REPORT ON COUNCIL MEETING WEDNESDAY 4th JUNE

THE FUTURE LOOKS BLEAK

The Town Council's Policy and Resources Committee met last week. Its main business was to consider and approve the Medium Term Financial Plan.

Introducing the Finance Manager Plan. Dan Austin reported the Town Council's finances were very hearing, ined significant currently outlined future challenges facing the Council in the years ahead. Chiefly, changes to Government legislation have reduced the council's taxraising capacity by £100,000 over the last two years, and will leave the Council facing

cuts of a further £100,000 over the next four years

In addition, it seems that the government is to implement a 2% 'cap' on council tax increases by town councils, so there is little leeway for the Council to meet the deficit by increasing Council Tax.

As a result, Mr Austin outlined increasing pressures on council finances, concluding that, concluding that, by the financial year 2018-19, it is likely that the Council will be in a position where there is no contingency sum. There will be no contribution to capital reserves, and no

Credit Unions are not-for-

profit financial cooperatives offering loans and savings opportunities to their members – NEFirst says it is 'not for profit, not for charity, but for service'. Members are encouraged to save on a regular basis as little or as

much as they want. Any adult member of the Credit Union can take out a loan; rates of interest depend on the amount of the loan and your personal circumstances . but are much, much lower than High Street 'pay-day' lenders.

As 'austerity' bites, and more people of limited financial circumstances slide into difficulties, the Credit Union provides a much cheaper way to get over unforeseen financial crises - the washer breaking down, the unexpected bill etc. – than loan sharks and payday lenders.

In the coming months, Credit Union volunteers aim to visit a number of local organisations, encouraging people to think ahead before trouble strikes, and to join a Credit Union now.

A Newton Avcliffe nursery has benefited from a kind donation that will ensure its children can continue to play in a safe environment.

Playday Nursery staff were shocked to find out that its artificial grass had been stolen – just three weeks after it had been installed in its garden area. After reading Newton News

Dear Sir

When people seek help from Helping Hands, we ask for proof of benefits/debts/sanctions and any other information which would prove that they are indeed in crisis.

We ask people that they would not give away goods which we have provided and certainly tell them that it is illegal to sell the said goods. However, we are aware that some people will do these things and we cannot judge why they've done this. We help people of all ages, including pensioners if they are in crisis.

Some people are unaware of the poverty in Newton Aycliffe - some Wards are within the top 10% of the most deprived in the country. Some situations which might cause people to be in crisis are redundancies, bereavements, relationship break ups, delay in paying benefits and benefit sanctions and providing extra meals when the children are on holiday from school.

These may cause people to choose whether to pay for housing or provide food and this would be particularly difficult when there are children in the family.

We aim to help people when they are in short term crisis and if these situations take longer to resolve then we are able to provide money management advice via the Christians Against Poverty (CAP) Money Course and hopefully get those people who are unemployed back into employment.

RENEWABLE ENERGY JARGON

The government's latest 'go-green' incentive - which kicked in on April 9th this year could save homeowners hundreds of pounds on their heating bills - but only if they understand it! That's the message from Yorkshire Heat Pumps owner, Michael Wright, who says the new domestic Renewable Heat Incentive (RHI) Scheme offers massive potential to those who can cut through the jargon and confusion.

Said Michael: "There is a real opportunity to increase efficiency and save money on energy bills for those exploring the possibility of incorporating renewable energy heating into their home."

For anyone wanting to navigate their way through the information minefield, here are Michael's answers to a number of the most frequently asked questions.

What is a renewable energy heating system?

It's a heating system which uses alternative sources of energy to fossil fuels.

What is the Renewable Heat Incentive Scheme?

RHI is a world first - a government scheme which incentivises customers to switch to a renewable energy heating system. It pays people for every kilowatt hour of renewable energy they produce. Domestic RHI payments are made quarterly over a seven year period.

A non-domestic scheme was launched in 2011, and has just been extended to the domestic

Why has it been introduced?

The government has a tough carbon reduction target to hit by 2020 when 12% of the UK's heating must come from renewable sources. The only way they can expect to hit this is by encouraging people to move away from fossil fuels. And the most effective way to do is by offering a financial incentive.

Can anyone claim?

Domestic RHI is for new installations of eligible

renewable neating systems, it is also available to people who have installed eligible systems since July 2009, if, and only if their installations were done by appropriately accredited installers, who must have Microgeneration Certification Scheme (MCS) accreditation. It will also need to have been registered on the government's MCS Installation Database (MID) by 22 October 2013.

Which heating technologies are eligible to receive domestic RHI payments?

Ground source heat pumps, biomass boilers, air source heat pumps and solar thermal panels are eligible.

What do you get paid?

You are paid a tariff for every kilowatt hour (kWh) of renewable energy you generate, which varies depending on what technology you have. The price paid is expected to go down as uptake of renewables grows and the government closes in on its carbon reduction target, so getting in quickly will see you getting better returns.

Where do I start?

A Green Deal Assessment must be completed for your home before you can apply for RHI payments.

It's crucial you find a suitably qualified and registered Green Deal Assessor to undertake this. There are sadly some rogue traders out there claiming to offer this service but without the proper accreditation.

You can find a registered Green Deal Assessor by searching on the Department for Energy and Climate Change (DECC) Green Deal Assessor database: http://gdorb.decc.gov.uk/

How do I know which is the right technology for me?

Ask the experts: In addition to the mandatory Green Deal Assessment, we recommend that our customers commission an independent Heat Loss Survey. This is undertaken by a suitably qualified person such as a Chartered Engineer (CEng), and looks at everything from a room by room heat loss calculation to the insulation values of your home and the local climate to help arrive at a system specification which is just right for your property and your circumstances. The findings are transferable to any provider and are extremely detailed

Keep an open mind: When embarking on your renewables journey don't rule out any technology too soon. Take the long view - don't just look at the seven year domestic RHI payback and the highest tariff you might receive. Think about the right system for you, your home and your lifestyle.

If you have a poorly insulated home in need of some modernisation, a low temperature system, such as a Ground Source Heat Pump, won't be suitable. It's the most efficient when installed in well insulated properties and works at its best with underfloor heating, and has a high tariff, but you'd be best considering a high temperature option such as a biomass boiler, and bear in mind, you might need to increase the size of some of your radiators to maintain a comfortable temperature

I am 53, a disabled widow. At present I receive ESA, but due to the government's 365 day rule this will stop soon. I shall then be entitled to £71 a week in benefit, in total, nothing else! This is despite the fact I have limited mobility and take morphine for constant severe pain. The government's nonsensical Work Capability Assessments have deemed me fit for work despite my doctor, consultants and physiotherapist disagreeing.

my doctor, consultants and physiotherapist disagreeing. £71 a week will not cover my household bills and I will be left with no money at all for food, if not for the support of my family.

This is not unusual. People apply for benefits due to illness and redundancy and can have weeks without money while being assessed. Punative sanctions can take away benefits for weeks on end.

I worked and paid my taxes but now am unable to despite wanting to work. We are not scroungers, just victims of this government's unfair policy of penalising the ill, disabled and those out of work through no fault of their own.

People are being urged not to fall for scams and ripoffs which could leave them heavily out of pocket.Durham County Council is marking 'Scams Awareness Month' which takes place throughout May - by highlighting some of the most common con tricks people should watch out for.

They include dodgy internetbased offers, mailshot scams, bogus telesales calls and rogue traders who call at people's homes.

Waller, head of Joanne environment, health and consumer protection at Durham County Council, said: "Scams often target the most vulnerable people and come in a variety of ways - including through the post, over the phone, on the doorstep and via the internet.

are all aimed at "They persuading people to hand over money or their personal details, which can then be used to commit fraud.

scams heartbreaking consequences, particularly for elderly and vulnerable victims, so we want to ensure people are aware of them and can spot the warning

Scams Awareness Month aims to raise awareness about four main types of scam:

· Online scams, such as websites offering 'check and send' services for things such as passport, driving licence and European Health Insurance

Cards applications as well as help with tax returns.

These copycat websites can appear genuine and give the appearance that they are official authorised Government websites when this is not the

The fees charges by these sites are often substantial.

· Mailshot scams. These are often designed to get people to part with money or bank details by promising huge rewards.

The most common types of mailshot scam are fake lotteries, prize draws and sweepstakes, requests for advance fees or money transfers, promises of home working and career opportunities, offers of health slimming 'miracle products and investment opportunities.

scams -Telephone particular one where the caller claims to be from the Microsoft or Apple technical support team

People receiving these calls that they reported have been asked to give personal details or pay for an unnecessary service or bogus software which can enable fraudsters to access all data on their computer or leave the computer affected by harmful viruses or spyware.

The caller often claims there is a problem with the computer but cases that have come to light show that this is not true.

Doorstep scams where tradesmen offer products or services at often extortionate prices. They often leave behind sub-standard work which the homeowner then has to spend more money on to get it put right.

These tradesmen can be difficult to trace as they rarely leave paperwork or receipts and the consumers often have no contact details.

People are being urged to look out for potential scams and be aware of some of the tell-tale signs - including promises of prize money in a competition you haven't entered, requests for payment to claim a prize, offers that are too good to be true, persistent sales pitches and requests for bank details or money up front.

If anyone suspects they have been the targeted by a scam they are advised to report it to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040. Action Fraud is the UK's national reporting centre for fraud and internet crime and details of some of the current scams targeting people are detailed on their website at www.actionfraud.police.uk

Street lights given a brighter life

Over the next few years we will be upgrading the street lights across the county. We have so far replaced 8,000 old ights and we will continue to do so to ensure we reduce carbon emissions and save almost £24 million over 25 years

The main difference with the new LED lights is that the light focuses on the footpath and highway, with less overspill into surrounding gardens and homes. It is a brighter, whiter light with colours more visible.

Dear Sir,

The new "Improved" Street lighting has been causing a bit of a stir since the installation in November 2013 with numerous letters comments in the following months.

I received my copy of Durham County News and found myself chuckling at an article on page 22 headed by the caption "Street lights given a brighter life". The lights installed wherever

the photographs were taken are absolutely fabulous, not only are they as they state "a brighter, whiter light with more colours visible" but according to the old and new photographs they are also capable of lightening the sky and changing it from virtually pitch black to a deep orange fading to sunlight on the right hand side.

If this is truly possible can we please have the same lights in Aycliffe instead of the new improved lights that I feel are not adequate at lighting the roadway or footpaths?

I would very much like to hear the comments of Durham C.C. with this obvious misrepresentation of the actual light quality attained.

I totally understand and agree with the reasoning behind the new lighting and stand by the council and their decision, but there must be a better option available to obtain satisfactory coverage. In addition, as a concerned resident, I personally feel that the current inadequate lighting seems to be assisting with crime in the area.

Recently there was a spate of car thefts and thankfully the culprit was caught after the police reviewed CCTV footage (from one of my neighbours who installed CCTV due to the rise in crime) and a keen-eyed officer recognised the culprit by his silhouette.

Only a few weeks ago a car pulled into the estate and was seen on CCTV (again, turning round in a cul-de-sac and braking outside a house as it left the field of vision.

We cannot be the only area in Newton Aycliffe that has seen such negative results with these new lights, but it seems that our voice is not loud enough to be heard within DCC and, therefore, are we to suffer reduced night time safety and an increase in crime for the foreseeable future? We have also commented to Millers on the current condition of the area, with regards to the appearance and health and safety. The current planting scheme appears as though it is not looked after by either Millers, Local Council or the residents.

The fencing put in place to protect this area is regularly used as a climbing frame by the children which is obviously a safety issue. In order to reach an outcome that is acceptable to all maybe the residents need to get together! Stephen Pallister

Town Centre Car Park Wrong Site for Market

I am not really surprised that the use of the car park on Greenwell Road, Newton Aycliffe was suggested as an $alternative\ temporary\ home$ for the market. However it would be impractical as it would not result in a footfall to give the traders a viable living.

informed by We are **Durham Council that major** problems would make the use of the land adjacent to the Cubby impossible. As the Council will probably use the Health and Safety argument as their friendly ally to force the decision upon Newton Aycliffe there are a couple of points which I would like to stress:

1. The land next to the

Cubby has been allowed to remain a carbuncle and an eyesore for a number of years with no attempt by the owners (Durham County Council) to landscape or even tidy up the land.

2. Access to the proposed car park on Greenwell Road will incur a substantial increase in pedestrians crossing the road at various points along the highway without the facility of a

pedestrian crossing.

3. The car park is very well used at present and the use of the car park by the market will increase pressure on other parking

4. Trade will be taken away from businesses in the Town Centre itself as the location of the market will be drawing potential customers away.
5. With the Taxi rank

overflowing along Greenwell Road past the rear of the old Woolworths building and Taxi drivers wandering around in the middle of the road with their car doors open, Homeplan receiving deliveries and customers loading, Fast food outlets with customers parking outside of the shops, Buses picking up and dropping off passengers and lorries delivering to shops, one can only imagine the melee.

With an organisation that has experts in every possible department from highways to legal, I find it very difficult to believe that those problems incurred with using the Cubby site cannot be overcome if the will is there.

We seem to be ruled by people whose primary interest is in Durham City and surrounding areas so I would pose this challenge: Come on Durham prove me wrong and solve this situation for the good of Newton Aycliffe and the great County of Durham. Ken Robson Chairman (ACORN Residents Association)


The Town Council Parish Performance Plan is our overarching document that aims to inform you about what we said we would do and what we actually did. It is an important strategic document that we produce each year as part of our aim to deliver quality services for the residents of Great Aycliffe.

There are currently 46 targets set out in the Parish Performance Plan supporting the 8 strategic aims of the Town Council. At the end of the financial year

- 21 targets were completed,
- 23 targets are on-going,
- 2 targets are behind schedule and they are both linked to the Great Aycliffe Neighbourhood Plan. There is a brief update on the Neighbourhood Plan later in the

Although no new targets are being added to the Parish Performance Plan this year the work we will be undertaking on behalf of the Neighbourhood Plan will ensure that there will be lots of challenges to face in the very near future.

The table below shows progress, as a percentage, on the Council targets over the previous 5 years. Regular reports are provided to both Councillors and the Customer Panel who have the opportunity to discuss progress on individual



- 41 public countryside events have taken place. Activities have included pond dipping, nature walks, bird box making, rubber duck racing along the Burn and various themed
- 39 environmental workshops have taken place with local school groups. All schools within the parish have been included.
- Volunteers have spent in excess of 750 man hours helping to improve the nature areas around the town.
- An Environment Week was organised with the assistance of the Youth Council. This involved visiting every primary school in the town, giving them an interactive presentation on litter and then giving them the chance to do a litter pick in their local community.
- The Council took over the ownership of Seven Hills Woodland site near Neville Parade. The site has since been improved by installing entrance gates and signage, tree maintenance works, community bulb planting, removal of household waste and regular litter picks.
- Even though finances are extremely tight, and we must continually monitor what we are doing, we still managed to help 13 different local organisations by giving over £8000 in grants.
- Oaklife Club, continues to be a success, with spins offs including a 50+ circuit exercise class which is growing in
- The Bygones vintage car society held their first rally/show on the fields at the rear of the complex; they hope this will be the start of many happy years using the facility.
- On the 1st April 2014 Great Aycliffe hosted the areas first go run for fun event, more than 300 young people took part in the event which is designed to encourage participation in running. Olympian Chris Tomlinson started the mile fun run along with the Mayor of Great Aycliffe Town Council. All those who attended had a wonderful time.

Partnership Working

The Council continues to further explore partnership working / joint procurement with Durham County Council.

The Council has worked with Horndale Residents Association to provide a Multi-Use Games area at Horndale Park and has been involved with the Friends of West Park group which has been recently set up to look at ideas for improving West Park.

The Council have been building partnership working and are looking at some very interesting projects. One in particular is an art project run through the Active Aycliffe Group based at the Pioneering Care Centre which is an intergenerational art project to help those with mental health problems which has been funded by our Youth Council.

The Youth Council are also helping to develop a pilot project with 3 organisations on the business park which they hope will eventually be adopted by the Aycliffe Schools. They are aiming to dispel the myth about apprenticeships, get young people 'work ready' and improve their understanding of what businesses are looking for.



Annual Report on the Council's Finances 2013/14

1. Introduction

Welcome to the annual report on the Council's finances which we hope you will find informative and of interest.

This report sets out the Council's spending plans for 2014/15 explaining how the budget will be funded by you, the council tax payers of the Parish, whilst also providing a summary of the Council's financial performance last year including the outcome of the annual audit inspection.

2. The Council Budget

The Council Budget is an estimate of the resources that the Council will require to be raised from council tax to fund all of the services it provides for the year ahead.

The Budget covers the financial year which runs from 1st April to 31st March.

The Council needs to set a Revenue Budget and a Capital Budget each year.

The **Revenue Budget** funds the day to day running costs of the Council's services such as salaries and supplies and the net cost, after deducting any income receivable from fees and charges and grants, is met from the Town Council proportion of your Council Tax bill.

The Capital Budget funds major one off investment in the Council's fixed assets such as its buildings, vehicles and play areas and is funded from the Council's Balances and Reserves and any external grants that may be available.

3. 2014/15 Revenue Budget

The 2014/15 Revenue Budget was developed on the principle of maintaining services whilst keeping the required increase in council tax as low as possible bearing in mind the difficult back drop of funding cuts and increasing costs.

 $Additional\ budget\ provision\ totalling\ more\ than\ \pounds 150,000\ needed\ to\ be\ made\ for\ a\ number\ of\ unavoidable\ budget\ increases\ including:-$

- A £40,000 cut in the Local Council Tax Support Grant funding;
- A 1% officer pay award;
- Additional pension costs following the implementation of automatic enrolment;
- Pension contributions now being payable on all staff overtime; and
- Inflation on running costs;

However, these increases were offset, for the most part, by savings, budget reductions and increases in income, assisted by the favourable Revenue Budget position in 2013/14 when a significant saving was achieved. Savings included:-

- The significant recovery in sports and golf complex income during 2013/14;
- High attendance levels and therefore funding income at the pre-schools;
- The removal of the budgets for elections and the neighbourhood plan which will be funded from earmarked revenue reserves in future years;
- Cutting the annual contribution to capital reserves by £25,000;
- Efficiency savings from improved procurement; and
- Reductions in under-utilised budgets.

In overall terms, the increase in the Council's **2014/15** Net Revenue Budget Requirement, as represented by the **Council Precept**, increased by £45,000 or 3.5%, from £1,271,600 to £1,316,600.

4. 2014/15 Council Tax

The 2014/15 Council Precept resulted in a Town Council Tax at Valuation Band D of £209.18 per year.

This represented an increase of £5 per year or 2.49% on the 2013/14 Council Tax of £204.10.

However, it is important to note that more than half of the properties in Great Aycliffe fall within Council Tax Band A and therefore pay only two thirds of the Band D Council Tax. The Band A Council


Tax for 2014/15 equates to £139.45 per year.

The decision to increase the Council Tax this year, for the first time in five years, was not taken lightly by the Council.

By limiting the increase to 2.49%, the impact on the Council Tax Bill at Valuation Band A was restricted to £3.40 per year or 7 pence per week.

This increase has ensured that all of the important services provided by the Town Council to the community of Great Aycliffe can be maintained in the year ahead.

A breakdown of the 2014/15 Council Tax is shown below showing that only 12p in every £1 of the total Council Tax comes to the Town Council, with the remaining 88p funding county council, police and fire services:-



5. 2014/15 Capital Programme Budget

The Council will continue to make capital investment in 2014/15 in order to deliver the Council's Asset Management Plan and invest in community assets.

The Capital Programme Budget for 2014/15 has been set at £170,500 and includes provision for building

maintenance works, replacement machinery and computer equipment, play equipment, footpath and play area safety surface repairs.

The Capital Programme Budget will be funded in full from the Council's Earmarked Capital Reserves which are set aside for this purpose.

6. Council Balances and Earmarked Reserves

The Council's Balances and Earmarked Reserves stood at just over £1.05 million at the end of March 2014.

This is significantly better than had been originally anticipated and is as a result of the savings delivered on the Council's Revenue Budget last year as well as the lower than expected spending on the Capital Programme Budget.

The current level of reserves held will help the Council to meet its capital spending commitments for the foreseeable future, and will provide some protection against further cuts to the Local Council Tax Support Grant funding.

The financial position and spending of the Council is continuously monitored and controlled in order to help achieve the most efficient use of public resources. Efficiency savings are identified wherever possible, for example by reviewing services, changing suppliers, and testing the market.

As can be seen above, this prudent management of the Council's spending has resulted in significant savings being achieved in both 2012/13 and 2013/14.

Spending last year was nearly £235,000 or 18% under the level of Precept. This saving was made up of the planned £50,000 contribution to Earmarked Capital Reserves as well as efficiency savings, increases in income and under spending of around £185,000.

All savings achieved on the Revenue Budget have been set aside in the Council's Earmarked Reserves to support future spending commitments and to

provide for further investment in Council and community assets for the benefit of the tax payers of Great Aycliffe over the coming years.

This is all investment that would not otherwise have been possible if the Council did not include a contribution to capital reserves in the Revenue Budget each year and achieve efficiency savings against the Revenue Budget year on year.

It is also important to note that the Council has actively sought external grant funding to support its capital investment in the town in recent years, securing over £500,000 from various funds.

9. Annual Audit Report

The Council is subject to an annual inspection by its external auditors and the overall opinion on the financial standing of the Council is set out in an Annual Audit Letter. The auditors looked at three main areas in 2012/13:-

- 1. Statement of Accounts
- 2. Annual Governance Statement
- 3. Value for Money (Use of Resources Assessment)

The Council is pleased to report that it has again received a clean bill of health on all aspects of the audit inspection.

This means that the external auditors consider that:-

- The Council's Statement of Accounts presents fairly its financial position;
- The Council is well managed and governed with sound strategies, policies, procedures, systems and internal controls:
- The Council's finances are in good order;
- The Council secures economy, efficiency and effectiveness in the use of public money and delivers value for money services to the local community.

 This was a very positive Audit Report for the Council and has been achieved as a result of the hard work

and commitment of all councillors, management and staff.

Children's Play Areas

Children's outdoor play areas across County Durham could be declared smoke-free zones if members of the public back the proposal.

Members of Durham County Council's Cabinet are being asked

Smoke-Free Outdoor

to give the go-ahead for a six-month consultation on plans for a voluntary code banning people from smoking at outdoor play

areas.
The idea has been put forward by the County Durham Tobacco Control Alliance, which includes Durham County Council.

The alliance believes by reducing children's exposure to smoking and making it less socially acceptable, children are less likely to take up the habit themselves. Cllr Lucy Hovvels, Durham County Council's Cabinet member

for safer and healthier communities, said: "More than 80,000 people die from smoking related diseases every year in England. "We want to prevent as many of those deaths as Table 11. want to prevent as many of those deaths as possible, not just by encouraging people to stop smoking, but by deterring them from taking up the habit in the first place.

"We know from research that young people are most at risk of becoming smokers if they grow up in communities where smoking is the norm.
"Making our play areas and play parks smoke-free is one of the

ways in which we could change that social norm and hopefully prevent young people from taking up smoking."

If a consultation goes ahead and members of the public are in support of the idea, 178 play areas owned by the county council

would be declared smoke-free.

The owners of the remaining 129 play areas would be asked to sign up to the voluntary code, placing posters and stickers at play areas advising people not to smoke. Cabinet meets at The Witham, in Barnard Castle on Wednesday, 11th June.



After taking over as executive chairman at Eutechnyx in 2013, the 45-year-old has more time to focus on his other interests, including a prominent role at the fledgling Lakes Distillery in Bassenthwaite, Cumbria, and his new position at GNAAS. Mr Jobling is no stranger to the

world of aviation as he holds a licence to fly both helicopters and fixed wing aircraft. His new role is not about getting behind the controls of the GNAAS helicopters, however, but making sure the charity is



raising enough money to keep the service airborne. "I'm here to support the chief

executive and to ensure we are raising enough money to keep the aircraft flying," he said.

"This isn't about coming in and making sweeping changes, it's about continuing the great work and promoting the charity, what it does and stands for in the region.
"It still isn't widely known

that the Great North Air Ambulance Service is 100 per cent charitably funded. Since 2001, this charity has grown rapidly to become a leader in the field of pre-hospital care.

a Future for Girls

SCHOOLGIRLS in the region will have the opportunity to gain an insight into a career in manufacturing and engineering with the help of a leading training provider workshop.

She said: "We're currently working on the development of Girls into Engineering workshops, intended delivery secondary into from September schools 2014. It's a focused campaign



of improvement with a targeted approach and measureable outcome.

"I came through apprenticeship route SWDT myself and have seen first-hand how great a career in engineering and manufacturing can be. I'm delighted to play a part in introducing the next generation to the industry and hope to see schools across the board sign up to take part in the workshops."

The drive behind the call for women in engineering comes as Government announce a national shortage of engineers required to drive forward the economic recovery and future growth within the sectors.

Miss Chapman, added: "We have a noticeable disproportion in male-to-female learners SWDT, which currently stands at a 14:1 ratio. We have recognised this as an area for improvement, not only to tackle the gender bias issues in industry, but as an area for recruitment to address the

engineering skills shortage as a whole.

"With this repeated fact comes the extreme underrepresentation of women in industry and it is within our own values as a training provider to ensure that we strive for equality of opportunity. The Government is looking at ways of trying to remedy the problem and at SWDT we're embracing that." The role of female apprentices will also be addressed at an upcoming business conference hosted by SWDT on 8th, July. 

GREAT PROSPECTS FOR BIG RISE IN CHILDREN CONTACTING CHILDLINE ON PARENTS' DRINKING & DRUG-TAKING

The number of children counselled by ChildLine because their parents were drinking too much or taking drugs more than doubled last year - averaging 15 counselling sessions a day to the free, 24hour helpline.

ChildLine carried out 5,323 sessions with children worried about their parents' abuse of drink or drugs - up from 2,509 the previous year. Most of the children counselled were 12 to 15 years old, although one in 10 were of primary school age. The figures contrast with a long-term fall in violent crime in England and Wales, thought to be partially influenced by the rising cost of alcohol.3 Research is needed to explain the sudden increase but it would appear that more children are witnessing drunken behaviour and experiencing violence at home, or they are more aware that help is available.

Many children told ChildLine that they lived in fear of their parents' anger, with one in six saying they'd been physically hurt by their mum or dad when they were under the influence. Some reported living in dirty and even dangerous surroundings, lacking essentials because money was frittered on alcohol or drugs.

Children spoke of feeling helpless and not knowing where to go for support. 19 per cent said the stress of their

situation had led to them feeling depressed, self-harming, or having suicidal thoughts.

One child told ChildLine: "My dad has been drinking and taking drugs a lot recently - it's ruining our family. He gets angry when he has been drinking so he says nasty things to us like we are stupid and worthless. I'm finding it difficult to deal with because underneath it all I know he's a really good dad." 4

Sue Minto, Head of ChildLine, "These shocking ChildLine statistics are sadly only one small piece of the jigsaw. Official estimates are that more than 250,000 children in the UK have parents with drug problems, and three in 10 children live with at least one binge-drinking parent.

"It's heart-breaking that so many young people struggle alone because they do not know where to go for help or are unsure of what might happen if they speak to someone. They may fear being taken away from their families by social services and put into care and believe that they are protecting their family by keeping quiet.

"Some children tell us their parents are under stress and it may be that they are using drink and drugs to blot out worries about jobs, money or housing issues. But whatever the reasons behind the rise, it's vital that anyone who knows a parent with drink or drug problems takes action to get

that family help so that their children are protected."

Children can seek help by contacting ChildLine on 0800 1111 or at childline.org.uk. Adults with concerns about a child should call the NSPCC helpline on 0808 800 5000.

The NSPCC is using public donations to fund specific services for families affected by drug and alcohol problems and is building an evidence base to help statutory services better meet the needs of children growing up in such circumstances.5 One NSPCC programme, FEDUP, helps parents understand and reduce the impact of their behaviour and provides a safe space for children aged between five and 12 to talk about their feelings.





the County Council. Great Aycliffe Residents Association
