NEW COMPANY CHOOSE AYCLIFFE AS BASE

A process to protect steel in oil rigs, bridges and metal-framed buildings from corrosion for ten to fifteen years is being launched in Aycliffe.

Britblast is offering a service, which could save industry in Britain and the Far East, millions of pounds a year and put an end to expensive annual maintenance and metal failure due to corrosion.

The new company will go into production in their 20,000 square feet factory in August with shot blasting, special coating systems and metal spraying facilities all for use in the factory, on site and offshore, on oil rigs and platforms.

"It is reckoned that world-wide corrosion costs £500,000 every hour," said Britblast managing director Phil Smith. "We have considerable experience in this field and increasingly industry is realising the value of anti-corrosion treatment."

"Our process is to take new steel as it comes from the mill or old steel which has been in use and shot blast it with chilled iron grit to clean it totally. It is then coated or sprayed with materials which will vary depending on the type of use to which it is being put."

"We can do this in our factory, on the site of a building or bridge, or offshore on oil rigs and platforms."

"When we are finished the metal will be in perfect condition for ten to fifteen years with the only maintenance required being minor touching-up any parts which become damaged."

"There has already been considerable interest from metal users in the region in what we are doing and I will be working also with a Belgium consortium of consul-

tant engineers who are involved in projects in the Far East. We expect a large part of our business to be there."

Britblast will employ 15 men working a three shift system in the Aycliffe factory and will be recruiting a further 30 for on site and offshore work over the next year.

"We have set up in Aycliffe because it has a strong industrial base, is well placed for working in the region and with the oil industry, and has precisely the factory we were seeking," said Mr Smith.

And Phil, who has set up home in Aycliffe, is a great believer in being close to his work. Even his main hobby is almost in the same field.

"I am a keen clay pigeon shooter," he said. "Really, it's shot blasting at work and play."

FREEDOM OF THE TOWN CEREMONY



VISIT BY AMERICAN BAND

A chance tuning-in to a local radio programme has led to a major band appearance for Aycliffe.

A 250 strong USA Marching Band, their Redcar host band and the local pipe band, will be parading through the streets of Newton Aycliffe on Sunday, 12th August.

The mini-music festival has all come about because Roger Ramsdale, Training Manager with Eaton Axles of Aycliffe, was listening to local radio while driving to work.

"I heard the words 'Cleveland, Ohio' — where our company has its world headquarters — and began to listen more closely," said Mr Ramsdale. "The interview was about the Lakewood High School Marching Band from Cleveland, Ohio, which was coming to Redcar as guests of the Anglo-American Marching Swing Band."

Mr Ramsdale mentioned it at his work, his Managing Director Tom Finnegan became interested and now the Company is hosting a visit to Aycliffe by the band.

Lakewood Band, 204 schoolchildren aged between 12 and 18 years, and their musical director, Jim Warwick, will be arriving for their two week visit to the U.K. on 8th August. Mr Finnegan will be presenting them with a Union Jack at a ceremony in Redcar which will also be attended by Eaton's European Managing Director, Frederick Hooson.

The big day for Aycliffe is the following Sunday. After a

tour of the Eaton Axles factory in Aycliffe the U.S. band, their host band and Aycliffe Pipe Band — in all around 400 musicians and majorettes — will march at 3 p.m. from Finchale Road to Simpature Park where they will put on a display. If the weather is bad the town's Recreation Centre will be used for an inside display.

With the band will be a television crew from Ohio who are covering the trip.

Later in the week the Mayor and Mayoress and other representatives of Lakewood will be Eaton's guests at the factory.

DISGUSTING MESS IN TOWN CENTRE

Fine Fare are making a bold attempt to get the business and we welcome their faith in our town as a base and wish them success.

MORE JOBS FOR AYCLIFFE

Two hundred new jobs have been created and 80,000 square feet of factory space let in Aycliffe in the past three months.

Ten companies have moved into the new town producing a range of goods and services from electronics to cosmetics and foam upholstery.

The record lettings follow two years when employment in the town rose by 980.

Announcing the successes, Tony Cooper, Director of Estates with Aycliffe Development Corporation, said: "We have been following a programme of attracting small companies to Aycliffe to grow with the town."

"As part of our programme we have been converting older large factories into small units and eight of the new companies are occupying one of these, a 21,000 square feet building, which has been re-

furbished and subdivided give a range of premises from 1,700 to 3,000 square feet.

"In addition to that, Br blast, who specialise in an corrosion treatment of metal in buildings, bridges and rigs and platforms, occupying some 20,0 square feet and Beaverfoa have taken an additional 37,000 square feet fact preparing foam for the furniture upholstery trade.

"This represents a build over the next few months around 200 jobs."



CONSERVATIVE ASSOCIATION A.G.M.





WITNESSES ATTEND CONVENTION

Community hymn singing at a football stadium! That was the scene at Murrayfield rugby football ground last week — and at almost 200 similar stadiums throughout the world.

Members of the Newton Aycliffe Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses were among the 12,000 from Scotland and Northern England drawn to Edinburgh for the 'Living Hope' Convention. For four days they shared in worship and Bible study.

A striking feature was the release of two new Bible study text books. One was a verse-by-verse analysis of the epistle of James, the other of two epistles of Peter.

It is generally recognised that the present moral climate has departed widely from traditional Christian standards. What advice will help those who still wish to live by those standards? In the early stages of the decline of the Roman Empire, Christians faced very similar problems. The advice given to them by James and Peter can help us.

Costume dramas based on well-known Bible stories pinpointed the choices individuals — especially young people — are forced to make.

The climax of the Assembly, an address by Mr J. A. Wynn from the London headquarters of the Witnesses, was a stirring call for diligence in applying Christian principles in daily life. Only in that way could 'thy kingdom come' be

prayed in sincerity.

The Convention departments were manned by over 3,000 volunteers. They cleaned the stadium, organised car parking, first aid and other essential services. To accommodate delegates, well over 2,500 beds were found, thanks to the kindness of the people of Edinburgh. Many other delegates stayed with hosts they had met in previous years. A cafeteria service provided 25,000 hot meals, and 15 refreshment stands handled over 300,000 food items.
