At a meeting of the Great Aycliffe Town Council **Recreation Committee on** 29th August 2013 members considered the staging of the Council's annual Firework Display for 2013. As a result of significantly increased numbers attending the event, following the cancellation of similar events in the region, a number of safety concerns were identified. Advice was therefore sought from the County Durham Safety Advisory Group (SAG), which offers advice and guidance on

event safety. Unfortunately, as the report to the Committee indicated, based on the recent discussions with SAG, although a number of matters could be addressed, a number of serious concerns remained unresolved.

ELEBRATING 5

Newton year celebrates its 50th year as the town's first commercial printing company, and 3 years later becoming, publishers of the Newtonian, later to be called Newton News

Syd Howarth moved to the town at the age of 25 to start the business and among other pioneers at the time has seen Newton Aycliffe grow from a few thousand people to a town of nearly 30.000

Newton Press started in a small baking unit at the rear of Neville Parade shopping precinct, offering a specialist bookbinding and printing service.

Throughout the 70's, 80's became Newton Press established well taking retail premises in the town centre opening the second newsagency, a children's clothiers and a specialist stationery shop. Newton Press print works moved to new premises on Greenwell Road

It was one of biggest disappointments to Syd when the ADC, facing dissolution, decided to sell the town centre to a private landlord. Syd led a consortium of shopkeepers which put in a bid to buy the town centre with the aim of each shop becoming privately owned. The ADC however went for the higher bidder, Grainger Trust, who also promised to put a roof over Beveridge Way. This as everyone knows, never



materialised and the new owners sold after a few years for a massive profit.

We moved out of retailing as shop rents and rates increased, quickly realising it is best to own rather than rent. With this in mind and needing more space the print works moved from its Greenwell Road premises

to the unit we now occupy on St Cuthbert's Way on the Business Park. As with most manufacturing trades, technology has improved the way we produce things and in printing there has been a revolution. Syd

Syd was originally from Nottingham but moved to the North East to complete National Service in the RAF. Posted to Boulmer he fell in love with the countryside, married a girl from Alnwick and vowed never to return to big city life. technology and training. Syd admits he has been lucky in having his three sons Paul, Stuart and Christopher join him in the business since they each left school. They all started their training at a very early age, going down to the factory to help Dad out as schoolboys and each beginning their working life as apprentices earning their wages the same as any other employee. They

They learnt to be independent and over the years have developed as employers, taking over the reins as Syd faced retirement age. Although the business is in the hands of his sons. Svd retains the role of Honorary Editor and enjoys a good relationship with the town's community, leading local campaigns, taking photos for the weekly newspaper and has worked on many local committees. The Newton News is his

pride and joy and has been acknowledged as the longest running free publication newspaper in the UK. As the current Mayor recently quoted "the Newton News is unique in its role as a community newspaper". Syd is proud to be offering

the townspeople newspaper that is purely for them. Readers know they can contribute to the columns without fear or favour and many a battle has been won by exposing wrongs through Newton publicity. Newton News Press is often thanked for the service it provides through Newton News and that is reward enough for the Howarth family business. It has become an institution and enjoys great influence in the area it covers. It is now read universally by Newtonians who have moved or work in countries throughout the world and since going on-line Newton website receives over 10,000 hits per week and is also popular on facebook The future is

Still Time to Apply for Community Grant

Residents are being reminded there is still time to apply for a share of funding being made available to local communities.

Local community groups in County Durham are encouraged to apply for funding from the Your funding from the Your Money, Your Area, Your Views Views community grants fund. All 14 of Durham Council's County Area Action Partnerships (AAPs) are currently running the fund but time is running out for groups to apply for a share. Groups have until Friday, 13 September to apply.

Each AAP has between $\pounds 20,000$ and $\pounds 80,000$ available and is asking members of the public to choose which organisations should benefit. In addition, the cash pot in five AAP areas has been boosted by a grant of £20,000 from the North Durham Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG). Individual

grant amounts differ from area to area ranging from $\pounds 500$ to $\pounds 5,000$ and will be made available for projects and initiatives that meet the priorities of the local AAPs.

The final decision on where the money goes will be made by local people at voting events taking place across County Durham in October November. Similar and events in the past have attracted hundreds of people so it's also an excellent opportunity for groups to promote what they do and attract new members.

Cllr Brian Stephens, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for neighbourhoods and local partnerships, said: "This is the last chance to apply and I don't want any group who would like to apply to miss out."

Dr Kate Bidwell, North Durham CCG's clinical chair, said: "We are keen to support community based projects that improve health priorities and inprove neutrin provides and it's great we can work with the AAPs in the north of the county to do this."

Members of the public who attend the events will also have the opportunity to help the council decide how future savings in the authority's overall budget can be made and also vote on what they think are the key local priorities that their AAP should be looking to address in the future.







Victims of domestic abuse across County Durham will soon be able to seek help and support from a specialist charity.

Durham County Council has commissioned a county-wide service to provide assistance to people across the county who are affected by verbal, physical or emotional abuse at home.

Domestic abuse support services are currently run by a number of different organisations each covering different areas of the county. Cllr Lucy Hovvels, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for safer and healthier communities, said: "The new service will enable us to ensure people across Durham receive County the same type of support no matter where they live.

'Thousands of families and individuals in the county experience the debilitating effects of abuse every day. It is vitally important that we are able to offer them any help we can."

The new service, which will be available from September,

will be provided by Harbour Support Services. Lesley Gibson the

company's chief executive. said: "Everyone has the right to live without fear of abuse. We want people to know that they can contact us if they feel concerned about their own situation or that of a friend or family member.

"We know that most abuse is unseen and that the feelings of isolation can be significant, making it difficult for people to seek out help.

"People need to know that someone will listen and won't judge them."

The free, confidential service will offer one-to-one help for men and women, offering advice on the choices available to them and information on how to keep safe.



Road safety charity the IAM offers motoring tips from Britain's top advanced driver, Peter Rodger. He is asking drivers to take extra care as the school run starts again.

Don't compromise your concentration and the safety of other road users by being in a hurry. Leaving the house five minutes earlier changes the nature of how you make the journey.

Take extra care to compensate for the fact that children won't always be paying attention, especially when approaching the school gate.

Never stop on the yellow "zig zags" by the school gate, and always ensure you let your passengers out on the pavement side.

Try to arrange a car pool with other parents - the fewer vehicles around the school gates, the better.

Roads surrounding schools are usually 20 mph, and for a good reason - it's

essential that you slow down and keep an eye out for children crossing the road and emerging from between parked cars. New starters in reception are unlikely to class

understand the dangers that the road outside their school presents – bare this in mind when driving nearby and keep your eyes peeled for children wandering into the road alone

If your children are walking to school on their own, make sure they are aware of potential hazards such as crossing busy roads encourage them to always use the pedestrian crossing if

there is one. IAM chief examiner Peter Rodger said: "The school run brings with it a 20 per cent growth in rush hour traffic. A little preparation can go a long way to making the school run easier, safer and less stressful, so take the extra time and plan ahead."

Tips for School Run | TODDLER | School Crossing Patrol **Cuts Under Discussion** Proposed changes to County

Durham's school crossing patrol service will be discussed by councillors when they meet next week. The changes would see the removal of lunchtime services at 60 sites where children actually no leave the school grounds unaccompanied during this period. Patrols would be kept on at six sites where pupils do leave the premises during the lunchbreak

Cllr Brian Stephens, Cabinet member said: "Pupil road safety is a priority for the County Council and we have a good track recording in providing school crossing over and above patrols national requirements. "However, like all councils

we are continuing to have to make savings and improve the efficiency of our services. "The proposal to remove lpatrols at sites where no unaccompanied pupils are using them will ensure we can continue to provide services at locations where they are most needed."

The changes, which would not affect morning and afternoon crossing patrols, would be expected to result in annual savings of £163,986. Before any changes could be introduced a consultation

with those affected, including staff, schools, pupils and their families, will need to be carried out.

If the changes go ahead the schools affected would be
