Sorry it's off

The opening date of the Recreation Centre blazed across our headlines last issue has been delayed.

A disappointed manager gave the news to Newton Press this week and decided he could not give a firm date, but thought it would be towards the end of May.

All arrangements for the opening have been postponed due to uncertainty of completion of necessary building

work in time for May 11th.

"All the staff are sorry but, the matter is beyond our control" said Mr Paxman, manager. "We are still receiving applications for membership, and, of course, such membership will not commence until the opening of the Centre" he added.

A rigged meeting!

This statement was made by a Mr Harrison, one of the few members of the public present at the Town meeting to discuss a resolution by Council, Colin Fiddes on rates.

The meeting, held in St. Clares Hall last Tuesday was really a Council meeting in disguise, and lone fighter Council Fiddes had no chance.

It made little difference whether Mr Fiddes was right

or wrong, the opposition from all sides of the Council was overwhelming. The few persons who spoke in support of Mr Fiddes had valid points, but the majority held the sway and the duties of the Town Council will not be altered or debated further.

Colin Fiddes believes the rates can be reduced if the Town Council handed over the responsibility of lighting and parks, which he maintained were being duplicated. He also said, by so doing our rate could be reduced by £6 per year or 13p per week. He was supported by County Council Cessford who condemned the Town Council for rejecting the offer by County to look after lighting.

The members of the public who spoke were evenly divided on the issue.

But on the vote it was evident that the Councillors present had the motion defeated from the start.

Personally, I give full marks to Mr Fiddes for courage. He prepared a good case and although he seemed out of step with the majority he never wavered in what he believed was the truth.

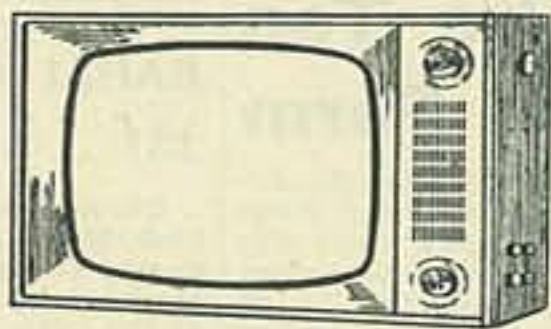

Help a child to a happy holiday

Throughout Britain last year children who would not otherwise have had a holiday were enabled to have one, thanks to the efforts of the Women's Royal Voluntary Service. 690 children were sent on holiday to the country, town or seaside by the WRVS in the Northern region.

This effort, made possible by the generosity of Northern women opening their homes to these needy children, would be even better if the WRVS could find still more hostesses willing to take the youngsters.

Imagine a child whose father has been ill and out of work for several months. In normal circumstances there is not much money going into the home, frequently not enough for a good meal. The child has never had even a day's holiday away from home never once goes to the country or the seaside. What we want is someone who will take her into their home for a few days this summer.

We would make all the necessary arrangements; we would give the child a new outfit, make sure she was clean and free from infection and escort her to and from the hostess's home. It is not, of course, only girls we want holiday homes for. There are boys just as much in need of a holiday.

Anyone who is understand-

ing, and who can accept the challenge of trying to make a deprived child happy, will find tremendous reward in the child's joy.

It is sometimes difficult to find places for older children. Hostesses tend to prefer the younger ones, but there are children of all ages who would benefit from a holiday if we could find more hostesses.

We always consult hostesses about the type of children they would prefer to take. Frequently permanent friendships develop between the children and those who take them. There are many women who make excellent holiday hostesses but who may not be able to afford to feed a child in addition to their own family. In such cases, thanks to donations, we can defray nominal expenses.
