The club were runners-up in the Northern Echo Local Heroes awards in December after climbing from the parks of the Durham Alliance League to the Northern League top flight in emphatic fashion.

Aycliffe But manager Allan Oliver, whose side are currently sixth in their inaugural first division campaign this season, says he faces losing his top players if he doesn't get more support from the business community. "It has reached a critical

point where we desperately need more support from local firms," said Oliver, who runs his own reinforcing and steel fixing business. We've progressed at a rapid rate over the last three or four years and have overcome every hurdle up to now, winning the second division title last season. "We're now enjoying a

tremendous debut season in the first division, but that can only be maintained with more corporate support. As with everything in life, you get what you pay for, and to service a team in the top six of the Northern League comes at a price. "We're competing against

top clubs, with years of



tradition and big backing behind them, with a third of their budget, and that's testament to our lads and the fact they're with us for the right reasons.

The demise of Town Centres is in the news and many reasons are given why people are deserting their own shopping precincts in favour of out of town retail parks and internet shopping.

Cost and convenience is the answer most people give and if we track back we can see that town centres are guilty of their own downfall, but the blame is not down to shopkeepers.

In my view it goes back a few years before alternative means of shopping evolved when Landlords got too greedy and the local authorities started to impose car parking charges.

Ĥigh rents, service increased charges. business rates and other on-costs saw profits from town centre shopkeeping reduced.

The giant retailers began to look to save costs and moved out of town where low land prices brought reduced rents and overheads.

This was a revolution in retailing and one stop shopping with easy parking won over the shoppers. Now on top of this there are even more savings on cost and time by purchasing on-line. This has badly affected "small shopkeeper the the loss of most and

private businesses. particularly noticeable in our town centre.

So it is no wonder town centres are struggling and the current debate is forcing landlords to review their letting policies and rentals. No longer can they expect to lease shops for 25 years and charge high rents. The prospective shopkeeper now has the upper hand and can almost dictate their own terms.

Newton Aycliffe's new development could show the way and it is an opportunity for our Town Centre landlords to adopt a more radical approach in competing with internet and out of town retailers.

Shopkeepers will have to wise up too with prices and service to equal, if not better, than the competition. Aycliffe is fortunate to have no car parking charges and this must continue.

REPORT ON COUNCIL MEETING WEDNESDAY 11th JANUARY

There were two issues of particular interest on the Environment Committee:

The first was two requests to fell or prune trees. The Town Council receives such requests from time to time: however, I hope readers will agree that it is very difficult for the Town Council to agree cut down woodland, which is there for the whole community, for the benefit or convenience of an individual householder.

Not least, there is the matter of precedence – all the community woodland in the town is in amongst housing. and if we agree cut down some woodland because (as in some past requests) a householder finds it irksome to clean leaves out of their guttering, then we could end up cutting down large areas. The Town Council considers each case on its merits - in these most recent cases, the Chair of Environment and myself went out with the Works Manager to inspect the sites. However, the decision on both cases was to decline the specific requests. Instead, the Town Council has recently commissioned a survey of its woodland, and will be cutting down any unhealthy or potentially unsafe trees.

On a happier note, officers reported that there was no vandalism at all over the

holiday period, so well done the youth of Aycliffe. The Council is keen to foster a sense of appreciation of the wonderful environment we are lucky enough to live in, so let's hope that our young people are learning to protect, not wreck, that environment There were four issues I will report from the Recreation Committee:

The play area at Byerley Park has now been refurbished we hope you will agree that it looks fabulous.

Members accepted quotes for the Senior Citizens' free day-trips this summer; the destinations will be the Lakes, South Shields, Scarborough, Blackpool, Dumfries and Skipton. This is a service which the Town Council is inordinately proud

to provide. new catering Manager has been appointed at the Oak Leaf Sports Complex. The cheap, excellent meals available at the Oak Leaf (both for individuals and groups) are one of Avcliffe's best-kept secrets, and Councillors expressed the hope that more people will start using the Complex restaurant.

commissioning for adult "We know services, said: "We know that Dean Lodge is very popular with the people who use it but we must respond to the changes in demand for respite services and the need to make savings in the light of the financial pressures the

council is facing. "If the decision is taken to close Dean Lodge the council is committed to ensuring that people continue to receive the respite services they need with as little disruption as possible."

The council will ensure that there will be sufficient alternative services available to meet the needs of people who currently use Dean Lodge. The council already has extensive experience of supporting people with a learning disability to make transitions between different services. Staff would ensure that any

new service would be fully aware of an individual's care and health needs personal preferences and factors. other important Arrangements would also be made for people to have

a gradual introduction to new type of care should that be required to support them through the change.

The council spends approximately £1.7m a year on learning disability respite services, provided through its facilities at Dean Lodge, in Ferryhill, at Hawthorn House, in Durham City, through its 'shared lives scheme or by independent care services.

Typically it costs around £1,730 per week for someone to attend Dean Lodge, compared to £1,295 per week for similar, independently run services.

The council carried out a review of respite services for adults with learning disabilities last year. This included a consultation with people who use respite services and with carers. The review was part of the council's work to save at

least £145.8m over 5 years between 2011 and 2016 in response to reductions in Government funding. Cabinet will be asked to agree the proposals at County Hall on January 25th.



the first new towns established under the New Towns Act 1946, and work on it started on June 28 1948. William Beveridge was the first chair of the Newton Aycliffe development corporation, the first row of shops in the town was built in 1952 on Neville Parade, and construction of the town centre itself began in

1957 In those early years the town centre was seen as a bustling environment with thriving shops, and everybody of a particular age in Newton Aycliffe has fond memories of it, but then, in the 1960s, things began to stall. The planners could not make up their minds about the future direction of the town and its predicted population, and as a result hesitation stepped in. There were plans for a new town centre, which were eventually

rejected In 1963 Lord Hailsham's report on the future of the northeast predicted an increase in the town's population, but because of hesitation and a poor decision-making process, it took 12 years from the Hailsham report and the consent of a Secretary of State before a few shops were built. In 1974 a leisure centre was built. By the 1980s the town's biographer, Garry Philipson, said in his book "Aycliffe and Peterlee New Towns" that there was

'indecision and consequent lengthy delay regarding the new towns' target population and, subsequently, the form of town centre redevelopment.'

17 Jan 2012 : Column 652 The delays and setbacks have continued into this century, but I think that we have started to turn the corner over the past three years. About 10 years ago Tesco built a store about 500 yards from the town centre. Today that is taking £1 million a week out of the town, which population of about 28.000. People might comment on the superstore's hold on the town centre, but everyone still seems to use the shop.

The town centre is still making progress. The old dilapidated health centre has been demolished, Wilkinson has opened a new store, and the row of shops in Dalton Way has been demolished. That will make room for a new Aldi supermarket, which will be

built and opened in the course of this year, adding welcome competition for Tesco. The leisure centre is to become the site of a community hub with a new library, newly configured health provision and a community space. The structural monstrosity known as "the ramp", which links the centre's two floors and the car park is to be dismantled, and a row of shops near the leisure centre is to be demolished, creating a thoroughfare. That will open up to the outside world a town centre that seems enclosed currently and uninviting to potential customers.

For the residents of Newton Aycliffe, the history of their town centre has been laced with a good dose of frustration. In the past few years I have experienced that frustration myself. To bring a halt to the delays and ensure that progress could be made, my predecessor arranged for the planners, developers and other stakeholders to sit down around the same table to thrash out their problems at the beginning of 2007. That was the first time that those people had sat down together in the same room to work out the problems. been There have still

frustrations. For example, before planning could be agreed for the Aldi store, a stopping-

up order had to be in place on a footpath. That process could not run concurrently with other planning issues, but had to happen sequentially, which caused unnecessary delay, given that the path has not been missed and the process holding up economic was development and job creation. The planning regime does not need wholesale reform, but some common sense must be applied when implementing

the existing planning regime. Even with the best will of the developers, planners and stakeholders, the bureaucratic generated nightmare by the utility companies was problem. The gas and electricity companies would arrange to sort out problems

on the building site of the new supermarket and then knock back the date. They found pipes that they did not know were there. I have spent many phone calls to the utility companies trying to get them to stick to the plans. Some Members might argue that such incompetence is the preserve of the public sector, but I can guarantee that it is not.



Is Golf Course Plan Considered an "Exceptional" Case?

Dear Sir, My objection to this proposed

development has up till now been based on its failure to comply with current planning rules and it has always been my understanding that any objection must be on planning grounds. I have however always known that these rules can be overruled in exceptional circumstances.

In the Localism Act the opportunity to do this is being severely curtailed and once the local plan is accepted then it cannot be easily overturned. These are the words of Greg Clark the planning minister, but this is exactly what Mr

Murphy is proposing. There is now no doubt that the County Council agree this application does not comply with the current planning rules and the discussions now going on with the developer for almost a year are to explore the developers proposals for them to be treated as an exceptional case.

As yet nothing is agreed and ultimately it will be the decision of councillors on the planning committee who make the final decision. This raises the question should councillors, maybe only one,

be allowed to change the rules that have been agreed by the people in the area after they have spent months and maybe vears, as we are doing now, in formulating the Local Plan? Greg Clark's suggestion is not new it has always been so, he is only reinforcing it. He has not introduced any sanctions

that I am aware of, against authorities, who ignore the planning rules. It will be interesting to find out what criteria the council use to decide "exceptional" and if these apply to all future applications. If this application

is approved, it appears to me that developers in future will be able to buy planning permission whatever the Local Plan says. Changes such as this used to have to be approved by the regional authority, but this has been abolished by this government.

There is one other issue which has to be addressed and that is the amount the developer must pay to the council for the provision of affordable houses etc. Developers are required to include twenty percent of the houses as affordable,

which in this case would be ten houses. However developers are allowed to get out of this requirement by offering the council a sum of money. The question is how much money. There is no prescribed amount and each council has a different system to decide what this should be. Up to now I have no idea how DCC is going to decide on this issue. Mr Murphy has offered £350,000. The council is not obliged to accept Mr Murphy's offer, it is by agreement. Mr Murphy has however introduced a snag, what he has done is to make his offer a package. This means it is accepted as a whole or it

fails. If for example councillors do not accept his offer of $\pounds 350,000$ then they have to reject the whole application even if they agree with the planning considerations.

Since we are currently very close to agreeing a new Local Plan, now called a Local Development Framework. when the people of Aycliffe will have the opportunity to have their say on every aspect of planning in Aycliffe, may I appeal to the councillors on the planning committee who will have to decide on this



TIME TO SHED LIGHT St. Elizabeth's **ON CLOCK CHANGE Church Events**

The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) is urging MPs to back a Bill that would lead to a better understanding of the benefits of lighter evenings in the UK.

The Daylight Saving Bill passed its second reading in December 2010 with a huge majority. This feat means the push for lighter evenings is closer to succeeding now than at any time since 1970. But with its third reading scheduled to take place in the House of Commons on Friday, January 20, the campaign needs more MPs to turn out and vote "Aye"

The Government has already said that it is "minded" to back Rebecca Harris MP's Private Members' Bill while every recent opinion poll shows the idea has UKwide appeal.

The Bill is simply calling for a cross-departmental audit of the benefits of Single/Double Summer Time (GMT+1 in winter / GMT+2 in summer). If the evidence proves compelling - and is accepted by all UK governments - then it could trigger a trial.

RoSPA has been campaigning on this issue for decades. All the evidence suggests that lighter evenings would make the UK's road users significantly safer. Figures cited by the Department for Transport show that by providing an extra hour of

evening daylight all year round, about 80 deaths and at least 200 serious injuries would be prevented on our roads each year. As well as better aligning

daylight with waking hours, independent studies show that a move to SDST would: Cut CO2 emissions by 447,000 tonnes a year by reducing the need for electric lighting in the evenings

Provide a £3.5bn boost to British leisure and tourism, creating up to 80,000 new iobs in the sector • Reduce levels of obesity by allowing for more outdoor

sport in the evenings • Relieve the symptoms of Seasonal Affective Disorder and similar conditions

• Reduce crime and the fear of crime (especially among the elderly). The world has changed a

great deal since the last trial concluded successfully in 1971, so it's imperative that we're given a chance to consider the impact lighter evenings would have on 21st century Britain.

With so much at stake, it is only right that the public is given the evidence it needs to make the kind of decisions that could save lives, create jobs and help protect the environment.

FUTURE OF LIBRARIES GUARANTEED

County Libraries across Durham will remain open reductions despite in Government funding, under proposals being discussed by councillors next week.

The County Council, which needs to make savings of at least £145.8m over the five years between 2011 and 2016, is proposing measures that will guarantee no libraries will close. However, with the total number of visits to libraries

having dropped over the past three years and the number of active users falling by 4%, the council does need to respond to changing demand for library services. Members of the authority's

Cabinet will be asked to agree to a 12-week consultation on a number of changes, when they meet at County Hall on Wednesday, 25 January.

If given the go-ahead, the consultation would see library-users, staff and the general public asked for their views on proposals to retain

the existing 11 town centre and 28 community library buildings, reduce opening hours and review the mobile library service.

Cllr Maria Plews, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for leisure, libraries and lifelong learning, said: "We need to reduce spending on library services by £1.457m over the next four years while still providing a high quality service to residents.

"I am pleased that we have been able to put forward a strategy for the future of the service that enables all libraries to remain open but means we can make the required savings and address changing demand.

'We are confident that the changes we are proposing will enable us to offer a financially sustainable library network that is vibrant modern and enjoyable to visit despite our reduced budget." The proposals reflect feedback received during an

earlier consultation on library services in 2010 as well as the annual Public Library Service User survey for 2009/10 and a consultation last year on the council's savings proposals prior to budget setting.

Library opening times currently vary from 21 hours per week in many smaller venues to 55.5 at Clayport, in Durham, with all open at least two evenings per week and on a Saturday morning.

The proposals would see the opening hours for all town centre libraries, excluding Clayport, reduced to a core of 36 hours per week, with community libraries operating a core of 20 hours per week.

Specific opening times for individual libraries would be determined in discussion with local communities to reflect local need, although it is expected that all would be open on Saturday mornings

and one evening per week. Changes are also being proposed to the mobile library service, which has seen membership fall from 7,800 in March 2008 to

3,538 in March 2011. The number of active borrowers now accounts for only 1.5 per cent of the total for the library service, making the mobile service significantly more expensive per visit than library buildings.

There are currently five mobile library vehicles, which visit 182 different communities over a twoweek period, stopping at 380 halts

Under the new strategy, it is proposed that the mobile library service will only visit communities at least four miles from a library building, with only one halt in each settlement the library visits. Halts would be withdrawn if they are not used.

Despite the overall reduction in funding for the service, capital has also been set aside to carry out much needed improvements to some of library buildings.

The council will also continue to seek out opportunities to co-locate libraries with other services

If given the go-ahead, the consultation would begin on Monday, 6 February.






