



The Meals on Wheels service operated by the W.R.V.S. for elderly and house bound require twenty four volunteers for the new rota starting in December.

Volunteers should be available between 11.30 a.m. and 1 p.m. and as a rota system is worked, they can do as much or as little as their circumstances allow.

Drivers may be asked to drive WRVS vans or private cars—their own—if they agree. The meals are transported in heated containers which fit safely into car boots or on back seats. A mileage allowance can be claimed when volunteers use their own cars.

There is unending scope for unofficial welfare work with the Meals on Wheels service—often the visit is the only contact with the outside world—and needs additional to the meal are constantly met.

#### CLEAN AIR ACT 1956

The Darlington Rural District (Newton Aycliffe No. 5) Smoke Control Order 1970

THE DARLINGTON RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL HEREBY GIVE NOTICE that the Minister of Housing and Local Government has confirmed the above mentioned Order without modification. The Order will come into operation on the 1st day of July, 1972.

The effect of the Order is that subject to exemptions provided by the Order and by virtue of Section 11(4) of the Act if, on any day after the Order has come into operation, smoke is emitted from a chimney of any building within the smoke control area the occupier of that building shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a fine not exceeding £10 unless he proves that the emission of smoke was not caused by the use of fuel other than an authorised fuel. The authorised fuels include anthracite, coke and other carbonised fuels, gas and electricity.

Grants will be payable in respect of the necessary conversion of existing fireplaces to use authorised fuels only if the expenditure is approved by the Council and the work is carried out to the Council's satisfaction before the 1st July, 1972. Persons interested in the payment of grant should make early application to the Council for approval of their proposals.
