I work 9hrs. 35 minutes per week, but the hours quoted in the March 'Newtonian' add up to 8 hours 20 minutes per week. I have worked the same 9 hours 35 minutes for the past 8 years without complaint and can see no good reason to change now, especially to please tired 'mums' who cannot get their children to school for 9 o'clock.

Sir,

I have just read my March issue of the "Newtonian" in which I find a Time Table issued by the Road Safety Committee giving the times at which the Wardens are on duty.

Did the Committee when compiling this time-table consult any of the Wardens or spend any time themselves on any of the crossings? Because the times given are not strictly correct. In the mornings it isn't necessary for the Wardens to be there until 9-10 a.m. as all the children are in school just after 9 o'clock at the latest. But the time with which I disagree most is the dinner time 1-15 p.m. to 1-35 p.m. Anyone who uses the crossings knows that more children cross the road between 1 o'clock and 1-15 p.m. than afterwards and in fact if the Warden is not to go until 1-15 p.m. she need hardly bother to go at all as she will be lucky if half a dozen children cross after that time.

I am the Warden at Stephenson Way Junior and Infants Schools and note that my times are different from anyone else's. For a short period of the year, namely, December and January, our schools close earlier in the evenings owing to lack of road lighting and during those 8 weeks I am on the crossing at 12-45 p.m. to 1-30 p.m. at dinner time and at 3-30 p.m. till 4 o'clock in the evenings. For the rest of the year our times are exactly the same as the rest of the schools in the town, and as our Junior School is rarely cleared by 4-15 p.m. my Head Master would take a pretty dim view of things if I went off home at 3-50 p.m. as shown in the Road Safety's time-table.

WOMEN'S COLUMN

Is your jam store low? There is practically no jam fruit in the shops at present so perhaps you would like to try either or both of these recipes:—

Date and Lemon Jam.

Ingredients—1 lb. Dates without stones; 5 Lemons; 1 lb. Sugar; 2 Cups water.

Method—Grate the rinds of the lemons, remove pips and pith. Chop up pulp, cover all fruit and rinds with water, stand 24 hours. Boil till set; about 20 minutes.

Grapefruit Marmalade.

Ingredients—4 Grapefruit (large); 2 quarts of water; 5 lbs. of sugar.

Method—slice very thinly, removing only pips, which are put in a separate basin and covered with water, 1 pint. Put the rest of the 2 quarts of water on to sliced fruit and leave 24 hours. Put into pan, strain and add the pip-water. Cook for 2 hours until tender, add sugar and boil until set, stirring constantly.

Care of Jewellery

Surprisingly few women take proper care of their jewellery, often wearing diamond rings while washing up. Dirty washing up water soon clouds the stones, and rough treatment loosens the settings.

Plain gold jewellery only needs washing in warm soapy water rinsing in clean warm water, drying on a very soft lintless cloth, and given a final polish with a chamois leather.

Silver can be cleaned as above, but if tarnished immerse in silver dip, rinse in clean warm water and polish with the specially impregnated cloth.

Diamond and Gem set jewellery may be cleaned with a small hog's bristle brush dipped in surgical spirit, cleaning carefully behind the stones and setting to remove accumulation of soap and dust.

Semi-precious stones should be cleaned by careful washing in warm water and finally polished with very soft cloth or chamois leather.

Opals and Turquoise should NOT be washed they are best cleaned with a fine soft cloth dipped in castor oil, followed by polishing with a clean soft cloth.

Check all settings, clasps, clip hinges and strings of pearl necklets etc. Never ever wear a piece of jewellery if these vulnerable parts show any sign of wear.






