In the meantime the Corporation has been instructed to suspend house sales other than those currently under negotiation. Chief Executive of the Corporation, Mr Garry Philipson, said today: "We very much regret the inconvenience this may cause to would-be purchasers. We will make a further announcement on the subject as soon as the Government policy is known."

Have you had your car slightly damaged by a careless driver and don't want to lose your no-claim bonus? Has someone done a job so badly for you that you've had to pay someone else to put it right? Or have you lent money and been unable to get it

Many people have lost money in situations like Fiese, thought of suing to get it back and then decided it's not worth the trouble and cost. But now people can bring small claims of £75 or less in the County courts using a new informal procedure. As a result of this, you cannot be made to pay the cost of your opponent's solicitor if you lose and it is easier for you yourself to manage without a solicitor.

If you want to know more about how to sue, or if you are being sued your local Citizen's Advice Bureau at 9 Isherwood Close can help you They can give you a booklet describing the procedure in simple detail, and they will also advise you if your're in doubt about your claim.




