100 New Jobs Coming to Aycliffe

Ebac has agreed a deal which will preserve the brands and products of UK manufacturer Icetech Freezers in a multimillion pound acquisition and investment deal, after the company fell victim to the collapse of Comet. The deal in an undisclosed

seven-figure sum will involve a further investment at Ebac's factory in Newton Aycliffe. It will see production of the firm's Norfrost domestic chest freezer range moved to Ebac's North East base, with up to 100 jobs expected to be created in the long term. The Norfrost name and the

company's equipment, designs and copyright agreements have been acquired after production closed at the firm's factory Castletown, Caithness, Scotland, at the end of 2012.

Production is expected to begin by the end of 2013, with the aim of building up to match the previous output of 80,000 Norfrost chest freezers a year. The existing Norfrost range includes freezers from 57 litre to 204 litre capacity for the domestic market.



Prizewinning Quilt Returns to Heighington after 78 years

story began WI when entered a patchwork quilt into the National Federation of Handicraft Exhibition WI's at the Horticultural Hall in London, where it was admired by royalty. On its journey to London, the then President, Mrs. E.M. Dixon, accompanied the quilt and according to archives eleven members were involved in its creation which took six months to make.

Also in the records is a black and white photograph with WI members; Mrs. Dixon's WI members; Mrs. Dixon's hand-written report of the exhibition and a newspaper cutting telling of Queen Mary's delight at seeing the quilt, when she exclaimed, "How lovely." The quilt was whibitien the product exhibited in County Durham in 1938 but then disappeared. That was until earlier this spring when Richard Peperell of Cookham in Berkshire went into his attic and discovered a box containing a quilt. With the quilt were paper labels with Mrs. Dixon's name and address and another label printed, "Heighington WI, County Durham, and Exhibit: Patchwork Quilt".

Lynne Peperell got in touch with Val Bedocs of Heighington WI and sent photographs of the quilt and when compared with the archives there could be no doubt it was the same quilt made by ladies of the WI in

joy when the Peperells said they wished to return the quilt to the WI and would be visiting the north-east in July and would like to call into Heighington.

On Wednesday 17th July the Heighington WI arranged a reception and afternoon tea for the Peperells in the village hall and invited special guests to join them. The Deputy Mayor and Mayoress of Darlington, Gerald and Ruth Lee; the Chair and Vice Chair of Durham County WI, Cecelia Wharton and Lyn Swift; the Chair of the County Craft Committee, Dorothy Allen; President of the neighbouring Redworth WI, Audrey Wilkinson; WI, Audrey Wilkinson; Margaret Wellings who had tried in 2003 to trace the quilt; the Rev. Lissa Gibbons, Vicar of St. Michael's, Heighington and John Robinson who had helped Mrs. Peperell to track some of her forebears in County Durham, and whose mother was a member of Heighington WI many years ago and knew Mrs. Dixon.

The Peperells arrived with the quilt and it was put on a frame for everbody to see. The quilt is in wonderful condition and astonishingly the labels from the exhibition in 1935 are still attached.

Everyone was stunned at the skill and workmanship of the quilt. The stitches are so small, nearly invisible and it is really a thing of beauty. After tea Val Bedocs

Bras, Boobs, Bakes Raffle in Community COLLEGES PROMOTE NEW 24+ STUDENT LOANS

Five colleges in County Durham have joined forces to launch a campaign to promote a new system of loans for college students aged 24+. Colleges at Bishop Auckland, Darlington Derwentside East Durham and New College Durham are working together to raise awareness of Advanced Learning Loans. The new system, which is being introduced for Level 3 and Level 4 courses starting after August 1, works very much like the existing student loans for tuition fees for university students. College courses eligible for loans include A Levels, Access to Higher Education, Apprenticeships, BTEC National Diplomas and NVQ Level 3 and 4. Some professional qualifications

from bodies including the Association of Accounting Technicians (AAT), Chartered Institute of Marketing (CIM) and the Chartered Institute of Professional Development can also be supported by a 24+ Advanced Learning Loan.

The new Advanced Learning Loans will cover the full cost of course fees but repayments do not start until April 2016 for students enrolling in 2013/14, and only then once they are earning more than £21,000.

The loans and course fee payments are managed by Student Finance England and are not subject to household Durham are working together limits or credit income checks. The minimum loan amount is £300 and students do not have to take out a loan - fee payment or part payment is still possible.

After speaking to various groups it is generally agreed that the current arrangements are fragmented and don't fully meet the needs of families in poverty in our town.

Curently a food bank works under an umbrella organisation based in Durham with various organisations contributing to a central point in Chester le Street which is then divided and sent to different parts of the county to be distributed. Newton Aycliffe has a distribution centre at St. Clares Church manned by volunteers.

Every six months or so a major national collection involving Supermarkets augments local appeals, but Aycliffe has no co-ordinated scheme to help alleviate poverty stricken families in its own community. GARA envisage bringing together all parties in all parties in Aycliffe, including Great individuals, church groups, businessess, shops, factories, Councillors, Social Services, Welfare Officers in an ongoing community effort to satisfy the demand in our own town, which we know is increasing. We believe each town should look after its own, recognising and fulfilling the need, and in the process, building community spirit, to provide for our less fortunate neighbours. We would like to see collection

points in places on the town and Business Park for clothes, household goods and food with a distribution point open more often than at present. It would be necessary to unite everyone under a new, properly constituted new,

organisation, registered with the Charity Commissioners. The organisation will consist of volunteers who will elect officers and a working committee to fulfil the aims and objectives, with proper accountability.

This will allow individuals and organisations to safely donate cash so that products can be

purchased when necessary. The committee and its members would work to provide collection points in the area and promote their activites to a wider audience to gain the maximum impact. They will also organise the venue and frequency the of distribution to people in need, and develop a system to determine the level of support for each applicant.

Initially it is necessary to call a meeting of those groups in the town already operating an aid programme. In addition volunteers who are willing to give their time to help others will also be invited. Any reader interested in this

Bleak News from the County Council

By County Councillor John Clare

This has been an important week for the County Council and the main news concerned the budget.

July is the time of year when the Council calculates the endof-year outturn, and begins to formulate its 'medium term financial plan' for the future. Durham County Council's Cabinet were told, last week, that £93m of savings have been made since 2010, with excellent progress being made in achieving the £21m savings target for the current financial year (so that total savings are expected to be £114m by the end of 2013/14).

However, further government measures 'in the pipeline', along with extra cuts announced in the Chancellor's June Spending Review, have meant that the County Council expects to have to find a further £88m of savings by 2017. The total cuts - £202m over the period 2010-17 - amount to almost a quarter of the County Council's current annual gross expenditure, so the Council will have to make some very

reaching the point where the Council may have to look at cuts that will bite into valued, front-line services.

of the savings which will have to be made, the Cabinet has pledged to hold an extensive consultation exercise to ask

the public where they wish the emphases to be placed. The choices offered are likely to be horrific, with people being asked to choose between things like youth services, winter maintenance, litter, funding for voluntary organisations. tourism, highways repairs, business support and a host of other essential services. In other news:

· The County Council's street lighting proposals were publicised in last week's Newton News; now you can have your say in the consultation online at http://bit. ly/DCCstreetlight.

· Community buildings: 100 of the 120 community buildings identified to be transferred into community ownership are on track to be transferred by 2014. · Hitherto, planning guidance has set a maximum number of parking spaces per new house -a policy which has led to estates overcrowded with cars parked on the roads and pavements; now DCC is to require instead minimum allocations (ranging from 1.3 for one-bed, to 2.2 for 5-bed, houses).

• The Council has merged the (wildly different) policies of the seven former District Councils for making past members 'Honorary Aldermen', and has proposed the criteria of 16 years service, with titles being conferred just before Christmas . a nice present for those who have given 'eminent service' to the Council!



Then as if by magic it started to rotate. At the same time a pedestrian on the opposite side of the road had pushed the button to cross. Intrigued, I decided to investigate a little further. Its purpose is for people who can't see or hear the crossing sequence.

Once you push the button to cross the road you can place your hand on the device. Once the cone lights go green to cross for pedestrians the cone

will start spinning. This assists people with visual impairment the OK to cross. It is estimate there are 2.7 million people in the UK who suffer from colour blindness alone.

The device invented by Nottingham University offered the idea to the Department of Transport in the 1980's. It was late 1989 the devices started to appear in our streets. Radix, the company behind the cones, says it has sold 10,0000 units per year since 1995. Hugh Huddy is blind and works for the visual impairment charities umbrella group Vision 2020. He is pleased to see cones fitted to our pedestrian crossings but would not just walk into the road because of a spinning mechanism: "An important point to make is that I wait for the cone to start to rotate

in front of me" You can hear whether they are changing gear or slowing down.

The cone isn't telling you its safe to cross, it's telling you the green light is on for pedestrians. Some crossing make beeping noises, not all do. For instance if two crossing are close together they can confuse impaired people. Imagine one of the fire engines reversing in our station yard or a HGV reversing across the road in Tesco the reversing bleeper could give a false signal to cross The spinning cone is a great aid and a welcome tool for the visually impaired. Try it out the next time you cross on Central Avenue

by the Fire Station or Burn Lane Crossing next to Tesco.


