
St. Francis' Junior School **Achieve Gold!**

On Saturday 11th May we boarded a coach for a trip to the lovely Northumbrian town of Hexham. The sun was shining as the coach left the Phoenix Club carrying us up the scenic route along the



A68 towards Hexham. Whether by accident or design, our driver John took a diversion into the Northumbrian countryside to the delight of passengers as we meandered through villages, hamlets and farms, spotting lambs frolicking in the fields.

Soon, we arrived in Hexham to be greeted by the former civic head of Northumberland and Cllr representing Hexham central, Trevor Cessford, a regular visitor to Newton Aycliffe who eagerly took on the role of unofficial tour guide.

Trevor is, like me, very proud of his town and quickly pointed out places of interest such as the beautiful abbey, the ancient gaol, the farmers market and, of course, a favourite of ours, the local Wetherspoons, which is located in the old forum cinema, which is not only a cheap breakfast, but also a fantastic example of 30's architecture.

Keen to know more about this lovely place, we asked Trevor to give us a tour of his town and were surprised to see new pavements, roads, and improved shop fronts. It struck me, as we wandered, that this little town, with a population of just 12,000, has two banks, a couple of building societies and a police station, whilst Aycliffe languishes in decline. Leaving the town centre behind we came across a lovely sports centre complete with running track and long jump pit.

At this point we couldn't help noticing that Hexham has several popular retailers such as Marks and Spencer, B&M, Home Bargains and many more. Being warm and weary we stopped at McDonalds for an ice cream and pondered what we had already seen of a thriving place with a low population. We then took the path alongside the river which has wonderful views of well-kept parks, canoeists on the river and families picnicking whilst soaking up the May sunshine.

Time for refreshments and we called into a local hostelry to guench our thirst before heading back into town where we found a house of correction which hails from an earlier time in the towns history when misdemeanour's were treated very differently to today. Inmates would be locked up for drunkenness, begging, prostitution and even people with mental health problems, quite shocking by today's standards.

We came across Hexham school which has a lovely façade and is very old, before pausing to watch bowling on the town green. Arriving back at the bus stop we met up with our fellow travellers who also had tales to tell of their day out in Hexham.

Many thanks to my friend Cllr Trevor Cessford for the grand tour and a great day out.

Helpful & Funding Reminder **Still Time To Apply!**


The Great Aycliffe & Middridge Partnership (GAMP) Board has a budget of £110k available, and applications are invited for projects from community & voluntary or not-for-profit organisations and groups. Grants of between £5,000 - £15,000 are available for project applications which support our key 'Community Recovery' priority. Important: anyone applying for a project over £10,000 MUST have a minimum of £5,000 capital expenditure included in the project.

Prospective projects must take place in the GAMP area. Our focus this year will be on an overarching 'Community Recovery' priority theme, and projects should aim to address at least one of the following key issues:

- **Employability initiatives**
- Advice and Guidance
- Mental Health & Wellbeing
- Organisational sustainability
- Food provision and support
- Social Isolation
- Support for the Voluntary and Community Sector
- Tackling antisocial behaviour
- Support to small businesses (through a third party, not-for-profit organisation to complement existing DCC and external opportunities)
- **Emerging Community Issues**
- Targeting older people's social isolation
- Providing positive and sound outcomes in relation to the Welfare Reform Agenda and the impact of Welfare Reform on individuals or communities

Groups are permitted to apply for more than one grant, so long as one funding allocation is not reliant on another.

Applications can be submitted for either capital or revenue funding (or both), and projects which include a specific element of capital spend are encouraged. If you need advice on the specific definitions for capital/ revenue, please get in touch. Project proposals must also include a minimum of 5% match funding (either cash or in-kind, or both). All eligible applications will be assessed and ranked by a panel of GAMP Board members, to determine which projects will be awarded funding. Prospective projects should have a planned start date no earlier than November 2024 to allow time for the appraisal process. It has been a really busy week in rescue, admitting and releasing back to the wild. Over the last few days I have admitted two here, the first one is a little 455 gram female, she has been called Missy, out in the day alone, she is from Bishop Auckland.

Secondly a more disturbing tale, there was a hedgehog in distress not too far from this rescue, when I managed to collect and bring her home, to medication, food and a comfy bed, it was 10pm Saturday night, had I not managed to bring her in that night the outcome would have been grim. When I came down to clean cages at six the following morning, the poor souls body had swollen up into balloon syndrome. This syndrome is quite rare, it's common in hedgehogs that have suffered some physical trauma. I took her to see Angela of Grange Vets who had a look at her and her chest is badly bruised, this poor soul has been physically attacked by someone. This behaviour cannot be tolerated, it's an offence to harm wildlife, I hope Big Brother was a witness because she was made dreadfully ill and I have had to put my best work into her, plus a couple of sleepless nights, but it has been worthwhile of course. Grace is a very ill hog, but turning a corner now, catching up on her rest.

I am in the process of fundraising, this is also very difficult especially when I need not only food, but meds, antibiotics, syringes and needles etc, so, our lovely Shirley, Tesco Community Champion, has invited me to the store to raise funds and awareness, I am also there to answer any questions you may have, please come and see me on the 1st June after 10am.

Finally, it appears that we have won a petition, all new developments have to make boundaries hedgehog friendly, so our hedgehogs can roam freely from garden to garden exploring and searching for food, it's also part of the levelling up programme, we have to share our world, we all have a right to be here.



Holiday Monday ready for Treasury Orals on Tuesday. This is the regular session where the Treasury team take questions in the Chamber in the same format as the Prime Minister does during Prime Minister's Questions on a Wednesday lunchtime. The difference though is that there are 45 minutes of specific questions followed by 15 minutes of Topicals, these are any Treasury related questions but not pre stated on the order paper. I then met with the Treasury Ministers to discuss the Finance Bill which was entering committee stage in the House on Wednesday. On Wednesday, I spent the morning in the Transport Select Committee as usual and then into Prime Minister's Questions before we then had an Urgent Question and two Statements before the House then converted to its Committee format and the Finance Bill was debated. The House converts to Committee when the Committee Stage of a Bill is debated on the floor of the House instead of it going to a committee room. Mr Speaker then sits in a lower chair and the Mace is removed from its place. Once this was concluded the Bill then moves to further committee stages later in the month. This is the formal process of enacting changes from the Budget. After the votes in the Chamber, I then went to meet the Secretary of State for Transport for a meeting I had arranged between him and other local Conservative MPs who wanted to be briefed on what he was doing to support the challenges Hitachi are facing. They essentially got the same face to face brief that the Unions had had when they visited.

Last week I travelled to London on the Bank

Thursday was an important day as the Back Bench Business Committee had scheduled a debate on Miners and Mining Communities that I wanted to speak in. This debate was originally scheduled a few weeks ago but had to be rescheduled due to a compression of time due to Urgent Questions/Statements that were heavily subscribed. This time there were no Urgent Questions or Statements so there was plenty of time available and many members contributed from both sides of the House, but heavily North East biased. After this finished, I dashed for the 16.00 from Kings Cross to arrive in Darlington at 18.22 and headed directly to Hardwick Hall for the Aycliffe Business Park Make Your Mark Awards. These started at 18.30, but thankfully the main business was from 19.30 onwards, so I was just okay for time. This was a fabulous evening celebrating the amazing businesses we have on the Business Park, we have so many of all sizes and sectors and it was fantastic to see them applauded and in particular to the Businessperson of the year, Andy Reed of Senstronics and the Lifetime

Achievement Award to Ronnie Nicholson of Gestamp.

On Friday there was a community surgery at Chilton before meetings with Virgin O2 nexfibre about Aycliffe Broadband and then a catch up with Durham County Council and Transport for the North. Saturday was an amazing day that started at the Glow Centre where I joined the Eric Knows Charity and Hiyed CIC at a Space Day which is a STEM Day for SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disabilities) children and their families. But, this was no ordinary Space Day! They had arranged for some of the young people to actually talk to astronauts on the International Space Station, which was an amazing thing to experience.

Whilst there I met some other groups one of which was 1st Ferryhill Scout Group, which was the one I was a member of when very young. Later in the day I went to Middleton St George Scouts to join the Lord Lieutenant and the Deputy Mayor of Darlington as they opened their new Scout Hall which had been funded by the Government's Youth Investment Fund.

Monday 13th May saw me at Hitachi for a catch up with the Unions before I headed to London as it will be Transport Orals on Thursday and I wanted to be sure I was up to date with events at the factory. Then it was the afternoon train to Westminster.

In reply, Yarm hurried to victory after only 13.3 overs with Leo Stout (2 for 39) and Ramzan Hussain (1 for 10) sharing the three wickets that fell.

The ladies senior team lost their first game in the The Hambleton League when they were beaten by 47 runs at home to Northallerton. However, credit must go to Louise Jackson (sponsored by Canny Comps) who top scored in the Aycliffe innings and was then the most successful bowler, taking 3 for 9 from her three overs, when the visitors replied.

The result of the weekend was the club's U17's beating Barnard Castle away by 15 runs in the first round of the NYSD Junior Cup. When the homeside replied, Lydia Myers bowled superbly taking 2 for 10 and Harvey Palmer chipped in with 1 for 10.
