

For the last ten years I have worked within the charity sector, from volunteer to paid worker. I enjoy my work with clients and I know that I have

helped change lives. But during that time there has always been a dark cloud hanging over the work that myself and so many others do - it is FUNDING.

Year by year there has been less and less money going to charities and council run services. This has meant that services have gone under and the ones that are left have been put under more stress and have become overworked. understand the current

making things difficult for everyone, but I believe there is a deeper problem within the charity sector that has made things worse. During every cycle when charities have to make bids for funding, executives and

managers have to decide what their charity wishes to offer and how they can deliver the

best value for money. This "value for money" in my experience leads to a charity becoming overstretched and one that will struggle to provide the service promised to the funders.

I have spoken to many varying agencies and all I have spoken to hear is how they struggle with work overload, stress and low morale. What I also hear is the frustration of workers who want to do everything they can for a client only to be told that there may be weeks to wait for a service to help or that the service required would mean a client may have to travel to get the help. Remember that a client may not be able to afford to travel so will not get the help they

need. This bidding for funding has been like this for many years. What we are left with is services that have been underfunded for all that time. There will be managers reading this who will defend their actions by saying if we hadn't done what we did there might not be a service at all.

I understand that and it is which has caused some of these problems, but due to the "value for money" promises. any statistics produced are incorrect leaving the system/ government the ability to say we can continue with these cuts we are currently suffering as there is still room to squeeze a little more. to squeeze a little more. Unfortunately, more and more people are requiring help and these cases are getting increasingly complex. I speak from the heart about these issues. Lack of Information on New Bus

Dear Sir.

I was sorry to hear about the Central Coaches situation, and the lack of passengers, but I have noticed a number of problems wheih could be the cause. To my knowledge no timetables have been put out, via official means. Unofficial timetables were sent out to certain places, whilst the County Durham Bus Maps Website had them, one had to go to a small heading at the top of the main map and it did not appear until after the new service started.

The timetable had a general route on it. However the "Contact Tees Valley" Website made the 116 timetable available from the start of the service with a more detailed route

Sadly the bus stops between the Town Council Offices and Heighington, controlled by Darlington Council, who put up a yellow notice at each stop saying their timetables are out of date and to phone Travelline etc. The first two weeks of Alex Vov's route has not been updated, although there has been some unofficial timetables at two sets of bus stops in School Aycliffe, including the new 16A.

A new route through School Aycliffe is in operation but I am not aware of any notification of this to the general public. A bus route map is now on the School Aycliffe bus stops. The new service around Alston Crescent and past Greenfield Community College does not start until 9.20am at Heighington and finishes at Heighington at 2.12pm. 

SNOW ON CARS COULD PROVE COSTLY

Motorists who fail to clear snow from their cars risk penalty points and a fine and will also nationally waste will also nationally waste hundreds of thousands of pounds worth of fuel by driving off with added weight on the roof.

Research reveals that almost one in five, equating to nearly 6 million motorists in the UK don't remove snow from their cars before setting out. While most people clear snow

from their windscreen and rear window and even their drive, many leave the roof of their cars untouched. This could lead to prosecution for careless or inconsiderate driving if they were involved in an accident. Situations where this could occur include: snow left on the roof falling forward onto a driver's windscreen, obscuring the view. Or similarly if the snow falls off backwards

causing a hazard for motorists travelling behind. Police warn the fixed penalty for driving with an obscured windscreen is three points

and a £60 fine, but the consequences can be far greater if snow from your car is deemed to have been a factor in an accident. Rule 229 of the Highway Code states: • Before you set off you must be able to see, so clear all snow and ice from all your windows.

· You must ensure that lights are clean and number plates are clearly visible and legible, make sure the mirrors are clear and the windows are demisted thoroughly.

• Remove all snow that might fall off into the path of other

Bad Weather Affects Waste Collection

Continued blizzard-like conditions and forecasts for more snow are having a direct impact on refuse and recycling collections in some parts of County Durham. Whilst the vast majority of

collections were undertaken as normal last week there were some problems in a few places due to extremely difficult local conditions on high ground. Durham County Council is asking residents to be patient and promising to return to pick up any missed refuse and recycling collections as soon as it is safe to do so.

'catch-up' This morning crews have attempted to carry out additional collections in some areas missed last week, but in many cases they have found local conditions on high ground too dangerous. The extra collections in these areas have been suspended to protect both the public and staff. Particularly badly affected are

the Consett and Blackhill areas, with high Dales communities also likely to be hit by the continued snow, sleet and ice Oliver Sherratt is the council's head of direct services: "Our crews have made valiant efforts to catch up in some truly awful weather conditions but we are at the point where it is simply dangerous for staff and the

public for us to continue. "Our fleet drivers have battled to manoeuvre 26 tonne vehicles on icy roads. In some areas we have deployed crews on foot to push the bins out and wherever possible we have diverted Streetscene staff onto snow clearing duties.

'We are trying hard to get to you and we will continue to do so. If your regular collection is missed then leave out your refuse or recycling and we will look for any opportunity to return.

"When the weather improves the worst hit areas will be targeted with additional crews. "We are really sorry for any inconvenience but I feel sure will understand everyone that public safety is the most important factor.

While you were enjoying your Christmas and New Year, plans were afoot for new driving licence rules to come into effect in January 2013. From this date newly issued licences will be produced in a format much harder to copy illegally.

Your previous passport style photo will now be burnt by laser onto several layers. They will also now be black and white rather than colour as is with the current format. Licences will also be made from polycarbonate - rather than basic plastic - so they will be light and durable.

It's also worth mentioning the newlicence rules will also influence what motorists can tow. For more information visit: www.gov.uk.

The new licence rules will also affect lorry and bus drivers. As such, if you pass your driving test in categories C, CE, C1, C1E, D, DE, D1 or D1E, after 19 January 2013 you'll get a licence valid for 5 years. Every 5 years up to age 45, you'll need to sign a declaration to show you still meet the medical standards



A new hospitality suite is set to be built thanks to £20,000 from the neighbourhood budgets of Cllr Sarah Iveson and Cllr John Moran (£10,000

Park know, the one thing missing from the ground is a clubhouse. The supporters currently use Aycliffe Sports Club and have long yearned for a sheltered, social space close to the pitch which can act as a viewing area for fans. GAMP funding is being used to purchase a large portable unit which is approximately 60 feet long with a veranda and with room for approximately

100 seated spectators. Adam White, GAMP coordinator, said: "This is a fantastic project which a namasuc project which will help the town's football club. Funding will provide a number of benefits not only for the club but also the hundreds of supporters who enjoy following their local team

Two local companies have been chosen to help kick start the project. Allan Oliver Reinforcing Ltd has agreed to install and fund the concrete base and foundations with Finley Structures Ltd agreeing to fund and install the steel framework for the structure, GAMP funding will also be used to fund flooring in the main stand.

A new stand last year enabled the ground to be eligible for the First Division but a lack of funding meant appropriate flooring couldn't be installed.

It still qualified for Football Association ground grading but can't hold as many people as other similar grounds and puts visitors off. It's hoped these new further improvements will not only benefit current fans but attract new ones too. The work is set to take place at

the end of the season in May. GAMP is one of 14 Area Action Partnerships set up in 2009 to help Durham County Council better engage with residents.
