Locomotion Needs Your Help This February Half Term

Locomotion and S&DR200 are inviting you to join an official attempt at their first ever GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS title on Thursday 26th February at Locomotion for the greatest number of people simultaneously performing the 'Locomotion' dance at a single venue.

The official guidelines stipulate that at least 1752 people must be dancing together for at least 5 minutes, so the museum is calling on you to join the fun and help them break the record.

Video guides to help learn the choreography will be made available on Locomotion's website and social media. No previous dance experience is required to take part, but participants are asked to familiarise themselves with the dance moves in advance to help the official attempt run smoothly.

Record producer and President of Railway Benefit Fund Pete Waterman OBE is supporting the record attempt, which will be performed to Kylie Minogue's version of 'The Locomotion'. Pete worked with Kylie Minogue to re-release her version of the song in 1998, which debuted at No. 2 on the UK singles chart and remains one of her most successful single releases to date.

Pete Waterman OBE, a dedicated advocate for the rail community, shared his enthusiasm for the upcoming record-breaking attempt:

"I am delighted to support this event and the brilliant teams at Locomotion and S&DR200. As a charity, we are committed to supporting the UK rail industry and the incredible people who keep it moving."

The railway has evolved in the best possible way, transforming from its historic roots into a modern, high-tech marvel, but it is the dedicated railway people, from the engineers to the apprentices, who remain its greatest asset. I am particularly excited by the opportunity this event brings to invite more young people to learn more about, and be inspired by, the rich history and exciting future of British rail."

Locomotion and S&DR200 are inviting participants to arrive at the museum before 12.30 on Thursday 26th February for registration, warm up and a brief rehearsal, before the official Guinness World Records attempt.

The dancing is going to be led by Darlington-based experienced professional dancer and choreographer Darren Wright. Darren won BBC1's Strictly Dance Fever in 2006 and danced with his idol Kylie Minogue on Michael McIntyre's Big Show in 2018. Local dance groups including Harlequin Stage School, Age



UK and HC Vocal And Performance Academy will also be taking part.

This official record attempt forms part of Locomotion's 'Railway Record Breakers' half term activities, which will include a poster trail to discover more about the record-breaking vehicles in the museum's collection, plus self-led STEM record breaking activities for visitors to challenge their friends and family too.

The record attempt, in partnership with S&DR200 Festival, also forms part of ongoing celebrations for the bicentenary year of the Stockton & Darlington Railway (S&DR) and Locomotion No.1, the first steam locomotive to haul a passenger-carrying train on a public railway. This world-famous locomotive will be illuminated as the historic backdrop to the world record attempt where it is housed in Locomotion's Main Hall.

Sarah Price, Head of Locomotion, said: "The thought that Locomotion might soon have its own official Guinness World Records title is amazing! We really hope as many people as possible – young, old, dancers and non-dancers, rail enthusiasts and complete newbies – join us to help us achieve this incredible goal. This will be a once in a lifetime opportunity for the community to come together in a historic setting to achieve something unforgettable."

Craig Glenday, Editor in Chief of Guinness World Records, said, "We are looking forward to adjudicating this fun and fabulous record attempt. Our call for 2026 is 'Be Part of it!', so it's wonderful to see a community coming together to dance the Locomotion. Good luck to all the kids, adults and groups taking part - you are all already Officially Amazing!"

Photography Exhibition Highlights Impact of Words

A new exhibition celebrating people who are often misunderstood and excluded because of prejudices about the way they look, or how they interact with the world around them, is now open in County Durham.

From a young woman with bionic hands to a man with facial differences to a little boy with Down Syndrome - The Meaning of Being Different is a series of portraits based around well-known proverbs and idioms.

Created by portrait photographer Debbie Todd, the exhibition opened at Bishop Auckland Town Hall on Monday 16th February and will remain on display at the Durham County Council venue until Saturday 16th May.

Debbie said: "I've tried to represent a diverse range of people in the exhibition - people who are often excluded because of how they look or their lifestyle. By linking each portrait to a phrase or idiom such as 'tarred by the same brush' or 'a face only a mother could love,' the sitters and I hope to raise awareness of the impact words can have and promote a kinder and more inclusive society."

Tilly Lockey, from Consett, is among those featured in the exhibition. After contracting meningitis as a toddler, Tilly lost both of her hands. Her family spent years raising money for Tilly to have bionic arms, which have allowed her to do almost everything people with hands can do. Tilly has gone on to become a singer and social media personality, inspiring her hundreds of thousands of followers with her fashion, lifestyle and music content.

Also featured is Jono Lancaster, who was born with Treacher Collins Syndrome, a genetic condition which meant the bones and tissue in his face grew at a different rate. Jono's parents rejected him at birth and also refused to meet him two decades later. Now an advocate for self-love, he was brought up by his adoptive mum who he says made him the person he is today.

One of the exhibition's youngest subjects is William Hughes, who has Down Syndrome.

Similar to other members of the Down Syndrome community, William has experienced a lot of stigma, as many people think the condition defines him, when he is an individual who is cherished by his friends and family.

Based in County Durham, Debbie is a socially engaged photographer who concentrates on telling stories of marginalised people, mainly from working class backgrounds, in a fine art style. She is inspired by old master painters and contemporary photographers and creates images that tell the sitter's story and encourage empathy.

The Meaning of Being Different is the first exhibition to be staged in Bishop Auckland Town Hall's mixed-use space, which also houses the venue's library.

The exhibition is free and will be available to view from 10am to 4pm, Monday to Saturday.

A Slice of Shakespeare

Friday 6th of February saw 93 students from Woodham Academy venture to watch Revision on Tour: Macbeth. The students met early at school to enjoy pizzas, before making their way to Darlington to enjoy an evening of theatre. The atmosphere before



departure was electric and for many of the students on the trip it was their first experience of the theatre. Joey Hayman, a year 10 student, commented "I've been to the theatre with family, but this was unlike anything I have seen before. The set and costumes were quite basic, but the acting was phenomenal. Shakespeare can be difficult to understand but the acting brought it to life."

The cast of Revision on Tour: Macbeth consisted of just six actors, each playing multiple parts. There was the addition of the Chorus, an actor who took on the role of the narrator. This helped pupils access the text and provided additional ideas about how they might write about the text. The performance captured the tragedy of Macbeth, whilst also providing some truly terrifying and hilarious moments.

Ensuring students experience a curriculum beyond the classroom is important for the staff at Woodham Academy and school trips are an integral part of being a student at Woodham. Michelle Lanson, Head of English, who organised the trip adds, "whilst the opportunity to see a play they study at GCSE is beneficial for students in relation to their exam, the real purpose of the trip was to see the text as it was intended. Shakespeare was written to be seen and not read. The visit was an enormous success, and our hope is that, for some students, it will have ignited a passion for theatre."

We're Putting More Police on Your Streets

When local people talk to me about policing, they are clear about what matters most. They want to see more police officers and PCSOs on our streets, and firm action against the crimes that cause the greatest harm.

That message came through strongly in the recent policing precept consultation. Visible neighbourhood policing was your top priority. Tackling serious violence and drug-related crime followed closely behind. Your priorities guide every decision I take, and they also guide the Chief Constable's operational response.

Since I was first elected as PCC in 2021, I have been relentless in lobbying government to rebuild policing in County Durham and Darlington. Under the previous Conservative government, our area lost 27% of its police officers - more than 400 fewer boots on the ground.

County Durham and Darlington is now one of just 9 forces out of 43 in England and Wales that still has fewer officers than it did in 2010. That is not because demand here is lower. It is because our low council tax base limits how much can be raised locally to invest in policing.

That is why I welcomed the decision by this Labour government to grant Durham exceptional flexibility on the police precept which gives us the ability to raise additional funding locally to protect and grow our policing service.

When the Chief Constable presented her operational plans to the Police and Crime Panel, she was clear that setting the precept at £18.50 rather than £15 would allow us to deliver exactly what residents have asked for. That included protecting neighbourhood policing and establishing a dedicated Criminal Exploitation Team to tackle drug-related crime and the exploitation of children and young adults, dismantle drug networks and disrupt those who profit from harm.

It will also enable dedicated resources to tackle antisocial behaviour linked to child exploitation and children who go missing from home, and to increase specialist investigators so we can build a future dedicated team to investigate rape and sexual assault and deliver a first-class service to victims.

The additional cost would have been modest. For a Band D household, it amounts to 36p a week. For the vast majority of households in County Durham and Darlington around 80 per cent in Bands A and B, it is around 24p week.

Despite this clear alignment between public priorities and professional advice, I was disappointed that the Vice Chair of the Police and Crime Panel, a Reform councillor and former police officer, proposed that the additional precept proposal was vetoed and the Chair, also a former police officer, used his casting vote against the additional £3.50 flexibility the Chief Constable needed to deliver her plans.

As your Police and Crime Commissioner, I am elected by local people to set the policing budget and deliver your priorities. I have therefore agreed to set the precept at £18.50, because failing to do so would have meant avoidable cuts to policing capability and turning my back on the priorities residents have consistently set.

This episode should also give us pause for thought. It shows what can happen when councillors, without a direct mandate for policing, seek to override operational policing advice and public priorities.

As national debates continue about police governance and the future of PCCs, we should be honest about the risks of moving to models where accountability is diluted. Until then, I will continue to deliver what matters to you: more police on our streets, stronger action against serious harm, and a policing service that puts victims and communities first.



What Is RYLA?

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is a leadership development programme run by Rotary for young people. The RYLA programme will provide you with the opportunity to experience and learn



things about yourself, about working in a team, but more importantly about leading and supervising other people. These are skills employers look for in the workplace.

What's Involved in RYLA?

The selected activities on the RYLA programme are all based on elements of problem solving, communication, organisation, delegation and teamwork. While many of the activities take place outside, alongside The Pennine Way, it is not an outward-bound course! We use a variety of activities to develop you as an individual, as a team member and as a leader of a team, in a safe and enjoyable environment. There is no assessment, and no pass or fail, on this course. There are no limits on your development and we aim to help you realise your potential.

The courses are open to young people who are between 16 and 21 years old and take place at Wilderness Outdoor Education Centre, Low Birk Hatt Farm, Baldersdale, near Barnard Castle and alongside Hannah's Meadow. This has been the centre for our District RYLA camps since 2023 and is a purpose-built outdoor activity centre ideally located for watersports and outdoor activities.

The first camp is Monday 3rd August until 7th August 2026 and the second on Monday 10th August until 14th August 2026 with each week able to take up to 24 young people.

Order 2026

The Council proposes to make an Order under Section 14(1) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 as amended, to prohibit all pedestrian traffic from proceeding on the following length of footpath. An 8 metre length of Thornton Close, Newton Aycliffe, to the side of No.208 Thornton Close to enable sewer repair works to be undertaken. Throughout the period of the closure, a diversion will be available to pedestrian traffic on alternative footpaths surrounding Thornton Close. The maximum duration of the Order is 6 months. The proposed works are to commence from 8am on Monday 16/3/2026 and are anticipated to be completed in 5 days. Reduced Impact

Hi Fret,
Thank you for your report on your safety visit to Fornax. Your article was written from the perspective of someone who is familiar with this industry. However, most of the general public are not. You did not mention who Fornax are; where they are located and what they do. The acronym CEMS was explained, however, COMAH, HAZOP, LOPA, SIL and SIF were not. The absence of these explanations greatly reduces the impact and understanding of your report. Your article was best suited for the more knowledgeable and the technically inclined regarding this industry. Chris Wheeler.

Heighington Matters

Millbank – The Millbank/South View road junction continues to concern many drivers. Visibility driving out of South View is poor and at times vehicles driving down Millbank excessive. Following a meeting I held with DBC a few weeks ago, a speed survey is underway and I look forward to seeing the results. A letter from DBC has been sent to residents living around the road junction, seeking their thoughts on the idea of putting yellow lines on the street corners and I am receiving emails with the residents responses. Ideas of 20mph speed limits and introducing one way systems down South View and Water Lane are two solutions being put forward which seem to be sensible solutions, but I know from past experience that a 20mph speed limit will not be introduced without traffic management and a one way system is not the answer because both the Police and DBC highways will say that one way systems encourage drivers to drive faster knowing there is nothing coming in the other direction. So, I will keep everyone informed – but irrespective of any solution that may be forthcoming, the real answer is for ALL drivers to drive slowly at all times.

Road Conditions – I thank everyone who has sent me an email about their concerns over the potholes in certain areas of my Ward. I have reported them all to DBC highways, but I would ask for a little patience as the demand across Darlington is high. Following the amazing amount of rain that we have endured, and the freezing conditions, water has penetrated the road surface and then froze, and expanded creating lots and lots of holes. The Council do employ road inspectors who check on all of our roads across the Borough and report their condition. If the damage is 40mm or deeper then repairs are organised.

Footpaths – An inspection regime is underway to report back on all footpaths in Darlington. Information will be collated and those exceeding the Highway standards will be given priority. It is expected that the inspections will be completed and solutions decided during April.

Hopelands Parking Bays – is ongoing. Following further complications, I met with a DBC Cabinet member before Christmas, and a couple of times since, to discuss the Project and ask them to provide financial and practical support to finally install the parking bays. Feedback is positive and a decision will be made in March/April – I am keeping fingers crossed, but at the same time relatively confident that they will support the Project.

St Michael's Church – Chris Lloyd evening

– Thank you to everyone who turned out on a cold Saturday evening to listen to Chris tell us about 'Four Scandals and a Gooseberry'. It was a brilliant evening thanks to Chris, the wine, the food and the venue – our old medieval church – St Michael's. Needless to say the evening went well with the help of so many church volunteers who cooked, baked, sold tickets, and greeted all who came along – a big thank you from my wife Ruth to you all. **AND** yet another evening is planned for us all to meet in St Michael's Church to enjoy the company and listen to the magnificent Ryton Singers who will entertain us with a combination of pop songs and hits from popular musicals. This wonderful evening is planned for Saturday 21st March from 5pm for a 6pm start.

Town Parking Charge Issue

It was about the fifth car park I'd tried to get into that day, after finding the one near the medical centre closed. I finally spotted a spare space in the left-hand part of the car park on Greenwell Road, adjacent to Costa and Wilson's Vets, opposite Barnado's and Aldi. I was astonished to receive a Parking Charge Notice, in intimidating language, from Civil Enforcement Ltd., the private company which operates the car park, a couple of weeks later - to the extent that I went back to the car park to check what I'd missed. I'd driven in on the left (of course), heading left because that is where I'd see the space. I had not seen the notice on the right, part-hidden by foliage, nor the many, prominent signs in the right-hand car park. There were none where I'd parked, so I had no reason to think that the charges applied there.

I appealed via CE's website. CE makes it hard to do anything but pay or appeal, and this has to be done within the time-limit. The 'Contact Us' button just led back to the Pay/Appeal page.

I received a reminder some time later, in a similar tone. I don't believe they considered the evidence. While the route to appeal to POPLA was given on the letter, somewhere in the process CE claimed that POPLA rejected a high percentage of the appeals against CE, presumably to encourage people not to bother, just to pay up.

I escalated the appeal to POPLA. A few days later, CE withdrew my appeal, and I received a letter with straightforward wording from CE confirming cancellation of the charges.

The last time I checked, there were still no signs in the left-hand car park, although CE says that charges apply in the whole area. As far as I know, there are no consequences for CE from my appeal - no obligation to put signs up there. So, there is a risk that unwitting

drivers could be caught out.

There is signage only in a small area, but the charges apply to a much larger area.

If you have received a Parking Charge Notice from a private company:

1) If you parked wrongly and should have known better, do the right thing: 'fess up and pay up.

2) If you feel the charge is unfair, don't pay it. Payment is considered admission of liability. You can appeal to the charging company and escalate to POPLA, if need be.
