

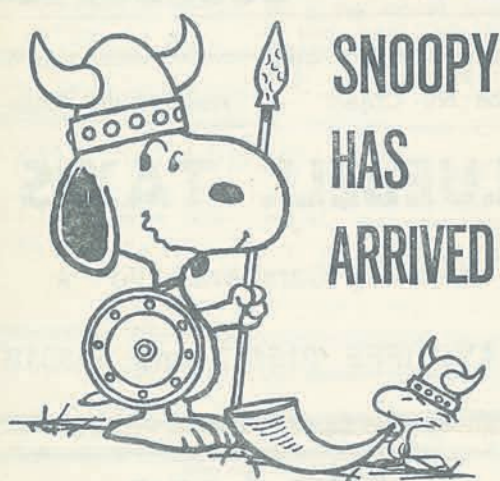

STRUCTURE PLAN GAINS MAJORITY AGREEMENT

... say County Council

**ANSWERS TO the County Council's
questionnaire, sent to every household in
County Durham, have been analysed.**

Comments from District Councils and other authorities are now to be added. A full report will be presented to the Council, who will then prepare a structure plan for approval by the Secretary of State.

County officials are happy with the response totalling 12,800 comments with a high percentage showing approval for the Council's policies.

Since the publication of the booklet there has been criticism of the manner in which some questions were posed and the inevitable answers they would receive.

This was borne out on the particular question related to Newton Aycliffe and how quickly it should grow. People outside the town returned an emphatic "no" for an expansion to a 45,000 population.

What else could they say when told in the booklet that Newton Aycliffe was expanding at their expense? Figures released since have shown the information in the booklet to be incorrect.

Those Newtonians who returned the questionnaire were evenly divided on whether the town should grow quickly to 45,000 or slow down to reach 34,000 by 1991.

The booklet did state that the larger population target would improve facilities and attract jobs in the new town. If we accept the number that replied as being truly representative then we conclude that half the town believe a 34,000 population will be big

enough, also that they are happy with the facilities we have now and the job prospects for the future.

It will be interesting to see what the future brings and whether the County Council can afford to be so specific on the rate of our growth.

It is our view that jobs will be the most important factor governing the expansion of Newton Aycliffe. Our industrial success during a time of economic depression denies the County Council the right to call a halt or even a slow

Rent Office hours alter on Monday

LUXURY HOTEL FOR PETERLEE

A 150 bedroom hotel complex — with its own swimming pool, sauna, squash courts, shops, banqueting and conference facilities — is planned for Peterlee, County Durham.

And the complex, which will cost between £2m. and £2½m., could be in full use by 1982, giving the north east the most modern and luxurious hotel in the

country.

Details of the scheme were announced today by Trevor Wynne-Jones, chairman of the company backing the new project.

The scheme, details of which have been lodged with the planning authorities, already has the support of Peterlee Development Corporation. It uses 200-year-old Shotton Hall and the spacious

wooded grounds in which it is situated at the west end of Peterlee.

The proposal is to use the hall itself for reception, restaurant, conference and bar facilities with a small number of bedrooms. Existing out-buildings will be re-built providing another 28 bedrooms. Subject to planning and licensing approval being given, these two phases, costing £350,000 and providing 38 bedrooms, will be in operation in around a year's time.

The third phase, which depends on the viability of the first two, involves the building of a three-storey block to the rear of Shotton Hall. In the open central area is a heated pool with bar enclosed by conference, banqueting, sports and shopping facilities and overlooked by the second and third storey bedrooms.

All of the development will be in Georgian style to match the existing character of Shotton Hall.

A great deal of emphasis is also given to landscaping. Treatment of the development involves extensive use of water features and sunken gardens leading to the pond on the site.

Trevor Wynne-Jones, who currently runs a Watford based company, Building Markets Limited, which is in-

volved in design and construction work for many international companies, said: "I am involved in partnership in this venture with a hotelier who has some 12 years of experience of running large, prestige complexes all over Britain. It is envisaged that he will be the man running the hotel. He cannot at the present time be publicly identified because he is actively involved in the hotel industry."

"Our proposal is to form a new company, Shotton Hall Hotels, to develop this building and, we hope, hotels elsewhere in the north-east in the future."

OBITUARY

Sad loss for Newton Aycliffe

Mr Frank Hiley, OBE, BA (Admin.), IPFA, FRVA, Director of Finance with Aycliffe and Peterlee Development Corporations for more than 20 years, has died.

Mr Hiley (63) had retired from his post with both Corporations in May this year. Married with four children, Mr Hiley had lived in Newton Aycliffe since 1947.

He started work in the Borough Treasurer's Department, Lythan St. Anne's, Lancashire, before the second world war, when he served in the Army as a Major in the RAOC.

Mr Hiley returned to Lythan St. Anne's after the war until joining Aycliffe Development Corporation when the new town was designated in 1947, becoming Joint Chief Finance Officer when Aycliffe and Peterlee Corporations merged in 1957.
