Local Lad 3rd in Junior Great North Run

Last weekend saw an amazing end to the summer for local lad Henry Johnson, with a 3rd place position at the Junior Great North Run. He stormed around the 4k course in 13.41. The route was tackled by runners from across the country, but the young athlete was happy to come in 3rd for the 13-14 yrs boys. The winner of the category was Josh Schofield from York who was this year's London mini marathon winner. "I was only 13 sec behind Josh,



so I am really pleased with my performance today," said Henry. His overall position of 8th place meant he had run faster than many of those competing in the 15-16 yr category. Johnson puts his recent success down to a few well placed events in his running diary. The Tartan Games at Gateshead at the end of August, gave him chance to race in Under 15 boys 1500m. A few days before he was struggling with asthma and considered pulling out. He did race and a photo finish saw him take 3rd place by only 400th of a second. Early September saw Johnson run at the Tees Pride 3k fun run. Coming back to defend his 2010 title, he glided to 1st place well ahead of the pack, in 10.33. Final preparations were put together on September 10th, when Johnson took part in his first ever park run at Durham. He was 4th over the line, behind the adults and first junior back with 17.41 a new personal best at the distance.

PROMISE OF NEW LIBRARY FOR AYCLIFFE IN COUNCIL'S EASY ACCESS PLANS

Durham County Council's Cabinet is being asked to approve plans for new customer access points in the heart of four major communities.

A report to members next week outlines how, by choosing busy town centre locations, the council can save money in the long term but improve its offer to customers at the same time. Last year the Cabinet agreed a budget of £8m to invest in new Customer Access Points (CAPs) which offer information and support on a range of council and partner agency services in easy to reach locations. At the same time a review of the authority's office accommodation was carried out to ensure all buildings were fit for modern purposes. Those which are not will be sold off for redevelopment raising income for the council in the longer term and replenishing the £8m investment made. Cabinet member for regeneration and economic development, Cllr Neil Foster, said: "The report offers Cabinet an important update, including the fact that the programme of new CAPs remains within budget. "But it also asks members

to approve the locations of four new facilities which I feel confident will be a major improvement for our customers in Crook, Durham City, Barnard Castle and Newton Aycliffe."

"The idea is that by choosing locations we already know are both popular and easily accessible and co-locating a range of services on one site, we improve what we offer residents and in the longer term, save money.

"I am particularly delighted that the report outlines a CAP for Newton Aycliffe, which I am sure will be most welcome for local people, who have not had anything similar in the past." The report proposes a new CAP within the Leisure Centre itself and a refurbishment programme of a number of local retail premises to provide a new

library. The proposals were considered by the Council Cabinet on Thursday September 22nd.

The successful Lunch Club recently launched at St Mary's on Burn Lane is welcoming new members. The club, for elderly people in Newton Aycliffe, was set up as a partnership between the Parish of St Mary and St Joseph and North East charity, St Cuthberts Care. With 27 volunteers the Lunch Club, held every Thursday at St Mary's, is flourishing and ready to help more people from the local community.

By providing them with a place to enjoy a nutritious lunch, companionship and a range of fun and entertaining activities, the Club aims to lessen the impact of isolation and loneliness and to help people enjoy the company and friendship of the group. Great Aycliffe and Middridge Partnership (GAMP) has funded essential improvements to make access and toilet facilities more wheelchair friendly for the

Club users. Funding was also provided to upgrade kitchen facilities including the heating and lighting systems.

Among those who are already benefiting from the lunch club is a carer who has been isolated by the responsibilities she has for her elderly husband, and an elderly married couple who have experienced little interaction with their community for several years.

Father Michael Campion, Parish Priest for St Mary's said, "Our lunch club has proved to be invaluable to many people in Newton Aycliffe and we want to make sure that every available place is used to benefit those who need our support. I am grateful to St Cuthberts Care for the expertise they have shared with us and to our team of dedicated volunteers who generously give their time to benefit others."

Kathleen Urwin, Community Services Manager with St Cuthberts Care added, "Working together with Father Campion and local volunteers, we have created a safe place where people can be assured of a warm welcome, a hot meal and companionship. St Mary's Lunch Club undoubtedly provides a weekly highlight for those who were previously unable to maintain links with their own community."

Decided to take it easy and drive to the Turbinia in Newton Aycliffe last night to watch Steve, Lewthy, Al and Marky aka Captain Rock. Anyway, I missed most of the first half...what I did see I'll come back to 'cos it's the best bit. The second half was a typical CR performance. Steve's a good sound engineer and he had the mix pretty much spot on with it not being too loud and everything cutting through well. WIND FARMS: A REALITY CHECK

CO2 EMISSIONS

Electricity generated from wind turbines is unpredictable. Conventional power stations, running inefficiently and producing CO2, are needed as backup. CO2 is produced in the manufacture of thousands of cubic feet of concrete for the base of each turbine. Lorries constructing the bases and road infrastructure emit CO2. RESULT – a negligible reduction in CO2 emissions over the lifetime of a wind farm

SUBSIDIES

Wind farms are only viable because of Renewable Obligation Certificates (ROCs). The consumer pays a higher price for electricity – the main beneficiaries are the shareholders of cement, wind and electricity companies and the landowners. Environmental economists estimate the environmental impact cost to every household in Scotland is £288 per on-shore wind farm.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASPECTS

“Wind farms” should be called “Wind power stations” – they are industrializations of the natural landscape Scotland’s natural beauty – its attraction to tourists – is under threat with proposals for 250 wind farms. Auchencorth Moss is close to the Pentland Hills – a Regional Park. A wind power station will destroy the view of the hills from the major tourist routes and will destroy views from the Pentlands Auchencorth Moss is a raised peat bog, a site of special scientific interest and a breeding ground for birds.

Young People Graduate from Baltic Training Apprenticeship

REPORT ON COUNCIL MEETING WEDNESDAY 14th SEPTEMBER

The Policy and Resources Committee was a very amicable meeting, when Councillors of all political persuasions unanimously agreed on almost every issue.

They agreed to give a small grant to a local group which was holding a charity night. The meeting also agreed spending decisions of £17,315 on new IT equipment (as recommended by the Council's IT Support company), and £1,586 for cavity wall insulation of the St Oswald's Learning Centre (as recommended by the Council's Asset Management Group). It also instructed officers to prepare a full report on the possibility (and viability) of installing photovoltaic cells on the Council offices roof.

Members agreed the 2012-13 Budget timetable, approved an updated policy on Lone-Working by Council employees and accepted the Council's revised Business Risk Review.

The Committee also recommitted itself to requiring full Audits. A change in government policy allows the Council to conduct only a 'light touch' audit, at a saving of £8,000 a year, and officers reported that we are the only town council in the country which still requires the full

'larger body' audit.

Members remain convinced, however, that they want the more thorough audit, because they want townspeople to be able to continue to be reassured that the Council is achieving the highest standards of financial competence. That peace of mind – for Councillors and electors – is worth the extra cost.

As if to demonstrate their financial acumen, Councillors raised a number of queries relating to the accounts control sheet, which the officers explained.

A final point concerned the West Park boathouse. In August, the Council's Asset Management Working Group had considered the boathouse (which has not been used since 2007, needs refurbishment and a new roof, and has no electricity, water or toilet).

The Working Group had recommended that investigations should be made as to other possible uses, but that – if there was no interest in the building in the next 3 months – the Council should consider demolishing it.

Cllr George Gray said that he was disappointed that the Working Group had not made a site visit to the building, and that it had not carried out a community consultation.

Cllr Clare suggested in reply that the Council cannot be expected to conduct a community consultation on every maintenance decision on every building it owns; Councillors were elected to make such decisions, and it was right that they do so. However, he moved that Cllr Gray's comments be noted. This – along with the recommendation of the Working Group – was accepted by the Committee.

LOCO APPEALS FOR STORIES FROM FORMER WAGON WORKS EMPLOYEES

The National Railway Museum at Shildon is appealing to former employees of Shildon Wagon Works to come forward with their stories and memories of working on Merry-Go-Round (MGR) wagons.

In May the museum saw the arrival of the last MGR wagon to be built at Shildon Wagon Works. It was built in 1982, and was the last new MGR wagon to be completed before Shildon Wagon Works closed in 1984.

The movement of coal by rail in Britain was revolutionised in the 1960s through the introduction of new coal hoppers, called 'Merry-Go-Round' wagons.

A train of 'Merry-Go-Round' wagons is able to load and unload its cargo while still moving – so maximising efficiency of the wagon fleet.

The prototype was a 32-ton unit, built at Darlington and tested in 1964 – and recently cosmetically restored at the NRM Conservation Workshop at Locomotion: The National Railway Museum at Shildon.

After the closure of Darlington Works in 1966, MGR wagon production continued at Shildon – and, with the exception of 160 wagons built at Ashford – all 10,702 HAA wagons and 460 HDA wagons were built in the town.

Tony Attle, Education Officer at Locomotion said: "Coal wagons have a long history of being made in Shildon, with over 150 years of coal transportation out of the town. Merry-Go-Round wagons are an important example of this, and they are still many in use today.

The display of this wagon at Locomotion is an important addition to the collections here. It represents the achievements made at Shildon Wagon Works and the important role that Shildon played as a railway town. But we need more information from people who worked in the industry to interpret this object. We hope that people will help us achieve this by coming forward with their stories and memories".

The project to interpret the MGR wagon has been funded through Local Elected Member, Councillor Brian Stephens' Neighbourhood Budget.

MGR wagon, HAD 368459 was bought by the North East Branch of the 'Friends of the National Railway Museum' for display at Locomotion.

AYCLIFFE FACES OPPORTUNITY & DANGER SAYS COUNCILLOR

Dear Sir,
May I share with Newton News readers what I regard as the main issues currently facing Aycliffe:

1. If you receive Durham County Council's Economic Update, you will be very worried about the rising unemployment rate in County Durham. I am campaigning for a regular meeting with the DCC 'RED' (Regeneration and Economic Development) team so that the Town Council can at least be kept informed about what is happening on the Aycliffe Industrial Estate. The Town Council does not have the financial means to influence the economy, but it must do what it can to encourage development.

2. The government's Localism Bill will give the Town Council the right to make a 'local plan' (within the County Plan we were all campaigning about earlier this year). At the same time, the government is seeking to 'free up' planning, and I am worried that this will make our precious places vulnerable to inappropriate development. So the town faces opportunity, and danger, both at the same time. The Town Council has set up a Planning Sub-Committee to monitor planning applications, and I

am advocating that – when the opportunity arises – we will write our own 'local plan'.

3. The government has published a review of constituency boundaries which will cut the number of MPs and reduce County Durham's representation at Westminster. Meantime, Aycliffe is to be taken out of its current constituency, and moved in with a Yarm/Eaglescliffe constituency. If you have read my blog, you will know that I regard this, not only as a disruption, but as an attack on our civil rights.

4. Finally, I am trying to stop the proposed Eon wind farm. I reckon that this, if it goes ahead, will be a long-term disaster for Aycliffe and its people.

There is currently an active debate in Newton News about wind farms, but we could really do with a discussion of all these issues. This government is racing pell-mell down a route which will change our whole society.

I don't know how you feel about it, but by the time you have included changes to the NHS, new housing proposals, benefit cuts, student fees, Academies, pensions and everything else the government is rushing

into law, it seems to me to add up to a regressive remodelling of society which more-or-less hands us over to big business.

And I think the speed of change is part of the process – to get our heads spinning so fast that we can't weigh up what we think about one change, before we're having to consider the next. I will try to keep people informed about what I see going on. As well as my letters in the Newton News, you can follow me on Twitter @johndclare.

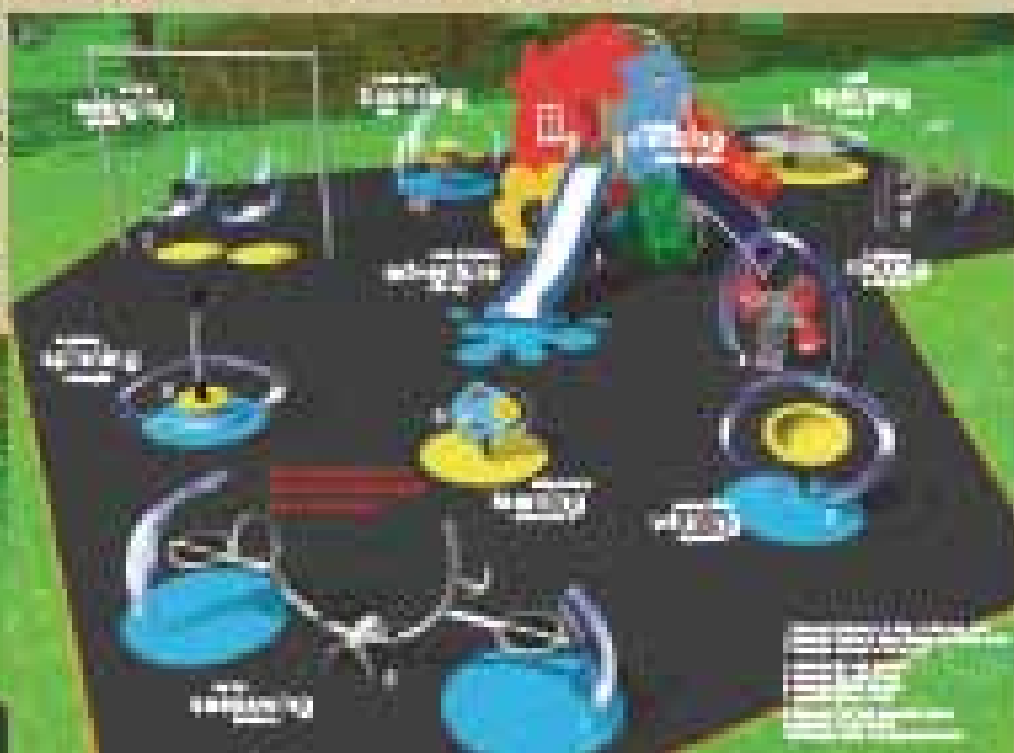

FURTHER PARK IMPROVEMENTS

BYERLEY PARK PLAY AREA REFURBISHMENT

The Council recently considered proposals from play equipment providers to refurbish the play area at Byerley Park. Residents were consulted by way of a postal survey in the Byerley Park and The Chase areas and a questionnaire in the Newton News on what type of play equipment they would like to see installed. A total of 200 replies were received. Following the consultation exercises the play equipment providers were asked to design a scheme that would best meet the residents' expectations



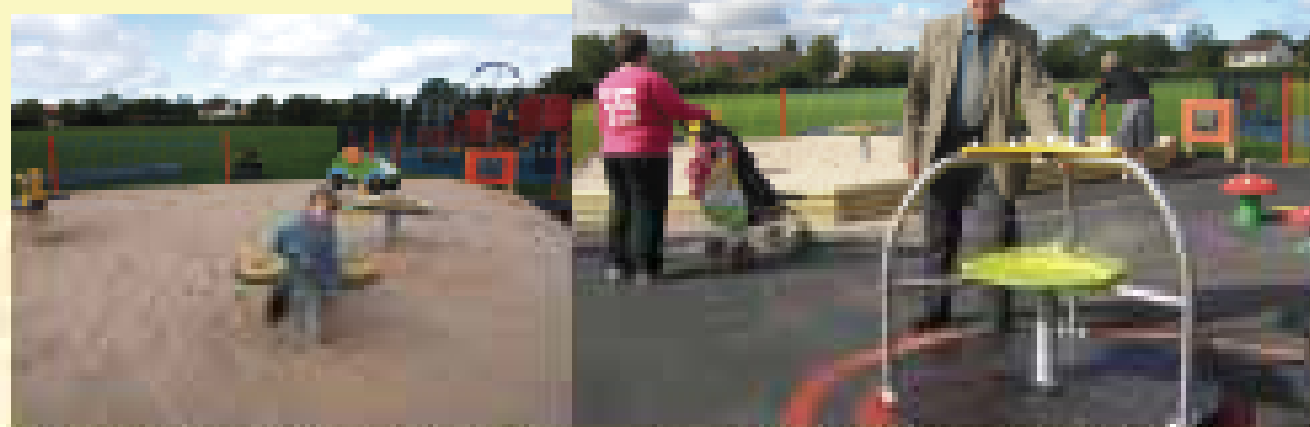
within the agreed budget for the refurbishment. The scheme chosen (pictured) incorporates a variety of equipment and offers play value for all age groups. The new equipment will be integrated between some of the existing play equipment at the site and will include both junior and infant swings, roundabout, multi-unit with slide, springers, sploos, a rocket and wacky spinner.

New Play Area for Toddlers in Town Park

A new play area, specially designed for toddlers, has been opened in the Town Park.

The play area is equipped with a cradle swing, roundabout, play house, slide and springy and also incorporates a sand play area – currently the only sand play area in a park in Great Aycliffe. Sandpits are fantastic for younger children, a blank canvas in 3D for children to build, dig and discover. The Council realises that sandpits take a fair bit of maintenance to keep them clean and hygienic but feels that this is manageable in the Town Park, which is staffed.

The Toddlers' Play Area will complement the existing play facilities in the Town Park, which cater for all ages and abilities and include a junior play area, in addition to a skateboard park, games area and teen shelter. The Park is an attractive venue for the whole family, with seating and picnic tables, football pitches, tennis and formal gardens.

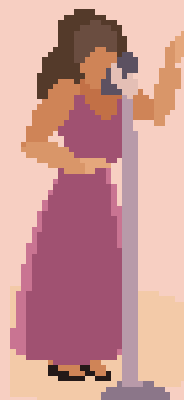

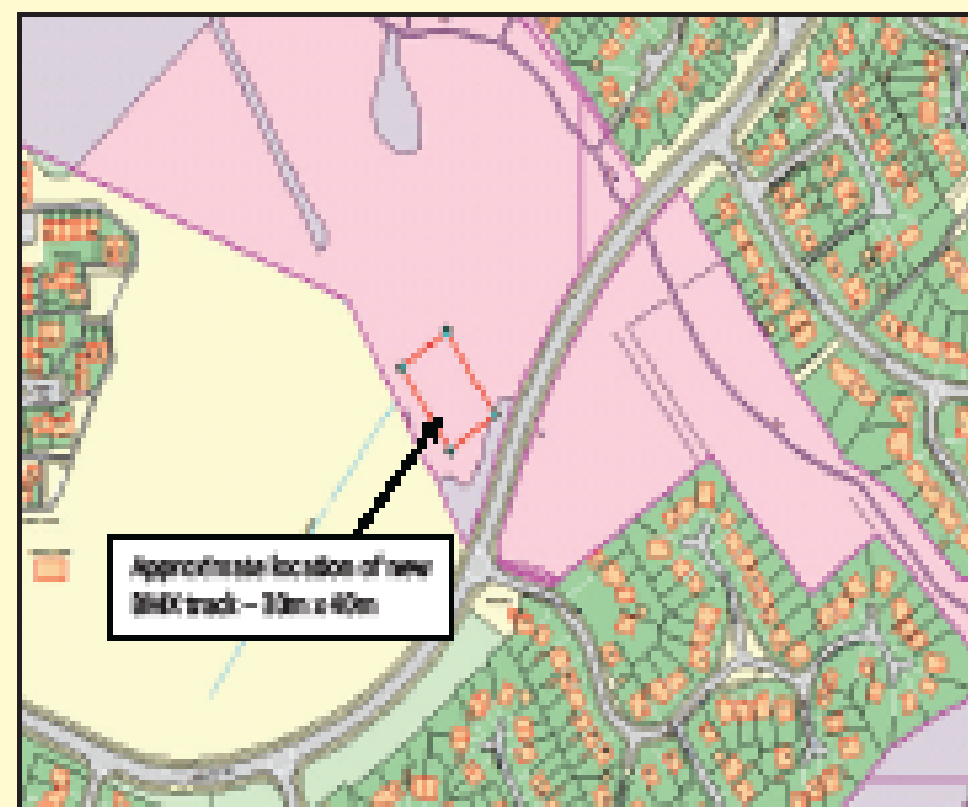

COUNCIL CONSIDERS SIGNS & SPONSORSHIP TO RAISE CASH

Environmental improvements which cost tax payers nothing, a tidier county and even a potential revenue stream for the council in tough times are just some of the points to be considered by Durham County Council's Cabinet this week. Members will be asked to support a paper which shows how the authority can introduce a new and consistent approach to deal with the tricky topics of roadside advertising and illegal signs. The report also highlights the potential of income generation from sponsorship in certain areas, including roundabouts and limited town centre areas. Money which could then be spent on delivering front line services at a time when the authority faces making savings of £123.5m over the next four years.

Cabinet member for the environment, Cllr Bob Young, explains: "A great deal of work has been undertaken to study how we can protect and enhance our beautiful county, while ensuring we have a fair and consistent approach to these sensitive issues. "It is right that we ensure our highways, including pavements, are safe places free of clutter and illegal distractions, but at the same time we need to consider, in this challenging financial environment, how we can improve some areas at no cost to our residents. "That is why I am taking this report to Cabinet and asking members to agree to sponsorship of some of our highway assets in certain areas and set against strict criteria and to approve a consultation

on our policy on advertising signs and boards." The council's highways manager is Dave Wilcox: "A number of businesses have approached the authority recently to sponsor roundabouts on our highways but we are committed to ensuring a coherent and balanced approach across the county. "We do not want an array of different signs on roundabouts, in limited town centre locations or Christmas trees. The recommendations would bring about an organised approach offering a good balance and potentially a good deal for residents too." Research shows there is no definitive consistent national or regional policy covering these issues but indicates that some councils have benefited by up to £4,000 per year for each roundabout sponsored. The report to Cabinet outlines how planning and highways laws can be met alongside the needs of the business community. It also addresses the need to protect local environments including conservation areas and The World Heritage Site while offering a common sense approach to signage associated with charity and community events which would be erected only for very short periods.

THE QUESTION ON COUNCIL ATTENDANCE

Sir, I thank Ken Stubbs for his response last week. Sadly, he chose not to answer the question on attendances. In the last full year 2010-2011 out of a possible minimum 38 meetings Cllr S Bambridge Great Aycliffe Independent attended 17, Cllr G R Gray Great Aycliffe Independent attended 9, Cllr P Gittins Independent attended 9, Cllr Hewitson Independent attended 9. **All claimed and received the full allowance.** I specifically excluded Councillors whose absences were due to illness. It appears from conversations with some GAI councillors they thought that just because they are not elected on to particular committee that

they could not attend those meetings. Councils rules are quite clear that any Councillor can attend any Committee meeting and speak with the permission of that meeting if they are not a member of it. Just like they were not aware that they did not have to receive an allowance. Contrast this with say just two simple facts: Firstly, last year the GAI Councillors proposed a motion that any Councillor who is not a member of the Committee could only attend by sitting at the back of the meeting with the public! Not only was this illegal, and highly disrespectful of elected representatives it was downright anti democratic

and Labour treat it with contempt and threw the motion out. Councillors not elected at the AGM onto a Committee continue with the right to attend and speak if the Committee allows. All councillors irrespective of their politics, can be heard on matters affecting their ward in particular and the Town in general. (incidentally no councillor has ever not been allowed). Contrast this with Councillor Bill Blenkinsopp. He represents Aycliffe Village as an Independent,

because he isn't Labour nor a GAI member he was unfortunately not elected on to committees. But Bill attends every meeting he can and does speak, so at least one Independent knows how to represent their ward and can justify his allowance!) Does Ken Stubbs agree with me that Councillors who poorly attend meetings of the Council, (excluding reasons of ill health) but who claim their full allowance deserve condemnation. It is simple really - and the public know the answer. Arun M Chandran

Last month a series of events led to the club being given less than a week's notice to move out to make way for a dance school – one of six running in the town.

Now, devastated Les, who is also an England official, had to find a new home quickly for his boxers right at the start of a new season. "We're absolutely gutted – Aycliffe Amateur Boxing Club is my life. I've been doing this sport since I was nine years old and coaching in Newton Aycliffe for the last 24 years. It's a long time and to be treated like this is unforgivable – the members can't believe it" said Les.

Les said the problems started a few weeks ago when he was asked by the centre youth leader to give up his cupboard space to make room for other activities.

"I refused because the cupboard was given to me when the new youth centre was being built – I was consulted when they were drawing up the plans on what storage space I needed – and it contains thousands of pounds worth of boxing equipment.

"I did ask at that stage whether they wanted the club to move out and was told that wasn't the case" said Les.

The following week Les was told he could no longer have the sports hall on a Thursday night because Durham County Council had stipulated it had to be used for youth work. "I was under the impression we still had the hall, which we hired, on a Tuesday night, although at no time was I asked if I wanted to extend my session. After a couple of days I was told I could no longer have it on a Tuesday either."

The centre management did offer Les alternative times to train his boys – on a

Monday evening and a Friday evening or Saturday, which were unsuitable given Les is a taxi driver and an England official for the ABAE.

Les said: "The Monday training session would have finished at nine – I think it's totally unreasonable to expect ten-year-old boys to walk home in the dark at that time of night.

"I also work as a taxi driver for a living, which the centre knows, so Friday is my busiest night plus many local boxing shows and championship shows are on Saturdays so I can be anywhere across the country.

"As I couldn't agree to the new times I was given a letter to say I had to be out in less than a week! At a time when the government is encouraging kids to get more active through initiatives such as 'fit for life' I feel really let down.

I've also contacted County Hall to ask if they gave any directives to the centre and have written confirmation saying they didn't – I really think the leader just wanted us out. "I love this club – and like many amateur clubs the coaches give their time voluntarily and the youth centre has just put those boys out on the streets!" Fortunately this was not the case as St. Clare's Church has offered space to the club and this is where they will train for the time being.

Former Chairman of the Youth Centre, Syd Howarth, who resigned at the last AGM was asked to comment on the matter and said: "I don't believe they can expel an affiliated club of this long standing without proper consultation and if they can't agree over a problem there should be a reasonable period of notice to enable the club to find other premises. By nature of their affiliation the club is working with children and is therefore performing youth work. To evict them to make room for youth work cannot be a reason" said Syd
