seat in Parliament, Mr Irvine went on to say that there would be two main election issues in Aycliffe. The first would be the level of income tax. The second would be the sale of their homes to council tenants.

As to income tax, whereas the average British household had paid £7.48 per week in income tax in 1973/74, after 5 years of Labour Government the same household was pay-ing over £18 per week in income tax. People in Aycliffe knew that income tax had reached an absurd level and must be reduced.

On the sale of council houses the Conservatives were pledged to give council and new town tenants the legal right to buy their own homes fair and reasonable prices. This legal right could be en-forced even against unwilling Labour councils such as the Sedgefield District Council. The Conservatives were The Conservatives were pledged to ensure that 100 per cent mortgages were available for such purchasers.

I know that I don't need to introduce myself to many of you because of my political activity in Newton Aycliffe for many years.

We believe that no single political party has the answer, if they had we wouldn't be in the state we are in today. The only way forward is for all parties to work together for the good of the country, in-stead of fighting about sec-tional interests. Liberal policy is for Democracy in Industry, which includes employees (irrespective of trade union membership) sharing control and profits with shareholders, and waging relentless war against bureaucratic waste, in central and local government.

To seek ways of improving pensions by using tax

credit systems.

Keep pressing for a satisfactory system of assistance for the purchase of vehicles for the disabled. The inadequate mobility allowance is no substitute

for a vehicle. As you know, what is good for the country is good for Newton Aycliffe as well.

Following the Labour Minister's speech announcing an end to growth in Newton Aycliffe and other new towns, Mr Hugh Rossi, Conservative Shadow, Huging Minister Shadow Housing Minister made a similar statement. Minister. and other leading Liberals of the town called a Parish meet-ing in St. Clare's Church Hall which passed a resolution against this policy and it was dropped. Now it has crept in again by stealth as a result of the inertia of our Labour and Conservative locally elected representatives.

The biggest problem facing Newton Aycliffe is to make sure that our successes continue, which means that we have to continue to attract new industry, while the Labour policy is to encourage industry to go to the east of the country. I'm appalled that the town's growth and not let it reach the planned 45,000. This has grave implications as far as housing second generation newly weds are concerned. Sedgefield District Council have just removed them from the priority list.

If houses are not going to be built there can't be more people to employ, firms will not be attracted here (no housing for key workers) and present companies will be un-able to expand. Newton Aycliffe will become as de-pressed as the rest of Labour controlled County Durham. This is the true price of a Labour vote.

I think I have proved to you that I will fight for Newton Aycliffe and its people. Isn't it time that you voted for someone with a proven record, a proven policy; and not for someone who will bend with any political wind.

If you do me the honour of electing me as your M.P. I will continue to be readily available by phone or personal call, unlike my opponents and our previous M.P., all of whom many miles from this constituency.
