Slimming World Members Donate Clothes To Charity



Super slimmers in Newton Aycliffe & Sedgfield have raised £1,500 so far for Cancer Research UK by donating the clothes they slimmed out of to the charity's shops.

The Big Slimming World Clothes Throw with Cancer Research UK is an annual event which takes place in Slimming World groups across the UK and sees members donating clothes, shoes and accessories that no longer fit.

The Sam's Slimming World groups, who meet weekly at Woodham Community Centre & Sedgfield Methodist Church, collected 50 bags, worth around £1,500, for Cancer Research UK.

Slimming World Consultant Sam, who runs the Sedgfield & Newton Aycliffe groups at Woodham Community Centre, says she's proud of how her members came together to support the charity, as well as celebrate how far they've come on their own weight loss journeys. She says: "Every week I'm

inspired by my members and their dedication and determination to achieve their weight loss goals. They're just as enthusiastic when it comes to getting involved in events such as The Big Slimming World Clothes Throw too. I was bowled over by how many bags they filled with clothes that they've slimmed out of to raise money for such an important charity. What I really love is that they're so confident they will never need these clothes again because they've made changes they can keep up for life!"

As well as raising funds for Cancer Research UK, the aim of the event is also to raise awareness of how maintaining a healthy weight reduces the risk of developing some types of cancer. Overweight and obesity is the second biggest preventable cause of cancer in the UK and more than one in 20 cancer cases are caused by excess weight. Sam says: "Being overweight doesn't necessarily mean that a person will develop cancer, but we know that losing weight and maintaining a healthy weight can help prevent a number of health conditions, including some types of cancer. The work that Cancer Research UK does, to help those affected by cancer, is vital. I'm so proud of my members for their passion towards this fundraising event as I know that their contributions will help the charity continue its life-saving research."

Over the years, Slimming World has raised more than £20 million for Cancer Research UK through a variety of campaigns including The Big Slimming World Clothes Throw and supporting the charity's Race for Life event series.

Last year, Slimming World members, consultants and head office staff raised £1,491,191.49 for Cancer Research UK through The Big Slimming World Clothes Throw and are aiming to make this year even bigger and better.

Community Recognition Award for Brian Rendell



Great Aycliffe Town Council launched their new Community Recognition Award Scheme in 2022. The Council developed the scheme to provide a means of recognising and acknowledging the dedication, commitment and outstanding contribution that nominated individuals make to improve and promote the Parish of Great Aycliffe. Their most recent recipient was local resident Brian Rendell, who was nominated for the hard work he does volunteering to improve the environment in Great Aycliffe. Brian regularly litter-picks around the town as well as volunteering with the Great Aycliffe Tidy Team, he has demonstrated outstanding citizenship within the parish and was invited to the Council offices to be officially presented with a Community Recognition Medal and Certificate. Cllr Arun M. Chandran said, "Brian spends a lot of his time walking around the town, and has done so for over 10 years, covering the Nature Park, Old Railway Line, West Park, Great Aycliffe Way, Woodham Burn, on his own, collecting litter big and small. This is all on top of other nature works he does around the town, and indeed the County, as a Durham Wildlife Trust Volunteer. He even recycles the glass bottles, cans and foil crisp packets. This is a token of our appreciation to Brian and recognition for his making this little corner of the universe a little bit better. Well done Brian."

In front of a busy council chamber, with friends and family supporting him, Brian was presented with the medal and certificate by Councillor Ian Gray along with the Mayor, Councillor Carl Robinson.

Cllr Gray said, "Brian has been involved as a Volunteer Litter Picker for a good number of years. He became part of the Great Aycliffe Tidy Team three years ago. The Team work with the Town Council, who provide sacks and equipment and remove the rubbish found. Brian recycles a lot of the items collected. He helps to plant trees and other tasks to improve the areas around the town, such as the Great Aycliffe Way. Brian is a true gentleman and a pleasure to work with."

Mr. Rendell said, "Thank you to the Council for this award and all the staff for recovering and disposing of the litter we collect. I hope my actions inspire others to take part and litter pick their own areas, which I feel has already happened."

Mission to Help Endangered Animals

Last year when St. Francis' Junior School learnt about and celebrated Earth day we decided to raise money to support some endangered animals. We did this by collecting money and completing a coin trail on the yard. We have not only donated money to six different endangered animal charities, but we adopted six animals that we can track on the journey in their habitat. We also received a beautiful bracelet with our animals on, to remind us of our new adopted family members. We now have six new St. Francis' school family members!



Our gorilla Macibiri is a lively female from the close-knit Titus family. She possesses a remarkable talent for forming heart-warming connections with gorillas of all ages, bringing joy to her family. Prudhoe, a female polar bear from the Western Hudson Bay Subpopulation in Canada, one of the southernmost groups of polar bears in the world. John, a male butter-nose dolphin that was tagged by FIU Marine Conversation Ecology Lab in collaboration with the Sarasota Dolphin Research Program. Esmerelda the sloth! Spanish for emerald, Esmerelda is named for the waters of Costa Rica's Caribbean Sun. She lives near a popular surf spot at Cocles Beach, in a small area with many Sloths who climb to the ground once weekly for a bathroom break, which is exactly where conservationists found her. Dobby is an adult female loggerhead sea turtle released with a satellite transmitter from the Archie Carr National Wildlife Refuge, Florida. Naisula the elephant, who is a member of the Samburu Ladies. The family group was identified in 1997 by Save the Elephants, but wasn't sighted for several years from 2008-2012. They later reappeared in the park, and the STE researchers almost didn't recognise them, as the calves have

now become young females with beautiful tusks. The children and staff are very excited to see what these amazing animals get up to and learn more about their habitat, why they are endangered and how we can help more animals like them.

Resilience Building Service Supports Over 1400

The County Durham Resilience service has supported 1,413 people across the county since its initial launch in April 2021. Working closely with people who may feel lonely, socially isolated or those experiencing mental health difficulties, County Durham Resilience service helps people build their resilience, increases their confidence, and connects them to other community services. Lorraine has accessed the County Durham Resilience service and has found the support has helped with her confidence. She said: "Since I met my resilience worker, she has given me back so much of my confidence. I was put in touch with the service earlier last year, and my resilience has grown so much, to the point where I now no longer need my talking therapy as the service has given me so much belief and help with everything, even to use my walker. Each session, I look forward to meeting with the team as I enjoy the sessions and can feel myself becoming more confident with every meeting. It has been the best thing for me, I cannot recommend the service enough for people who may be lacking in confidence, feel isolated or struggle with their mental wellbeing. They have put me on the road of better thinking, which is what I needed, and the whole team is so lovely and it is a marvellous service and asset for County Durham." The service will continue to evolve in the future, based on the needs of the community and help as many people as possible, by listening, supporting and connecting people across the

county. One-to-one, telephone, virtual and group-based support is available over approximately twelve sessions.

The County Durham Resilience service is a community mental health service for adults (18 years +) with the aim to build resilience within communities in County Durham. The service is managed by Pioneering Care Partnership (PCP) and Tees, Esk and Wear Valleys NHS Foundation Trust.

Woodham Academy Site Visit and Ward Update

Dear friends, neighbours and residents, I would like to share with you that myself and Cllr. McAnaney, visited Woodham Academy, after being kindly invited by Deputy Head Teacher, Danny Morgans and expertly tour guided by Site Manager Paul Purvis. I was very impressed with the eco-friendly buildings with grass on the roof and solar panels, as well as only gas being used in the science labs and swimming pool. Great views from the top and the lorries coming through St Mary's and Shafto Ward have avoided school runs and kept low speeds through housing.

It was also great to hear that Galliford-Try, the construction company and their subcontractors, did a generous fund-raiser and delivered 800 Easter eggs to needy children in our town! Wonderful work.

On a more serious note, both myself, the Head and Deputy Head teachers are still concerned about coach access to the new site due to cars parking on pavements (even when there are parking bays free most of the day near the shop) and Durham County Council's reluctance to address the issue. A one way system has been rejected in the past (as well as speed bumps) due to so many side roads off Washington Crescent. A more practical solution would be parking restrictions at school run times, to keep the route clear.

We can understand parents wanting to drop infant and primary children off at school gates, but students aged 11-16 are surely capable of walking from St Oswalds Park, the car park behind Whitehead Walk, Tesco, The Youth and Community Centre, Moore Lane car parks, the one behind Kemble Green and the one behind Ross Walk flats. A small minority of residents also prefer to park cars on the pavement, to save walking 20 yards, causing obstructions and delays (as well as restricting wheelchair and pushchair access) but most use the shop and resident parking bays. I also suggested a mirror for traffic safety on the sharp, blind bend (just after Neile Road side road) on Washington Crescent.

After further pressure from myself, Cllr. Nev Jones and local residents, an apology was received from Michelle McIntosh (Team Leader of Traffic Assets at Durham County Council) for not replying to residents emails and phone calls. Unfortunately, the response was almost identical to the one in October 2023 and still refused to give dates of the mini survey, i.e. was it during covid when schools were closed and people were working from home?

No data about numbers of cars per hour, pedestrians crossing Central Avenue per day and definitely no public survey or consultation, about whether school pupils, elderly, disabled, preschool parents and special needs residents found difficulty crossing the road. The excuse of duplication of assets is also a false one because there are no safety measures like patrol crossings or 20mph flashing lights outside of school term time. How can assets be duplicated when there is no safety process in place, evenings and weekends?

I thought it was cruel and unnecessary to say that the Patrol person would lose their role if a crossing was installed. It would actually make it safer for that operative. Both head teachers agreed on this.

Whatever survey did take place is historical and did not take into account the 1500 phase one new housing and 3000 new cars that will come from this every time the new residents come to shop at Tesco or ALDI or bring students



to Woodham, Vane Road and St Mary's RC Primaries. I would like to see direct comparison traffic figures for the new Gestamp traffic lights crossing (daily pedestrian numbers) and to see how low the number is for the Aycliffe Fire Station crossing, which has very low usage, since the big stores in town closed down and multi-storey car parks closed.

Residents in the new housing are not going to walk half a mile down to the planned crossing from the Gretna to Moore Lane. It will only benefit those going for a meal or drink.

Sedgefield High Street zebra crossing and Shildon High Street traffic lights are in places with much less traffic and pedestrians, so the DCC explanation of govt. formulas for crossing location and priority and need for public safety, does not add up and no logical reason is given. I would like to see, if necessary (under the Freedom of Information Act) data for these two, comparable, nearby local towns, data in direct comparison to Central Avenue (including forecasted data for the 1500+ new Copelaw houses).

Well done to all those who voted in the NE Mayor and Police and Crime Commissioner elections. It may seem irrelevant to some, but these two people will have a lot of power in decision making and budgets and can help rebuild our under-funded public services and reverse over 10 years of reduction in police officers and extortionate costs of care homes for the elderly.

In March, myself, the Corporate Policy officer and Works and Environment manager attended a Durham Youth Council event and encouraged 11-19 year olds to join the Youth Council and have a voice in decision making on youth facilities and services in our town. Please visit County Durham Youth Council Facebook page and look out for an informative display in the town Leisure Centre in the summer holidays.

I am pleased to say that off road vehicles and illegal motorbikes have reduced recently and that dog owners are keeping their dogs on the lead in public places, with a new county by-law being monitored by neighbourhood wardens. See PSPO £100 fine.

Enjoy quality family time over the May Bank Holidays and thank you to all my ward residents for keeping our neighbourhood clean, safe and tidy.

The week of 29th April started with me travelling to Westminster on the morning train. Whilst on the train, I joined a call with Durham County Council about HUG (Home Improvement Grants) that was particularly about Ferryhill. Once in Westminster, the first Business was seeing the Post Office (Horizon) Offences Bill through its remaining stages - which was really positive. The day finished with meetings with staff and also a catch up with the Secretary of State for Defence.

Tuesday started with the APPG (All Party Parliamentary Group) for the Menopause. I took an interest in this group after meetings in 2022 with ladies from Sedgefield and the problems they were having getting support. The meeting is all about supporting and education for women about the symptoms of the Menopause and where and how support can be accessed. It was an education to me of how many women don't recognise some challenges they may have, either physical or mental, that have their roots in the Menopause and I am working with them to look at how we can broaden this education, not only for women, but also for men who might want to support the women in their lives. I also recently visited a Menopause support session at Chilton, led by the PCP, and I will be joining one at Aycliffe in the near future. If you would like to know more, please do get in touch with me. Tuesday afternoon I had a couple of visitors who travelled down from Newton Aycliffe for an event at No 10 Downing Street celebrating 'Community Childcare Champions'. My invitees were Jackie from Forest Park School and Kerry who links with Mums in small businesses to network support. There are so many more people in the constituency I could have invited to this, but I only have two slots. I was able to take the time to show them around the Palace of Westminster whilst they were down.

I finished the day with an Armed forces briefing from the Navy. Wednesday, as usual, started with Transport Select Committee where we were taking evidence on strategic transport planning and I was particularly interested in the evaluation processes that historically have been biased towards the South East.

From there it was to Prime Minister's Questions before sessions on support for Agriculture and Wine Taxation. There was then a meeting of the Northern Research Group discussing our priorities for the North in any future election manifestos and finally a round table event with other MP's and the Chief Secretary to the Treasury, Laura Trott. This was talking about some of the real progress the Economy is making as it

recovers, but also our priorities going forward. After all of this it was the late train north ready for the elections on Thursday. Clearly, across the country, I found these disappointing, but I was pleased to see Ben Houchen re-elected in the Tees Valley as Mayor. Whilst I would obviously have preferred different results in the North East Mayor and The Durham and Darlington Police and Crime Commissioner elections, I congratulate Joy and Kim on their elections and look forward to working with them for the good of our communities.

Friday was an incredibly busy day which started with the visit by Gillian Keegan, Secretary of State for Education, to Dean Bank Primary School in Ferryhill. This was the first school I attended as a child before moving to Aycliffe and going to Sugar Hill. I was delighted with the time she took at the school, being there for close to two hours, she was able to have good discussions with not just the Teachers and Governors, but also many pupils and she opened their new library. I then drove up to Wheatley Hill to meet a constituent and spent time talking with the manager of Greenhills Centre where we are planning a surgery in the next few months.

I then finished off with a call to Cash Access UK. They are the organisation behind the banking hub in Aycliffe and they are looking at one for Ferryhill. I have also asked for one in the Trimdon to Sedgefield corridor. After Bank Holiday, in Westminster, we will have Treasury Oral Questions and the Finance Bill and I am sure lots of party politics following the elections. I have to say that, whilst I love my job as a Constituency MP, my least favourite bit is the politics that goes on when elections loom large. 

It's been really busy recently, I have released most of my overwintered hedgehogs, they have all gone to lovely support fed gardens where they will be doing what they do best, exploring and mating. I want to thank Lesley and Steve who were kind enough to release some for me, I know they will be well cared for and if they get into any difficulties I will be here for them. As will any hog if they need help. Thanks also go to Valerie and June for their invaluable support, sending best wishes to Fred too. Also, can I thank Deborah for helping Harriet, she is doing well, but has some spines missing, she loves her food too. Also Pat, for bringing me Arthur, I have shortened his name to Arti, he has a parasite burden but responding to meds, he really likes it here. All hoggies that I have admitted are doing well and responding to meds, thankfully. It's baby season too. I would like to ask everyone to check their gardens before using power tools. Hoglets in a nest can be anywhere in your garden, they are the size of a 2p piece, sometimes a nesting mother can have up to six hoglets to feed and care for. I have to mention that if you find a hedgehog out in the day, it's not ok, it's in serious trouble and needs help from a rescue on the day you find him or her. Should you find one and think it looks ok, and you keep it because it's cute, this is illegal, they are endangered and protected under the wildlife act and by the time I get the poor thing into rescue I can't save him or her. Such a waste of a precious little life. I have a well stocked medicine cupboard, I have spent a lot of money on sharps, antibiotics and also wormer's. This is all specialist equipment needed to run this rescue, it's no good admitting a hog without meds etc, I have recently spent more than a couple of hundred pounds on meds etc. I regularly purchase things like puppy pads and kitchen roll from Grannies Choice, Donella supplies me with puppy pads that fit the cages I have and they save me time and keep hoggies clean and hygienic. I use vet beds for all hoggies, big and small, after all they like their comforts too especially when they are unwell. Major Upgrade of A167

Major work to upgrade junctions on one of Newton Aycliffe's busiest roads are now underway. The Durham County Council scheme will deliver improvements at the A167/A689 Rushyford roundabout as well as the A167's Central Avenue and Ricknall Lane junctions. Work at Rushyford roundabout started on Monday 22nd April, with work set to start on the Central Avenue and Ricknall Lane junctions in May. The scheme will provide additional road capacity in the area, unlocking the potential to develop up to 1,400 new homes on the Low Copelaw site to the east of the town. Cllr Elizabeth Scott, the council's Cabinet member for economy and partnerships, said: "Low Copelaw is identified as a strategic housing site in the County Durham Plan and these upgrades to the nearby highways network will provide access to the site itself, while ensuring that highways capacity keeps pace with housing growth in the area. We've secured £7million from the Government's Housing Infrastructure Fund (HIF) for the scheme, and the timescales attached to the funding mean

we have to deliver the three sets of improvements together in parallel rather than in separate phases. Though these upgrades will ensure we can keep traffic moving in the long-term, there will inevitably be some disruption in the short-term. We apologise in advance for any inconvenience and thank people for their patience while we deliver this important project." All approaches to the A167/A689 Rushyford roundabout will be widened to three lanes, and improvements will be made to the roundabout's layout. There will be new line markings too. The work at the A167's Central Avenue junction will introduce a new link road providing access to the future housing site, as well as a traffic light-controlled entry and improved pedestrian crossings. New traffic lights will be introduced at the A167's Ricknall Lane junction, along with improved pedestrian crossing facilities. The scheme, which is scheduled for completion late this year, also includes plans to plant nearly 1,000 trees, as well as hundreds of shrubs and lengths of hedge.

Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report

Newton Aycliffe's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, had their game, away at Hartlepool 2nd XI, postponed after heavy overnight rain made the ground unplayable. The club's second team, playing their first game of the season, could only earn a winning draw, despite dominating their home game against Northallerton 2nd XI in the NYSD 4th division. New captain Dan Weldon won the toss and chose to bat first, despite the bowler friendly cloudy conditions. However, his side still piled up the runs scoring an impressive 227 for 7 in their allotted 40 overs thanks in part to a brilliant 2nd team club record 6th wicket partnership of 93 between James Layfield-Carroll and 15 year old Will Dearden (sponsored by Community Spirit). Layfield-Carroll, who was a late call up, smashed the bowling to all parts of the ground finishing his career best innings with 66 runs from just 38 balls and included seven huge sixes and a couple of fours. Dearden also reached his senior career best score of 61 off 85 balls with eight boundaries and a six. Earlier in the game, Aycliffe were wobbling at 24 for 3 when Dan Weldon came to the crease and he helped steady the innings, hitting 35 off 38 balls, including three boundaries and two massive sixes. In reply, Dan Weldon (2 for 25), Patrick Howe (2 for 31), Will Dearden (1 for 10) and James Layfield-Carroll (1 for 25) all bowled well for the home side, but Northallerton never really attempted to go for the win and decided early in their innings to dig in for the draw and they duly finished their 40 overs on 119 for 6. The 2nd XI played their second league game of the bank holiday weekend and were beaten by six wickets, away at top of the table Rockcliffe Park 2nd XI. After being asked to bat first, Aycliffe struggled to get any momentum into their innings and were thankful to Matty Greaves (sponsored by Athena Sports Academy and Britannia Fire), who top scored with 39 off 62 balls, Leon Patel (29 off 69 balls) and Terence Smit (14 off 29 balls) for helping the visitors to reach 125 for 9 in their 40 overs. In reply, Rockcliffe also found scoring runs difficult and despite some good bowling from Leo Stout (2 for 24), the homeside eventually crawled over the winning line for the loss of four wickets with just eight balls of the game remaining.

The club's U15's team got their season off to a great start with a thumping 70 run victory at home to Seaton Carew in the NYACC League. After being asked to bat first, Aycliffe scored a challenging 128 for 7 from their 20 overs thanks to good innings from Freddie Lawler (31 not out from 43 balls), Will Dearden (28 off 33 balls) and Liam Scott (11 off 16 balls). In reply, the visitors were dismissed for just 58 off 17 overs with Will Dearden the pick of the bowlers taking 4 wickets for 5 runs. Jack Collingwood, Liam Scott and Tom also bowled well, each taking two wickets.
