialist support services for those housed by the programme.

Cllr James Rowlandson, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for resources, investment and assets, said: "We are pleased to have been successful in our bid for SHAP funding. In County Durham, we are committed to breaking the cycle of homelessness and supporting people to live well and lead independent lives. This funding will help us to continue providing this support. This project isn't just aimed at providing accommodation, it includes intensive wrap around support tailored to each individual to help them turn their lives around and regain their independence."

A specialist external support provider will be procured, through a competitive process, to provide wrap around support to those housed by the programme. A mix of accommodation will be provided through the project, with multiple self-contained flats plus dispersed properties. Some of the accommodation will have 24-hour support every day of the year and some will have lower levels of support with regular visits by the specialist team. All the applicants will be fully assessed, including their housing and any other relevant history, before being accommodated by the project.
