Eight Resolutions to Make Aycliffe Better

New Year is the time when many people set goals for themselves for the coming year - here are some suggestions of resolutions citizens could make which would make 2015 a great year for the town

1. BIG UP THE TOWN

Aycliffe is rapidly growing in regional importance, and we can all play our part by emphasising the positives. Of course we all wish to improve our town, but in public we need to sing its

2. "IT'S THE ECONOMY STUPID"

There are no more government handouts - we live in a world where, if the local economy fails, we all suffer, and some of us starve. In particular Aycliffe Business Park is the key to our future; it needs to figure large in all our decisions. 3. LET'S HANG ON TO WHAT WE'VE GOT

The government is systematically reducing funding to local government, and the days when 'the council' could clear up litter, vandalism and neglect faster than it occurs are gone. We need at local level a campaign against littering and vandalism, and a joint-effort to care for the facilities we retain.

4. A VOLUNTEERING COMMUNITY

In the region, Aycliffe is envied for its large number of community centres and voluntary groups. But when I speak to the heroic volunteers who give up their time (in some cases their lives) to run these facilities, many worry that they are getting older and that there seem to be few people to follow on after them. Of course, not everyone is in a position to be able even to think of volunteering. But we need as a community to support our local community ventures, not just by attending, but - if possible - by volunteering to help.

5. DRY JANUARY

There is a national campaign to give up alcohol for January. Whilst you may think total abstinence a step too far, it is a fact that, if we could eliminate drunkenness from our social scene, we would significantly reduce vandalism, traffic accidents, violent crime, self-harm and suicides, domestic violence, childneglect and many other social ills, since many of these problems are alcohol-fuelled.

6. SUPPORT YOUR LOCAL TEAM

Aycliffe hosts a premier division basketball team. Its football club is in the first division of the Northern League. We have successful rugby and cricket teams. Every one of them would welcome more supporters cheering them on. 7. MONEY CHANGES EVERYTHING

We have some fabulous shops and local businesses in the town centre, but we have got ourselves into a vicious circle where people do not go to the town centre because they think the retail offer is lacking, and shops are not coming to the town centre because the public spend there does not make them sufficiently profitable. If every family would resolve to buy from the town centre where it can, we would at least be doing what we can do to stimulate our town centre retail provision. 8. 'DO' POLITICS

Proper politics is an informed debate about the decisions, rules and institutions which frame our lives. It will help our town move forward if people would take a greater interest and engagement in what is happening, locally as well as nationally.

"People Want to Buy British" says Aycliffe Director

Figures on increased credit card spending and a trade gap of more than £5bn are signs that UK companies should produce more goods for the domestic market, says leading Aycliffe manufacturing boss Pamela Petty. The Managing Director of

Ebac says the public's desire to buy British goods should be harnessed to create jobs and wealth in the UK.

Today's trade figures, covering imports and imports and exports in November 2014, show that the UK is a net importer, with the difference between imports and exports standing at £5.2bn, despite being a net exporter to non EU countries, with a £1bn surplus.

Pamela said: "The fact that spending on credit cards in the three months to Christmas was at its highest level since 2007, with banks and building societies predicting another rise in early 2015, shows the public's appetite to spend is on the increase. Whether this is down to growing confidence or greater access to credit, it indicates a period of opportunity for those who make and sell goods for the consumer market.

'As today's figures show we continue to import more than we export, in our relationship with other countries, particularly within the EU, it is time to acknowledge that the UK should be making more goods domestically. In terms of the economy, it is misguided to buy cheap from abroad, because we pay twice for the labour – once for the people who actually make the items abroad, and again in benefits payments to those who could be doing the job here.

"We have seen a real appetite for domestically-manufactured goods, with the re-launch of the Norfrost freezer range and the demand for UK-made washing machines, which will soon be coming off our production lines. This demand has led to deals with Argos and Amazon to stock the chest freezers, while there is also significant interest from major retailers for the washing machines. "The UK, particularly areas such as the North East, where we are based, was once known as a manufacturing powerhouse. We have the people, and we have the knowhow, to make things

DISABLED BADGE **ABUSE**

A County Durham woman who allowed another driver to use her disabled parking badge to get free parking in London has appeared in court.

Karen Heslop, 44, of Hillside, Chester-le-Street, in was ordered to pay a total of £550 after she admitted one offence under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984. Magistrates in Peterlee heard

yesterday (Jan 6) that when Mrs Heslop applied to Durham County Council for the blue badge, in February 2013, she had given the registration number of the vehicle she said she would be using.

The court was told that on 11 occasions, between 23 September 2013 and 3 April 2014 fraud investigators observed the same vehicle parked in the Hammersmith and Fulham area of London. On each occasion there was no pay and display ticket inside the car but the blue badge issued to Mrs Heslop was on display. Further investigations revealed that the vehicle was registered to a woman in Newcastle and did not have a valid residents' permit to park in Fulham.

In mitigation the court heard that this was not a case where a blue badge had been obtained from the council by deception but Mrs Heslop did admit she had been deceitful in allowing the badge to be used incorrectly by another person.

Mrs Heslop was fined £200, with £330 costs, and ordered to pay a £20 victim surcharge



On January morning, а 82-year-old Irene (name changed to protect her identity) slowly made her way towards the Helping Hands office.

Impeccably dressed in headto-toe blue, she looked ready for a party or special event. But on this particular day, circumstances she hadn't chosen brought her there for an unexpected need to request help.

Once inside, Irene hesitantly stepped up to the reception desk. Like most elderly people, she had always worked hard to care for herself and was ashamed to be reaching out for help.

She leaned forward and quietly said, "I'm 82 years old and I'm so embarrassed to be here." Gently, Linzi reminded her that we are all in this together, there is no shame in getting help, and that she was happy to be there for her. That compassion instantly comforted Irene, melting away her uneasiness and misconceptions about receiving assistance. Linzi said to her, 'Poverty does not discriminate. It does not target a specific gender, race,

financial class, or age. In Newton Aycliffe where most people don't think twice about making a trip to the local food shop, there are thousands of people who face hunger every day-including senior citizens"

Stories like Irene's are all too

common, there are people who are struggling financially and going hungry. The idea of senior citizens being hungry may come as a surprise to people, but it's very much a

People lives working are now living through their golden years finding it difficult to get by. Limited income and savings combined with rising living costs make budgeting difficult.

Bringing food and goods directly to the people who need them the most is the aim, but getting it there is no easy task. Ordering is done generally before 7am, then wagons are used to deliver the supplies. Preparations for distribution begin a week in advance. Once the goods are brought in on pallets, it takes approximately ten volunteers load and unload, restock the shelves and make up the household packs.

Thankfully, Helping Hands have been able to help over 3,000 people during 2014 but we now need more supporters to meet the demand.



CLEAR PATHS AND DRIVES WITHOUT FEAR OF BEING SUED

As amber weather-warnings are issued across many parts of the UK, personal injury lawyers have reassured homeowners that they can clear paths and driveways of snow or ice without fear of being sued. "Every single winter someone somewhere stirs the myth that Good Samaritans shouldn't be helpful and clear snow because they will be sued if someone then falls and is injured. It's absurd," said solicitor John Spencer, president of not-forprofit group the Association of Personal Injury Lawyers (APIL) which campaigns on behalf of injured people.

"Excuse the pun, but let's clear this up right now. There is a distinct difference between a simple accident and negligence which causes an injury when it comes to making a legal claim. 'Whoever clears the snow or ice would have to be negligent be liable for someone to else's injury," said John. "For example, using hot water to melt snow which is then going to re-freeze and create a dangerous sheet of ice would be negligent, as well as foolish. Some salt or sand and a shovel will do the job safely. Use your common sense and no-one will get hurt.

John added that a Bill approved last week by the House of Lords which aims to remove the fear of being sued for people performing helpful acts 'hits the wrong mark' He said: "This myth about

clearing paths is a perfect example of why the Social Action, Responsibility and Heroism Bill hits the wrong mark. The law is fine, but it is public understanding which isn't right and which could Good Samaritans prevent from acting to help others. Education, not legislation, is the way to deal with misconceptions".

As the Met Office has issued yellow weather warnings of ice and snow for much of the of country, roads are expected to be gritted to prevent snow from settling. The IAM's chief examiner, Peter Rodger is offering advice to motorists to better cope with driving on road surfaces that have been recently treated.

1. If weather conditions are severe in your area you should take notice of police advice and simply don't travel. However, in exceptional circumstances if you must go out make sure you drive safely with extra caution on icy roads 2. Sa

Salt will often make the windscreen, headlights, number plate and rear parts of your car very dirty. Cars without headlamp washers, for example, will lose an estimated 40% of luminosity, and possibly all their focus in about 20 miles on a damp, gritted motorway. When travelling long distances it is advised that you stop regularly at service stations to clean your

windscreen and headlights with a clean cloth. Or keep a filled gallon of water in the car boot to give your lights, windows and mirrors a quick wash over – a handy investment to top up your

nandy investment to top up your windscreen washer reservoir when needed too.
3. When driving on a busy road avoid overtaking a gritting lorry as the road ahead may not be treated yet. If you have any doubt, don't risk it. Never overtake a second purpt in heart overtake a snow plough in heavy snow conditions.

4. While roads may be gritted to give you better traction some areas may not be completely treated, leaving ice patches exposed. You should therefore drive at a steady pace - ensuring the safety of you and your

passengers. 5. It's important you keep your car clean throughout the winter as the salt in grit can cause external damage such as corrosion to exposed suspension parts. Ensure you thoroughly wash underneath your car when you can to stop salt from settling.
