It's new and it's good

The new "Boys Club" at Burnhill Way opens for activities on 5th October.

A new team takes charge under the leadership of Alan Grey, an A.D.C. employee. Alan, who originated from Northallerton has always taken an interest in coaching and helping youth sporting activities. This new position carries extra responsibilities in administration but Alan is quickly getting to grips with the situation.

GIRLS WELCOME

The term "Boys Club" is very misleading as girls are equally welcome as members. The new club opens at the following times:—

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday 7 to 10 p.m. Senior. Thursday 7 to 10 p.m. Table Tennis League teams. Friday 6 to 9 p.m. Junior. Ages: Juniors 11 to 14, Seniors 14 years plus.

Activities include: 11-a-side soccer team, 5-a-side table tennis teams, Judo club, discos, netball, volleyball, badminton, usual table games. Canteen with juke box, pool table, table soccer and pinball.

The other leaders of the new club are Paul Claxton, Ernie Wilson and Lynda Bainbridge, plus Bill Avery the Judo Instructor and Paul Thompson the Football Secretary. It is also hoped to have qualified table tennis coaches, badminton coach and professional help on the football training.

Membership will run from August to July at a cost of 25p — 11 to 18 years olds and 50p for the old timers —

18 plus. In addition to this amount a nightly charge of 10p will be made.

Membership cards will be issued and must be produced on every visit.

Save Newton Aycliffe!

The Ministerial announcement that New Town expansion is to be stopped brings immediate action from local Liberals who have forced a Town Meeting to be called next week in protest.

The following statement by Brian Roberts put forward reasons why the town should react strongly to any cut back in its growth.

"The Labour Minister has called for a full stop on further development in new towns pending a review, which really means the Labour Government intends to switch resources to building factories and homes in cities.

Newton Aycliffe has been a success (despite its faults) in attracting industry. Our unemployment is less than the national average, and houses have been available in the same number of weeks as it takes years in the surrounding Sedgefield District area. On the present home building in the District all houses built would have to be allotted to Newton Aycliffe, just to fill the need of second generation marriages. Will our young people have to leave and go South for jobs and homes?

People waiting to buy their homes will not be able to if the housing programme is cut or halted.

Recreational facilities provided by local Councils and based on the 45,000 population will be under used and therefore prove an even heavier burden on the ratepayers.

Only by direct action now and kicking up a fuss before all this happens will prevent a decision which will drastically affect all our lives.

Your Labour County Councillors have not voted against the County Structure plans which allows Newton Aycliffe only to increase by "natural growth."

Many Sedgefield District Labour Councillors are jealous of Newton Aycliffe and want no increase. Can we expect the Government not to take their colleague's advice?

Beware — you will be told by Counc. Conlon and his Labour colleagues that it won't happen — we've heard it all before! It was fixed four years ago — we weren't going in with expensive Sedgefield District on reorganisation.

County Council, Alex Cessford was more honest, urging people to go into Sedgefield District, because Newton Aycliffe would then become the

centre of administration. Result — in with Shildon and its debts, and if you have any complaints you've got to go all the way to Spennymoor — the centre of administration.

We are calling this meeting and are supported by many independent signatures to **SAVE OUR TOWN**. I hope that all those people who are concerned with their own, and their children's future will attend St. Clares Church Hall at 7.30 p.m., Next Tuesday, 28th September, and **MAKE YOUR VOICE HEARD!**

THE TRAIN NOW STANDING . . .

Newton Aycliffe is to have a Railway Station — well, not really, more a train stopping point.

There will be a platform both sides of the rails, and a bridge, but no ticket office, porter or any staff at all.

Work should start soon on the site at Greenfield Way.

It will be good news for Counc. Joe Conlon who first suggested we have a rail halt four years ago.

The Town Council have contacted British Rail a number of times since and now it seems the effort is to be rewarded.

Second try to stage Bazaar '76

It is anticipated that the Bazaar will finish no later than 4.00 p.m.

Fancy a great evening out? Then go along to the Arts Councils' Bonfire Night Ball in the Recreation Centre, Friday 5th November. International stars Kenny Ball and the Jazzmen are the big attraction, supported by the John Wray Set. Dancing is from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. and Tickets (strictly limited) at £2 are available from the Information Centre.

"Aycliffe's future looks good ..."

Aycliffe New Town expects to contribute 800 new jobs towards solving the region's employment problems soon.

Twenty firms now have new factories and extensions under construction, or at the design stage.

Mr J. A. Cooper, Director of Estates for the A.D.C. said "Estimates given by the companies mean at least 800 new jobs here when all the projects are complete. Eight of the projects are from firms new to Aycliffe. The rest are expansions and new developments by existing companies."

Details of the two biggest new factories at Aycliffe — for Flymo/Electrolux and Union Carbide — have already been announced. These will bring more than 500 new jobs. The Flymo/Electrolux factory is almost complete and the company is recruiting workers for the new plant. The Union Carbide factory is due to come on stream early in 1977.

Important developments announced for the first time include extensions for Ozalid (with 60 new jobs forecast), British Steel (24 new jobs), Tin Boxes (20 new jobs), and a new 7,000 sq. ft. factory for Darlington Heat Treatment, a new company setting up in Aycliffe (15 new jobs). Other firms participating in the boom include WK (Engineering) and Tolwood Multifasteners.

"Aycliffe's future looks good" said Dennis Stevenson, Chairman of the A.D.C. "We acquired the industrial estate three years ago at the start of the worst recession that has ever hit the West. A few companies have closed down, a few have laid off workers and some others have gone on to short time working. But despite all that, industrial employment at Aycliffe has remained steady."
