Esh Secures Additional £4m Contract at Greenfield Academy

Earlier this year, the contractor was awarded a contract to develop the academy's new education hub in Newton Aycliffe.

Esh Construction has been appointed to deliver a £4 million refurbishment programme at Greenfield Academy, complementing the ongoing new build project already underway in Newton Aycliffe.

The refurbishment works form part of a phased approach to modernising the school estate and will run alongside the construction of the new £14 million three-storey education hub. Esh was appointed to deliver the new school facility in June 2025 in partnership with Durham County Council and the Advance Learning Partnership Multi Academy Trust. The combined investment will provide state-of-the-art facilities for students and staff, supporting the school's ambition to create an inspiring learning environment for future generations.

Grant Watson, Construction Manager at Esh Construction, said: "We're delighted to extend our involvement at Greenfield Academy through this significant refurbishment programme. Alongside the new build, these works will transform key areas of the school, providing modern, high-quality spaces for teaching and learning. Our team is committed to delivering the project safely, efficiently, and to the highest standards, ensuring the school community benefits from improved facilities." The refurbishment contract will run in several phases to minimise disruption to school operations, with the initial phase focusing on the music and drama classrooms, followed by works to the main hall, reception, dining and kitchen areas in later phases. Work will include full roof replacement with new insulation and weatherproof membranes, upgraded ceilings and floor finishes, full decoration and the installation of new partitions to create





additional teaching spaces.

Mechanical and electrical upgrades will be carried out, with LED lighting introduced throughout, new ventilation systems installed, and improved drainage to accommodate new toilet facilities.

James Keating, Executive Headteacher at Greenfield Academy, said "We are thrilled to see this next phase of investment in our school. The refurbishment works, alongside the new build facility, will completely transform our learning environment and provide exceptional facilities for both current pupils and future generations. This project reflects our commitment to delivering the very best opportunities for our young people and ensuring Greenfield Academy remains at the heart of the community."

Cllr Cathy Hunt, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for children and young people's services, added: "Staff, students and the whole community are quite rightly excited by the school's new build, and it's important that the entire school estate offers students a modern, fit for purpose and inspiring learning environment.

"This refurbishment project will help to deliver that, providing state-of-the-art facilities for those who currently attend, as well as future generations of learners. We look forward to seeing the project completed and witnessing the positive impact this will have on staff and students."

The new education hub is expected to complete in Autumn 2026 and will provide 19 classrooms, and specialist subject hubs for IT, art, design & technology and science, whilst a sports centre extension will enable the Academy to open the doors for community use outside of school hours.

Santa's Christmas Eve Tour of Great Aycliffe

The Town Council will deliver this year's Santa event using five Council-owned vehicles, each equipped with a Santa Sleigh and festive lighting. Three vehicles will operate with a Santa, driver and navigator, while two will run with Santa and a driver only.

Each route will include 2-3 fixed meeting locations - often community centres or pubs, with parking available. These venues are encouraged to host attendees with Santa meeting families both indoors and outdoors for 45-60 minutes at each stop. Between fixed points, vehicles will tour local streets without stopping, covering as many safe streets as possible. Areas requiring more street-by-street touring will use the three-cab vehicles with navigators.

A separate Christmas Eve morning tour will visit all care homes in the Parish. A new 'Find Santa' online tool will show route maps and meeting locations so residents can easily find the nearest stop. In total, 24 volunteers will run the event:

- 6 Santa's (for the five main routes plus the care-home tour);
- 6 Drivers;
- 4 Navigators;
- 8 Support vehicle volunteers (two per route on four routes); Key Improvements of the New Format - Safety Enhancements Eliminates the risk of Santa riding on the back of moving vehicles.

Avoids large vehicles navigating tight, parked-car-lined streets. Reduces the danger of children approaching moving vehicles by using fixed, static meeting points. Provides trained drivers and proper volunteer vetting, health checks and briefings.

Operational Benefits

Reduces volunteer requirements from 36 to 24, making recruitment more achievable. Uses only Council vehicles, removing risks associated with borrowed or donated vehicles. Ensures standby volunteers and support vehicles are available for quick response to issues. Enables the creation of a reserve pool of trained volunteers, improving reliability.

Community Experience Improvements

Fixed times and locations eliminate delays, missed streets or route overruns. Residents can choose the most convenient time or place to meet Santa, improving accessibility.

Two larger venues will offer extended stays and are accessible by car. Santa can interact more personally with children at ground level, rather than from a raised platform. Volunteers will spend a maximum of four hours outside instead of five or more.

Council Tax Increases

Dear Sir,

A motion was on the agenda at the Full Council meeting on 10th December in which Great Aycliffe Town Council proposed increasing its Council Tax by no more than 2.8% for 2026/27 - below the rate of inflation. However, the new Reform UK administration at Durham County Council has reneged on its agreement regarding the LCTRS grants to parish and town councils. In effect, it is withholding money provided by the Government specifically to be passed on to these councils. This action is forcing parish and town councils to impose far higher Council Tax increases than would otherwise have been necessary.

Reform UK won control of Durham County Council on a pledge to freeze Council Tax. Yet the Government made it clear that, to receive additional funding under the Fair Funding Review, the Council must increase Council Tax by the maximum 4.99% each year for the next three years. If it failed to do so, it would be penalised through reduced funding. By choosing instead to withhold around £1 million each year from parish and town councils - money intended for them - Reform UK is creating a situation in which these councils face either significant cuts to services and facilities or substantial Council Tax rises for local residents. Furthermore, it has abandoned our three-year agreement a full year early.

Reform ÚK's actions have rendered its commitments meaningless and have damaged trust. The County Durham Association of Parish and Town Councils, representing more than 103 councils, shares this concern. Regards,

Partnership Wins Award

A partnership that launched a pioneering recycling service in the region has won a prestigious gong at the National Recycling Awards 2025.

Durham County Council, and its partners Medequip and HW Martin Waste, won the Partnership Excellence: Public/Private Sector Award after launching the region's first medical equipment recycling service.

Through convenient drop off points at the local authority's Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs) across the county, the initiative addresses the significant financial losses faced by local NHS and social care services due to unreturned equipment. By recovering, safety testing, sterilising and reintegrating items into Medequip's inventory, the service promotes sustainability and resource efficiency. In its first three months, 360 items were recovered, saving the NHS £7,380, an average of £20.50 per item. Since launch, the initiative has collected more than 4,300 items, delivering estimated savings of nearly £90,000. Meanwhile, during the 2024/25 period, nearly eight tonnes of medical equipment were diverted from disposal. Initially, due to funding limitations, Medequip was unable to provide receptacles at all the council's HWRCs, risking a backlog of equipment. However, HW Martins Waste Ltd resolved this by supplying 1100-litre receptacles, enabling a full-service rollout across all twelve permanent sites.



Readers may have seen the leaflet distributed by Fornax to houses in our area, in its efforts to get the community on board with its incinerator plant. Readers may also have spotted the contradictory statements that high temperature will obliterate any harmful substances but there will be emissions of harmful substances.

To support their claim that emissions of the harmful substances will have 'no significant impact on local air quality', they say 'NOx gas, including dioxins and furans, released each year will be the same as from a single diesel HGV doing 20,000 miles a year'. 



DURHAM POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER

Last week I took a call from my daughter, who lives just fifteen minutes away. She was worried about driving to work because the roads were already turning white and the snow was falling heavily.

She asked what it was like where I lived - and at that moment it was perfectly clear: no snow, dry roads, blue skies. But within ten minutes, everything changed. The weather closed in, visibility dropped, and the landscape was transformed. That sudden shift was a stark reminder that winter conditions can change rapidly and without warning, and why every journey, even the familiar ones, requires preparation. Here are practical steps, echoing National Highways' Safe T.R.I.P. campaign and TyreSafe guidance, that every driver should adopt.

 Follow the T.R.I.P. check before every journey T: Top Up. Ensure your vehicle has plenty of fuel or, for electric vehicles, adequate charge, allowing for diversions or delays. Top up screen wash with freeze resistant fluid and check oil, coolant and anti-freeze.

R: Rest. Fatigue reduces reaction times, especially in long night drives, fog or heavy rain. Build in rest stops on longer routes. I: Inspect. Check tyre tread (legal minimum 1.6mm, but aim for 3mm), air pressure and


condition. Make sure lights work, wipers are effective, and your windscreen is fully cleared before moving off.

P: Prepare. Carry a winter-ready kit: warm clothing, blanket, high visibility jacket, warning triangle, de-icer, scraper, torch, charger/power bank, water, snacks, first-aid kit, jump leads and a small shovel for rural areas.

Winter conditions can vary sharply, even a few miles apart, as my daughter and I discovered. Before travelling: Check traffic alerts, accidents and road closures. Review Met Office warnings for snow, ice or freezing fog. Stick to main roads where possible, as they are more likely to be aritted.

If conditions worsen, delay or reconsider your journey. The sun sits low in the sky, creating dangerous glare. Always keep sunglasses in the car and ensure your windscreen is spotless. Modern LED headlights and wet roads can dazzle. If you are sensitive to glare, consider anti-glare night-driving glasses.

Drive for the weather, not the clock. Reduce speed and leave significantly more space. Brake early and accelerate gently. Expect black ice on bridges, shaded bends and rural roads. Avoid harsh steering or sudden manoeuvres. If travelling in severe weather, tell someone where you're going and when you expect to arrive. Build in extra time and never feel pressured to take risks.



Withdrawal of Council Tax Support Grant

Withdrawal of Council Tax Support Grant by Durham County Council leaves Town Council facing a £145,000 Revenue Budget Shortfall.

The Town Council is in the process of developing its Revenue and Capital Budget for the 2026/27 financial year.

In overall terms, the Town Council is preparing the Revenue Budget on the principle of protecting and maintaining all of our current services, facilities, and events next year.

The Council is also prudently planning to maintain some surplus resources in the budget which will allow it to replenish its balances and reserves.

This will help ensure that we can continue to make capital investment in valued community assets such as cemeteries, allotments, parks and play areas, for the benefit of the community, in the coming years. In order to do so, the Council was proposing to raise the Town Council proportion of the Council Tax bill by around £5.61 per year (equating to an increase of 2.8%) for the vast majority of local taxpayers i.e. those living in Band A properties. The Town Council Tax currently amounts to 11p in every £1 of Council Tax paid.

This increase would have been below the current rate of inflation and as a result of the Council's ongoing efforts to cut costs, increase income and deliver value-for-money services.

Sadly, however, the new Reform Administration at Durham County Council has made a decision to withdraw, in full, the Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme Grant funding paid to town and parish councils, despite an expectation by Central Government that this funding is passed on, which will result in a £145,250 loss of revenue for the Town Council next year (representing 7% of the current Council Precept) This action is effectively forcing parish and town councils to make a choice, at very late notice, between making significant cuts to services and facilities or considering substantial council tax rises for local residents.

The grant cut, if offset via the Council Precept would regrettably result in the Town Council Tax increase rising to £13.86 per year (an increase of 6.92%).

The Town Council is of the view that this grant cut is being imposed on the Town Council with little notice or consultation at a very late stage in the budget setting process, and that making cuts to valued town council services and events is not an acceptable course of action, and has therefore taken the decision to fund the grant cut via the council tax. This one-off increase will fully offset the financial impact of the grant cut and make the Town Council financially self-sufficient moving forwards. We hope you will agree that a monthly increase of £1.16 in the Band A

Town Council Tax bill is a small price to pay to ensure that all the existing services provided by the Town Council can be protected for another year, despite the actions of Durham County Council in withdrawing the Council Tax Support Grant.
