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EDITORIAL

On a lonely hill, a matter of a mile or two from here, there stands an equally lonely edifice. A monument to modernity, it has not long been there, yet it is symbolic of the march of urbanity into the countryside and to many village communities scattered here and there.

Yes, it is a bus shelter; and there it stands, forlornly offering solace and shelter to the solitary traveller awaiting the infrequent 'bus which serves this bucolic backwater.

When, may it be asked, is this country township to be accorded a similar privilege? For how many more dreary winters are people to stand shivering in the icy blast, morning, noon and night, for lack of such 'elementary' protection? Granted that up to now the 'bus routes have been of a temporary nature; granted that even now they may, indeed will, from time to time have to be altered as the town develops, but surely it is not an insuperable task to move a prefabricated bus-shelter once in a while, always provided there is one to move!

The question of cost; well again, who is providing the lion's share of the finance for the rural district but this population? Furthermore, it is on an ever increasing scale. Let us have something for it other than promises, very much of a future nature and even then full of 'ifs' and 'buts'. In this respect, it's time the payers called the tune.

With only four representatives on the council, we cannot expect much action, but we do, and will, expect them to pursue this matter vigorously and persistently with a view to providing this population with an adequate number of shelters before the winter assails us again.

One further point on the subject, which concerns the Corporation - will they please have an adequate area around 'bus stops flagged? Grass verges cannot be expected to survive in such places, neither are they needed there, and to have people slithering around ankle deep in mud whenever it has rained is not only unnecessary, it is plain stupid and utterly inconsiderate.

Sports Report

Certain gentle criticism has been made that the Newtonian very seldom carries news of our local sporting events. This is indeed the case, but the fault, if any, lies with the sportsmen concerned. They can be sure that any news concerning their activities, successes and failures will be appreciated. More news will create greater interest in their clubs and result, most probably, in added membership. Again, in the past they have not had very much encouragement in the form of 'gates' for their games, and this, possibly, has tended to narrow their views. Let us have knowledge of their hopes, intentions and problems for the future young sportsmen of the town, and they will be rewarding in many ways. Otherwise, very few will be aware of the struggles that are the every day meals of young and virile organisations in the town.

CORPORATION NOTES

Boarders - There are now three recognised boarding houses in Newton Aycliffe and residents in private houses are reminded that lodgers are not allowed unless the permission of the Corporation is sought and obtained, which permission will only be given under exceptional circumstances.

Gardens Competition - Arrangements have been made for the judging of gardens in connection with the Corporation's annual Gardens Competition during the first week of August. For the purpose of the competition, the town will be divided into two areas, i.e. east and west of St. Cuthbert's Way. The final judging of the gardens will be carried out by two independent horticultural experts. Prizes of £3 £2 and £1 will be awarded for the three best gardens in each of the two sections and, in addition, the tenant of the garden adjudged to be the best in the town will be awarded the Lady Beveridge Rose Bowl to be held for one year. The gardens attached to aged persons' bungalows in the town will be treated as a separate class and prizes of £2 and £1 will be awarded to the two best gardens in that class.

THE GREAT AYCLIFFE PARISH COUNCIL

A letter from the Newton Aycliffe Community Association expressing concern at the lack of recreational facilities in the new town was considered at the meeting of the Parish Council held during the evening of Tuesday, June 26th. It was pointed out that the town's present sports field was leased to the Newton Aycliffe Cricket Club but, whilst adequate playing areas were available for young children on the town's open spaces and forecourts, there were no facilities available for organised sport for teenagers. The Council appointed a committee to consider the whole question of sports facilities in the new town and, if necessary, to make an approach to the Aycliffe Development Corporation.

Councillor Mrs. Kell, vice-chairman of the Lighting Committee, reported that tenders had been invited for the repainting of 65 15ft. steel lighting columns in various parts of the town and it was hoped that the work would be completed during this summer.

A progress report on the water supply and drainage scheme on the Clarence Chare allotments was given by Councillor Nicholson who said that water would be available in about two months! time, and the drainage work would follow immediately.

Serious complaints were made about the concrete tank on the children's play space on Baliol Green which was full of rubbish and, it was stated, was being used by the children as a toilet. The Council instructed its Clerk to write to the Aycliffe Development Corporation asking for the removal of the tank and suggesting that similar tanks be not installed on other children's play spaces.

The Council also decided that in future, the grass on the Aycliffe Village green be cut twice each year instead of once, and arrangements were made for the first cutting for this year to be undertaken immediately.

GARDENS GUILD - Arrangements have been made for members of the Guild to visit the School of Agriculture at Houghall, Durham on Saturday, July 14th. The 'bus will leave Neville Parade Shops at 2 p.m. and will return from Houghall at approx. 4.30 p.m. Seats will cost not more than 2/- per person. A house to house collection will be made during the period July 9th - 21st, and we would be most grateful to have the backing of the town in this venture.
