Sir,

I would like to take advantage of your columns to correct a misapprehension which has arisen in parts of the New Town in connection with a petition, which I and a group of parents have raised, to have the education of our seven year olds continued at Sugar Hill Junior School instead of Stephenson Way, as directed by the S. W. Durham Education Committee.

It has come to my attention that some people feel that, in making our petition, we are casting aspersions at Stephenson Way School. This is not the intention at all, either directly or indirectly. We are quite sure that the school accommodation and quality of teaching are good and we have a great respect for the integrity and efficiency of the Headmaster.

He does, however, very sincerely believe in the "streaming" of children and, as Headmaster, quite rightly administrates his school in accordance with his opinions.

We, equally sincerely, do not share his beliefs. We have established that there is room at Sugar Hill Junior School, where "streaming" does not take place, and we wish to assert our rights under Section 76 of the Education Act 1944 to have our children educated in accordance with our wishes.







NEWTON RANGERS FOOTBALL CLUB

At the club's Annual General Meeting the following officers were elected:-

The selection committee will be the chairman, Secretary, first and second team captains and two or three non-playing members yet to be elected.

Newton Aycliffe Rangers is the only team that really belongs to the town, and it is true to say that few 'Newtonians' know very much about their own team, this being due to the fact that both teams have to play, even their home games 'away' in the absence of a local pitch.

A brief history of the club that will enable the townspeople to appreciate what their own team has been doing during the last few seasons is not out of place.

The club was formed in 1961/62 season by a small but enthusiastic group of local footballers who played friendly matches until gaining access to the Darlington Church and Friendly League the following season during which the team reached third position. The next season 1963/4 the team was elevated to Darlington and District League, B. Division, and formed a second team that played in the Darlington Church and Friendly League. In the 1964/65 season the first eleven remained in the Darlington and District League and succeeded in winning the Paton and Baldwin Shield defeating teams from a superior league in the process. A buffet supper was held in the 'Iron Horse' to celebrate this achievement and seventeen players who had contributed to this success were each presented with a replica of the shield. The winning of the shield was all the more notable when it is considered that all 'home' games were played in Darlington, and the players often had the added handicap of poor pitches and accommodation that left a lot to be desired. The club has made steady progress since its form-

WOMENS COLUMN

Women are frequently accused of carelessness in connection with electric appliances, whether it is truer of women than men is open to debate. If you obey the following don'ts you will ensure the safety of yourself, family and property and be able to refute any accusation of carelessness.

When using Electricity be sure to carry out these simple safety hints.

DON'T lay flexes under carpets or lino, through doorways or windows.

DON'T bend a flex to cause a 'kink' which might lead to a breakage of wires.

DON'T extend a flex by joining a further length and insulating with tape. This can be highly dangerous.

DON'T use adaptors to feed more than one appliance from one socket.

DON'T use a portable appliance in the bathroom (you wouldn't dream of using one of course, but a surprising number of mishaps occur each year to people who do) all electric heaters and towel rails should be permanent fixtures and controlled by pull cord switches. And if an electric razor must be used in the bathroom have a special outlet installed containing an isolating transformer.

DON'T fill kettles while still switched on, or leave the connector lying about with the current on.

DON'T ever clean an electric fire unless it is unplugged.

DON'T overload washing machines and NEVER touch the socket or plug with wet hands.

DON'T switch on a blanket if it is folded or rucked and always switch off before getting into bed.

Some of these **DON'TS** are so simple that you wonder why they are repeated—you always take the proper precautions, but have you never left your ironing to answer the door, and failed to stand

the iron on its heel, so that on your return you were greeted with a smell of burning rag, and a beautiful brown patch in the ironing board. Of course you haven't! You lie—and you know it. Let us leave the **DON'TS** with a final word, take the utmost care; electricity is a wonderful servant but a shocking master.

If you want to give the family a treat on a hot day—and something apart from the usual salad is indicated, Melon Salad is ideal to serve with cold ham, poultry or cheese. The price of melons is very reasonable and the salad is easily prepared. It consists of diced melon, sliced dessert apples, sliced chicory mixed together with chopped walnuts, lemon juice, a little salad oil, mayonnaise and seasoning. This is delicious and is indeed worth tasting. As also are these suppertime snacks.

Hawaiian Toasts—although served hot, are tangy and refreshing. These tasty snacks consist of grilled bacon atop a ring of pineapple served on toast smothered with a mixture of cream cheese and vegetable extract.

Scandinavian Smorgas—or open sandwiches have become increasingly popular over the past few years. They are ideal at tea-time or as gap fillers, and there is an endless variety of fillings. Egg and herring filling is quick and easy. Skin and bone two smoked herrings and put into a basin with two hard-boiled eggs, run a sharp knife quickly from side to side until the ingredients are finely chopped and thoroughly mixed. Press a generous portion of the mixture on to buttered bread slices and top with cress.
