SOWING OF GRASS



In addition to the concerts, there will be the usual sprinkling of members' meetings including two lecture-recitals by Mr. J. Gittins, one on "Music and Drama," the other on the music of Ravel; an evening on Verdi opera by Mr. Benedikte; two record concerts, one of light music, and the other a complete performance of Bizet's "Carmen"; and a record evening in which several members of the Society will introduce and play a record of their choice.

Our annual party-cum-dance takes place on Shrove Tuesday next year, more of which later.

In the immediate future i.e., October, there are three dates to note. Tuesday 3rd is our Opening Night, when we hope for a full house. Saturday 14th is the opera night with the Arts Council Opera Group and "The Marriage of Figaro." And Thursday 26th brings us to Mr. Gittins' lecture-recital on "Music and Drama."

A GLIMPSE OF THE PAST FROM AN ELDERLY RESIDENT

"The trouble with new towns is that they have no Ghosts...."
Maybe not, but ours is no longer "a town of toddlers" and we welcome these reminiscences from one of our older residents, Mrs. Mary Mellor.

Mrs. Mellor is 76 years old and says she has had good children, a good life and really nothing to grumble about. Over the years she has been a great reader, having read all Dicken's novels at least twice. Now failing eyesight excludes her from this enthralling pastime and instead she listens avidly to the classics series on the radio. She also likes her granddaughter to read the Newtonian to her but, we might add, she can tell a remarkably good tale herself.

Her greatest enjoyment, incredible though it may seem to those of us who take such things for granted, is the simple commodity of the hot and cold water taps. Although married for 42 years, never in all that time had she had tapped water in her home, and for the privilege of carrying her own water into the house she was paying 17/6d. rent over 40 years ago, a fantastic sum for those days. When she first came to Newton Aycliffe, Mrs. Mellor said she used to pat the taps and thank God for them, and still remains grateful for this modern facility.

Through the medium of her Grandfather, Mrs. Mellor can take us back to the battle of Waterloo victory celebrations! Born, Joseph Hunter on 6th November, 1807, he was 8 years old when these celebrations took place and Mrs. Mellor said she never tired of hearing him tell the story to her when she was a child. When the news of the victory was received, he would tell her, all the water taps were connected to wine barrels, a bullock was roasted in the streets and all the townspeople came with plates and ate slices of roast bullock and drank wine. Mr. Hunter's father took him to town to see the celebrations and everyone lit candles in their windows. He never forgot the roasting bullock and people dancing in the streets.

The song "Blaydon Races," is now said to have been written by him, and not by Geordie Ridley as was popularly understood. This fact was published in a local evening paper dated 23rd October, 1959.

Her grandfather, she said, started work as an apprentice at a small factory called Armstrongs, now universally known as Vickers Armstrong's. He was granted a pension from Lord Armstrong because he was the oldest workman and given a free cottage on his retirement. He sometimes received a visit from Lord Armstrong who used to arrive at the cottage complete with coachman, after having attended the opening of his country home, Cragside, Rothbury, for the working people to view.

Mrs. Mellor said that when she was 12 years old, her grandfather was 90. After his death a book was published on the life of Joseph Hunter, in an effort to raise money for a gravestone, but at 2d. per copy it was not a successful venture.

As a child, Mrs. Mellor's one trip of the year was to the "Town Moor." Her mother, with the children used to go to the moor, while Father went to the races. She recalled that if her Father's horse won, the following day they would all have a trip to the coast, if it lost they would just walk round the moor and gaze with fascination at the sideshows and "agony things" as she termed the two-headed sheep, three legged hens and bearded ladies, etc. How they longed to go in, said Mrs. Mellor, but they were never able to. They used to sit around eating enormous meat pies that their mother had made. Boat trips, when they went on them, from Gateshead to South Shields cost 4d.

Mrs. Mellor started work as a maid when she was 13 years old. Her hours were 8 a.m. until 7 or 8 p.m. and she was paid the large sum of 2/6d. per week and she had no days off. If she started before 8 a.m. breakfast was provided, otherwise she had to have it before leaving.home.

"The good old days," she remarked, "Should be the bad old days, we are now living in the good days of wealth and prosperity."

These are but a few of the astonishing memories that this elderly lady brings from the past into our young and modern community.

Lemmings

Lemmings are rodents and have a round head and thick set body. They are a brownish colour with black patches on the head and back. The legs and tail are grey in colour. It burrows under-ground to a limited depth. It feeds on plants and is very destructive to crops. At times great numbers migrate to the Atlantic destroying all vegetation in their path. Bears, wolves, foxes, rough legged buzzards and other birds of prey keep to a certain extent their numbers in check. There are two species, the European Lemming and the Banded Lemming.

Owl Pellets

When an owl eats a vole all the indigestable parts such as bones and fur are passed back through the mouth and injected as pellets. These can be found wherever a bird of prey roosts. If you di-sect one of these pellets you are likely to find small mammal bones, feathers, wing cases of beetles all these are surrounded by fur. The owl makes no nest but lays the 4—8 white eggs on a layer of dry pellets or plugs, occasionally small fish bones are found.

Make a collection of Autumn Fruits and Seeds. Mount them on sheets of cardboard, label and bring to me. You should be able to find acorns (two kinds), sycamore samaras, ash keys, hazel nuts, etc. Closing date October 30th, 1961.

N.B.—If you have been handling fungi be sure to wash your hands when you have finished. Some are deadly poisonous—especially the Death-Cap!
