St. Francis Horndale School Celebrate New Facilities



Schoolchildren have shown off their updated facilities following the merger of two schools. Durham County Council agreed to amalgamate St. Francis Church of England Junior School and Horndale County Infant and Nursery School in Newton Aycliffe, in January of this year.

St. Francis Horndale C of E (Aided) Primary School has now officially opened its doors to pupils following the summer holidays, with the council having completed work to accommodate all staff and children on the one site.

The authority has invested £650,000 in upgrading the facilities at the existing school, including a new layout with added capacity in each classroom, as well as new LED lighting,



heaters and furnishings.

An outdoor play area has also been installed for the infant and nursery children who have moved to the new site, which is less than 20 metres from the former Horndale County Infant and Nursery School.

The school now has capacity for 210 primary school pupils as well as a 26-place nursery class for children aged three.

Cllr Cathy Hunt, the council's Cabinet member for children and young people's services, said: "We're delighted that pupils and staff are already making the most of their upgraded facilities, with the new school year getting off to a fantastic start.

"Offering one, more modern and effective, school site will help staff to deliver a broader curriculum and make it easier for children to transition from nursery to primary school. As well as offering children at St. Francis Horndale the best start in life, it will make it easier for staff to work together as a team to provide an engaging education and supportive, nurturing school environment." Lisa Lakey, the school's headteacher, said: "We're so pleased to be all together in our completed school and have everyone under the same roof.

"The upgraded facilities are fantastic and will help us to enhance our current provision whilst also offering extra capacity for the community as it continues to grow.

"We're very grateful to the council for completing the work so quickly and feel proud that we have been able to work together to make sure the new St. Francis Horndale is the best it can be for our lovely pupils now and those who will attend in the future. New Students Begin at UTC South Durham

UTC South Durham, based on Newton Aycliffe Business Park, has welcomed a new intake of Year 10 and Year 12 students this September. Year 10 students are starting a curriculum that blends GCSEs with a strong focus on Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM). Alongside core subjects, they will gain practical experience in engineering and technical skills, helping to prepare them for future career pathways.

In the Sixth Form, students are beginning one of three specialist routes. Some are taking a one year course designed to provide practical engineering skills for apprenticeships, while others are enrolled on the Engineering T Level or a collection of STEM-focused A Levels. The UTC recently celebrated a 100% pass rate on its T Level course, which is delivered in a specialist engineering annex

As part of their induction programme,

Year 10 students visited one of the UTC's founding partners, Hitachi, to learn about career opportunities available after their studies. They also took part in team building activities at Witton Castle to help them settle in and make new friends.

Nobody Should Suffer in Silence: Standing Together Against Hate Crime and Criminal Damage

Over recent weeks and months, there has been a concerning rise in hate crime and racially motivated criminal damage across County Durham and Darlington. From offensive graffiti to the vandalism of our highways to serious verbal abuse.

Criminal damage is a crime that can impact negatively on the pride and community confidence in our towns and villages, it costs taxpayers money to repair and, when motivated by prejudice, strikes at the very heart of who we are as a community.

Hate crime is even more serious. It is defined as any criminal act that is motivated by hostility or prejudice based on a person's race, religion, sexual orientation, disability, or transgender identity. Behind every statistic lies a victim, someone who may feel unsafe in their own home, their own street, or their own workplace, because of who they are.

That is unacceptable. Nobody should suffer in silence or be subjected to verbal threats and abuse.

Hate crime does more than damage property. It damages lives, trust, and community cohesion. It spreads fear among entire communities and can escalate very quickly if not challenged early and robustly. That is why I want to send a clear message: hate crime and racially motivated criminal damage will not be tolerated in County Durham and Darlington. The police will uphold the law, and those responsible will be dealt with

But enforcement alone is not enough. We need the public's help. Many of these incidents go unreported, either because victims fear nothing will be done, or because witnesses assume someone else will act.

I want to reassure every resident: if you are targeted, or if you witness these crimes, your voice matters. By reporting hate crime, you will not only help the police catch offenders, but also help us understand the true scale of the problem and target resources where they are needed most.

There are several ways to report. If you are in immediate danger, always dial 999. For non-emergencies, you can call 101, report online via the Durham Constabulary website, or attend your local police station.

If you do not wish to speak directly to the police, you can contact Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or via their website. Crimestoppers is completely independent, and you can share information whilst remaining 100% anonymous. As your Police and Crime Commissioner, I am committed to ensuring that all victims are supported, and offenders are held accountable for their actions. I have invested in victim services so that anyone affected by hate crime can access practical and emotional help. I also continue to work with partners across councils, schools, community groups and faith organisations to promote education, tolerance and early intervention, because prevention is always better than cure.

We all have a part to play. Whether by challenging prejudice when we hear it, supporting a neighbour who has been targeted, or simply refusing to turn a blind eye, we can make a difference. Hate has no place in our towns and villages!

Let us unite against hate crime and racial motivated criminal damage and show that County Durham and Darlington remain places where everyone is respected, valued and safe. Nobody should live in fear. Nobody should suffer in silence. And I will ensure that those who commit these crimes are brought to justice.

Puppy Mauled to Death

Authorities are urging dog owners to take responsibility and prevent further tragedies after a four-month-old Cocker Spaniel was killed in a vicious attack by two XL Bully dogs in Ferryhill.

The incident occurred outside the puppy's home, where its 18-year-old owner was also injured and required hospital treatment. The XL Bully dogs, which should have been muzzled and kept on leads in public, were roaming freely after escaping from a property with no secure gates.



"This was a devastating and preventable tragedy," a spokesperson said. "Dangerous dogs must be kept under strict control at all times. Owners have a legal responsibility - failure to comply can result in fines, prison sentences and destruction orders."

The Facts

- Thousands of dog-on-dog attacks are reported in the UK every year.
- Owners are legally responsible for ensuring their dogs are under control in public.
- XL Bullies and other restricted breeds must always be muzzled and leashed when outside.
- Attacks can lead to criminal prosecution and severe penalties.

How to Prevent Attacks

- · Always keep dogs on a lead in public places.
- Use a muzzle when required by law.
- · Seek professional help at the first sign of aggression.
- Report dangerous or uncontrolled dogs before tragedy strikes.

The public is being urged to remain vigilant. If you are aware of a dangerous dog in your area, report it immediately.

"This innocent puppy's death is a stark reminder of the devastating consequences when dogs are not properly controlled," the spokesperson added. "We cannot allow this to happen again."

Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report

Newton Aycliffe's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, had to dig deep to earn, what had earlier seemed, an unlikey draw at home to third in the table Yarm 1sts on Saturday 6th September in the NYSD 3rd division. Yarm elected to bat first and scored a respectable 160 for 6 from their allotted 40 overs, despite some good bowling from Leo Mercy (sponsored by Yvonne and Bob Wood), who finished with 2 for 15 from a very tidy ten overs and Matty Greaves (2 for 51 from ten overs). In reply, the ever reliable opener Tez Smit, helped get the home side off to a decent start scoring 33 from 36 balls, but Aycliffe still slipped to worrying 88 for 9 with 11 overs still



remaining. However, a defiant unbroken tenth wicket partnership of 22 by Leo Mercy (13 not out off 58 balls) and Ben Howard (10 not out off 29 balls) saw their side safely to stumps in a tense finale to earn an unlikely draw for the hosts.

The following Saturday (13th September) Aycliffe's first team travelled to already relegated Thornaby 2nd XI for the final game of the season and came away with an excellent 41 run victory. Electing to bat first, Aycliffe made a respectable 160 all out after 39.2 overs. Leon Patel top scored for Aycliffe with a steely 42 off 72 balls and his excellent innings included four boundaries, other major contributions came from Tez Smit (29 off 42 balls) and Ramzan Hussain (16 off 20 balls). In reply, Aycliffe's Ben Howard bowled brilliantly, taking 3 for 26 from his ten over spell to help reduce Thornaby to 57 for 5. With the homeside digging in for a draw, the introduction of spinner Tom Dearden had an immediate effect as he took the last three wickets for just three runs to help Aycliffe to victory with 4.1 overs remaining.

Aycliffe's first team finished their season in a creditable fourth place in the NYSD third division table with 299 points from 22 games played. On Saturday 6th September, Aycliffe's 2nd team were well beaten by 167 runs away at Yarm 2nd XI in the NYSD 4th division. Yarm were asked to bat first and scored a huge 240 for 4 declared after just 34 overs, despite some good bowling by Jon Tait (2 for 58), Shashank Garg (2 for 50) and Will Moffatt (1 for 53). In reply, 15 year old Will Moffatt top scored with a senior best 22 runs off 35 balls, Dan Weldon hit 16 off 23 balls and Matty French chipped in with 10 off 40 balls, as Aycliffe were bowled out for just 73 after 23 overs.

The following weekend Aycliffe's 2nd team lost at home to Bishop Auckland 2nd XI by just four wickets in a much improved performance in their final game of the season. Aycliffe were asked to bat first and were bowled out for just 84 after 28.3 overs. Veteran Tony Travis (sponsored by John Wardle) top scored with 20 off 31 balls, Matty Thompson smashed a quickfire 19 off just 7 balls and opener Matty French chipped in with 11 off 33 balls. In reply, the visitors also struggled to score runs thanks to some superb bowling by Jon Tait,



who finished with career best figures of 4 for 28. 15 year old Tom Norman (2 for 28) also bowled well, but they couldn't stop Bishop from reaching their winning target after 21.5 overs and with four wickets in hand.

Site Visit

Heighington Lane Incinerator Facility.

Following Ian Jones' appearance on the Around Town radio show on 1st August, Andy and I requested access to the incinerator site to follow up on the answers Ian provided to our questions during the show.

This was to be scheduled once all of the heavy construction work was completed, allowing for safe supervised access. On Wednesday 3rd September we were given total, unrestricted access, to all areas of the site with lan Jones acting as our guide.

Answering all of the questions that arose from the detailed explanation of the processes involved, including the pre-approved waste safely arriving on site, the security screening of the waste before it's accepted and then processed ready to begin the incineration of the waste from start to finish. Such was the level of access provided, at one point we were able to see the internal construction of the incinerator drum itself.

We were walked through every stage of the process, given a detailed explanation of what every piece of equipment was, its role in the incineration process, all of the technical details involved and the individual safety measures that appeared to go above and beyond what is required to be installed and operational at every key stage of the process.

Every question was answered, and concerns were recognised and dealt with, over the two hours we spent on site. We were also able to witness the installation of the first two remote air quality monitoring sensors around the site which will shortly be in operation to provide Fornax with a six month detailed baseline of air quality and residual particulate and NOx gas levels present in the atmosphere before the incinerator comes into operation.

We have already been granted permission to return for further site visits, to view the findings of the external sensors and, again, once the facility becomes fully operational.

lan has agreed to further share this with Great Aycliffe Town Council in due course. Our community expects Fornax to deliver their promise to operate responsibly, and we intend to remain involved and pro-active to ensure this happens.

Our constituency has a proud rail history and an even brighter future and I'm determined to keep backing local industry, jobs and opportunities for the next generation.


Update Plant Plans

Ref: 'Detailed Plans for Gold Standard High Temperature Waste Treatment Plant" Newton News - 15th August 2025'.

Firstly, it was almost a relief to see the CEO of Fornax had some input into local information, to give the residents an opportunity to see what is awaiting approval from the Environment Agency.

On the face of it, the incinerator looks to be state of the art, according to all the descriptions set out in the plans, however there are several anomalies which means the incinerator is maybe not quite as gold standard as it could be and this raises several important questions, some of which are listed below. The statement that the incinerator will generate enough energy to power 700 homes is probably correct, however, how will this 'power' be distributed? The 'power' the plant is producing is heat - not electricity, therefore, what looks good on paper, is not likely to become actual for any local homes. The statement that the plant has been designed with the best available proven techniques from Europe, however, there is no Flue Gas recirculation, which further reduces NOx - nor is there any Carbon Gas capture see the Olive report on operating techniques both technologies are available and beneficial, therefore why are they not implemented? There are two different air dispersion modelling reports. The first, produced by Independent Air Quality & Odour Specialists, dated May 2022 uses the meteorological data from Teesside Airport. This data has the prevailing wind direction for Newton Aycliffe, as predominantly south westerly. In the second report, produced by Olive Consulting, dated February 2024, the prevailing wind direction is taken from the meteorological data from RAF Leeming, which is much further away from Newton Aycliffe and the prevailing wind direction used in this report is south easterly. Why are there two reports, (both sent to DCC planning) and why is the second one in the EA permit application, using the air dispersion modelling data which is the furthest away from Newton Aycliffe?

All documents referenced above are available on DCC planning portal. Reference Docs FYI. Included are the diagrams from the air dispersion documents for reference: Left is the first report, right is the Olive report:



These show the air dispersion for NOx, the scale of the maps are very close, however, the spread of the NOx is much higher concentration in the first than in the second. We really want Fornax to explain why they are using the Olive report.

It is all very well for Mr Jones to glibly tow the company line in terms of 'perceived' safety, but truthfully, does he really expect us to throw our arms open in welcome to a continuous 'wagon-train' of hazardous filth piling off the motorway into our town day-in, day-out and honestly believe that this is to our benefit? I think not, unless lower house prices, additional heavy-goods traffic and further downgrading of an area, just recovering from the recent land-fill issues, is something he feels that we can all celebrate.

I get that business is business, but Fornax and their CEO attempting to sell us their snake-oil in terms of future benefits and negligible impact to the surrounding area is extremely difficult to swallow. Please give us credit for knowing when we're about to be dumped on again, literally... Norman Liddle.


