ARCHERY CLUB

Spring will soon be here and with it a resumption of all summer sports. "Archery," a comparative newcomer to the town of Newton Aycliffe, will soon be seen on the Burn Lane sports field. This year the Newton Aycliffe Archery Club will be entering for the league matches organized by the Northern Counties Archery Society; these matches carry on throughout the summer between other clubs in Durham County, each club forming a team of four archers, and playing home and away matches.

On various occasions teams will be entering for county tournaments, of course there is nothing to stop an archer from entering on his or her own, but to get to tournament standard we must practice, starting at the short ranges and work up to 80 and 100 yards. Many people will no doubt be asking how much archery equipment costs; it has been worked out that one can equip oneself for as little as four pounds, though of course one can pay as much as twelve pounds for a steel bow and thirty pounds for a composite bow, A beginner would do well to start with the ordinary wood bow and gain experience. When buying equipment for the first time some people, especially the gentlemen, are apt to go in for a bow with a high draw weight; unless the person is really strong my advice is "keep to the light weights."

The following guide may help:-Ladies 24 lbs. draw weight to 32 lbs. Gentlemen 36 lbs. to 40 lbs.

Remember you will have to shoot all afternoon with your bow, hence the reason for the light weight. A man shooting at 40 lbs. bow will, on the average use enough energy to raise 5,000 lbs. in weight, so one gets the exercise as well.

CHILDREN IN BED

This unhappily is the season of infectious diseases, and many of you may have to keep a child or two amused in bed. A worth-while investment is one of the modern cantilever tables with hard, washable tops which can be fixed at different heights into metal tubing, clear of the bed—no more upsets due to bed-table legs collapsing! These are ideal for children to lean their drawing-books, stamp-collections, etc., on as well as for trays at meal-times.

Making scrap-books out of your last years Christmas cards keep the interest for hours.

Staying in bed is also a golden opportunity for a child to learn verses by heart—comic ones, real poetry, all kinds—and to give a recital from "the stage," his bed.

Cooking Hints

Instead of using flour or cornflour to thicken fresh mince, add a handful of porridge oats—one handful to ½-lb. mince makes it thick and creamy, and incidently makes the meat go further.

Onions

If you are one of those people who like onions—but—they don't like you, try this way.

Peel and cut the onions up—put into a basin and add ½ teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda, cover with boiling water and leave a minute or two. Drain and rinse in clear water then use in the usual way.

Recipes

Orange Pudding (very good for children) (4 to 5 people)

INGREDIENTS: 2 eggs, 2 oranges, 6 tablespoonsful S. R. Flour, 2 tablespoonsful suet, sugar to sweeten, a little milk and water mixed.

Method:- Grate orange rind into the sieved flour, add nearly all the sugar and suet. Make into a batter with the beaten eggs, milk and water. Remove pith from oranges and slice them into a greased pie-dish—sprinkle with rest of the sugar—cover with the batter and bake in a mod. oven 45 minutes.

Rice Special (3 people)

INGREDIENTS:- 2 oz. rice, 9 oz. butter, 1 pt. fresh milk, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 2 eggs, 3 oz. castor sugar.

Method:- Simmer the rice in milk with $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar and $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. butter till tender. Drain—then to the rice add beaten egg yolks and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoonful of castor sugar. Put into a greased pie dish, then whip whites till stiff, fold in the rest of the castor sugar and pile on top of the rice mixture. Bake till golden brown 30—40 minutes in mod. oven. Nutmeg or cinnamon may be added if liked or fresh or tinned fruit can be put in bottom of the pie dish.

CHILDREN'S COLUMN

The other day I met a very interesting chatty fellow who lived in this area over fifty years ago and he told me a lot of interesting things about Newton Aycliffe.

Because of the large volume of clay under the soil in this area it was regarded as poor land for farmers. But it was a birds' paradise, with pools of water for the Herons, Wild Duck and Cootes that lived in peace. There were a number of wood-peckers and only last week one was seen in Simpasture! A large number of the linnet family also lived in this area before the town was built.

In the old days Coltsfoot (the small yellow flower that looks so like Dandelion and is first in Spring) and Dandelion grew in large golden masses and the old men plucked it, dried it, and used it with tobacco as a smoking mixture and it was good and cheap. Owls too lived in numbers and recently I was wakened by an old owl hooting in a large tree outside my home in Finchale Road. So our feathered friends have not fully deserted us. If we do not rob their nests we will have large numbers of beautiful wild birds coming to live amongst us once more.

This is the month when the Rooks and Crows start nest building, and it is most interesting to see them struggle with a large twig, bending it to put into place in the nest. It is said they start on March 1st but if it is a Sunday they wait until the next day !!! Look out for the Crows nest and watch it grow.




