COUNCIL DID NOT INVITE THE HUNT

A row has broken out over the Zetland Hunt's "Meet" held on Heighington Village Green on Tuesday 17th January.

The press notice issued by the British Field Sports Society stated the Parish council had "invited" the Hunt and in so doing had restored a long lost tradition.

Apparently, as there was no Parish Council Meetings between November and January to receive an application for the Hunt to meet on the Green, Counc. Joe Sewell rang the Chairman and a majority of his colleagues to agree to it taking place.

Following a public outcry over the Council's support for blood sport, Councillors not contacted by Joe Sewell have condemned the telephone vote as improper. "No official application has been made and the Council have not debated and voted on rescinding the previous resolution passed in 1973 to ban the Meet" said Counc. Les Garnett.

We spoke to the Chairman, Les Blades of Redworth, who agreed, and told us there was no decision made to change the 1973 resolution. "In fact it is more pertinent now than then, as the Council is very concerned about dog fouling in the Village, generally, and it is unlikely we would invite 50 hounds onto the Village Green," said Counc. Blades. He recalled Counc. Sewell asking him, on a casual

chance meeting, whether he had any personal objections to the Hunt and he said no. "But this did not constitute an invitation or give permission" he added.

The Meet was banned in 1973 because horseboxes and heavy vehicles were damaging the Green. Horses are allowed on the Green by ancient statute, and now vehicles have to park well away from horseriders and hounds, some Councillors considered it unharmed and a welcome rural activity.

They may not have taken into account the strong views of anti-blood sport groups. Some fanatics are known to cause a lot of trouble and Heighington's peace could be shattered by saboteurs and unwelcome police and media attention.

"The Hunt have always met in or near the Village and to allow them on the Green was thought harmless if it could have been kept quiet, but the press announcement was counter productive" said one Councillor.

It seems the "Meet" attracted no trouble on this occasion. They met at 11am and moved off to hunt foxes at 11.15pm.

The matter will be discussed at the next Council Meeting and there is a possibility Counc. Sewell and his supporters will be in for some criticism.

A statement is expected confirming the Parish Council's original 1973 decision.

CHANGES MADE TO COUNCILLORS ALLOWANCES

Local authorities in England and Wales will have greater freedom in future to decide the level of councillor's allowances, Local Government Minister David Curry announced today.

The changes will include scrapping the ceiling on what leading councillors can be paid in allowances in recognition of their special responsibilities. Mr Curry stressed, however, that although the changes will give councils more freedom to decide how to spend money available for allowances, no additional resources will be made available.

In a written reply to a parliamentary Question from Warren Hawksley MP (Halesowen & Stourbridge), Mr Curry explained:

"In the light of the comments we received during that consultation my Rt. Hon. Friend will bring forward amending regulations which will give local authorities in England and Wales much greater discretion to decide how much councillors should be paid in allowances.

"The current system of allowances is too prescriptive and places an unnecessary burden on local authorities. The changes to the system we propose to make will remove that burden, and will encourage people with a wide range of skills to serve as councillors. "The draft regulations will:

(a) remove the overall limit on what may be spent by authorities on their allowances schemes;

(b) remove the requirement on local authorities to pay a special responsibility allowance or allowances and, where they decide they will pay such allowances, remove the upper limit on the level of allowances which can be paid to individual councillors; where special responsibility allowances are paid, the requirement that a least one member of a minority group on each authority should receive a special responsibility allowance will continue;

(c) require the payment of a basic allowance to all councillors * but will not specify the level of allowance to be paid;

(d) permit the payment of attendance allowances and specify arrange of single member duties which will be eligible for the payment of attendance allowances - these will be limited to statutory duties which councillors must perform but for which, currently, they are not able to claim attendance allowances if they perform them alone - including visits to children's homes, other social services' residential establishments and special schools;

(e) require local authorities to publish details of the allowances schemes they make and to publish an annual report of the payments made to individual councillors under the scheme in order to ensure accountability."

My Rt. Hon. Friend will shortly consult local government about draft regulations which will implement the new system. The new allowances system will be in place from 1 April 1995.

"WE HAVE REQUESTED DOUBLE YELLOW LINES FOR YEARS" say Councillors

Our article in last week's issue concerning dangerous parking by parents outside their child's school premises provoked strong reaction from many people wanting to solve the problem.

Counc. Dave Elliott informed us that he and Counc. Eric White had campaigned for years for double yellow lines outside all schools, but the County Council will not listen or act on their proposals.

"They think it wrong to inconvenience nearby residents, but surely safety of children is more important and I can't see those residents objecting, as it would improve matters for them too!" said Counc. Elliott.

There has also been a suggestion that School grounds be used to get cars off the

roads. The Council say they can't endanger children on school property. Is it okay for them to be at risk once outside the School gates? Another suggestion is a by law imposed with a strict "No Waiting" order outside school premises for a half hour each side of opening and leaving times.

"The Police say there is not a lot they can do, but surely it is against the law to obstruct roads and footpaths" said Dave.

The County Council must get down to solving this problem causing absolute mayhem outside school premises. It is difficult to understand how they can teach and preach road safety to children and at the same time allow this dangerous and chaotic situation to continue.

Icy conditions are part of our Winter and way of life. Most of us except slipping and sliding on footpaths as unavoidably "seasonal". But spare a thought for those who have difficulty walking at the best of times. How do they cope with ice and slush? In fact - they don't, and have to stay indoors till the thaw.

Elderly and disabled people tend to be housed in the same areas usually in specially adapted bungalows - yet very little is done to help them in bad winter weather and they become prisoners in their own homes.

They can put salt down to make their own garden paths safe but to attempt a journey to the shops along a public pavement is sui-

cidal and hospital wards are full of people who have tried.

A couple of Beechfield residents pleaded with the Council to help by salting or clearing footpaths, but they could not think of a way to help. It would, after all, need an army of men to clear every street. There is an army of men on the dole, could they be employed for extra money on top of that already received?

Or why don't we adopt the practice of some other countries by being responsible for clearing the footpath immediately outside our home?

And wouldn't it be nice if those that could not remove ice or snow, due to age or infirmity, were helped by their neighbours?

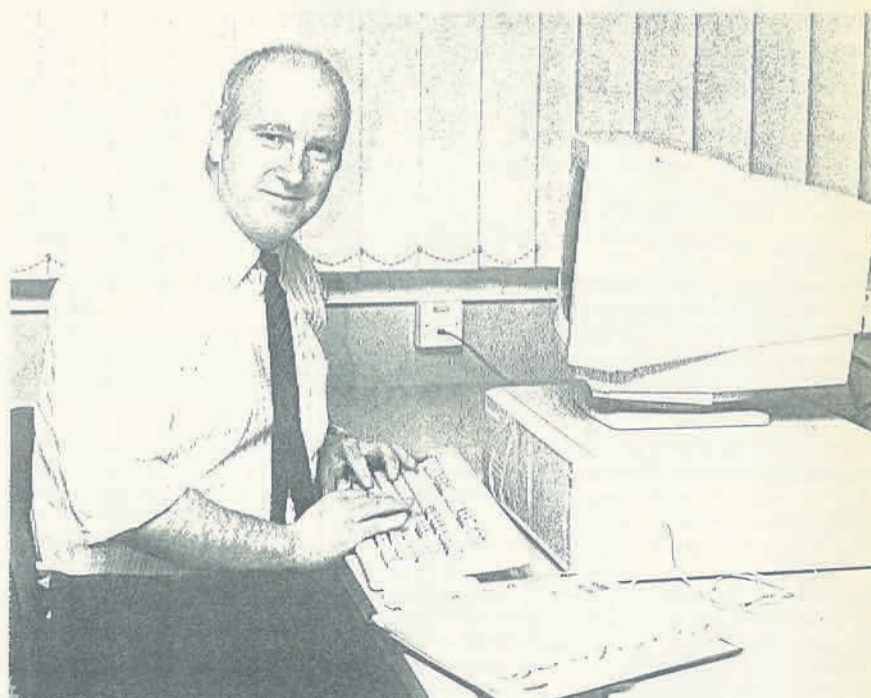

TOWN SOLDIER TOP COLLEGE QUALIFIER FOR "CIVVY STREET"



Stockton born Staff Sergeant Ernest Henderson leaves the Army in a couple of weeks time, hoping to begin a new life in Civvy Street as a career advisor

having completed a remarkable trio for record achievements as a mature student at Monkwearmouth College, Sunderland. The 39 year old sergeant, who did two tours in Northern Ireland during his 23 years Army service and gained the nickname "Doctor Death" while in the Falklands, is the first Monkwearmouth College student to obtain a Level 3 Administration NVQ qualification via the APL route.

Not only that, he achieved it in record time and has topped even that by being chosen for a special prize as the best part-time APL student out of well over 100. Sgt. Henderson, advisor and manager of the Army Careers Office in Durham for the past six years, lives at Greenfields, Newton Aycliffe, with his wife Carole and two teenage sons.

In a race against time to gain this latest qualification before his Army service officially ended, his day for the past nine months has begun at 5.30am until late into the night in order to combine work with study.

"It's been hectic and exhausting nine months but it has been well worth

it" he says. "Now, with this important qualification to add to others I've obtained over the years, I'm hoping to persuade employers to give me a chance to do the job I most want to do - helping young people as a career advisor".

Joining the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers at the age of 17 to be trained as a metalsmith, he rose the ranks to become the youngest sergeant and staff sergeant in the Corps.

When he volunteered for the post of Army Careers Advisor, he was in charge of large numbers of skilled Army tradesman. At one time he was responsible for the repair and maintenance of the Royal family cars.

His "Doctor Death" tag in the Falklands was the result of him using his metalsmith skill to seal coffins in lead caskets. He explains "There was no Coroner on the island and all bodies had to be flown back to the UK for autopsy".

Sgt. Henderson has only one fear. It is that the negative stereotyping of ex-service personnel by some employers will jeopardise his chances of a new career.

"Ex-servicemen should not be dismissed lightly from consideration by employers" he says "Their training in the services is as good as any that can be given outside and, buy their virtue, they are resourceful, innovative and dependable."


