Two Cinemas planned for Town

Centre

The Aycliffe Development Corporation have entered into negotiations with a private company for the provision of two cinemas in the town centre.

The A.D.C. cannot divulge the name of the company at this point of the discussions. The only details available are those pertaining to site and size. The site is near Wentons Carpet Shop and the cinemas will each seat 250 people.

It is expected one company will operate both cinemas (which are to be built side by side) and offer the same facilities as Rank and Classic in presenting two completely different programmes at the same time.

It will be interesting to see what type of support the cinemas get following the years of complaints regarding the lack of this type of amenity.

There is no doubt, whatever the outcome, that this added attraction in the town centre can do nothing but good.

The Wine Makers

Nearly six million people in this country are now making their own wine and beer. The prewery experts say that this nome brewed beer is very good indeed; possibly much better than brewery made.

I have had a go at wine making and was quite astonished at the excellent results.
Mind you, I've tried it all and have now got it down to something quite simple.

All this messing about with potatoes, apples and black-currants and what not is a lot of mushy hard labour and the results can be very uncertain.

I like the chemists way. Buy a tin of concentrated juice which is made by experts and you'll have no bother at all if you follow the few simple rules.

Make some cream sherry.

It's easy and costs very jittle. Once you have made this sherry, then you can launch into the various flavours with essences and you can make it very potent indeed with the help of Polish spirit or Vodka (just a little of each)


Be careful about drinking a lot of these wines, especially if you are driving a car afterwards. The home made sherry is stronger than the imported stuff. Gear required for winemaking and available at the chemists:—

Two jars (30p each) corks and plastic piping (10p) fermentation lock (5p) cleaning powder (6p) Campden tablets and yeast, 20oz of sugar. Tin of grape juice (60p), The actual ingredients for the gallon of wine costs about 80p.



Father Anderson's 25 years a priest



Father Dennis Anderson celebrated his 25th Anniversary of ordination with a special Mass at St Mary's on the 18th July.

The Mass, for St. Mary's congregation, was held a week before the actual Anniversary date, 25th July, so as not to clash with the holiday period.

Father Anderson is much loved by his parishoners and indeed is respected by all who come in contact with him.


