The opening speech was given by Ed Miliband – he spoke very well, not at all the figure-of-ridicule the right-wing media make him out to be.



was 14 Luke Watson suffered an accident when his go kart left the track and crashed into a barrier. The impact shattered his ankle, fracturing and rotating the talus bone. Major surgery followed and Luke was wheelchair bound for three years. He was unable to go to school and had home tuition for two years leading up to his

where he had a metal cage built around his leg from toes to knee with a number of pins and pistons attached. The pistons had to be turned daily for 6 months to raise the foot back into position which solved the foot problem but as the bone had died his leg had stopped growing, and more surgery was needed. The cage went back on for another 6 months but this time the leg was surgically broken and the pistons turned every day to stretch the leg and stop the bone healing until the leg had reached the correct length. Luke also had a double

ankle fusion at the same time in an effort to stop the pain from the ankle joint.

Unfortunately all this was in vain, as he still had problems walking and the pain and high

levels of medication were getting too much - seriously effecting Luke's quality of life. He took the brave decision to elect for a below-the-knee amputation in 2013.

Rehab was tough but he battled through it and learned to walk with an artificial leg but needed to regain lost confidence and fitness. He tried Crossfit in Nottingham where he lives. "The Crossfit Luke says Nottingham coaches have been fantastic but the problem I face is my prosthetic leg not being compatible with exercise and it is causing problems with joints in my good leg and the knee and hip in my other leg. Unfortunately as good as the NHS have been they haven't got the funding for a specialist leg. Luke needs to raise £8000.

Agency Crimestoppers.Launched in November 2014. it is the biggest crackdown on the illegal dumping of waste ever seen in the county. The campaign also aims to remind householders that they are legally responsible for ensuring that anyone they use to dispose of their household waste - including furniture, household appliances and building materials - is properly registered with the Environment

Businesses are also reminded of their responsibility to check that the licences of the waste carriers Durham they use are correct.

Meanwhile, throughout December neighbourhood the council's neighbourhood protection team issued 34 fixed penalty notices – 30 were for littering, one was for dog fouling the council's

and three were for flytipping. The neighbourhood protection team is tasked with combatting crimes against the environment, which include flytipping, dog fouling, stray dogs, littering and antisocial behaviour. The team also handed out 47

community protection warnings – warning letters - and 14 community protection notices to properties with untidy gardens and yards. The notices give recipients 28 days to address the problem or face further action.

The taskforce responded to 27 reports of antisocial behaviour and it was called to 117 incidents flytipping and we regularly carry out stop and check operations to make sure all waste carriers are licenced. CCTV cameras are also proving to be an effective tool by providing robust evidence to help successfully prosecute those who


