

Section of Original Railway Found in Newton Aycliffe

The 27th September 2025, marks 200 years since the opening of the Stockton & Darlington Railway, a railway of great importance! Unlike other primitive railways and wagon ways before it, the S&DR was the first of its kind, a groundbreaking project on an epic scale of engineering marvel, a single-track railway hauling coal and goods from the upper reaches of Witton Park to the port of Stockton. But what made this railway more important, was the vision of a local mining and locomotive engineer, George Stephenson, who along with his esteemed colleagues, the likes of Timothy Hackworth and a young apprentice named Joseph Locke, built a railway fit for the purpose of running a NEW locomotive. Given that demand was so great for shipping coal to the south, for the first time ever, under an act of parliament, the new railway was decreed with the addition of allowing locomotives to operate with the carrying of passengers and, the first of which, was Locomotion No.1, formally named Active, but aptly renamed as it was to be the first locomotive to officially operate on the new S&DR, the world's 1st public passenger railway. On 27th September 1825, amidst a huge gathering, Locomotion No.1 left Shildon carrying passengers, stopping briefly at Aycliffe Lane (Heighington Station) where it was placed onto tracks the day before, then continuing on to Darlington and Stockton. The world of passenger railway all started right here on our doorstep. With the 200th anniversary fast approaching, there is great emphasis on this historic occasion and the route itself, most of which is no longer original. However, the section between Shildon and Hopetown museum is still the original route in its entirety, and still operational to this day as enacted 200 years ago! Finding what remains of George's original railway is practically non-existent, but recently I discovered what looks to be the remains of this highly important railway right next to Newton Aycliffe train station, after seeing a photograph of it at Preston









Victory in Europe Day Celebrations - 1948



Newton Aycliffe celebrated its 75th birthday in 2023. To mark the occasion, the Town Council, with funding from Durham County Council, produced two displays and a book 'Newton Aycliffe - Life and Times of a New Town'. Newton Avcliffe's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, were well beaten by 150 runs away at Maltby 1st XI in the NYSD 3rd division. The home side chose to bat first and reached 228 for 8 in their 40 overs despite some good bowling by both Shashank Garg (4 for 61) and Matty Greaves



What's Community Exploring Sustainability

Woodham Academy's Florida Trip

As part of the government's Turing Scheme, twelve ambitious science students from Woodham Academy recently embarked on an educational journey to Florida to analyse the sustainability of tourism and explore green energy solutions. This once-in-alifetime experience offered them a unique opportunity to conduct research on pollution, energy conservation and biodiversity in



some of the state's most popular travel destinations. As they traversed Florida's bustling theme parks, and tranquil natural reserves, they compared various locations in terms of their environmental impact and sustainability initiatives. Their findings provided valuable insights into the challenges and advancements in eco-friendly tourism. In Orlando, the students examined the carbon footprint of largescale attractions such as Walt Disney World, Universal Studios and Kennedy Space Centre. While these theme parks generate massive

amounts of energy consumption and waste, they also invest heavily in sustainability initiatives, such as solar power projects, water recycling programs, and eco-friendly transportation options. The students were impressed by the progress, but also recognised that more efforts are needed to make large-scale tourism truly sustainable.

Florida's warm climate and abundant sunshine make it an ideal location for solar energy. The students studied how green energy is being integrated into the tourism industry and everyday life. They visited solar farms and learned about large-scale renewable energy projects aimed at reducing dependence on fossil fuels. They also witnessed the Space X launch and its sustainable reuse policy for its launch components. Beyond the research, the trip was an unforgettable adventure. The students not only expanded their knowledge of sustainability, but also bonded over shared experiences, their journey to Florida reinforced the importance of responsible tourism and innovative green energy solutions. As they returned home, they carried with them a deeper appreciation for environmental conservation and a determination to advocate for a more sustainable future in travel and energy. An aspect which already has began, with the students analysing energy usage

in the new school building, the findings of which, they will present to the schools headteacher.

A.F.C. REPORT



Newton Aycliffe just missed out on a play-off place, finishing 6th in the Pitching In Northern Premier League Division One East; their highest ever league placing. Added to equalling their best FA Cup run (second qualifying round) and their best FA Trophy run (first round proper). The 2024-2025 has been an excellent achievement for Brian Atkinson's

Aycliffe were in the play-off hunt until the final day after a season which saw them scoring 93 goals (the highest in the league) along the way and with an average attendance of 236, an increase of over 20% on last season.

19th April

Sherwood Colliery 0-3 Newton Aycliffe

Aycliffe made the long trip to Nottinghamshire to face already relegated Sherwood Colliery. The home side did start off brightly, but their haphazard defending was their downfall when Jake Petitjean made it 1-0 in the 23rd minute after a pacey breakaway. Ten minutes later Dean Thexton made it 2-0. In the 49th minute the game was beyond Sherwood when Jake Petitjean got his brace. The second half saw Sherwood try to get back into it, but Aycliffe managed the game in a well enough manner to keep the clean sheet.

21st April

Newton Aycliffe 0-1 Dunston

This low scoring contest was probably not one for the neutral and it was decided in the 64th minute when David Robinson headed home from a cross in a crowded box. Aycliffe did send men forward towards the games end, but Dunston saw out the contest with a 1-0 win. Dunston finished the season in second place, earning a home tie in the play-off semi final on 29th April.

26th April

Ossett Town 0-0 Newton Aycliffe

Aycliffe struggled to accomplish much of note on a very heavy pitch where the home side had the far greater amount of chances throughout the game. Sparing a few Jim Pollard saves in both halves, very little happened to write home about from an Aycliffe perspective. Most crosses and attacks forward were easily dealt with by Ossett's goalkeeper Aleks Petrovic. Results elsewhere meant Aycliffe missed out on the playoffs.

To celebrate St. George's Day, it was a real privilege to secure an invitation for Mark Solan, founder of the Solan Connor Fawcett Family Cancer Trust, to No. 10 Downing Street for a special event. I was proud to secure this recognition for Mark and his team for all the incredible work they do in our community. Team Solan was established in 2015 to help improve the quality of life of children and adults who have been affected by a cancer diagnosis or bereavement. This local charity supports many families in Newton Aycliffe. They have provided bespoke help and support for thousands of people who have had their lives turned upside down by a cancer diagnosis.

At the event, Mark was thanked by the Prime Minister, Gary Lineker and even Ross Kemp. It was a pleasure, as your Member of Parliament, to be able to thank this amazing organisation which was helped so many people and raised £2m over the last decade. In Parliament, I've been proud to support a number of important measures which will benefit our community. The government's new deal for GP's will see an increase of £889m to improve access to services and will put an extra 1,500 extra GPs on the frontline. The government is also cutting red tape which will allow more practices to take on GPs and bring back the traditional family doctor role. Another big priority is speeding up access to operations and tests. I met so many families on the doorstep who had been stuck on waiting lists; progress on this has been a big priority. NHS waiting lists have now fallen seven months in a row thanks to this investment and more people are being treated and diagnosed quicker with an extra three million appointments since Labour came to power. This is crucial to ensuring residents are treated quickly and get the surgery they need to get on with their lives.

This week also marked the start of free Breakfast Clubs in two local schools. Part of the first 750 free breakfast clubs across the country, this government initiative aims to make sure kids start the day with a hungry mind, not a hungry stomach. And evidence shows that attending breakfast clubs before school improves young people's learning, which is incredibly important. Having access to free clubs will also save parents hundreds of pounds a year and enable all pupils to attend, not just those who can afford paid provision.

I also held a well-attended constituency advice surgery, meeting residents to provide support with a wide range of issues. Helping local families with individual issues is an important part of my role. This can include resolving issues with social housing providers, challenging inaccurate benefit decisions, raising complaints with a variety of organisations or asking for a review of decisions by NHS trusts. 

Unfair Fines

Dear Sir.

I am writing to share an issue that I believe affects many residents and local businesses in our community - the use of unfair parking fines by a private car park operator, Parking Group Limited, in Newton Aycliffe town centre. I have lived in Avcliffe for over 30 years and, as a former business owner in the town centre, I've always supported our local businesses.

On the day of the incident - a dark December afternoon - I had visited the town centre for some shopping and a haircut. When I returned to my car, the car battery suddenly failed. I had to wait for help and, as a result, exceeded the maximum parking time (2.5 hours) by 16 minutes (I entered the car park at 15.08 and exited at 17.54). I could not extend my stay as the car park does not have this option, even in case of emergency. I also want to note that the signage in the car park is not clearly visible in low light, which made it even harder to clearly see the terms and conditions and it could easily catch others out too.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank Bosch Car Service - Hilton Road Garage who lent me a power bank - their kindness turned a stressful moment into a reminder of the strong community spirit we're lucky to have in Aycliffe.

Despite explaining the situation and providing evidence, the parking company initially acknowledged it was a genuine issue and offered to reduce the fine to a £20 'admin fee'. However, when I appealed to POPLA in hopes of having the charge waived completely, I lost - and the full £100 fine was reinstated. This feels not only deeply unfair, but also disheartening for residents who are simply trying to shop locally and support town centre businesses. If these kinds of practices continue, they risk driving people away from Newton Aycliffe's town centre altogether. With local elections approaching, I believe that now is the time to raise this issue. I hope that by sharing my experience, others who've faced similar situations will feel encouraged to come forward - and that local candidates will consider how to better protect residents from overly aggressive private parking enforcement.

Thank you for your time and for being a voice for our community.

Lineside Signs to Celebrate Railway 200th

Almost 90 years ago the London and North Eastern Railway (LNER), installed huge signs on the railway lineside between London and Edinburgh to indicate to passengers places of interest and the distance to their destinations while travelling on their new streamlined Coronation train hauled by Gresley A4 Pacific steam engines.



Now, to mark the 200th anniversary of the Stockton & Darlington Railway and celebrate 200 years of passenger rail travel, new signs to a similar design will be erected along the surviving parts of the 1825 line between Shildon and Stockton to make passengers aware of the historical significance of the line they are travelling on.

While many of the original 1930s signs along the East Coast Main Line (ECML), were scrapped in the 1960s at the time of the Beeching cuts, several did survive. The most famous of these is the half way sign between London and Edinburgh situated north of York. Just north of Darlington Station a sign was erected to mark the route of the Stockton and Darlington Railway which, on 27th September 1825, ran the world's first scheduled locomotive hauled passenger train hauled by George Stephenson's Locomotion No 1. This track crossed the ECML on a flat crossing and remained in use for freight traffic until 2nd July 1967. The original LNER sign is still in position and was recently restored and is now a listed building.

To coincide with the 200th Anniversary celebrations of the S&DR this year, an idea to install five new signs on the Shildon to Stockton on Tees line and inspired by those of the original LNER of the 1930s, was suggested by Maurice Burns to Network Rail two years ago. From the very outset Network Rail were very supportive of the idea and the 'S & D sign project' was developed by Maurice with support from friends Richard Barber, Gordon Best and Nick Carter. The proposal was to install five signs located at Shildon, Heighington, Darlington North Road, Urlay Nook (near Allens West station) and Bowesfield in Stockton on the principle that Network Rail would install them if Maurice could coordinate the design, supply of materials and oversee the order for fabrication. Maurice and colleagues have worked closely with the charity Friends of the Stockton & Darlington Railway (FSDR) to turn ambitions into reality. Niall Hammond, the Chair of Trustees for the FSDR, secured grants and all involved are grateful to The Railway Heritage Trust, Durham County Council and Northern Trains for their generous support. The project team are also exceptionally grateful to Network Rail and their sub-contractors Amco Giffen, Construction Marine Limited and QTS Group for their in-kind support and the Network Rail commitment to install and care for the signs in future. Five signs will be erected on the Shildon to Stockton route, and agreement has also been reached for a sixth sign to replace a 'lost' one which indicated the branch westwards north of Darlington. Originally this pointed towards the 'Lake District, Teesdale and Weardale' but with the closure of the Stainmore route to Penrith and the Lakes, and the branch to Middleton in Teesdale in the early 1960s, the sign was cut down by British Railways. By chance, back in 1965, Maurice was doing some steam engine photography, saw the remains of this scrap sign lying on the ground and recorded it on film. The new sign, to be located on the ECML, will promote the route to Shildon, Bishop Auckland and Weardale where, today, it is still possible to travel from Darlington to Stanhope in Weardale using the heritage line from Bishop Auckland to Stanhope on days it is operating. With funding in place and agreements confirmed, the order has now

been placed for six signs to be manufactured by Northern Heritage Engineering based in Darlington, only a stone's throw away from the location where the original signs were made at Darlington North Road works. Once manufacture is complete, all the signs will be installed at agreed locations during 2025 to coincide with the 200th anniversary. Once the signs are in place, a dedicated webpage will be added to the Friends of the S&DR website celebrating the project and encouraging those passionate about rail heritage to visit and look out for the signs as they travel along the world's oldest public passenger railway.

Ayeliffe Cricket Club History Day **Scoreboard Report**



On a dry, but a genuinely freezing cold, day the start of the new cricket season got off in style for Newton Aycliffe's senior teams as they both chalked up maximum 25 points victories thanks to some outstanding individual and team performances. Newton Aycliffe's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, playing their first game back in the NYSD 3rd division after last season's relegation, had a tough game at home to Whitby 2nd XI, but eventually came out on top by 91 runs.
