Last year the site won a Best Factory award in a national competition run by Works Management magazine. As a result, the magazine asked the site to organise a

Best Factory tour to share its knowledge and experience with other manufacturers. Twenty representatives of six companies from across England, Wales and Scotland came to the Heighington Lane plant, which makes respirators for worker safety and products for the vehicle

aftercare market. Donna Gowland, the site's Continuous Improvement

and Lean leader organised the visit and said: "We had a great response from the visitors. They appreciated our openness with them and they very complimentary were about the initiatives we've developed at the site, such as behavioural safety and lean

management systems." The Works Management magazine allocated £500 to meet the 3M site's expenses

in holding the event, but the site decided this sum should be donated to local charities instead.



Phil Wilson, the Labour Parliamentary candidate for Sedgefield, shares his views on some of the important questions he's heard on the doorstep during the election campaign so far

What have you done for us? Being a local man, brought up in Trimdon, my dad worked down Fishburn pit, I am passionate about this area. Since getting elected in 2007 I have sought to be a voice for the people of

Sedgefield. My prime concern has been job creation and it always will be. My proudest achievement was to lead the campaign to bring Hitachi to South Durham, creating over 730 jobs and thousands more in the supply chain. I also worked towards bringing the University Technological College to Avcliffe Business Park so that our young people can learn the skills they need to get on in industry.

When I was first elected, Avcliffe town centre was in decline and had not been invested in for a number of years. But now we've seen demolition of some disused buildings and $\pounds 2m$ refurbishment with the final phase of development under way leading to impressive changes over the last few years. My office continues to work with the town centre management and local community to ensure more retailers fill the shops. My office also helped and supported thousands of constituents with problems from changes benefits to housing to consumer issues and everything inbetween.

People want to know if Labour will form a coalition with the SNP?

There is no way that I would want to go into coalition with the Scottish National Party the and I agree with Ed Milliband when he says it isn't going to happen. The SNP sees itself as a 'progressive' force in British politics, but there is nothing progressive about wanting to break up the United Kingdom. The Tories keep saying Labour will enter into a coalition with the SNP as a scare story which is not based upon fact because they have nothing else to say.

What will Labour do about the bedroom tax? One of the first things a Labour government will do is abolish the bedroom tax. It is affecting a lot of people, particularly

my constituency those in where there is not enough one bedroom properties for them to move into and it is instead driving them further into poverty. Labour already has

legislation ready to abolish the tax. People are worried about the

future of the NHS, what will Labour do to save it? Through our 'time to care fund' raised through a mansion tax and tackling tax avoidance, we will invest in our NHS. We will recruit and train 20,000 more nurses and 8,000 more GPs guaranteeing GP appointments within 48 hours and cancer tests within a week. We'll provide 25 hours free childcare and ensure smaller class sizes for 5 to 7-year-olds. None of our manifesto commitments require additional borrowing and we'll balance the books and cut the deficit each year. Our NHS and public services need a Labour government to secure their future. Labour created the NHS and we will always defend a health service, free at the point of need.

What do you think about plans to turn some of the street lighting on A167?

I have raised this with the council and asked county them to look again at their decision. I know the council is suffering severe cuts to its idget, but our priority must be the safety of pedestrians and road users. Turning off street lights is happening all over the country not just in this area and it is because of the extreme cuts made by the current government. We must find a way of keeping people safe, despite financial pressures.

What is happening about EON's plans to build a huge Windfarm at the Isles?

I am opposed to EON's plan to build 23 wind turbines 100m+ at the Isles between Bradbury. Mordon and Chilton. This does not mean I am opposed to wind energy, but it does mean I am opposed to the cumulative impact of having so many windfarms in one area. County Durham continues to play its part in providing renewable energy, but I think we have our fair share of windfarms considering the windfarms at Red Gap Farm, Lambs Hill and Moorside Farm have been approved but are yet to be built

"I led the campaign to bring Hitachi to Newton Aycliffe Not true, of course Labour played a part in attracting Hitachi to the North East but to claim credit is overstepping the mark and stretching the truth. The initiative was spearheaded by Durham County Council with active support from local leading Conservatives including Bates, Darlington Lord Conservative group and local media. The decision ultimately rested with a Conservative Transport Secretary. Claire Perry, the Conservative

Rail Minister said, "This is quite frankly a desperate lie from Labour. It was this Conservative government that awarded the £4.5 billion contract for the Intercity Express Programme, seeing Hitachi assemble an intercity fleet of 92 complete trains at Newton Aycliffe, seeing 730 skilled jobs created at Newton Aycliffe with a further 200 jobs during construction of the factory itself. The Newton Aycliffe factory was awarded another contract to build 500 carriages of The Class 800 trains by this government only last years. Thanks to the Conservatives' long term

economic plan, we can invest in rail and infrastructure and businesses are investing in the UK, meaning more jobs for people. The biggest risk to all of this progress and our economic security is Ed Miliband and Labour."

"I supported the University Technical College for South Durham" - UTCs are an initiative from the Conservative side of the Coalition. 

Community Groups Benefit from Energy Partnership

Community groups could benefit from thousands of pounds by referring eligible people for heavily subsidised gas boilers after a new scheme - the first of its kind in the country – was unveiled in the region.

Community organisations are really well placed to identify those who can benefit most, helping them to live in warmer, more energy efficient homes.

AN historic walled garden, in the grounds of a prestigious North East country house hotel, is to be opened to the public as part of a £5.3m investment. The Walled Garden, at

Wynyard Hall Hotel, Tees Valley, - which was established by the Hall's owners, the Marquises of Londonderry, in the 19th century - will open on Tuesday 4th August.

Containing more than 3000 roses, it is the realisation of a long-held dream of Wynyard Hall's owner, Sir John Hall and has been designed and planted by multi-awardwinning Royal Horticultural Society landscape architect Alistair Baldwin.

"The walled garden will be breathtakingly beautiful," £1 said York-based Alistair. M Visitors will see a truly su dazzling display of roses, in a design which pays tribute to the ancient heritage of in ind

the walled garden, yet takes it firmly forward into a new stage of development." The £1.6m Walled Garden development, to the north of the Hall itself and within the

estate's 150 acres of grounds, will also house a state-of-theart visitor centre, shop and café, stocking and serving locally-sourced goods and produce. Thirty new jobs have been created by the re-

been created by the redevelopment of the Walled Garden; the second stage in a rolling programme of work to create The Gardens at Wynyard Hall – which will eventually cover four acres and be one of the largest rose gardens in the UK.

The first stage, adjacent to the Walled Garden, was the $\pounds 1.7m$ installation of a Grand Marquee and management suite, for weddings and large scale corporate events and further stages will include a $\pounds 2m$ investment in the creation of a cookery school, children's garden and designated walks through the estate. Property magnate Sir

Property magnate Sir John, who grew up in a Northumberland pit village, said: "When I was a lad I used to watch my father grow roses in the little strip of garden in front of our cottage and I decided, there and then, that one day I would have one

of the most spectacular rose gardens in the country – and this is just the start." Local suppliers and

Local suppliers and businesses have been deployed across all areas of the development, including the build, landscaping, fitting and design. "It is magnificent beyond our

"It is magnificent beyond our wildest dreams," said Allison Antonopoulos, Managing Director at Wynyard Hall Hotel. "It has been years in the planning, many months in the developing and will, we hope, give a lifetime's pleasure to all who come to see it."




