A Unique Challenge . . .

Newton Aycliffe Rugby Club has announced an ambitious new community initiative aimed at introducing more local men to the sport of rugby while improving fitness, mental health and social connection.

The Newton Aycliffe Rugby Club Challenge is open to men aged 18 and over, with no previous rugby experience required. All body types and fitness levels are welcome. The project is designed for those not currently involved in sport, those looking to improve fitness without gym costs, or anyone interested in learning rugby in a supportive, structured environment.

Participants will be coached separately from the club's existing squad and introduced to the fundamentals of the game, including fitness, ball handling, tackling techniques and game understanding. The ultimate goal is to create a brand-new team from scratch, capable of playing a full 80-minute match against the club's 1st XV by mid-August. In future seasons, the team could go on to compete in the Candy League under the name Aycliffe Vikings, including fixtures against local rivals Sedgfield Saxons.

The club highlights the wider benefits of the initiative, including improved physical fitness, mental wellbeing and the opportunity to become part of a close-knit rugby community. The entire project will be visually documented from start to finish, with the potential for inclusion in a local documentary.

Newton Aycliffe Rugby Club is also inviting volunteer rugby and fitness coaches to take part in the initiative. While voluntary, the role offers valuable experience for those pursuing a future in sports coaching.

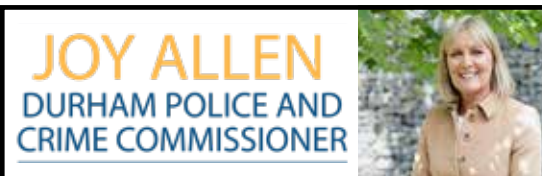

Police Mergers – Will a London Centric Power Grab be the death knell for Local Policing!
Durham Constabulary was established 187 years ago in 1839, when it became one of England's first county police forces. Its boundaries once included Hartlepool, Sunderland, Gateshead and South Shields.

These boundaries changed in the 1970s, when parts of the county became part of Northumbria and Cleveland. But those changes followed legislation, scrutiny and public debate in recognition that policing is about place, identity and trust.

To date there has been no consultation whatsoever on these proposals, apart from lots of column inches given the opinions of London based Metropolitan Police Commissioner and the Chair of National Police Chief Council, no published research, no impact assessment and no sense that the public has been asked what they think of creating large, centrally controlled, forces.

This matters because policing does not belong to politicians, civil servants or police chiefs. It belongs to the public. People experience policing not through strategies or structures, but through whether an officer turns up when they call, whether local problems are understood and whether someone is accountable when things go wrong.

Local policing works because it is local. Officers know their patch. Leaders understand the difference between a policing a city, a market town and a rural village. Communities know who is responsible and how to raise concerns. That connection is important and, once weakened, it is extremely hard to rebuild.

Supporters of force mergers argue that crime does not respect borders. That is true, and it always has been. But police forces already work together across borders every day. Serious and organised crime is tackled jointly. Intelligence is shared. Collaboration exists without dismantling local policing or erasing local identity.

We should also challenge the assumption that bigger automatically means better or saves money. Some of the largest police forces in the country, Greater Manchester, the West Midlands, Nottinghamshire and the Metropolitan Police have all, at some point, been placed into special measures because they were failing. Size did not protect them. In some cases, it made problems harder to spot, harder to manage and harder to fix. Large organisations can become distant, complex and difficult to control. Here in the North East, these options are already being talked about. Should Durham remain as it is, reflecting its mix of urban, town and rural communities? Should Durham merge with Northumbria, while Darlington aligns with Cleveland to reflect North East and Tees Valley footprints? Or should local oversight be replaced by a regional board represented by mayoral areas?

Each option would have far-reaching consequences for how policing feels on the ground. Yet, ordinary people have not been asked what they think about any of these options. British policing is built on a simple, but powerful, idea set out nearly two hundred years ago by Sir Robert Peel: the police are the public and the public are the police. That principle only works when policing is shaped with public consent. Yes, policing must evolve. Chiefs will argue for radical change to meet modern challenges. But radical change imposed from above, without evidence and without public involvement, breaks the very bond that policing depends on. Change must be done with communities, not to them. This decision is too big, too important and too far-reaching to be cobbled together behind closed doors. The public deserve a say in the future of their local policing and I will do my utmost to ensure they do!

Site Visit

Dear Sir,

After my last email, I have followed it up by contacting Fornax. I was kindly contacted by Fornax for an independent site visit to establish what safety measures have been put in place in order to run the site safely once in operation.

Based on my background, having worked in various COMAH environments, I asked how the risks are controlled and I was advised that a preliminary HAZOP study has been carried out. This HAZOP study has to be fully reviewed before starting up the plant. Based on the back of this, a LOPA study has to be conducted which, in turn, will trigger a SIL study 1 to 4, which, in turn, will trigger a SIF study. This means the level of controls the business needs to put in place in order to run the site.

The business has got a CEMS in place. This means Continuous Emission Monitoring System. The business has been pro-active by installing a system to monitor the current environment before it goes into operation, so a basic footprint is established before the plant goes live.

Whilst visiting the plant, I was informed about the level of protection the business has put in place. I was really impressed with the level of fire suppression put in place in the storage facility. Never ever seen this level of protection in my life before. Bearing in mind having worked on various COMAH sites.

I have also been advised as regards their drainage facilities. All of it is captured below ground level since the fire brigade will not attend site until it is safe.

This is all I can say to local residents, who are 'worried' about the local alarm at 10.45 every Thursday and considering you have another COMAH site. Not only that, local residents have to realise that local spray firms cause more hazard to life.

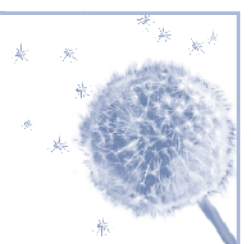

'Taking Time to Talk'

A young man overcame significant mental health challenges by addressing his mental and physical wellbeing simultaneously with the support of Wellbeing for Life (WBFL).

Kieren Kemp had been through a difficult time in his life, leading him to a point of severe depression and suicidal thoughts. After a 12-week wellbeing programme and building a relationship with his practitioner where he could share the challenges he was experiencing, Kieren had secured a new job, and his friends and family noticed a remarkable change in him.

Speaking of his experience, and his encouragement to others, Kieren said: "It can sometimes be surprising where you find support, for me it has been from a community organisation, who champion the wellbeing of everyone. I've got the motivation to look after myself now and want to share my story so that anyone who might be in a similar place to where I was will see, you're not alone. Reach out and there will be someone who can help."

An excitement for the future and its possibilities has been sparked in Kieren. He said: "I'm looking forward to being myself, enjoying my new self-confidence and being able to socialise more."

In County Durham, the prevalence of mental health conditions has increased by 5.8% since 2023/24. This rise is higher than the North East region, and England as a whole. It is ever more important to break down barriers; to listen, share, and encourage others to talk.

At the point of referral to WBFL, from the County Durham Resilience service, Kieren was struggling with low self-esteem and was underweight. It was at this moment that he began his journey to recovery.

Kevin Howe, Wellbeing Practitioner at WBFL, reached out to Kieren; he arranged their first meeting at the Pioneering Care Centre in Newton Aycliffe. Kevin's own experiences with similar challenges allowed him to connect with Kieren on a personal level, providing invaluable support and creating a safe, open space to talk.

Children at St. Joseph's Catholic Primary School enjoyed a magical day of storytelling and celebration as the school marked Winnie the Pooh Day with creative activities, workshops and a special teddy bears' picnic on Friday 16th January.

Pupils arrived dressed as their favourite characters from A. A. Milne's much loved stories, transforming the school into the Hundred Acre Wood. The colourful costumes helped to create a sense of excitement and set the tone for a day focused on enjoying classic children's literature.



Blue Badge Abuse

A woman has been fined after being caught using the Blue Badge of an elderly man she used to care for.

Durham County Council took legal action against Carys Coates, of Hill View, Esh Winning, after a civil enforcement officer checked the Blue Badge of a car parked on double yellow lines in Stanley.

While checking the badge, a woman returned to the vehicle and had a conversation with the officer, who advised that she had not set the clock on the Blue Badge.

The matter was reported to the council's corporate fraud team as the badge on display belonged to a man, but he was not present when the woman returned to the car. Peterlee Magistrates Court heard that the badge belonged to an elderly man living in Ponteland, while checks on the car's registration showed the vehicle belonged to Coates.

Coates was invited to an interview under caution, in which she told the council she had the badge as she used to be the carer of the man and admitted to using it while he was not present.

The 22-year-old pleaded guilty to misuse of a Blue Badge. She was ordered to pay a £119 fine, £250 costs, and a £48 victim surcharge. Tracy Henderson, Durham County Council's chief internal auditor and corporate fraud manager, said: "Blue Badge misuse undermines a vital scheme designed to help those with genuine mobility needs."

"In this case, the driver admitted to using the badge to avoid a parking ticket, knowing full well it should not have been used without the owner of the badge being present. The driver now faces a financial penalty much larger than what the parking would have cost."

"This successful prosecution demonstrates our zero-tolerance approach towards those who misuse the Blue Badge scheme and our commitment to ensuring fair access for those who genuinely need it."

The school was delighted to welcome Seven Stories, the National Centre for Children's Books, who worked with each class during the day. Through interactive sessions, children explored key themes from the Winnie the Pooh stories, including woodland nature, adventure and friendship, encouraging imagination, discussion and creativity.

Mr Hunt, Deputy Headteacher at St. Joseph's Catholic Primary School said: "It was wonderful to see the children so engaged and enthusiastic throughout the day. Events like this help bring stories to life and encourage a genuine love of reading across the whole school."

The day ended with a joyful teddy bears' picnic, where children brought in their own favourite teddy bears to join in the celebrations. Older pupils shared Winnie the Pooh stories with younger children, creating a warm and supportive atmosphere and strengthening links across different year groups.

Ms Young, EYFS lead, commented: "The way the older children supported the younger pupils by reading to them was really special. It reflected the themes of friendship and kindness that are so central to the Winnie the Pooh stories."

Cash Cow Motorists

Dear Sir,

I recently suffered a cardiac arrest, necessitating a triple heart bypass and hospitalisation/convalescence for several weeks.

When I eventually returned home in November 2025 I desperately needed provisions & visited Aldi & Tesco on the evening of Monday 1st December 2025, when it was quiet, parking in the Costa Coffee car park (42 minutes stay). My condition after surgery dictated that I shouldn't lift anything heavy, as such I returned to the same car park on the evening of Friday 4th Dec 2025 to complete my shopping (18 minutes stay).

I subsequently received two parking fines totalling £200.00 from 'Civil Enforcement' - because I had entered 'Costa Coffee' car park after 8.00pm where apparently, no parking is now permitted between 8.00pm & 6.30am, My calculations are that this equates to a parking rate of £3.33 per minute which is even more expensive than exorbitant airport charges.

I contacted 'Civil Enforcement' to appeal against their fines explaining my personal circumstances and also pointing out that although the 'terms & conditions' had changed the signage looked exactly the same as it had before, I also emphasised that both my visits had been during dark and inclement weather which meant that 'terms and conditions' were virtually impossible to read, my appeal was rejected and under threat of a 'debt recovery agent', I have been forced to pay the fines. It would appear that there is no vehicle for discretion or compassion within 'Civil Enforcement' suggesting they are simply out to 'screw the motorist' on behalf of Costa Coffee.

May I suggest to like minded motorists/shoppers that they boycott 'Costa Coffee' in protest against blatantly unjust parking conditions, excessive fines and egregious practices.

Beating The Deadline

More than 11.48 million people beat the deadline and filed their Self Assessment tax return for the 2024 to 2025 tax year by 31st January, HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) can reveal.

There were 475,722 taxpayers who waited until the final day to file their return. On the day:

- 27,456 people submitted theirs in the final hour (23:00 to 23:59);
- the busiest hour for submitting a return was 17:00 to 17:59, when 32,982 people filed;
- HMRC advisers handled 5,409 webchats and 10,483 calls to the helplines which, unusually, were opened on a Saturday to provide extra support to customers on the deadline day.

More than 12 million Self Assessment customers were expected to file a tax return and pay any tax owed for the 2024 to 2025 tax year by 31 January. Anyone who needs to file a return and missed the deadline should meet their tax obligations as soon as possible, as late filing and late payment penalties are charged.

Customers can file their tax return now and pay any tax owed via GOV.UK. One of the quickest ways to pay is via the HMRC app. Time to Pay arrangements are available for those who cannot pay their tax bill in full, if they meet the relevant criteria. A full list of payment options is available on GOV.UK.

There are also additional penalties for paying late - 5% of the tax unpaid at 30 days, 6 months and 12 months. Interest will also be charged on any tax paid late.

Customers will be able to file their Self Assessment tax return for the 2025 to 2026 tax year from 6th April 2026.
