

TRIP OF A LIFETIME TO SOUTH AFRICA Bryan Witt, a 21 year old Newtonian and ex Woodham Student took an opportunity to complete

voluntary work in South Africa. He has submitted his story to encourage others to do likewise.

What made me want to apply for this once in a life time experience? Perhaps it was because my parents worked supporting people, Mum in a pre-school and my Dad in the prison service. I am a scout leader and I like to think I help children to develop within themself to become more confident.

My Mum first suggested I volunteered to work abroad and I filled in the form as it sounded right for what I wanted to do with youth work. I received a phone call from International Citizen Service for an interview in York. After the interviews all the candidates returned home not knowing if they were successful or not.

After three weeks I a phone call from ICS congratulating me as I was accepted and would go to South Africa for ten weeks. I told my Mum and Dad and everyone I knew as I had to start fundraising for the eight hundred pounds I needed to take the trip.

I completed a 27 mile sponsored bike ride with my Dad. It was raining on the day and muddy, but OK for the first 13.5 miles. On

The training was great and we had a laugh with some of the things we had to learn.

sons and the two elder sons had children who I got on with very well. I also had a second family, as one of my South Afican friends became my best friend over there and I enjoyed being with his

with the children at the school. In class I helped them with reading and their work ready to be marked by the teacher. I also took a few of the children out of class at times to help them to read which was rewarding as they became quite confident reading out loud. The volunteers met up at

weekends for activities such as a boat ride to Seal Island, Table Top Mountain and other interesting things within Hout Bay. At the end of each week we visited an indoor market for sightseeing and enjoyed the entertainment.

The main reason for the visit was to complete an HIV and Aids awareness project. This took a lot of planning as we had to plan role-play and sports related games to help get the message across. This included planning for the World Aids Day working with three different year groups, a class at a time, of up to thirty pupils.

Big 6 Meet

The partnership of local Authorities who meeting regularly to use their combined strength to

influence Government policy is working well. Henig Cllr Simon as Chairman of the North East Leadership Board said "All 6 Leaders and the Elected Mayor met and held a very constructive meeting on Friday January 17th. We all

reaffirmed our commitment to the need for a strategic body for the area. We will continue to discuss the way forward and will maintain regular dialogue with the Government."

Council Budgets and Savings – What the Public Said!

More than ten and a half thousand people across County Durham took the chance to vote on which local groups should get funds in their area and thousands also gave Durham County Council their views on where a further £100m in budget cuts could be made. The public turned out at events staged by all 14 Area Action

Partnerships through the autumn from Consett to south Durham and the east coast to Barnard Castle. The community sessions, offered cash pots to local not-for-profit groups – with the public vote deciding the winners. Residents attending were also invited to take part in an exercise in which they were asked to decide which council services they would protect and which they would reduce spending on.

The results will now be presented to the council's Cabinet at a meeting on January 22. The region's largest local authority faces overall spending cuts

of £222m (2011-2017) in the face of significant reductions in Government grants. With more than £100m already accounted for, members of the public were asked to say where they would make these required savings. As a result a widespread consultation, which ended last month, saw more than 4,000 residents take part. Additional responses were taken from workshops with children and young people as well as other groups. Consultation 2013 – in numbers:

- 10,693 people attend 14 AAP events
- More than 3,300 (about 1 in 3) also give views on budget cuts
- 1,300 people participate in focus groups on budget cuts
 270 board activity based budget exercises completed

• 97 per cent of those taking part in the exercise said it was a good way to involve the public

517 people offer budget views online

• Further responses via workshops including children and young people and people with disabilities Leader of the council, Cllr Simon Henig, said: "We have long

been believers in the value of community led budget and spending decision-making. Having trialled what is called a 'participatory budget' approach previously in our AAPs, we felt it provided an ideal opportunity to speak to the public about the very difficult financial position we have been put in. "The response from residents has been extremely valuable as we

seek the additional £100m in budget cuts we have to make. We will take these views on board, as we did previously in 2010, when we also asked the public which services they valued most and least. "It was particularly interesting to see how very difficult many people taking part in the exercise found it to cut £100m from a budget. There was a great deal of discussion, debate, thought and

The consultation revealed that there was a high degree of consensus amongst those taking part on the areas which should take the highest reductions. These were:

• Finance, legal services, Information Technology and Human Resources

Performance management, policy and communications Democratic support – decisions and elections

Subsidised bus travel

Four other services were also very close to having a majority decision to cut budgets by above the average. They were: • Grass cutting, trees and flower beds

 Maintenance of public buildings Planning services

• Borrowing for new development Cllr Henig continues: "While many people were clear on which areas they would target for bigger cuts, it was far more difficult to get a public consensus on which services they wanted to see receive the greatest protection. Looking after vulnerable people was seen as a priority but given the scale of budget cuts almost all groups really struggled to find the $\pm 100m$ necessary. Many found they had to change their initial priorities to make the savings.

"I would like to thank all those people who took part in this extensive consultation and to say that their feedback will form an integral part of the decision-making process. I would also say that, as we have done, we will continue to seek residents' views on the tough decisions ahead, to ensure we fully understand how the changes we have no choice but to make, will impact on our communities."

Those taking part in the board activity however did prioritise seven areas for lower spending reductions. Those were: Job creation

- Social work/protecting vulnerable children and adults Support for adults in their homes
- Support for schools/education services
- Community projects/centres/partnerships/groups
- Gritting/snow clearance
- · Children's centres/support for families

The consultation also sought peoples' views on the setting of council tax. While feedback showed there was little support for an increase of above two per cent, approximately two-thirds of the people taking part in the board game exercise felt an increase of up The findings and results will be used to inform the council's

Government **Slow to Use Euro Cash** to Benefit **North East**

MP Euro Stephen Hughes, has called on the UK government to start funding programmes under the EU's new budget as soon as possible. Stephen said: "We're already into the new EU funding period and the government has made little progress in starting European programmes that will bring jobs and growth to the North East, helping families struggling from the cost of living crisis.

"The government needs to ensure local and regional administrations are fully involved during the preparation stages and more flexibility is given for regions, like the North East, to establish their

own priorities. The North East region will receive £616m in structural funding over the next seven years from the European Union to support local businesses, research and jobs."

Emerald Biogas, opened its state-of-the-art food waste plant last year. launching a campaign directed at schools across the region called 'Waste Warriors: Food for Thought'

to tackle the growing problem of food waste. The company, which manages a commercial anaerobic digestion facility in Newton Aycliffe - the first of its kind in the north east – is giving schools in the north east the opportunity to take part in its school engagement programme and inviting pupils to become 'waste warriors'.

Food waste is a growing concern and in the north east alone over 800,000 tonnes of food waste is generated every year, with over 80,000 tonnes generated by schools in England every year. In response to the demand from industry to tackle the issue, Emerald Biogas developed its anaerobic digestion plant at its site in County Durham. We're particularly pleased to be launching this new freephone number at a time when we receive a higher volume of calls from people concerned about older relatives they have seen over Christmas.

Durham County Council has signed up to a national scheme to increase affordable housing and help owners of empty properties bring them back into use.

Empty The National Homes Loan Fund has been established to tackle the 710,000 empty homes across the country. Owners will be able to apply for a low interest loan of up to £15,000 to bring properties up to the Decent Homes Standard. As part of the agreement, the renovated property must then be rented out at 80 per cent of the market rate rent for the duration of the loan, increasing the number of affordable homes available to residents. The initiative is a joint venture between the Empty Homes charity, the Ecology Building Society, central government, Durham County Council and 38 other local authorities who have signed up for the scheme. The Government established the £3 million fund following a campaign led by the

architect and broadcaster George Clarke as part of Channel 4's Great British Property Scandal The programme found that many owners of empty properties were unable to access funds to bring run down properties

back into use. Owners of properties that have been empty for over six months will be able to apply to the council for a loan between £5,000 and £15,000. The loans are paid in advance with a low interest of 5 per cent. Borrowers will need to make monthly repayments over a maximum period of five years. Loans will be made the Ecology Building bv Society with Durham County Council working with owners to apply for the funds, saving them a £495 charge.

Durham County Council's Cabinet member for housing, said: "We're delighted to be backing this scheme which will be of great benefit to the county. Not only will it mean empty properties are renovated and brought back into use but it will also increase the number of affordable homes available to local residents."

Commenting on the launch of the scheme, George Clarke said: "I care passionately about getting England's empty homes back into use for people who need them. This scheme provides real help to property owners to help achieve that. David Ireland OBE, chief

executive of Empty Homes,

said: "This scheme is a real first in England and is a great example of central government working together with the public and private sector to try and reduce the number of empty homes in the UK. We hope the fund will enable hundreds of empty homes to be brought back up to standard and back into the housing stock." Home owners interested in
