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More Problems for Town Centre Shopkeepers SHOP SERVICE CHARGES DOUBLED

Having received notice of large increases in service charges a number of private shopkeepers in the Town Centre have come to the end of their tether and are being forced to close! Jim Parkin, of Homeplan, has taken a survey of shops and finds everyone is struggling already without the addition of

a further increase in overheads The Elachi Indian Restaurant have been told the service which covers charge administration and maintenance has been quadrupled. This, on top of high rents, means they might not continue to trade. Other shops including Stephen

Russel the hairdressers face increases of 85% in times when they are barely able to survive. He and other shopkeeprs do not understand the charges and why and for what they are being imposed. All believe they pay far too much for what services they receive and to pay more is unreasonable and unaffordable.

McMahons will be closing, Bon Marche not sure how much longer they can survive. The Baby Shop is moving onto the Business Park. Cafe Pronto who have just moved into new premises are worried. Boola Dress Shop feels he has to close

through excessive charges. China Garden cannot afford to pay any extra.

The list goes on, with each shop complaining bitterly over the new charges when they have lost so much trade over the last few months while the town centre has been refurbished. It appears the Landlords now

want the money they invested in their own property, to be paid for by the tenants through extra service charges.

Jim Parkin is hoping to get all the traders to a meeting to plan a protest in an effort to put a stop to the extra charge before causes a mass closure of shops.in Newton Aycliffe.

to be helped with low cost household items and furniture that the County Durham Furniture Help Scheme now assists over 2,000 families each month and have expanded to meet this ever increasing demand.

Based on the Chilton Industrial Estate, the Charity, first established in 1970 and re-launched as the CDFHS in 2004, is run by volunteers and helps families in need. The charity makes free collections across County Durham and neighbouring counties of furniture, household goods, carpets, clothes, bicycles, toys, disability appliances, gardening items, scrap metals, waste electrical and electronic equipment. Items are restored refurbished and then able for a suitable and available for a suitable donation (low cost) from its warehouse in Chilton. Whilst open to members of the public, the charity has noted an increase in the number of

families seeking support due to a number of factors, the current economic climate, and the drastic change in benefits system, bedroom tax, unemployment, financial struggles, housing and health issues. To meet this increase in demand the Charity has just



opened its fourth showroom. The team of 30+ volunteers at the charity (some of whom are disabled or sensory impaired) all give their time to ensure the charity runs and meets the ever increasing demands.

CDFHS has dedicated training programmes to help people of all ages improve their employability by helping them improve skills and gain new skills to help them into fruitful future employment or volunteering. Founder Palmer

comments: "We rely on the generosity of the residents and businesses of County Durham and neighbouring Counties who have surplus or unwanted items to donate. At the moment we are very short of white goods as well as pots and pans - we are always short of cookers and washers" "Support from Durham County

Council means that the reuse credits we receive for recycling goods has enabled us to deliver our expansion plans and to be a very active part of the local community." said Chris. Council Plans Aycliffe Regeneration







Allan Oliver's men have yet to be beaten at Moore Lane Park in the league in their six outings during this season, though have seen Earl depart for high-flying Marske United.



Water Problems at Cobblers Hall New Housing Site

Dear Sir.

The letter from Graham Stevens (w/e 23 August) and his concerns for the Cobblers Hall Nature Reserve prompted me to actually read the planning documents and I now also have concerns, rather different ones but also involving water.

As expected water from roads and impervious surfaces of this high density site is to be directed into drains (but I note that in July 2013 Northumbrian Water were requesting 'further assurances re the restriction of the surface water discharge into their network). Also with any new housing water usage increases with car washing, gardening etc. - water which does not go into the drains.

It is apparently planned that the run-off from the remaining land is to ' be fed ' into the wetland areas; in particular the Pond which is marked on the plans but is not shown as such on any maps I have yet found. Google maps actually show four boggy areas; two particular wet areas which are to be amalgamated further NE into 'The Pond' and it's surrounding 'wetland'. This could and I believe should, be of serious concern to the occupants of surrounding land and, more especially, houses. The other two wet areas visible on the Google map are behind the PCP and the shopping precinct and may or

commercial ventures and the houses directly opposite. The area is a bog; in rainy conditions parts are already virtually impassible on foot. In fact much of Newton Aycliffe is built on wetland. I didn't realise just how wet until I moved here and found that apart from an inch or two of soil the rest is clay - the stuff used to line reservoirs to keep the water on site. Perfect for

It is much more relevant that the substantial layer of impermeable clay under Newton Aycliffe is in effect 'perched groundwater' (Wikipedia is a good start) which in practice means that surface water cannot easily escape down to the Water Table level as in normal soil and is acknowledged in the documentation So it does what water does best and slowly(?) leaks away down-hill resulting in a saturated landscape and

boggy gardens. The Moor Nature Reserve lies on the 375' contour and falls away eastward, partly towards the Golf course and mainly towards Woodham Burn on the 300' contour about 1K to the east. There are water issues in both areas. Any land and properties in between those contours have a propensity to experience wetter gardens for longer.

of surprising number Α homes are already being affected by unwelcome surface water, suggesting that (if) any consideration has been previously given to such developments it may well have been less than adequate.
