The Darlington Marriage Guidance Council is giving a series of eight lectures on "The Facts of Life" to girls aged 13 to 15 years, belonging to the Girls Section of the Newton Aycliffe Boys Club.

So successful was the response from 75 girls, each with written permission from their parents, that the large games room at the Boys' Club had to be used, for the first lecture.

Mrs. J. L. Kell, Club Leader, said, many parents had written to express their thanks, and in particular, Mothers of large young families, who simply had not the time nor opportunity to give this essential instruction.

The lectures are given by Mrs. B. Freshwater, assisted by qualified medical staff of the Council.

Mrs. Freshwater, said Mrs. Kell, has a wonderful and understanding approach to the subject, and the girls were obviously impressed.

This series of lectures will be followed by more advanced lectures for older girls, and will include Engagement behaviour.

After which, a series of lectures for the Boys of the Club will be given.

# NEWTON AYCLIFFE COUNCIL OF LOCAL ORGANISATIONS

Following the collapse of the Newton Aycliffe Community Association a meeting was arranged on 11th May, 1961 to discuss what action should be taken to continue certain aspects of the work of that Association. It was suggested that an Organisation be set up which would be representative of the Organisations in the town.

The Newton Aycliffe Council of Local Organisation was formed with the object of promoting the interests of the residents of Newton Aycliffe. Committees were formed to ensure the continuation, and the Annual Sports Day.

The first Annual General Meeting of the Council was held on 30th October in the Iron Horse Hotel, at which there were reppresentatives from approximately half of the local Organisations, most of which had affiliated to the Council thereby giving great impetus to the work of the Council.

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At the A.G.M. there were reports from the four active committees which are summarised here.

Newtonian. The cost of printing the Newtonian is met by the printers through revenue obtained from advertisements. There is no lack of items for the Newtonian, the problem is one of space, which could be solved by a larger Newtonian via more advertisements. For those people who wish to contribute to the Newtonian, they are reminded that the material has to be in the hands of the Editor by the 9th day of each month, so that it can be considered for the next publication.

Sports Day. A Committee of 10 was set up to organise the Annual Sports Day, the date fixed was 2nd September in the Simpasture Playing Fields. This was an outstanding success, and there will be a balance when the accounts are finalised, which will ensure a healthy start to the next Sports Day.

Winter Programme. This committee was able to report that they had been successful in obtaining the necessary information at very short notice, and that the programmes were waiting distribution.

Welcoming Parties were also reported to be continuing, two have been held, and the next party is due on 11th December. It is found that the new residents show a great interest in these parties, which form an ideal way of meeting representatives of the local Organisations, so that the newcomers can continue to meet people with similar interests in the New Town.

The election of Officers of the Council was held, and due to Mr. J. Ashford, the late President leaving the town next February, he was unable to accept nomination for the post. The new Officers are Mr. E. Birch, President; Mr. M. Nicholson, Secretary; Mr. A. Bellfield, Treasurer.

Among the motions for discussions was the item, that this Council consider the question of a Community Centre for Newton Aycliffe. As there was not time to discuss this at any length, this matter will be on the agenda for the next meeting of the Council.

A New Constitution was presented and accepted, one of the main points being to extend membership to individual residents.

The Council was asked to give a vote of thanks to all the people who through their voluntary efforts have made the setting up of the organisation justified. There is a great deal of scope in the Town, with the backing of the local organisations, for this Council and we look forward to the next year with confidence.

### COUNCIL NOTES

#### Parish Council

The Parish Council has given further consideration to the provision of a playing field in the Moore Lane area, and has asked for provisional lay-out plans and estimates of expenditure for three different schemes as follows:- (1). Normal Playing Field; (2). With Running track; (3). With Running and Cycling Track. When these have been received they will decide which scheme to proceed with.

The Council has provisionally agreed to donate ten guineas to the Newton Aycliffe Association for the Welfare of the Physically Handicapped.

The Postmaster General has informed the Council that he cannot reconsider his decision to close the Simpasture and Neville Sub Post Offices when the Crown Post Office is opened in the Town Centre.

# County Council

The County Council has appointed Mr. Leslie Soulsby, B.Sc., to the Headship of the new Campus School—Milton Hall. Mr. Soulsby is at present Head of the St. John's Chapel County School, a post he has held since 1948. He will commence his duties early in the New Year. Mr. T. Walker, 29 Eden Road, has been appointed full time Caretaker of this school, and has already commenced his duties.



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The Home Secretary has confirmed by laws made by the County Council which make it an offence punishable by a fine of not exceeding five pounds for any person in Newton Aycliffe who, being in charge of a dog, allows it to foul the pavement. This bye law became effective on November 1st.

The Council has agreed to participate in a scheme suggested by the Minister of Health for the issue of badges to identify the vehicles of disabled Drivers who have difficulty in walking more than a short distance. The object is to ease the difficulty of these drivers in finding Parking places; the badge will be for indentification purposes only, and will confer no legal right or privilege. Persons interested should apply in the first place to the County Medical Officer.



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
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# R.A.F. ASSOCIATION NOTES

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### WOMAN'S COLUMN

December is usually the busiest month of the year for the housewife with Christmas preparations and Parties to cater for, so I thought a couple of quickly prepared, but at the same time really interesting, recipes would be appreciated, also a game for the children's party in which all age groups can take part.

Firstly—to the Kitchen to make a Sausage Roly Poly that looks after itself for 3 hours, so that one can get on with other chores. The ingredients required are:-

1-lb. uncooked Pork Sausage meat.

½-teaspoon herbs (sage is good)

1 or 2 cooking apples

1-lb. Suet pastry

#### Method:

Make a Suet pastry using hot water to mix it as it makes a much lighter crust, then roll out into an oblong, spread the meat over it with the herbs already mixed in, (a finely chopped onion is just as nice as the herbs if you prefer it). Then a thin layer of raw sliced apple. Roll up and wrap in Kitchen foil or a floured pudding cloth and boil for three hours.

Remove the wrapping and roll the roly poly in bread crumbs, put it in a medium oven to brown and serve with good gravy.

Now for a delicious pudding which takes at the most 5 minutes to prepare and 20 minutes to cook. For 2 people.

Half 3 bananas lengthwise into a fire proof dish, pour over then the juice of 2 oranges then add a heaped tablespoon of brown sugar and finally top with a teacup of desiccated coconut, put into medium oven for 20 minutes.

Most of you will have those pretty coloured candles burning during Christmas time, but did you know they will last much longer if coated with clear varnish, allow them to dry of course before lighting and do keep them out of reach of small hands.

A party game called Gods and Goddesses is not only fun but will help the children's deportment. Each child must balance a book on the head—the children then march round the room to a rousing tune and when the music stops they must kneel down until the music starts again. Any child who loses a book, and there must be no hands used, is out. The last remaining child with its book still intact is, of course the winner.
