

The County Council are now having to review their processes. I intend to bring the proposed use of Elmfield land to the attention of this Government Inspector What has happened since 2009 in providing new Schools in Durham County?

Schools in Durham County? I hope our two councillors take note as this is what they should be fighting for rather than housing. New state-of-the-art Schools built since 2009 include Brandon, Esh Whinning, Kirk Merrington,

Greenland Community School., Shotton Hall, Durham Trinity School, an Academy also at Shotton Hall, Sedgefield Community College and North Durham Academy - all closed and moved to newly built schools.

This can be done at Elmfield if our County Councillors start doing what is required

for the West Ward instead of following what the Labour controlled council want to happen.

They are only interested in building new houses, but if we look around the West Ward and Newton Aycliffe generally there are many houses standing empty.

If a Community Centre is built on the Elmfield site I am only too pleased I will not be living next to it! Just take a look at the one we have in the west ward, Silverdale House. Vast amounts of ratepayers money has been spent on it and still doesn't function in the best interests of the public. The two West Ward



Ebac Boss Appointed New GAMP Decide on Chairman of College Board 2015 - 2016 Priorities

leading North East businesswoman has been appointed as chair of the Bishop Auckland College Corporate Board. Pamela Petty, managing director of international manufacturer Ebac, takes over the reins from Prof. Alan Townsend. Newton Aycliffe based Ebac, which manufactures water coolers, dehumidifiers and air conditioning units for industrial, office and domestic use, has grown

from a small family run firm to a £25m turnover global business employing 220 staff.

Mrs Petty, an ex-student of the college who studied A Level Accounts there as part of her accountancy training nearly 30 years ago, is also governor of a primary school in Barnard Castle and a non executive board member of the Entrepreneurs' Forum.

She joined Ebac, which was launched by her father John Elliott MBE in 1972, back in 1986 and headed up the Group IT department before being promoted to manufacturing director in 1997, then to her current position of Group MD in 2003.

SEVEN WAYS SUCCESSIVE GOVERNMENTS HAVE TARGETED THE NORTH EAST

Dear Sir

So, John D. Clare has only just come to realise that the further you are from Westminster the smaller share you get Government spending. of This has always been the case for as far back as I can remember However, if he were to publish the relative spending allocations at the end of Gordon Brown's New Labour Government your readers could decide if David Cameron is the real villain!

I have to agree with him on his statistics but cannot leave David Cameron to shoulder the blame for any of them. It is all down to party politics and the fact that since New Labour bankrupted the economy, the available spending 'pot' is smaller and the party in Government is bound to spend more in constituencies where it is likely to win the seat. Simple!

Thus, for 12 years, New Labour ignored the North East where they had safe seats and spent disproportionately in the south to try and win and keep the southern seats. Before he won the election Tony Blair said that he had to make New Labour a more 'centralist' party with wider appeal. This he did, and ignored the North East and his / our constituency thereafter! The Coalition Government is just doing the same but with a smaller 'pot' of money to spend.

Tell it like it is Mr Clare, don't ignore or try and re-write history! David Cameron is only echoing Tony Blair. The difference is that New Labour supporters in the North East thought that Blair would be true to his North East power base; however history shows

that he was more preoccupied with the 'Tony Blair legacy (and getting his snout into the Westminster trough).

In the end he stepped down and handed his 'poisoned chalice' to Gordon Brown who had "prudently" sold our gold reserves at the bottom of the market and then proceeded to "prudently" bankrupt the country.

There are fewer unemployed people in the North East now than there were at the end of 12 years of New Labour. However, the south have got 12 new jobs to every 1 in the North East. Could this be that the non-Labour Councils in the south are working with the Coalition Government better than the North East Labour Councils?

The fact of the matter is that all governments of whatever political persuasion have courted the southern voter because that is where they have to win seats; they spend money in the south.

A shed load of money is to be spent on HS2 and it doesn't even reach the North East proper! Why has no North East Labour politician suggested we start building HS2 at Newcastle and end it in the South? This way, the money would be spent up front in the North East economy and HS2 would increasingly improve travel here before it is completed and drains further money south out of the North East.

The sad fact for Labour voters is that a vote for Labour is a vote for a Westminster focused government. Neither Labour nor the Conservatives see wooing North East voters a priority. Labour need to

Scottish their power-base while the Coalition Parties have to fend off UKIP. The only hope for the North East is a protest vote (e.g. for the Green Party or UKIP), Only then will a Westminster Government have to heed how the North East votes Alastair P. G. Welsh Ayclife Village

AUTHOR BETS ON GRAND NATIONAL WINNER NAMED AFTER HIS BOOK TITLE

It is nearing the calendar dates for those prestigious jump races: The Cheltenham Gold Cup, The Aintree Grand National and The Scottish Grand National. Newtonian Steven Corner, a lecturer at Darlington College, has driven his passion for National Hunt racing into his second novel, 'The Whispering Pegasus.'

The story follows a fictional local trainer, jockey and former SAS member, John Brennan, as they fight to keep John's brother's prized chaser safe so he can rank alongside Red Rum. Arkle and Desert Orchid.

Steven has presented his novel to the 1968 Grand National winning trainer, Mr Denys Smith, whose yard was based at South Church, Bishop Auckland. Denys trained the winner, Red Alligator and retained the services of Aintree legend jockey, Brian Fletcher, who later rode Red Rum twice to National victory. It was the exploits of Denys and Brian that inspired Steven to write his novel.

The author has also placed a bet with Coral Racing that a horse bearing the name, 'Whispering Pegasus' will go on to win the Grand National within ten years. The bookies must think this outcome is achievable and have offered odds of 200-1! Mr Corner has placed a bet of £20 and the slip is held in a Coral Shop



safe. Mr Corner has contacted jump trainers like Jonjo O'Neil and local Sedgefield owner, John Wade, to ask if they would consider naming one of their future jump stars, Whispering Pegasus'.

The rules of horse racing forbid horses having names longer that 18 characters: Whispering Pegasus is within these rules and there is no jump race, in training, that bears this name. "I think the real question is whether the eventual real horse can match the deeds of the fictional horse", concludes Mr Corner, The Whispering Pegasus is available as a paperback or eBook from Amazon and the

have told Government and local authorities they must try harder and stop fining mums and dads who take their children out of school for family holidays in term time. According to a nationwide survey of 7,000 households

– 179 in Durham - a massive 68% of parents complained that head teachers deserved a D minus and should not have the right to penalise parents, with 57% adding that it was now time to stagger school holidays. Even worse some 70%

accused the Government of once again acting like a nanny state over the issue while calling for an immediate change in the law to allow parents to take their children on holiday anvtime.

The survey, commissioned bv Questor Insurance Services, based in Rainham, Kent, was not totally one sided. Of those that supported the school policy 52% said taking children away in term time disrupted their education and made it difficult for the school.

"The survey was originally intended to establish the views of households about travel insurance." said Andrew Lawrence. managing director of Questor, "and we were not

Mums and Dads in Durham expecting such a response to the second part of our questionnaire which covered holiday habits. It really does seem that parents feel strongly about this issue."

> These views were reinforced with 77% of parents saying it was not selfish to take children on holiday in term time with predictably 30% of those saying it gives hard pressed families the chance of a less expensive holiday; 38% saying such occasions were good for a child's education and the rest claiming it was better for a family to have quality time together than no holiday at all.

STUDENTS VOLUNTEER Keepmoat Build Homes on Three New Sites TO HELP PLAN

Housing and regeneration specialist, Keepmoat, who are currently building homes at Cobblers Hall, continue to grow its presence in the North East by acquiring three new sites that will lead to an investment of £34m in the region.

Land in Stockton will be used to build 174 new homes 144 for sale and 30 affordable homes for Tristar Homes. The £18m project will be part of a regeneration partnership

initiative involving Stockton Borough Council and the HCA. Work started on site in January and the first homes will be and the first nonces ready to occupy in late spring. Through Durham Villages Regeneration Company, Keepmoat's joint venture with Durham County Council,they will be building 81 new homes in Sherburn Hill - 80 for sale and 5 affordable homes for Isos Housing. Work has started on site in the last few weeks and the local community will be

able to view the show homes

in July. The site of the former St Stephen's School in Longbenton set to be developed with 1S 41 new dwellings, 31 for sale and 10 affordable homes for Isos Housing. The scheme, which is the latest purchase by Keepmoat from the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle, is worth £5m. Works to demolish the former school have now started and the first homes will be completed in early summer.

Prescott, Ian and Partnership Director Keepmoat, commented: "We are delighted to continue to grow in the North East and these three new site acquisitions are set to make a significant positive impact on local communities, even more so as we plan to use local labour wherever possible to complete the developments." 

Support for Increase in Police Budget

A proposal to apply a small increase to the police element (precept) of Council Tax has been supported by the Durham Police and Crime Panel, at the Panel's meeting this week.

Ron Hogg, Durham's Police and Crime Commissioner, sought views from residents about the proposed precept increase, as part of his consultation, at annual events in shopping centres and community meetings, online and by telephone throughout January.

Residents who gave their overwhelmingly views agreed in favour of paying a small increase in the police element of the Council Tax, from April 2015.

An increase of 1.98% to the amount of Council Tax which goes to the police service will raise around £0.5m per year, and keep the equivalent of at least 10 police officers on the streets. Mr Hogg said: "In the face of austerity and the ongoing Government cuts

to police budgets, I am very conscious of the challenge that people face in terms of their household finances.

"I have taken residents' views from the consultation into account. I am committed to ensuring that the police have the resources they need to continue to provide an excellent service to the public."

For an individual household, this equates to just £2.11 over the year, or 4p a week for the average house in Band A

Mr Hogg continues to monitor the work Durham Constabulary has undertaken to increase value for money and to protect community policing.

According to Safer Roads, 2,000 people a year are saved by wearing seat belts. They say in the event of an accident if unrestrained, you will hit the windscreen, or the front seat in the case of a rear seat passenger at a force of 30 to 60 times your own body weight. The effectiveness of seat belts as a life saving device is without question.


Research has found that for drivers seat belts are 50% effective at preventing fatal injuries, 45% effective at preventing serious injuries and 25% effective at preventing minor injuries. It also found for front seat passengers, preventing fatal or serious injuries, and 20% effective at preventing minor injuries. Quite apart from safety factors, drivers caught without a seat belt face on-the-spot fines of £100 and

Back in 1965 all new cars sold were required to have seat belt anchorage points for the front outer seats. In 1967 the law was changed so all new cars were required to have seat belts fitted. In 1968, seat belts were required to be retro-fitted to all cars sold from 1965 The biggest development in seat belt development came in 1983 when it became compulsory for front seat occupants to wear one. 31 January marked the 32nd anniversary of the passing of the front seat belt law in the UK

Scattered Families Make

Proposals to Devolve Power to the North

Business leaders, residents and partner agencies across the North East are being invited to influence ambitious proposals which will see the area's Combined Authority lobby Government for significant devolved powers to boost economic growth in the

region. A letter inviting feedback on the North East Combined Authority's devolution prospectus is being issued across key partners and the business community. A high level of consensus has already been achieved on these outline proposals and neca will work closely with the North East LEP and other organisations to ensure that the proposals support delivery of 'More and Better Jobs' the North East's Strategic Economic Plan.

Cllr Simon Henig, Chair of neca said "We have been clear from the outset that we are committed to strengthening our economy by working with, and listening to, all stakeholders on key issues. Our proposals for regional powers over budgets and decision-making offer us all an important opportunity to collectively develop proposals which best suit our area, our businesses and our people.

"I am looking forward to receiving feedback on our outline proposals which have the potential to enable us to boost our region's economic prosperity and ensure decisions about the North East's economic future relating to skills, investment and transport are taken in the region.'
