PROPOSED PARTNERSHIP IN SECONDARY EDUCATION WITH SHILDON A WIDE - RANGING people served by the three

consultation process is about to be launched into proposals to make our three local secondary schools formal partners in learning. Parents, colleges, training

providers and employers will all be asked to have their say on plans to establish a joint education trust to serve young people in Newton Aycliffe and Shildon. The three schools involved are

Greenfield School Community and Arts College and Woodham Community Technology College in Newton Aycliffe and Sunnydale Community College for Maths and Computing in Shildon.

The proposed collaboration is intended to ensure that young TOWN COUNCIL PROVIDE

schools get access to the best educational and vocational resources. The joint trust would combine the expertise and successful practices of the three schools.

The partnership approach is seen as being vital as the choice of courses and qualifications available to 14-19 year olds develops and expands.

The five-week consultation period begins at the start of the summer term on Monday April 20 when information about the proposals will be sent out to parents. This will be followed by meetings at each school at which parents will be issued with further details and will have the opportunity to ask questions and discuss the implications of the

establishment of a trust These will take place at Sunnydale on Tuesday on Tuesday May 5 at 6.30pm, at Greenfield on Wednesday May 6 at 6.30pm and at Woodham on Thursday May 7 at 7.30pm. Information will also be sent to local colleges and schools, workplace providers and other stakeholders along with an invitation to comment on the plans.

All the views gathered during the five weeks will be considered by governors of the three schools at meetings in early June before decisions are made as to whether they proceed with the next stage in the process.

If approved, the collaboration will lead to the establishment of the Aycliffe and Shildon Schools Education Trust from September. It will work closely with the Local Authority and other key partners from education and training to provide top class educational and vocational opportunities for students and go further to raise levels of achievement. Partnerships between the schools already provide Young Apprenticeship and high quality vocational courses in Engineering, Business and Health and Social Care. The schools are also developing a common approach to extended

schools and the issue of children's well-being. The educational trust will consolidate and extend these existing partnerships, working with educational institutions

involved in further and higher education, businesses and public sector organisations.

FREE DAY EXCURSIONS GREENFIELD'S TENTH YEAR AT **AOSTA SKI COURSE RESORT**



Greenfield School Community & Arts College, Newton Aycliffe has just returned from a second ski residential course in Pila ,Val d'Aosta, Italy this season. A group of 56 key stage four pupils and adults skied at the end of January and a party of 60 Key stage 3 pupils and adults returned from their course last week. The two groups put together equal one of the biggest ski courses in the country. These courses marked a celebration of ten vears skiing in Val d'Aosta with Interski during which time over 700 children from Greenfield have learnt to ski and many have developed into very accomplished skiers. Some of the key features of the Greenfield courses include the opportunity for continuity and progression which has resulted in very high standards of performance being attained.

In the past five years, nine students have been recommended for the Interski scholarship scheme and three have actually progressed to sponsorship by Rossignol to pursue the international ski teaching qualification of the British Association of Snow Sports Instructors (BASI). Andrew Richardson has subsequently worked as an instructor in Whistler (Canada), Zermatt (Switzerland) and New Zealand prior to starting a Sports Science degree at the University of Northumbria.

Weather conditions for both courses were superb, the best skiing we have had in the Aosta Valley. The locals in the valley explained to us that the snow was by far the best that they have had in 25 years.

Whilst away, the Greenfield team enjoyed the company of many other schools from our local area. Pupils and staff from several secondary schools around our area enjoyed the conditions at the same time as our pupils. It was particularly pleasant to have Woodham Technology College skiing in the same resort as this indicates a strong tradition for ski residential courses in our town. Long may this continue!

Stuart Dixon, subject leader for PE and ski course leader said; 'the annual ski residential course is one of the highlights of the school calendar for many of our students. It forms an important part of the schools 'Learning Outside The Classroom' policy. The variety of conditions made the course both challenging and enjoyable for all of our students.

The owners of the Au Coin Vert hotel in Aosta. which hosts the annual Greenfield course, received some gifts to celebrate ten years of their hospitality. Course leader Stuart Dixon presented a print of the Sanctuary Knocker, with translation, and a copy of The Durham Book, published by Durham County Council.

SBC Deputy Leader Sets the Record Straight

Dear Sir. Now that Sedgefield Borough Council has gone it means that reporting embargoes have been lifted, and as there has been some erroneous reports covering everything from green spaces to selling of land, I now want to set the record straight. Housing Associations that have inherited council housing since 1997 all over the country have been highly successful in delivering improvements promised to tenants, this is according to a new report from the "Chartered Institute of Housing" for the Joseph Rowntree Foundation.

The Impact of housing stock transfers in urban Britain. found that a large majority implemented local property standards 'much higher' than the English Decent Homes Standard or its Scottish or Welsh counterparts.

Many housing associations have also generated procurement and other energy efficient savings and reinvested them into modernisation and schemes originally unplanned works. In a recent local government publication on regeneration, Hal Pawson, lead author of the study, said: "Most of the transfer housing associations we looked at have become involved in neighbourhood regeneration including social and economic renewal - to much greater degree than anticipated at the time of transfer. Most have developed community facilities and contributed to community services beyond housing management. Transfer has also provided a substantial stimulus

MEP Health Warning: Check Before You Travel

With millions of European Health Insurance Cards (EHICs) held by UK Citizens due to expire in the coming weeks, North East MEP Stephen Hughes of the European Parliament's Consumer Protection Committee has warned holidaymakers to check before they travel.

Stephen said "Millions of UK travellers can visit other Europeancountriesknowing that, should anything go wrong, they will be covered

for tenant involvement. On estate management, the transfer process has contributed to a more business - like, more consumer-focused social housing sector."

This showed that a greater area of land would have been transferred had the ballot been successful in 2004 than what is being acquired by Sedgefield Borough Homes now that transfer has gone ahead.

COUNCIL CHAIRMAN PAYS TRIBUTE TO DISTRICT AND BOROUGH COUNCILS

Retiring County Council Chairman, Len O'Donnell has paid tribute to the work done by the eight councils which merged to form the new unitary council for the county.

Speaking at the inaugural annual meeting of the new authority, which was attended by all eight civic leaders of the dissolved councils, Coun O'Donnell said: "Today is a landmark occasion for local government in County Durham.

"After months of planning and close co-operation, a new era in local government has dawned. "I am delighted that the civic leaders from our partners in reorganisation have been able to join us this morning to mark the birth of the new unitary council.

"Since their creation more than 30 years ago, our District and Borough Councils have achieved a great deal for the communities they have served, often despite what has seemed like a never ending cycle of challenging difficulties and adversity.

"Together with the old County Council, they have left a rich legacy of social, economic and environmental improvements which provide firm foundations on which the new unitary replacement can build.

"Collectively they have tackled, and overcome, tremendous setbacks like the loss of our traditional industries and the large scale unemployment, hardship and industrial dereliction they left in their wake. "They have helped the people of County Durham pick themselves up and dust themselves off one setback after another.

"And while there is much still to be done, the fact that County Durham is now better placed to face the challenges and opportunities which lie ahead is due in no small measure to the role played by our district and borough councils - and local government generally since the last reorganisation of the 1970s.

"I am sure I speak on behalf of the new unitary council as a whole when I say we are determined to build upon that record of achievement. We are up to the challenge that reorganisation offers and we are determined to continue to improve the quality of life of the people of County Durham."

The new toilets are a joint venture between Sedgefield Borough Council and Ferryhill Town Council and are situated on the town centre free car park next to the Post Boy Public House. The toilets which are admission free will contain male and female toilets with baby changing facilities and a mixed gender disabled convenience.

They will incorporate two shop units – one at either end - which will be rented out to generate an income used to cover the running costs of the toilets.

This good news for Ferryhill begs the question why Newton Aycliffe can't do the same?

the shutters were down at the Aycliffe Office, and I tried to ring Stuart Edwards Aycliffe office getting no answer, ringing the Darlington Office, only an answer phone. On ringing the Bishop Auckland office, I was informed that it was in process of being completed, I was not happy with this answer so I called in and was offered a refund which would be sent to me, but the following day this was retracted.

I have continually phoned Stuart Edwards to get my HIPPs, first chasing them to have the Energy Survey done, which was completed six weeks after paying for the HIPPS. Then phoning to have my HIPPs supplied so I could put my property on the market with another Estate Agent. I have wrote and emailed Lee Smurthwaite and received no answer. I have asked to speak to Lee Smurthwaite, but he is never available, and his staff will not supply a contact number for him. I have also asked for the name and phone number of the Company commissioned to do the HIPPs, which has also been refused. I have now given the job of selling my house to another Estate Agent, who informed me that they have a large number

of clients in the same situation. I paid the other Estate Agent for a HIPPs on the Monday, the "For Sale" sign went up on Tuesday, the Energy Survey was completed on the Thursday, and the HIPPS was supplied to the Estate Agent the following week. Why couldn't Stuart Edwards have done this? I have now informed Stuart Edwards I require a full refund. I have also informed Consumer Advice, Trading Standards and my solicitor of the situation

with Stuart Edwards. Trading Standards have now taken up the case.





Rotary Club Raise Awareness of Stroke TESCO ALLOW ROOM FOR STALL



With the co-operation of Tesco the town's Rotary Club are holding a Stroke Awareness Day in the store on Saturday 18th April from 10am till 4p.m. On hand will be qualified people to take blood pressure of customers and if suspect to refer them to their doctor. It is a startling fact that thousands of people die or suffer needlessly from strokes because they were not treated for blood pressure problems. Rotary throughout Great Britain and Ireland in most towns and cities will be organising events to take blood pressure and raise

awareness Please call at the stall in Tecos for your blood pressure to be taken. You may be one of the people who had reason to thank Rotary for referring them to their doctor in time to save them from serious illness. Untreated high blood pressure (hypertension) is the biggest single risk factor for

stroke. Lifestyle measures and the right medication can help

reduce high blood pressure. Know what your blood pressure should be, and get it checked regularly. There are some steps that you and your doctor can take together. High blood pressure causes the arteries to fur up (atherosclerosis) and puts extra strain on the blood vessels. You may not know if you have high blood pressure, so you should have it checked regularly. (A normal healthy adult blood pressure is less than 140/90 mmHg.)

A number of other medical problems increase your risk of a stroke, including: heart disease; atrial fibrillation (irregular heartbeat); high cholesterol; and diabetes. Your doctor can prescribe medication to help keep these conditions under control.
