OUT OF WORK TEENAGERS HELPED BY A.S.C.A.

RECENTLY the Town Centre shops and
notice boards have been displaying
posters carrying information by A.S.C.A.

What is ASCA — It stands for Aycliffe and Sedgfield Community Aid. It is a scheme run by a local committee and is financed by the Manpower Services Commission.

Its aim is to train unemployed teenagers in life and social skills, and at the same time help the community.

In providing this training for 20 teenagers, it gave work to six qualified personnel who were also unemployed.

The training programme aims to give the youngsters confidence in themselves to tackle interviews, it also helps them to discover the

ability to get on with other people and to help where help is needed.

The age range of the teenagers is 16-18 on joining, and the training is for 12 months unless a job comes up in the meantime.

St. Clare's Parish Church has opened its doors to help the scheme and allowed ASCA to use their halls for administration and training—though a lot of the work by the youngsters will be "on the job training", carried out in the community.

ASCA have a permanent office Monday to Friday, 8.30 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Small

Hall opposite the new Fine Fare building on Central Avenue, telephone Aycliffe 317119.

Part of the training consists of helping people in need, with the guidance and supervision of the course tutors.

This may mean decorating or gardening for the elderly or disabled. It may mean shopping or library and prescription messages. It could mean spending time keeping someone company who suffers from loneliness.

The scheme has now been running for two weeks and the organising committee are delighted with the results.

The initial hesitancy first

displayed by the youngsters has given way to eagerness and enthusiasm.

Instead of feeling dejected and that there is nothing for them, they are discovering the world is theirs and that there are people around who are prepared to listen and help.

Rev. Granville Gibson is the chairman of the local committee and he is very happy with the way things are going.

"I hope the scheme develops such a high reputation that everyone who attends the course finds that future employers consider the experience gained at ASCA a qualification," said Rev. Gibson.

June to teach in New Hebrides

A Newtonian left Teesside Airport recently for a far flung island in the South Pacific.

Miss June Morris gave up her job as a secretary at BIP to do voluntary work overseas.

Her VSO duties involve teaching English to the Melanesians at St. Patrick's School, Longano, New Hebrides. She will also act as bursar and expects to work 15 hours a day. She does get one day off a week.

Among the difficulties of settling in a strange land is the oddity of getting used to being without a bed!

The Melanesians do not have beds and June will have to make up an improvised mattress on the floor.

June did not let anyone know when she was leaving Newton Aycliffe and she will be sorely missed for the voluntary work she did here.

She taught adults to read, worked through the night at intervals as a Samaritan, and then went to work the next

morning!

She helped at the Brownies, was a member of St. John Ambulance Brigade, visited the sick, made costumes for church pantomimes, helped the Amateur Operatic Society, and carried out countless little jobs to help anyone who asked.

June Morris is a remarkable person and we wish her good fortune in her work in the New Hebrides.

Continued success at the Avenue

As the Autumn prize giving ceremony has been postponed this year, former pupils are requested to collect their GCE 'A' and 'O' and CSE certificates from the school during normal school hours. The school has in its possession more than 200 certificates dating from 1968 to 1977 belonging to former pupils. RECENT SUCCESSSES

Jason Field, head boy from 1977 to 1978, has been awarded one of the first "National Engineering Scholarships" under a new scheme to attract young people into careers in industry. Only 62 scholarships have been awarded this year and the applicants must be committed to a career in a productive industry and be accepted into one of the eight universities involved in the scheme.

The qualities looked for include academic excellence, evidence of interest in practical engineering both at school and during holidays and relevant interests or hobbies. Jason has been accepted into the Ford Motor Company and will undertake a degree course at Manchester University which includes elements of the science of management such as economics, business methods and industrial relations. The scholarship is worth £500 each year for the duration of the course.

On Tuesday, 24th October, Jason, along with the other 61 chosen, attended a recep-

tion in London at which the Minister of State for Education, Mr Gordon Oakes, was present. It is believed that Jason is one of the few comprehensive school pupils to have gained this award.

In a different sphere of activity, a member of the first year 6th, Patricia Llewellyn, achieved fame at the same time in a contest at Great Yarmouth when she was voted joint number one Drum Major in the final of a national competition for juvenile jazz bands. In addition, the drum corps of the band, the Newton Aycliffe Monarchs, also tied for top place.

6,500 MILES TO DELIVER MOWER

Patrick Legg-Bagg, an Area Manager for the Flymo hover mower organisation at Newton Aycliffe, has just returned from a 6,500-mile trip to deliver a mower.

It went to a Christian Technical Training Centre in the north of Pakistan.

The Flymo GT4 air cushion mower was a bonus for the centre. The main purpose of the trip was to deliver a new mini-bus.

The four-week trip through Belgium, Germany, Austria, Yugoslavia, Greece, Turkey, Iran and Afghanistan before entering Pakistan through the Khyber Pass, is estimated to have saved about £750 on freight charges for the mini-bus.

The principal of the training centre says two acres of grass around the buildings is kept short not only for appearances but because of the danger of snakes. The new mower takes five per cent of the time previously involved with a man flailing with a light sword, and the gardeners are happy because they can sell the grass in the city for buffalo fodder.

St. Clare's Church have appointed a replacement for Rev. John Tidy, who left to take over the Parish of St. Peter's, Bishop Auckland.

The new curate comes from Silsworth and is 32-year-old Rev. John Scorer, a native of Washington and a bachelor. John was ordained 3 years ago and joined the Priesthood after a career in engineering where he served an apprenticeship as a fitter and later became a technician at the Polytechnic.

He will live quite near St. Francis Church, for which he will be mainly responsible. The Church of England is becoming well established in this area and needs a resident priest.

The Bishop of Durham will officially licence John Scorer to the parish on Wednesday, 29th November, at St. Francis Church at 7.30 p.m.

A successful Halloween night was held in the hall and the witches, monsters and turnip lanterns were out in force. Dancing, games and singing were enjoyed by all. Hot potatoes and soup were quickly consumed by the happy crowd.

Safety Officer announces new campaign

John Tully, County Road Safety Officer, recently announced the start of a publicity campaign designed to help drivers turn right correctly.

He said that last year nearly 800 vehicles were involved in turning right accidents, which if placed nose to tail would stretch for well over 2 miles.

These accidents killed or injured 539 people and cost the community £382,800.

Well over half of these accidents were caused through drivers turning out of minor roads into the path of an oncoming vehicle.

Mr Tully warned drivers that when stopping at a junction they should make sure that they have a good view of traffic on the main road and to remember that some oncoming vehicles will be going much faster than expected, particularly heavy vehicles going downhill.

He said that many of these accidents involved motor cyclists and pedal cyclists, these being particularly vulnerable as they are difficult to see because their profile is small compared with other traffic.

He emphasised that at night or in bad weather conditions it will be much harder to judge the speed of traffic on the main road.

Mr Tully said, at junctions, "If in doubt stop and wait — if necessary double check before moving off."

CHRISTMAS TREE

People have asked where the Christmas tree will be situated this year now that the Fine Fare Development have taken away the traditional site between Wentons and Fine Fare.
