Get On Board with Bus Travel

Residents are being encouraged to take advantage of discount bus fares in County Durham as part of a nationwide campaign to promote bus travel.

This September, Durham County Council is backing Catch the Bus Month, a campaign that celebrates the contribution buses make to the economy, as well as reducing congestion and air pollution.

In County Durham, residents and visitors can benefit from a range of discount fares, subsidised by the North East Combined Authority (NÉCA), of which the council is a partner.

. These include the £5 Durham Day Rover ticket, which allows people to hop on and off bus services, run by any operator in the county on the same day. Young people aged 21 and under can take advantage of Get Round for £1 single fares, as well as £3 day tickets, which allow unlimited travel across the region. In the last edition of the Newton News, lan Jones of Fornax stated that: "The plant would generate enough energy to power the equivalent of 700 homes. "This statement is rather disingenuous as it implies that home owners in the area of the incinerator could be the beneficiaries of the off-take heat. This is far from the truth. Following the planning appeal, Fornax signed a s106 agreement to construct a network to distribute heat to occupiers within 2km of the incinerator. In their application to discharge planning Condition 13, Fornax say they would reduce the pipe work to 1km, largely on the grounds of cost, and their preference is for distribution within Merchant Park, ie nowhere near homes!! Therefore the chances of homes acquiring the off-take is a false construct. If Fornax stuck to the agreement, homes may well have had the benefit of the off-take heat.

I quote, from a written statement made by Fornax in their application: "In practical terms the maximum distance considered for a pipe run is - 1km from the source of the off-take.' However, I note that Mr Jones refers in the article to "organisations within a mile of the site" who may want to take up the heat. Either he is not familiar with Fornax's formal application or he is not being entirely honest about their intentions. One mile is not equal to one kilometre, nor is it equal to the 2km as per the unilateral undertaking agreement/S106, which is relevant to Condition 13.

The application to discharge Condition 13 is yet to be decided by DCC.

Despite Mr Jones's words, Fornax do not appear concerned about building a trusting two way relationship, as stated in the mentioned article, their concerns are profit. Mr Jones's various accounts, using various media, are interesting, as in your previous article (dated) and on the radio, Aycliffe Radio 3/8/25, he mentions Health and Safety. On Aycliffe Radio he states that he will be inviting councillors to view the incinerator, but at that time, due to health and safety reasons, he was unable to send out the invitations, however, he was able to entertain within the facility the BBC television recording crew and reporter, and the ITV television recording crew. It appears that Mr Ian Jones is not interested in working with the community, being a good neighbour or Health & Safety, all they are interested in is controlling the narrative and portraying themselves in a positive light.

To conclude, profit and controlling the narrative are the objectives. If they are giving misleading and false constructs now, can you imagine the misinformation, should a permit is given? Hilda Longley.

Fornax 'Trustworthy'?

In the last edition of Newton News and on Aycliffe Radio (3/8/25), lan Jones of Fornax gave interesting accounts of the Newton Aycliffe incinerator in an effort to win people round to his claim that the incinerator will be safe and Fornax will be a "good neighbour". By way of balance, I would ask people to bear the following in mind. Since the planning application stage, Fornax has been inconsistent about what they intend to burn. As part of the public consultation (incidentally, brought about only after pressure from residents) on 14/6/21 and 15/6/21 Fornax attended two meetings online with local councillors, MP Paul Howell and local residents. These meetings were recorded and transcripts are included in the DCC planning portal Ref DM/21/01500

In answer to the question about what they intended to burn, Mark Roberts of Fornax said- "... the waste codes that we're actually applying for through the EA permit will mainly be what's called the 18s which is for waste from ... healthcare and or related research, so basically it's there really for us to support the NHS, support hospitals, support health centres and local industry I can pretty much guarantee for everybody listening tonight, so it's mainly going to be looking after the clinical waste which is prefix 18. We don't treat any municipal waste.

This was confirmed in Fornax's other publicity - letters to local businesses said "The facility would provide a valuable, local and costeffective service to the NHS and other similar facilities such as GP surgeries and dentists in County Durham and the surrounding area." No mention of Hazardous Waste (HW). Their website gave examples of only health-care sources of waste. The incinerator was promoted as a clinical waste incinerator, and emphasis placed on helping the NHS. However, when presented by the Resident's Group with data indicating that volumes of clinical waste in the northeast could not have sustained this incinerator, Fornax submitted a report to the planning inquiry stating "Healthcare/Clinical waste is not only a small proportion of the waste available for the plant, but also unlikely to form a large proportion of the tonnage to be targeted for incineration." So now we have the incinerator presented as a largely HW incinerator.

Mr Jones now states, without any explanation of the discrepancies, that 70% of the waste will be clinical. So, either Mr Jones the CEO is mistaken, or they will be taking clinical waste from much further afield than the northeast. Readers will recall that Fornax's prime justification for siting the incinerator in Aycliffe was that it is central to the clinical waste catchment area of Teesside, Durham, Northumberland and North Yorkshire. Despite frequent questions from the public, Fornax has never denied outright that waste would be coming from Scotland. In fact, Fornax has applied for their environmental permit to cover a whole host of wastes in addition to clinical, eg agriculture, textiles, chemicals, oils, power stations, packaging, oily rags (specifically excluded, by the way, by Mark Roberts 14/6/21), and many more. Everything but the kitchen sink, in other words and maybe that too! On the radio programme, Mr Jones said that he already knows what waste is coming in - and so he should. So why not be open about it? And why be coy about waste from Scotland?

Mr Jones says Fornax wishes to be a good neighbour and build a trusting relationship. Good neighbours are open, honest and transparent in their dealings with others. It seems to me that, throughout the whole process, Fornax has been less than open and transparent about many crucial aspects of this project. They have a long way to go before they can be described as trustworthy. Yours faithfully,

Forgotten Army

I write to honour people, like my dad, who fought with the British 14 Army often called the 'Forgotten Army'. Honouring the final victory, remembering the forgotten sacrifice they made in the following places: Burma, Singapore, Imphal, Kohima, and the jungles of the Pacific, in the best and hardship of the Far Fort Pritish in the heat and hardship of the Far East, British and Commonwealth soldiers faced the longest and harshest campaigns of WWII.

Thousands Object

Dear Sir,

In a recent article and radio interview, Ian Jones of Fornax described the proposed Newton Aycliffe incinerator as a safe facility and claimed Fornax would be a "good neighbour." Many of us residents fear this does not reflect reality.

Many of us argue Newton Aycliffe Business Park, where the hazardous waste incinerator would be sited, is not "mostly industrial" as claimed. It sites near nurseries, a college, cafes, children's activity centres, a family swimming centre, homes and small local businesses. Durham County Council refused planning permission, and residents made clear this location is wholly inappropriate for a hazardous waste incinerator. Thousands of objections were submitted to the Environment Agency, which can be viewed online. Local residents and businesses came together to campaign against the proposed hazardous waste incinerator. A peer review of risk assessments, within the permit application, was commissioned, which raised potential concerns we believe require serious consideration from the Environment Agency. Equally troubling are the many pages of waste types included in the Fornax application. Many in the community fear emissions pose serious long-term risks to the community's health and the environment. A Facebook group was created: STOP Heighington Lane Incinerator and has over 3,000 members. We strongly hope the Environment Agency refuse the permit.

A hazardous waste incinerator, we feel, does not belong in the heart of a community. If one must be built, it should be far from homes, schools, and businesses. Newton Aycliffe deserves clean air. Name and address supplied.

Service of Reflection

People affected by suicide are invited to an event in Durham City this weekend. Working with partners, Durham County Council and Darlington Borough Council, through their joint County Durham and Darlington Coroners Service, have organised a service of reflection which is open to anyone who has been affected by suicide in some way.

The service takes place at Durham Cathedral on Sunday 7th September from 6pm to 7pm, with this date chosen as it is close to World Suicide Prevention Day on 10th September.

Preventing suicide and supporting those affected by it are priorities for both councils and their Health and Wellbeing Boards. These boards see the councils work with the NHS and Healthwatch groups, which represent health and social care service users, to improve the health and wellbeing of people locally.

A number of organisations that provide mental health support have also helped organise the service and representatives will be at the event to offer assistance to anyone who needs it.

Clir Darren Grimes, Durham County Council's Deputy Leader, whose portfolio includes the Coroners Service, said: "Many people struggle with their mental health, and it is really important that everyone knows there is support out there for them if they are struggling, Sadly though, some people do die by suicide and our Coroners Service naturally comes into contact with bereaved friends and family as a result.

"Members of the team fully appreciate how hard it is for those bereaved by suicide and wanted to help. They came up with the idea of a service and felt it would be appropriate to arrange it around World Suicide Prevention Day.

"We'd like anyone who has been affected by suicide in any way to feel welcome at this event. We hope it will give people the chance to reflect in a quiet environment and remember loved ones. Support will be available to anyone who needs it at any point during the service. We hope everyone who attends will find it helpful in some

The service will be presided over by The Vice Dean of Durham Cathedral, The Reverend Canon Michael Hampel.
Organisations that have helped organise the event, and will be present to provide support to people, are: Samaritans, PAPYRUS Prevention of Young Suicide, If U Care Share, Survivors of Bereavement by Suicide, The Compassionate Friends and The Coroners' Courts Support Service. The service is also supported by Durham University.

These appointments are pre-bookable and patients should contact the surgery to book an appointment.

Parking Guidance

I politely asked them if there would be any letter deliveries that day as we hadn't had mail for several days and their response was 'no' as they had been told by their managers to prioritise parcel deliveries over letter deliveries. If I needed my post urgently I could go down to the Sorting Office to collect my own mail. I did so and luckily the only person there was able to locate my mail after checking my ID, to which I was very grateful. Not only were my tickets in the batch of mail, but also our credit card bill and FOUR NHS hospital appointment letters, one of which was bringing forward an appointment to within the next few days. Such service, or indeed non-service, is clearly unacceptable in these modern times. I appreciate there may be staff shortages and that Royal Mail are trying to compete with other couriers for parcels, but surely alternating between a parcel delivery one day and a letter delivery the next day would be an acceptable compromise. While Parliament has been in recess over August, I've been a busy spending time with local residents' groups, businesses and community organisations. Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report

Opening batsman Trent Telford, unluckily out for 49 the previous game, made amends when the 14 year old carried his bat for an excellent career best unbeaten 52 off 110 balls, including four boundaries. 14 year Freddie Lawler also hit a career best score when he finished with a superb unbeaten 72 off 78 balls and his innings included nine boundaries and a six as Aycliffe totalled a respectable 163 for 3 from their allotted 40 overs. In reply, the homeside eased to their victory target after 32 overs, with 13 year old Miles Telford marking his senior debut for Aycliffe by taking one of the only two

Flying Scotsman Joins the Titans



All Aboard Ghost Train



Excitement is building for celebrations in Darlington as the S&DR200 festival counts down to the 200th anniversary of the world's first passenger rail journey.

The inaugural journey of Locomotion No. 1 on the Stockton and Darlington Railway (S&DR) represented a major turning point in history and preparations are well underway to celebrate the historic first journey which took place on 27th September 1825.

On Saturday 20th September, prepare to be amazed as 'Ghost Train: The Departures' arrives in Darlington town centre with free, interactive performances and a spectacular evening parade to Hopetown. Commissioned by S&DR200, created and produced by Avanti Display Ltd and Walk the Plank, 'Ghost Train: The Departures' will begin with a theatrical re-imagining of Locomotion No. 1, with moving cogs and wheels, installed on a large plinth in the Market Square. Throughout the afternoon six large-scale structures, each mounted on customized cars, will bring to life, through performance, music, sound and feats of engineering, some of the most significant inventions of the last 200 vears.

Once the parade arrives at Hopetown, there will be a host of free, Night at the Museum activities for all the family. The exhibition sees six amazing steam engines standing side by side the 78018 BR Standard Class 2, the 62005 LNER K1, the freight-hauling 63395 LNER Q6, the 65894 LNER J27, the 63395 LNER Q6, the 60163 Tornado and the 60007 Sir Nigel Gresley.

On Sunday 28th September, 'Ghost Train: The Arrival' will move to Stockton-on-Tees on with an epic outdoor performance at the Riverside.

The anniversary celebrations continue in Darlington on Saturday 27th September, when there will be the chance to watch a re-enactment of the first journey on the S&DR as a newly restored replica of Locomotion No. 1 travels along part of the route of the original journey in 1825.
