
After many months of planning and building our premises have now got a fresh new look and are proving to be very popular with new and old customers. The association raise the funding needed to maintain and run the Scout Centre. Most of this funding is generated from the bar sales and hall hire

which is one of the reasons an extension to the bar was considered to be necessary. This has enabled us to increase our customer base and generate more income. For the year ending 31/12/2012 the cost of the heating, lighting, rates, water, insurance and cleaning amounted to  $\pounds 15,427$ , so you can see that a great deal of

money is required. We do not get any funding or grant aid from the Council or scouting organisations - all the money is from our supporters. The centre is run by volunteers

and the scouting groups use the premises free of charge. The money spent on the building and renovations was raised over a number of years from donations and a four small group which had few small grants which had been applied for to hopefully extend the premises on a much larger scale. Due to rising costs and some problems with the original plans the second hall which was planned could not be built. It was therefore decided to use the money to improve the existing building. and we are planning a small extension to the hall to provide additional toilets and a couple of small meeting rooms when funds allow.

Unfortunately due to the losses suffered during recent breakins and the cost of repairing the damage, much of the money which was available to put towards this has been used so we do not know at the moment when we will be able to complete this part of the plan. We would like to thank We would like to thank everyone who has helped with the building in any way in particular we would like to thank Bespoke Flooring, PAR Design and Build Services Ltd. ### **Rotary Club, Barclays and Boots Support Scanner Appeal Residents Asked to Buy Raffle Tickets**

Over the last decade MRI scanning has increasingly become the preferred method used bv Cardiologists and Cardiac Surgeons foi diagnosing heart problems. It has considerable advantages over traditional methods, providing very detailed images of the heart, including the condition of the muscle, tissue and valves. This enables treatment to be specifically targeted, leading to

significantly improved results for patients. The James Cook University Hospital in Middlesbrough currently has two MRI currently has two MRI scanners that are available for use by all departments other than Neurology which has its own dedicated facility. In response to the continually increasing demand across the board for MRI scanning, JCUH has recently committed some  $\pounds 2.3M$ , including  $\pounds 0.3M$  from the SCHF, to replacing the oldest scanner with a new 'state of the art' machine that will be used for most of the general

purpose scanning. Commissioning of the new scanner will release significantly more time for

heart scans on the second of the existing machines, for which it is more suitable than the new machine. However, its well below the 2000 per year that is recognised as desirable for the JCUH catchment area of some 1.6 million people.

If heart scanning capacity is not increased to this level, the regional Cardiothoracic Centre at JCUH may lose its place in the ten dividing of place in the top division of Cardiothoracic Units, with heart patients in the hospital's catchment area unable to benefit from this advanced diagnosis and treatment. There is also the likelihood that, as a consequence, it may no longer be possible to recruit and retain the best professionals.

To address the above issue, the opportunity exists to refurbish and upgrade the second of the existing scanners at a cost of £0.5M to meet the required level of 2000 per year. However, because of funding

shortfalls, South Tees Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust has declared that it will not be in a position to commit to this investment for the foreseeable future

It is against this background that the SCHF, with support from JCUH, has decided to mount an appeal to raise the £0.5M that is required. Erimus Middlesbrough





### **Benefits Won for Local People** | Popular Model Railway Exhibition Returns from New Rail Franchises

The North East Combined Authority has welcomed 'Invitations to Tender' for the Northern and TransPennine Express rail franchises published today, promising a better deal for passengers, additional journeys across the region and new local accountability for how services are delivered.

The neca has been working on behalf of local authorities to secure improvements to services and devolution of decision making in the new franchise specifications.

Cllr Nick Forbes, lead member for transport on the neca and leader of Newcastle City Council, said: "We have secured a commitment to replace the much-maligned Pacer train, improvements to evening and weekend services, and a requirement for substantial investment in the region's stations.

"Whoever wins the new franchise must also support community rail partnerships and join the roll-out of smart ticketing, which the Combined Authority is already bringing to bus and Metro in the North East.

"Crucially for this region, bidders for the Northern franchise will also be required to show how they will deliver a specific management unit for North East England, giving local people a say in how services are delivered. "I now challenge the shortlisted bidders for both franchises to commit to enhancements beyond the minimum requirements in the specifications, to deliver true transformation to the region's rail network and progress towards the vision set out in the neca's long-term rail strategy."



### OUT OF DARKNESS **INTO DARKNESS!**

#### Dear Sir.

I used to teach History first we had The Dark Ages then much later The Age of Enlightenment. It was natural evolution. It was progress and part of what Bronowski called 'The Ascent of Man'. Durham County Council, with their decision (after a flawed and prejudicial consultation process) to turn off the lights on many major urban roads within the county are turning this all on its head.

They plan to take us on a journey from enlightenment, back to the Dark Ages. It is crass and downright dangerous! What with all the gizmos, that we all concentrate on to some extent within our cars, drivers need the existing urban highway lighting. More cost effective lighting, yes, but not doing away with it. Durham County Council

have put the cart before the horse. They began with a decision to turn off the lights and then wanted evidence to prove their case. So they observed roads, such as the A 167, between Aycliffe Village and Rushvford, on such as a light, bright sunny September basically when morning there would be few real problems - as the basis of their evidence. This beggars belief! If they had really been serious about consultation and gathering evidence, they would have informed the public that they were turning off all major urban highway lighting (none Motorway) for a period of 48 hours, in the middle of January. Can you imagine the chaos that would

### **Illegal Tobacco Sold from Ice Cream Van near School**

An ice cream van known to park near primary schools in County Durham was raided as part of the latest crackdown on illicit tobacco sales.

Trading Standards officers County Durham from Council and police officers from Durham Constabulary searched the ice cream van at its storage location on a West Auckland farm, along with several other vehicles and a house in Bishop Auckland.

The raids were carried out on Wednesday evening (25 February) following tip offs that suspected counterfeit cigarettes were being sold from the van, which has been known to stop close to some primary schools. However, it is not known if any sales were made to children. As a result of the raids a man

and a woman were arrested and 4,560 cigarettes and 20.35kg of hand rolling tobacco was seized along with a large amount of cash. The cigarettes are believed to be 'cheap whites' made especially for the illegal market and the hand rolling tobacco is believed to be smuggled. The Department for Transport has announced a range of improvements to local rail services on the busy Darlington to Bishop Auckland railway line.

The improvements from part of a much wider package that will see rail services transformed right across the north and brought into the 21st century. Local rail users can look forward to the current 2 hourly service to Bishop Auckland being increased to hourly, more Sunday trains and newer rolling stock with the current fleet of aging 'pacer'

trains finally being replaced by modern, more comfortable carriages. The improvements have been

included in the new Northern franchise which is due to start March 2016 with most timetable improvements due to be in place by 2019. The franchise sets out the minimum level of service that must be provided, so local rail passengers can confidently expect the improvements will be delivered. Charlie Walton, the Chairman

of the Bishop Line community rail partnership said. 'This is



fantastic news for local rail users; we have been talking to the Department for Transport for many years now about the need to improve local train services in the north and they have finally listened to us.

'Patronage on our local rail line has increased sharply over recent years and we need more trains to deal with the extra passengers. The Bishop Auckland to Darlington rail line plays an important role in regenerating the economies of County Durham, Darlington and the wider North East, helping people get to work, to the shops and to education, and tourism, opportunities, so this is great news for our local economy as well.'

Local rail users have long complained about the ageing rolling stock used on the

Bishop Auckland line. These 'pacer' trains which date from the early 1980s are jokingly referred to as cattle trucks by long suffering rail commuters and are used on local rail services right across the north of England. The new franchise will see these old trains phased out and replaced by a fleet of modern trains over the life of the new franchise. Charlie went on to say that

'We have long called for the removal of pacer trains from our railway lines here in the north, we don't believe this rolling stock would never be tolerated in London and the South East and is certainly not good enough for us here in the North East, we're delighted that we will soon be seeing them replaced with modern, more comfortable rolling stock.

officers left them completely devastated as alternative premises or land was not offered or seemed to be available. They even asked the Committee what they had done about finding other accommodation. which astounded them as they have no access or idea to what is available in the town centre.

The officers did suggest the Cubby take premises from the Town Centre owners which was completely out of the question as they could not possibly afford the rent and service levy being charged.

Any fair-minded Any fair-minded person would hope the County Council, who supposedly will benefit enormously from its sale, would be more compassionate in keeping the Cubby (and Honest John) in business, as they provide such good service to the community.

The Cubby has been open for many years and would be missed as a drop-in for so many people who visit the town centre. The future looks very uncertain.



#### **Council's "Operation Stop It" Targets Enviro-crimes** out to properties with untidy deployed in known flytipping

More than 100 people have been fined after committing a string of crimes against the environment

Latest figures show Durham County Council's neighbourhood protection team issued 89 fixed penalty notices for littering throughout January, as well as a further six for dog fouling, seven for untidy gardens or yards and failing to comply with litter clearing notices and one for flytipping.

The team is tasked with tackling various issues, including flytipping, dog fouling, stray dogs, littering and antisocial behaviour.

As well as issuing a total of 103 fines, 57 community protection warnings and 10 community protection notices were handed

Stop and check exercises are carried out by neighbourhood wardens and police to make sure vehicles have a licence to carry, transport or dispose of waste.

They form part of Operation Stop It, which has also seen number of successful prosecutions through the courts, including a recent case where a man dumped about 100 bags of rubbish from a pub. The man, from Peterlee, was

ordered to pay a total of £366 magistrates last month (February) after admitting the offence, which took place in Hetton-le-Hole.

Ian Hoult, neighbourhood protection manager at Durham County Council, said: "We're building on the momentum of our campaign to stamp out flytipping across the county and the number of people prosecuted as a result is testament to these efforts. "We work closely with Durham

Constabulary, Crimestoppers and the Environment Agency to investigate every report of flytipping and to determine whether the waste can be traced back to the owner. The use of extra CCTV cameras at flytipping hotspots throughout the county is also providing robust evidence to use when

prosecuting offenders. Whilst education is always the first step, when it comes to environmental offences like flytipping our message is clear we will not tolerate it and anyone who commits waste crime can expect to be fined

or even hauled through the courts." Domestic rubbish can be taken to any of the county's Household Waste Recycling Centres (HWRCs) and bulky
