RETIREE BECOMES COMMUNITY CRIME FIGHTER

An Aycliffe resident has decided to become involved in community activities to benefit his neighbourhood. Ken Robson has lived and worked in Newton Aycliffe for 46 years and is so passionate about his town and neighbourhood, that as he approaches retirement wants to devote some spare time helping keep the area safe and a good place to live. Ken read an article promoting the benefits of Neighbourhood Watch and his subsequent enquiry with Durham Constabulary lead to his involvement as a coordinator. His decision has since snowballed and his area now covers over 700 homes. He said. 'I heard about the excellent work of Neighbourhood Watch coordinators in other parts of the town, in particular the scheme in Washington Crescent area and thought, why not on my estate?'

'I am keen to work with the police and local residents to ensure the area remains a safe place to live, but I also have ambitions to develop this further by creating a Residents Association to foster good community spirit. The new scheme covers the streets between Stephenson Way, Burn Lane and Greenwell Road and is free to join, offers potentially safer neighbourhoods and reduced levels of crime and members n enjoy household often reductions insurance in premiums. Orphans Speak Out Against Sex Trafficking

Sunday, November Stella's Voice, an This Voice, an 13th. organization determined to be a voice that speaks for the orphans of Moldova, will arrive in Newton Aycliffe. Founder Philip Cameron, along with 5 Moldovan orphans, will visit the Xcel Centre to share their personal stories.

Stella's Voice began in response to the horrific conditions Philip Cameron witnessed while visiting Moldovan state-run а orphanage. Not only are orphans neglected, abused, and mistreated, they are turned out at 16 years old. An easy target, these orphans are often snatched by sex traffickers and sold for as little as £2,200. They are then used 30 to 40 times per day while their trafficker profits as much as £233,000 per year.

In 2007, Philip Cameron opened Stella's House, a safe house for aged-out orphan girls. The home gives orphans a chance at a new life. They receive their education, learn life skills, and function as a family.

In 2010, Simon's House opened to house aged-out orphan males who are often sold into Russia. In addition, Philip opened Stella's House Two and acquired Cupcui Orphanage in 2011. The state-run orphanage was recently renovated and named Providence House and has the capacity to house 130 children.

"My heart's desire is to offer a loving Christian home for every orphan in Moldova all 12,500 of them," said Philip. "There is a place for every aged-out girl and boy

Appeals for Help Dear Sir. Could you possibly help our boxing club which as vou know was eased out of the Youth Centre and since then have struggled to find



REPORT ON COUNCIL MEETING WEDNESDAY 2nd NOVEMBER

First, members agreed to install photovoltaic panels on the south-facing roof of the Town Council Offices at a cost of approximately £60,000.

The Senior Low Carbon officer from Durham County Council was present to advise, and gave a presentation. Although the recent reduction of the feed-in tariff had reduced the profit the scheme would make for the Council, it was still financially beneficial to the Council to install the panels, in a time of rising electricity prices it would make sense to produce our own electricity, and the Council wished to set an example as promoting 'green energy'.

After this, Councillors were given a presentation of the Town Council's new website at http://www.great-aycliffe. gov.uk/ – which is a great improvement on the old one. Next, Councillors responded to three consultation processes. All the following were agreed without any vote against:

1. Members asked the Town Clerk to write to the Boundaries Commission objecting to the proposed new parliamentary constituency boundaries. Whilst – since the Boundaries Commission did not have the power to change the law – there was no point in objecting to the underlying principle (that every constituency should have c.76,000 voters), members did object to its consequences for Great Aycliffe, which have been to strip us out of our current County Durham constituency, and put us into a Tees Valley constituency which stretches down round south of Middlesbrough to Ingleby Barwick.

They also felt it was inappropriate – after the recent County Durham boundary review had separated Aycliffe and East Shildon – that the proposed constituency included Thickley. And they believed that, given the fact that Great Aycliffe has 30,000 inhabitants, the name 'Great Aycliffe' ought to appear in the

constituency name. Members instructed the Town Clerk to write to the government and the National Association of Local Councils to express their opinion on the local government pension scheme. Members agreed that whilst it might be necessary to change the pension arrangements for new entrants to the profession - it was unacceptable to tell employees, who may be now in their fifties and have spent 40 years preparing for retirement on the basis of what were believed to be contractual promises, that suddenly they will have to pay more, work longer and get less at retirement. Contractual promises to existing scheme members should be honoured. 3. Members agreed a response to a consultation on the new Community Infrastructure Levy. Whilst welcoming

the general principle – that developers should contribute

to the infrastructure needs

they create – members made specific comments on issues such as how much of that levy should come to the Town Council, and what the Town Council should be allowed to spend the money on. Finally, members were pleased

Finally, members were pleased to hear the reports from outside bodies. It was agreed to appoint Councillor Fleming to the Cubby committee, and to propose Councillor Hogan to the NHS Health and Wellbeing Partnership Network.

Time and again votes are taken with no active debate or opposition by the Independents. Then, as soon as the Council meeting has closed they run to the press claiming imbalance and they have not had an opportunity to contribute to the Council's activities.

We need to have Councillors who direct their energies into putting Aycliffe first rather than massaging their own inflated egos by conducting public slanging matches because they are suffering pique through their own failings.
