After the final curtain Soc lety chairman Joyce Walton, gave her annual vote of thanks to all supporters and helpers and in a special presentation, made stage manager Harry Clark a 'life member' in appreciation of the work he has done for the Society over many years.

They told us that the first meeting of the Choir was held on 5th March 1953. At one time there were 54 members, but now, due to various circumstances the numbers have diminished to

The only qualification you need to join the Choir is a good voice, so it seems a great pity that only a few people from this town show any interest. In fact, 50% of the Choir come from surrouning areas such as Darlington and Shildon etc. Support from the Town is badly needed. One member, Mr J. Robinson, has a job as a porter in Darlington, but is so keen to be with the Choir, that he has been known to go to work from practice still in uniform.

One of the former young members, Mr G. Pearce, is now in the London Royal College of Opera. Another young member who joined at the age of 14 was Nicholas Ketringham and has already made as important already made an important contribution to the Male Voice Choir by arranging three pieces of music for them to sing.

The Choir makes an effort for the town. During the last seven years over £1,000 nas been provided for celebrity concerts alone. The Arts Council provides a guarantee against loss for the professional performers who per-form in the annual celebrities concert. There is usually a very good response to this with about 400 people atten-

#### VARIED

The Choir has quite a varied repertoire of music, from pop to comedy to classical and Gilbert and Sullivan, which always seems to go down well with most audiences.

The Choir is still remembered by people who left the district years ago. They have received letters from people as far away as New Zealand. It seems a shame that people closer at hand, in Newton Aycliffe, are not more interested

The fee for joining is not very great, it works out about 3p per week. This is paid when members attend their practise on a Tuesday evening at 7.30 p.m. in the Avenue Comp. School, where new members would be very welcome. Before they had the School, the Choir had been known to practise in Church halls, and once in a cafe! The practises are held all through the year even though in the Summer, numbers are often low.

CHARITY CONCERTS

The Choir members always practise hard and hope to entertain their audiences. They give concerts to various audiences, from the Over 60's to the people at Aycliffe Hos- of the town.

quite often give charity con-certs for the old people or a special club.

As well as appearing locally in Churches and Schools they also enter competitions and have done very well in them. At the moment they are the holders of the Darlington Choir Cup, but unfortunately were unable to enter this year dut to a previous engagemen. During the year they were placed 2nd in Stockton out of seven choirs and 2nd in Stanley, being only one point be-hind the winners. Not bad go-ing for a local choir is it?
