


Easter Activity Sessions Blood Bikes

> The County Council of Durham (Beechfield, Newton Aycliffe) (Temporary Footpath Closure) Order 2024

The Council on 12.4.24 made the above Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, as amended, Section 14(1) to prohibit all pedestrian traffic from proceeding on a 98-metre length of footpath to the front of no.'s 43-57; a 29-metre length of footpath to the front of no.'s 62-65; a 31-metre length of footway to the front of no.'s 96-99; a 40-metre length of footpath to the side of no. 96 & 119; a 39-metre length of footpath from the rear of no.'s to the side of no. 30 and a 25-metre length of footpath to the rear of no.'s 112-115 to enable gas main replacement works to be undertaken. Throughout the period of closure, a diversion to pedestrian traffic, where available, will be signed on site. The maximum duration of the Order is 6 months. The proposed works are to commence on 22.4.24 and are anticipated to be completed in 9 weeks. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed on site accordingly.


Aycliffe Village WI

Shadow Chancellor Visits Hitachi Rail



Hitachi Rail on Aycliffe Business Park hosted a visit by Labour Shadow Chancellor Rachel Reeves MP and Shadow Business Secretary Jonathan Reynolds. The pair joined local Labour candidate for Newton Aycliffe and Spennymoor Alan Strickland for meetings with senior managers, workers and trade union representatives.

The meeting comes after Hitachi warned its 700 workers in Aycliffe that, unless the government acts quickly to fill a production gap, jobs will be at risk.

Alan Strickland said: "The Hitachi plant is a real local gem, providing well-paid manufacturing jobs to residents here in Newton Aycliffe and across the area. But, that's at severe risk because the government has been dithering on a key decision needed to support the factory. Hitachi has a busy order book until October this year, and again in the future so, for the last two years, they've been asking for some simple flexibility on contracts to help fill the gap. Without that, they'll struggle to keep the factory open, and the government's failed to help.

May I start by asking our possible future MP to print more than just an email contact? As an 88 year old resident, I do not have an email address and have no way of contacting Alan Strickland, the Labour candidate for the next election - I have tried County Hall, Town Council and local Labour councillors, none of them have been able to furnish me with a contact number for Alan.

Mr Strickland's literature does not mention Aycliffe Town Centre. Thirty five years ago, when I first moved to Newton Aycliffe, we had five banks in our town centre and a cash point outside every one of them, where cash could be withdrawn at any time - we now have none. The Banking Hub is located outside of the town centre and you cannot get a printed bank statement.

All the shop units in the town centre were occupied when I moved to the town, there were public toilets and a weekly market. Doctors surgeries were open longer hours and even on Saturday mornings - we could go to the surgery, check with the receptionist and see a doctor. Now, we have to ring at a certain time, try and make an appointment, go on a waiting list and, sometimes, when you get to the front of the waiting list, you see a nurse. At other times you are advised to attend A&E and wait for hours. Back in the day, you could contact a doctor or chemist out of hours. So, Mr Strickland, please be more open to the elderly's requirements and let's hear your thoughts on the above.

Not Fit For Purpose

Dear Sir,

We see again further facts coming out regarding Joy Allen and her handling of the Durham Constabulary. I think the headline will not surprise anyone.

When Joy won the job, the first person she employed was her very close friend, the first time ever, as Assistant PCC and then others, it shows now twelve people working in her office and three vacancies.

She purchased a van to promote herself, at a cost of £50,000, and spent £100,000 refurbishing her office, this, of course, is our money she used.

She claims that crime and ASB has gone down, but this is not true, it has in fact risen and the reason this has occurred is that people no longer trust her and the police response, that they no longer report such crimes as they feel nothing is done about it.

If we look at our town, our police station was closed and the land sold, where the money went from the sale she does not know and we are still waiting for it to be replaced.

In July last year, after pressure from the town council and the residents, a meeting was held at the council offices with Joy Allen, Assistant Chief Constable and someone from the finance side. I, along with others, attended this meeting. Joy did not seem able to answer the questions and many where passed to the people accompanying her, all with negative answers.

The problem with a new police station was to find the right premises or land in the centre of town. One thing that was mentioned by the ACC was the white elephant, the new processing and holding centre being built up the road at Spennymoor and how it would help us, but when asked if we would end up being policed from there, no answer was given. When joy was asked by a reporter, at the end of the meeting if she would apologise for the letting the people down, no answer was forthcoming.

Since the meeting, and various Mickey Mouse surveys, one where just under 200 of the population of the town replied, we are no longer any further forward. We must not blame the police officers in the area as they are passed from pillar to post regarding locations to work from and do their best as Joy has let them down just as she has let us down. No signs of a new permanent police station, just excuses, a new building hub stood empty at Spennymoor and no money in the coffers and a rise of 5.5% for the police - it will not be long before we vote for a new PCC. At the moment, with Joy having the large staff in the office (previously there was only five), it seems she can't handle the job and it seems many people, like ourselves in Newton Aycliffe, have no confidence in her. To go forward, it is now time for change and we can do this shortly when the next election comes, please do think and vote wisely. John Armstrong, Newton Aycliffe.


Our Officers Deserve Better Council's Support

Lawyer named as Lib Dem candidate for Durham Police and Crime Commissioner and calls for radical change.

A north east solicitor, with more than 50 years of criminal justice experience, has joined the race to become Durham's next Police & Crime Commissioner. Nigel Boddy, who was born

and lives in Darlington, has announced he will run on a platform of sensible spending, a return to best policing practices, and making the wellbeing of police officers a priority.

The son of a Darlington railway engineer, Mr Boddy said: "It's been my enormous privilege to work alongside the police



"I know what we need to do to get this broken system working again. Handing down stronger sentences in a vacuum isn't the magic solution. For a start, the prisons are full! We have to find new ways of approaching criminality."

A life-long advocate for change and justice, Mr Boddy began campaigning in his teenage years, successfully protesting against the closure of his school. This passion for speaking out has stood him in good stead, both in his professional career and in his extensive involvement in the north-east political scene.

"At present, there is an immense amount of money being wasted," he declared. "I sometimes feel like I've spent the last 50 years watching the greatest criminal justice system in the world fall apart from poor

management and inefficiency. Look at our local system. We have a custody suite in Spennymoor and a courthouse in Newton Aycliffe. That means our taxes are paying private companies to ferry prisoners between them - that just doesn't make sense.

Spending our money more wisely means we can afford to put more police officers into our communities with better resources to do their jobs.

"We need to take a close look at the best working practices for our officers and perhaps bring back some older ways of working that have fallen by the wayside. We now have officers sometimes doing 12-hour shifts - is anyone really effective in their job after working that long?

"Looking after police officers and making sure they have the support they need means better morale, better policing and better results for the public. I'm keen to work closely with the Police Federation to make sure we're doing right by our officers.' Mr Boddy has also ruled out a forceful takeover of the Fire and Rescue Service. He said: "My understanding is that the Fire Brigades Union doesn't want to fall under the control of the Police & Crime Commissioner in Durham, the way it's been done in other parts of the country. They know their service best so, if they're against it, I'm against it. But, I would be keen to work closely with all our emergency services to ensure the best provision possible for the public."

for Care Leavers

Durham County Council has been praised by Ofsted inspectors for its work to prepare and support young people as they leave care. The council works closely with care leavers, ensuring they have suitable accommodation and offering advice on education, training, employment, money and personal wellbeing. During a two-day inspection focusing on these services, Ofsted inspectors trawled records, held case discussions, and spoke with young people

with experience of being in care.

In their report, they say leaders have a 'detailed understanding' of strengths in these service areas and where further improvements can be made. They go on to praise the council for allocating personal assistants (PA) to care leavers well in advance of their 18th birthday. This early involvement, they say, 'helps to ensure that planning for adulthood starts early'.

Inspectors also describe young people telling them of their 'strong and caring relationships' with PAs, with many saying they view them as 'extended family members'.

And they commend the council for its 'meaningful' collaboration, saying 'the voice of careexperienced young people is central to decisionmaking'

Their closing summary says the council is 'diligent in its efforts to ensure that careexperienced young people are given the opportunity to achieve their goals' Clir Ted Henderson, Cabinet member for children and young people's services, said: "This is our first focused Ofsted visit since our children's services were given an overall 'Good' rating in summer 2022 and we're delighted to receive such positive feedback.

Over recess I continued to engage with people re Hitachi and was able to facilitate a meeting for the union team with the Secretary of State for Transport. The meeting will have taken place before you read this, but after I submit this column for printing, so I will provide more details on this meeting

next week.

Last week in the Constituency had me meeting the Environment Agency, on Thursday 11th April, to continue to raise concerns regarding the ongoing smells from the quarry. We have seen numerous promises that these were to stop after corrective actions from Ashcourt but, on each occasion the outcome has not been as indicated and I raised these frustrations on behalf of residents again. I have a meeting scheduled with residents of Aycliffe Village to give them feedback and have asked the Environment Agency to join me. I hope, from what has been said to me, that we are finally seeing the end of this saga. Following this I went to Ferryhill Town Hall where I met residents from Rushyford to discuss the proposed changes to the roundabout. These changes are part of the improvements being made to improve traffic flow in anticipation of the housing developments scheduled opposite the Central Avenue junction with the A167. There was clear consensus that this roundabout is currently dangerous, but the residents are frustrated with the lack of engagement with them. There has been concern for some time about not only the road traffic but the challenges residents of Rushyford face in getting from their homes to either buses or up into Chilton for shops etc. We discussed this in the meeting and then I went back with them to walk the area and take a closer look. I also went back around 5.30pm to see the traffic at its busiest. Ironically, I arrived just in time to watch the Police trying to clear the road after an accident had taken place, just reinforcing residents' points. I have since raised these issues with the team at Durham County Council and will do all I can to encourage them to revisit the options and look to use the recent extra funding provided by Government to introduce some improvements for pedestrian crossing points or traffic calming.

After this, I went to Chilton to meet the ladies at the Menopause Support Group. I called to see them as I had previously spent time supporting a similar group in Sedgefield and came to appreciate the need for support. As a result, I am a Vice Chair of the Menopause All-Party Parliamentary Group in Westminster and was able to offer them some other avenues for advice. 

Arriva remain unreceptive to my pressure from residents regarding the need to reintroduce the X21 connection to Sedgefield/Fishburn/Trimdon and I am therefore pushing hard with Durham County Council to find another solution. As for Arriva, I am trying to get them to take on board other changes to routes to improve connections so, if there are any you want on the list, please get in touch. I already have suggestions from residents and Councillors (of all political colours) and would welcome others if anyone wants to reach out to

After the bus session I joined the team working on the potential Community Hub for the Town Centre and then off to meet the new Town Centre Manager on his third day in post. The afternoon was spent meeting with a number of constituents in my Aycliffe office with the usual diverse range of issues. Then it was off to the Darlington Mayor's Ball where the Mayor, Cllr Jan Cossins, was raising funds for ManHealth and the Listening Post (a mentoring and support scheme for young people). It was a lovely evening with many local mayors, including our own Cllr Carl Robinson, representing Aycliffe, but also representatives from Mulheim in Germany and Amiens in France, the twin towns of Darlington as the twinning celebrates its 70th anniversary. Week commencing 15th April we are back in Westminster and start with Oral Questions to the Home Secretary on Monday before the latest iterations of the Safety of Rwanda (Asylum and Immigration) Bill. On Wednesday, as I said earlier, I will host the Hitachi team with the Secretary of State for Transport, Mark Harper MP. I will also have some constituents visiting for a long-planned visit for Prime Ministers Questions so will have my Westminster team helping me look after them. I will be back in the Constituency sometime on Thursday so I hope to catch up with some of you at the end of the week. 



Trust Invests in Specialist Inflatable **Equipment**



Specialist inflatable devices, to better support patients who have a fall in hospital, have been purchased by County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust. The FloJac enables a fallen patient to be raised from the floor in a safe and controlled manner.

Manufactured in the UK, it was designed with infection control as a priority and features a wipeable safety strap and ladder handles and has no removable parts. The air assisted lifting device is designed to help clinicians safely lift patients weighing up to 500kg from the floor. Noel Scanlon, Executive Director for Nursing at CDDFT, said: "Our colleagues work hard to prevent patients from having a fall while in hospital and to mitigate the impact of a fall when it does sadly occur. Unfortunately, falls can happen while patients are in hospital so we are pleased to have invested in equipment that not only improves patient safety, comfort and dignity but also reduces the risk of musculoskeletal injuries to our valued colleagues. In less than five minutes a patient is able to be safely lifted from the floor and be transferred to a chair or bed. I was impressed to see for myself our manual handling team achieve this in as little as three and a half minutes.

The pump is operated by a simple on/off switch, making it quick and easy to inflate and deflate. It is equipped with a head support wedge for added patient comfort and ten wipeable handles to encourage better posture for clinicians.

Paul Sewell, Senior Manual Handling Advisor, added: "The benefits are immediate for patients - it reduces the risk of suffering from a long lie and increases patient comfort and dignity. Staff are in a better position when using the FloJac and, as it also slides quicker than other equipment, this involves much less pulling and tugging. Because it is so quick and efficient, it means colleagues are not crouched down in awkward positions for prolonged periods which can cause stress on their back or joints.'

CDDFT has invested in nine FloJacs available for use at University Hospital of North Durham, Darlington Memorial Hospital, Bishop Auckland Hospital, Chester-le-Street, Sedgefield and Shotley Bridge community hospitals and two designated for training. The FloJac is also safe to use near an MRI machine and for pregnant women.

Newton Aycliffe 1 v Carlton Town 3 Saturday 13th April

Newton Aycliffe fell to defeat in their game against fellow play-off chasing side Carlton Town on Saturday. Just one place separated the two sides beforehand, with Carlton having the advantage of several games in hand. Carlton showed intent from the off. While Lewis Durow's cross looked as if it was initially going wide, Niall Hylton found the ball and jinked past Toby Pascoe to finish well at a tight angle into the top corner in the fifth minute

The entire game, and in particular the first half, was played at an incredibly slow pace as Carlton seemed more than happy to sit back with their lead. It would take 22 minutes for Aycliffe to have their first notable chance. Liam Jarvie broke away and almost got one-on-one with Felix Annan, however, Daniel Brown intercepted.

Aycliffe conceded their second on 32 minutes. Alex Tempest received the ball on the edge of the box and found Niall Davie who fired a strong shot past everyone in the box to make it 2-0. Aycliffe would gain a promising corner, but Annan stood firm and saved it off the line in a crowded box. Carlton could have sealed it on the stroke of half time when Manneh's cross found the head of Nathan Watson. however Watson headed it narrowly wide. In the second half, Kyle Davis came close to scoring, but his shot went wide after he collided with Annan and a free kick to Carlton was given. Shortly after, at the other end of the pitch, Manneh passed to Watson who was in a great position to shoot and he wasted no time in firing it past James Winter to make it 3-0 in the 54th minute. Aycliffe did find the net courtesy of a Liam Jarvie's close range toepoke finish in a crowded box, however it was swiftly flagged for offside. The next chance came when Liam Adamson's shot deflected off Annan and into the feet of Cieran Jackson, but all he could do was fire it high over the bar.


