Aycliffe hits record employment level

Male employment in Newton Aycliffe has reached record level. Figures released for January 1977 show that 6,791 men are employed at Aycliffe

now, compared with 6,172 in April 1973, when the A.D.C. acquired the Estate. This is an increase of over 10% during a period when unemployment in the North East has risen to 8%.

The number of industrial workers at Aycliffe has risen during each of the past eight months. The new total (including women) is 9,140 — an increase of 348 compared with the May 1976 figure of 8,792. (Total employment on Aycliffe Industrial Estate in April 1973 was 8,994).

"These statistics are plain evidence that Aycliffe is fulfilling its role as an employment growth point in South of West Durham" said Dennis Stevenson, Chairman of Aycliffe Development Corporation.

cliffe Development Corporation.

"Britain has been going through the biggest recession ever to hit the West but Aycliffe has still managed to boost the number of people in employment. The position is even more encouraging when it is realised that a number of important new projects have only started recruitment recently" he added.

Electrolux/Flymo have a target of 300 workers for the first phase of their project but so far only one-third of that total has been hired. Union Carbide are also actively recruiting workers for their new 65,000 sq. ft. factory.

Since April 1973, a million square feet of factory space has been added at Aycliffe. Seventy firms now occupy almost 4.4 million square feet of space. In the last two months, five firms have moved into new premises at Aycliffe.

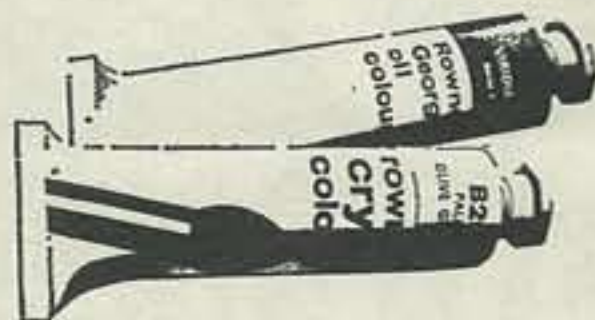

Charity dance cancelled

The Dance to be held on
 February 25th to raise funds
 for the British Heart Founda-
 tion has been cancelled. Sup-
 port has been so poor that
 even the cost of the hall in the
 Recreation Centre, could not
 be met.

Mr Alan Wright, organiser
 of many successful dances in
 the town, planned to make
 this dance something special
 thinking that many people
 would have the interests of
 this worthy cause at heart.

A very disappointed Alan
 Wright told Newton News he
 thought the cause alone would

sell tickets.

"It is obvious that only a
 few of us care. Of the 200
 letters sent out to industrialists
 and business people, only 10
 replied — seems there is not
 even courtesy, never mind
 help and support" he said.

Mr Wright expresses
 his thanks to the ninety or
 so people who bought or re-
 quested tickets and those who
 have offered prizes or other
 means of help, mentioning in
 particular the ADC and Sedge-
 field District Council.

"When I think that £1.50,
 the cost of a ticket for this
 dance, is spent by many people
 on drinks alone, I feel very
 bitter about the whole thing"
 said the despondent Mr
 Wright. "Another thing I
 thought would have brought
 the people in" he said "was
 the innovation of a bar in the
 dance hall. This was some-
 thing that was lacking at my
 previous dances and I was
 delighted to have permission.
 However, I have learnt my
 lesson, I hope no-one asks ME
 to organise another dance!"
 Mr Norman Bell, Northern
 Region organiser for the BHF
 said he "feels for Mr Wright"
 and cannot understand the
 apathy in view of the good
 cause.

There may be a good reason
 for this apathy, if there is Mr
 Wright would like to know
 what it is. Lack of publicity
 cannot be the reason, publicity
 was far flung through posters
 press, and the usual media
 including radio. "My thanks
 go out to them and to the
 Newton Press for giving me
 so much space in the Newton
 News. I only wish this had
 been a success story instead
 of one of great disappoint-
 ment," concluded Mr Wright.
 People who bought tickets
 are asked to return them for
 a refund.

Ed: A sad story of enterprise
 unrewarded, but we hope Mr
 Wright will not withdraw com-
 pletely from his organisers'
 role. Leaders of his calibre
 are hard to find.

 opens your own eyes more.
 You think, 'If Richard Wawro
 with all his handicaps can ac-

 achievements as a normal per-
 son are meagre indeed.' And
 you re-evaluate your pre-
 conceived notions about the
 handicapped."

**No cash for
Golf Course**

Dennis Stevenson, Chairman of the ADC made a rare appearance at a liaison meeting with the Town Council earlier this month.

His attendance was noted sarcastically by Counc. McMenamin who stated that in his two years of office it was the first time he had met the Chairman.

The meeting was conducted in an expeditious manner and dealt with many problems affecting the town.

The question of who should be responsible for providing old peoples warden schemes was discussed. It was apparent the ADC were unwilling to commit the tenants to an extra rent increase to cover the cost. Counc. McMenamin told the meeting he was sure the tenants of the town would not grudge the extra 11p per week to see the schemes introduced. After more debate it was agreed to consult the Sedgfield District Council as they would be taking over this responsibility soon and already operate Warden Schemes financed from the rates.

RENT COLLECTING

Counc. Mrs Meadows raised the topic of rent collections for elderly and infirm residents; pointing out the value of the service. Mr Village housing manager, replied that there was now no facilities for this, but arrangements had been made with the sub-post offices to take rent money. It was hoped that when relatives collected pensions they would pay rents at the same time.

Tony Cooper, Director of Estates, gave an up to date report on industry and commerce which showed amazing growth and potential. Dennis Stevenson praised the efforts

of the states Dept. observing over the four years since the ADC took over the Industrial Estate there had been steady progress and Aycliffe was among half a dozen towns who were escaping the brunt of a poor economy and "buckling the trend."

Town Clerk, John Farquhar brought the meetings attention to the nine hole golf course at School Aycliffe which, due to bad drainage, could only offer seven holes to disappointed town golfers. He reported the Town Council had given up hope of ever clearing the affected area and have decided to resite the two holes, leaving the water as a feature of the course. "Unfortunately the Town Council are out of cash and we ask the ADC to consider further help in this project" said Mr Farquhar. The chairman sympathised and promised urgent consideration.

Alan Coustick or Mr Keith Nelson, or from the Information Centre. Price is 50p. Senior Citizens and children 25p).

Other events we can look forward to at Burnhill Way are: a Mannequin Parade on Wednesday 4th May, and the Spring Fayre on Saturday 14th May.

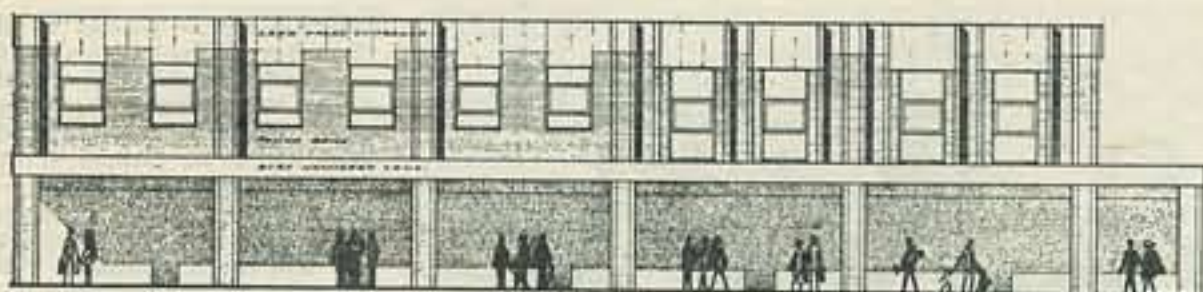

Work starts on new "Boots" store

Work started this week on the first stages of the construction of a new store for Boots Ltd., adjacent to Barclays Bank in the town centre. The new store will have about five times as much shopping space as the company's existing shop in Aycliffe. It will sell a much wider range of goods including children's clothes, hardware and hi-fi equipment. The new store should be open for business in the summer of 1978.

The start of work on the project brought the closure of the small car park at the southern end of Beveridge Way (between Walter Wilson's supermarket and Hardys furniture store).

The Development Corporation has published a leaflet (available from the Housing Centre, the Library and the Information Centre) which gives full details of the location of the 400 free car parking spaces available in the town centre. Additional spaces for handicapped drivers have been provided in the main Central Avenue car parks to replace those closed at the end of Beveridge Way.

FIRST AID COURSE OPENS

A course on First Aid will be held on Thursday evenings at 7 p.m. in the Recreation Centre (commencing 17th Feb).

This is a course leading to the Adult St John Ambulance Certificate — recognised by local authorities and government departments under Factory Acts and Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act.
