CAUSE FOR CONCERN

FATHER DENNIS ANDERSON'S letter in our last issue raised three matters of public concern relating to town centre car parking and road hazards in the town.

Since then numerous people have come out in support of this much respected priest's assertion that the unnecessary dangers should be removed.

For Father Anderson to make a public statement is rare, and should indicate the measure of importance of the matter. One can be sure his expression of concern is anything but trivial and that his views carry great influence.

Many are surprised that there have not been fatal accidents at the town centre roundabout.

The changes made there completely disregard road safety. This newspaper expressed concern, the Road Safety Committee have discussed the problem, and still

pedestrians are obliged to dice with death at the crossing near Churchill House.

A refuge is required — or do we have to spill blood before it is apparent?

The same question applies to Fr. Anderson's complaint over the lack of footpaths along Burn Lane. This very busy road is the cause of frequent complaints, yet still nothing is done!

TOWN CENTRE CAR PARKING

While the multi-storey car park is being built the pressure on the remaining town centre car park is fierce.

The area is like London's "rush hour" at times, with cars jockeying for a parking space near to shops.

Fr. Anderson's suggestion that short term parking should be imposed has been discussed with the ADC by the Chamber of Trade.

It was thought unnecessary if all day parkers such as ADC, Police HQ, shop and office workers parked elsewhere. It seems from observations made that they are not, so it is possible the traders will take up the matter again.

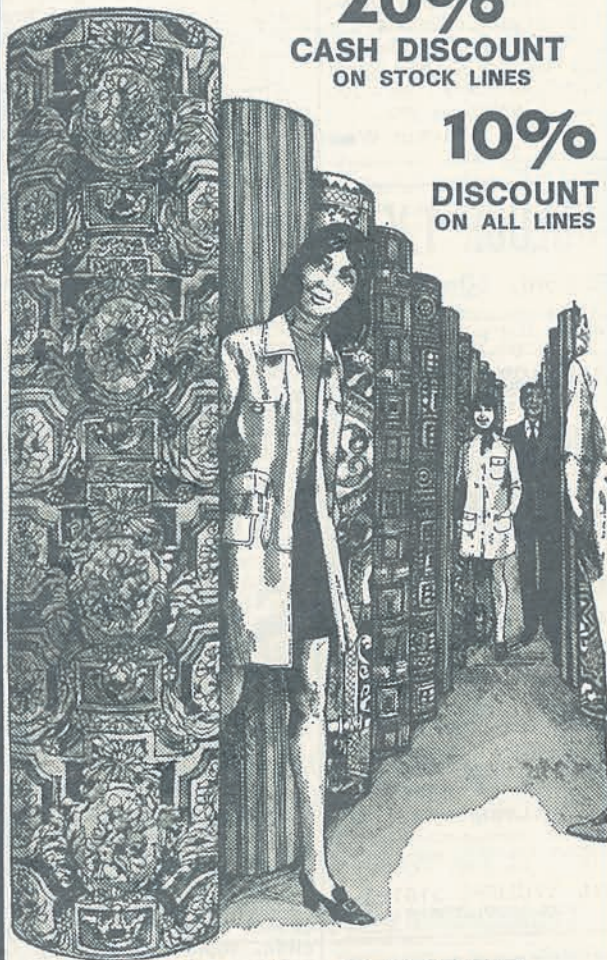

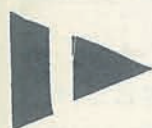

'COMPETER' SUPPLIES ALL THE ANSWERS

ATTRACTING industry by computer — that is the aim of a new selling method devised by Peterlee Development Corporation.

Officers in Peterlee will now take a portable computer terminal with them when they go to see industrialists in the United States, Scandinavia, Germany and Japan.

And it is their unique computer programme — dubbed 'Competer' — that gives the industrialist detailed information on why Peterlee is the place to be.

The terminal plugs into a telephone and, anywhere in the world, can answer an industrialist's questions about the incentives his project will attract, an assessment of his project's long-term viability, information on his 'ideal' location and a range of up-to-date figures on employee and factory availability and wages and disputes statistics.

Now the Development Corporation thinks 'Competer', which shows how even industrial marketing can bene-

fit from the computer, will help attract new industry to the north-east of England.

'Competer' was born just four months ago when the Corporation's data processor, John Stevens, was talking to the Assistant Director, Industry, Fred McClenaghan, about a new portable terminal, the Texas Instruments Silent 700.

PORTABLE

"With the machine being so portable I began to wonder how we could use it," said Mr McClenaghan. "I asked John if a programme could be devised to work out the grants and incentives available to industry establishing in a special development area."

"It wasn't an easy programme to draw up — it involves 380 stages because of the many variables in the scheme but now the Peterlee industrial team have it working very smoothly and we have drawn up a number of

additional programmes to utilise to the full the advantages of using a computer as a sales aid.

"What 'Competer' does is when I or any other member of the team visits an industrialist in Chicago or Tokyo, or wherever, who is interested in a new factory or site, the terminal plugs into his desk telephone and a local call connects us to the international Comshare network."

"The industrialist gives a few details about his proposed project — size, number of phases, proposed investment — and these are typed into the computer. 'Competer' immediately prints out the actual grants, loans and other concessions he is likely to get if he locates in Peterlee."

"Before 'Competer' all we could do at the time was give general examples or vague answers. Now the industrialist has all the detail to keep and check."

had 'Competer' demonstrated to them on their projects, and have been very impressed," said Mr McClenaghan. "It is a very useful sales aid."

"'Competer' does not make empty promises or bury the industrialist in masses of literature but gives him the information he wants and needs to make the right decision on where he locates his new factory. 'Competer' gives him that information immediately."

The 'Competer' names and the programmes devised by Peterlee Development Corporation are copyright — but the Corporation would be delighted to discuss licensing use of the software to any interested development agency.

UNEMPLOYMENT ISSUE VITAL FOR S.W. DURHAM

Unemployment is the most important issue facing the Bishop Auckland constituency. This was recognised by the North Region Strategy team when special measures were advocated for South West Durham.

Yet the Durham County Structure Plan is remarkably complacent about industrial development, and it argues that sufficient industrial land has been allocated.

But the land needs to be prepared, serviced, and a range of factories built in a variety of settings, if industrialists are to be attracted. They will want to move in the day after the decision is made and if nothing is available in south west Durham they will go elsewhere.

Now is the time to prepare for the upturn of the economy. If the work is not done now the opportunity will not re-occur for another five years or more.

Again the Structure Plan does not take sufficient account of the increasing pace of technology. If firms are to remain internationally competitive, productivity must increase.

New plants will be more capital intensive, creating fewer jobs per acre of industrial land. The result will be that we will have to run faster and faster to stand still on the employment front.

The most successful job seeking agencies are the North's new towns. The County and the District should take a leaf from their book. They need to recruit a high powered team of industrial officers and back them with the necessary resources. Local Government must make every effort to understand industry's needs. Planning policies must not squeeze out small "non conforming firms."

CHEAP HOUSING

Cheap housing for rent and for sale must be made available for incoming key workers. Transport planning must make the need to get quickly and cheaply to work a major priority. Access from the industrial sites to the A1(M), the A68 and the A66 must be improved.

There are too many agencies promoting industry in the North. They lack co-ordination, a sense of direction and a sense of urgency. A Northern Development Agency comparable to the Scottish and Welsh agencies, with impressive powers and resources is essential. Failing that, central government should co-ordinate existing agencies under a Minister for the North.

"PATHETIC"

The National Enterprise Board's performance in the North has been pathetic so far. It is impossible to believe viable projects are not available here. The present Director should be replaced by someone more dynamic.

The new Co-operative Development Agency should be invited to invest in the area. The nursery factories shortly to be built at the Labour Government's initiative in the Dales will provide an admirable opportunity for co-operative ventures.

Finally, the County and the District should do all in their power to promote Bishop Auckland as a centre for small businesses. They are more labour intensive and tend to grow more quickly than larger firms.

The Labour Government is now energetically encouraging small firms. South West Durham must hurry to cash in. Without more jobs the people of Coundon, Cockfield, Evenwood and West Auckland must continue to travel long distances at great expense.

Without more highly paid jobs South West Durham can never be prosperous. Without greater prosperity we will never be able to improve our schools, our hospitals, and give the elderly and the handicapped the services they need.
