MASSIVE INTEREST IN BUYING COUNCIL HOUSES

OVER 1,000 NEWTON AYCLIFFE families have shown interest in wishing to purchase their home from Sedgfield District Council.

Sedgfield District Council Housing Committee, at its special meeting on the 24th July, 1979, resolved, inter alia, that, prior to any policy decision being taken regarding the sale of Council houses, a survey be undertaken to ascertain the likely level of demand in the district.

Accordingly a circular letter was issued to the tenants of all Council owned properties enquiring whether they would be interested in purchasing their home if the Council decided to sell. It was emphasised to tenants that no policy decision had yet been taken by the Council and the proposition of selling was still under consideration.

Replies to the circular letter were requested by August 24, 1979, and by that date a total of 2,800 reply slips had been

returned, 1,075 of these had come from Newton Aycliffe tenants.

Some replies are still being received and processed but these late arrivals have not been taken into account for the present.

Experience elsewhere suggests that there is often a considerable disparity between "expressions of interest" such as those flowing from the present survey, and the actual conclusion of a sale. It may be prudent, therefore, to discount the figures mentioned above. On the other hand, there are likely to be a number of tenants who have not replied having regard to the current absence of information as to selling prices.

It now remains for the Committee to make a decision as to whether or not the sale of Council houses should go forward.

Market to commence in October

The long awaited opening of the town centre market is to take place on Tuesday, 2nd October.

The chairman of Sedgfield District Council will officially open the market at 11.30 a.m., though the stalls will have commenced trading much earlier.

There will be 52 stalls operating from Beveridge Way.

The protests regarding the removal of the raised flower bed to accommodate two more stalls have been heard, and this will not now take place.

The Council have agreed a trading mix to include 5 fruit and vegetable stalls, six material and haberdashery, six babies and ladies wear, three

confectionery, 2 fancy goods, two fish, two jewellery, two toys, two garden, and one stall each catering for menswear, wool, crockery, leather, electrical spares, basketweave, footwear, books, meat and eggs, cosmetics, charity.

BOYS' BRIGADE PLAN NATIONWIDE CAMPAIGN DURING SEPTEMBER

For the first time in its 96 year history, the Boys' Brigade is going all out in a nationwide drive to enlist more members.

This was the first voluntary uniformed organisation for boys. It began in Scotland in 1883 and has spread to over 60 countries with a world strength of 300,000.

The exciting programme starts for boys at the age of six in the pre-Junior Section, where a red jersey is the distinctive uniform worn.

At age eight the boys wear a smart cap and dark blue jersey. Green, white, blue, red,

purple and gold badges are awarded for taking part in the achievement scheme — over 100 lively activities.

Boys of 11 plus are in the Company Section. They can serve until they are 18, and by this time are Junior Leaders, taking major responsibility in running the programme for the younger boys.



The Boys' Brigade caters for all sorts, shapes and sizes. Many boys qualify each year for the Queen's Badge, the highest award in the movement. Thousands also take part in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme.

Because there is plenty of room for expansion, the Boys' Brigade is using over 500 High Street shop windows,

many of them provided by Abbey National Building Society, as display centres. Bands will play, activities held and leaflets distributed to thousands of boys telling the good news that they can join the pioneer youth organisation.

In addition to the outside advertising, a new film for showing in cinemas, schools and churches is being made for The Boys' Brigade.

Schemes

Imaginative schemes are being organised by local units to spread the message of "First for Boys", these include a decorated train, a vintage double deck bus, and a giant balloon to be flown in major cities of the United Kingdom.

A programme is going out to all local radio stations. Many distinguished ex-members are giving their support.

Plans are already being made for follow-up campaigns in 1980, 1981 and 1982. Then in 1983 The Boys' Brigade proudly celebrates its Cen-

tenary with every intention of remaining "First for Boys."

Job creation scheme with a difference

Cleveland Mormon leaders have pledged full support for a national network of farms, canneries and factories to provide food for the needy and work for the unemployed now being planned by the Church throughout Britain.

Mr Craig L. Marshall, head of the Church in Cleveland, stressed today that the plan was not a commercial exercise. Its aim is to provide work opportunities for unemployed members from among the 108,000 Latter-day Saints in Britain.

Mr Marshall said that detailed attention was now being given to a vegetable and pig farm in the general vicinity which would be used by the members of the Church in Cleveland.

Small pilot projects have been operating south of London and at Merthyr Tydfil, South Wales, but this is the first time the Church in Britain has committed itself to the full-scale development of its welfare programme.

The announcement of the British plan, which has been two years in the making, follows the appointment of Mr John Mason—an experienced farm manager and church administrator, now living in the Midlands—to supervise and develop the proposals.

Mr Mason said: "We have identified about 3,500 of our members in Britain who are unemployed, or about 3.2 per

cent of the total, compared with a national unemployment average of about 6 per cent.

"But our objective is to remove all our members from unemployment registers eventually, including those who are handicapped."

Unemployed members will provide much of the workforce for the projects, with the balance coming from volunteer work from within the Church membership. The larger production projects will have full-time managers.

All profits will be channelled back into the welfare programme.

Work on a welfare farm or in a cannery will be regarded as temporary until the member can find full-time employment.

Mind how you go!

"Mind How You Go" is the snappy slogan of Durham County Council's new pedestrian campaign which began on the 1st of this month.

The campaign encourages pedestrians to Stop, Look, Listen before crossing the road and warns pedestrians not to play blindman's bluff by crossing between parked cars where it is so difficult to see and to be seen by the vehicle driver.

"It's much more sensible," said John Tully, the County Road Safety Officer, "to walk a few more yards to a safer place than to be killed or injured."

He said that people thought that the chance of injury when crossing the road was remote but this is not the case as there were 506 pedestrian casualties in Durham County last year. The terrible thing is that we can confidently predict that a similar number of people, who are at present living normal lives, will next year be killed, crippled or suffer great pain as a result of pedestrian accidents.

The campaign will involve the issue of 30,000 leaflets and 2,600 posters to firms, shops, garages and libraries.

Mr Tully commented that the increased participation of industry in these campaigns is very pleasing, as it is gradually being realised by employers that the social and economic consequences of accidents can be far reaching.

Traffic danger
