Last Friday morning local residents may have seen our Town Council workers, a Councillor and a Friends of West Park member wading in the lake in an attempt to reduce the green carpet of weed which is currently covering the lower half of the lake

They scraped the surface with large rakes and specially designed push bars and worked tirelessly for two and half hours, but only made a small dent in this green carpet of weed. It would seem that this is a very time consuming and hopeless task, this is 'duckweed' and it will return as quickly as it is removed. This plant has the ability to reproduce rapidly, it can double in just 16 hours to 2 days, depending on temperature and its growing environment.

Although residents complain about the look of this green carpet, for some, duckweed can be a positive inclusion in the right location.

For those of you who don't know what duckweed is, it is a small floating plant that group on relatively still that grows on relatively still lakes? It can cover an area rapidly and because of this can cause problems. Now however, duckweed is being touted as a miracle plant for many reasons including some listed below.

• Water filter • Prevents algae growth

- · Reduces evaporation of water
- Virtually free animal feed · Cost effective renewable energy

In the wild, duckweed is an important source of food for fish and waterfowl. Duckweed provides a habitat for certain types of frogs and fish. It also maintains a cleaner habitat by providing enough shade to keep down the growth of oxygen-robbing algae that used to plague the lakes in

However, when duckweed completely covers a lake may be a symptom of other problems, such as, high nutrient levels from decaying leaves and plants on the bottom of the lake and the lack of constant water flow. This is why the Town Council have sourced hydrology and ecology advice from the Groundwork Trust, this will help it determine the most effective way to balance the ecology and aesthetics of this fantastic community resource and ultimately reduce the necessity to clear the lake.

HOMES PLAN - NEW CHAPTER FOR COUNTY COUNCIL

Durham County Council has set up an arms-length private company with the aim of offering better choice for housebuyers and creating job opportunities. Following recent Cabinet approval, Chapter Homes will

develop council-owned land for housing to be sold and rented at market values. A contract has been agreed with Gentoo Construction to build the houses on behalf of the new company with Chapter Homes responsible for the development and subsequent management of the rental properties. In addition to meeting need for good quality housing, building more affordable homes, creating jobs and boosting the local economy, any profits from the scheme will be reinvested into council services

With the company now established, four possible development

- sites have been identified: Agnew 5, Woodham Drive, Newton Aycliffe
- Cobblers Hall Site, Newton Aycliffe
- Former Civic Centre, Chester-le-Street
- · Oakerside Drive, Peterlee

The Newton Aycliffe site has been chosen to act as a pilot for the scheme and a planning application for 125 properties has now been submitted.

Cllr Eddie Tomlinson, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for assets, strategic housing and rural issues, said: "We hope that the creation of Chapter Homes will see significant benefits for the people of County Durham. Potential buyers will have more choice and the county will be better equipped to meet the rising need for local housing, especially private rented accommodation where there is a

known shortage. "With housebuilding a key driver for the economy, Chapter Homes means investment in the construction industry and the wider supply chain to build quality housing and creating

much needed jobs in the process. "With the council facing savings of £260m by 2020, this innovative approach will also allow us to turn currently unused council land into welcome extra income that can be put towards council services.

Dinner plates are 44% bigger than in the '50's – and Dinner plates slimmers are paying the price. If you're trying to lose weight but the scales aren't shifting, it may be more to do with the size of your dinner plate than what you put on it. Increasing plate sizes over the past 30 years have had a direct impact

on waistlines everywhere. Back in the early '50s, the average dinner plate was 23cm wide. Fast-forward 30 years to the '80s and it had increased to 28cm - and today, it's nearer 33cm.

It should be no surprise then that as our dinner plates have grown, so have we. An increase in the rate of obesity over the last 60 years is parallel with the increase in the size of our dinner plates. Brown MSc. Emma

nutritionist for weight loss App, Nutracheck, is not is not surprised by the findings: "We rely on visual clues to tell

us how much to eat. People pay more attention to the proportion of the plate that is covered, rather than the actual amount of food. So they tend to eat more when given a large plate because they fill more of it.

"We find it difficult to judge how much food there is on a plate as our brain tricks us into thinking there is more is



• Serve calorie-dense foods on smaller plates and save large plates for salads and fruit • Resist filling your plate and always leave a decent border around food

• Pile low energy dense foods (veg, salad) onto your plate first so there's less room for the more calorific items. At least half your plate should be veg/salad, a quarter protein food and no more than a



Dear Sir. It was great to see that Neville Parade Community Centre was going to continue with the amalgamation with the Cubby but I think some serious questions need to be answered. Was there a Special Public Meeting properly advertised and called with minutes taken, available for scrutiny regarding the amalgamation of the two existing registered charities i.e. Friends of Senior Citizens Registered in 2002 and Great Aycliffe Old Peoples Welfare Committee registered in 1970. There are set procedures to be put in place regarding bank accounts asset transfer and equipment etc for both

charities. What is happening to the transfer of ownership of the Neville Parade building and who owns it now Neville Parade Over 60's Club

and Community Centre was deregistered in 2005. In 2008 the Sedgefield LIP Funding awarded in the region of £48,000.00 in three separate 'tranches" to Friends of Senior

Citizens. This has never been shown in the accounts Has all this been spent and

is there evidence of the expenditure? Does Friends of Senior Citizens have two bank accounts?

There is only one trustee listed for Friends of Senior Citizens which is illegal for a charity. This point has been raised to GAMP on several occasions but an answer has never been

given. The Cubby is a trading name not a charity. Have the accounts of The Cubby been presented to verify the capability of this group taking over this project. In the early part of 2008 "The Cubby collected money for "The Kool Red Bus" at its

Where was this money banked and is it still available because on 3rd March 2008 a letter was sent to the group telling them that the bus had been disposed of and that any money received would have expected to be handed in at the end of the collection period. Many remarked on how well this collection was going but to date no money has been received.

Dear Sir May I respond to the anonymous letter concerning The Cubby and Neville Community Centre. The public will be aware "The Cubby" which has occupied the site on Greenwell Road since 1978 was last year given notice to quit by Durham County Council. This notice expires on the 10 October and no alternative site has been found within the town centre area for The Cubby to move too. Its closure looked inevitable. "The Cubby" is the trading name of Great Aycliffe Old Peoples Welfare Committee which was formed in the 1960's and became a registered charity, number 504398, on the 4 August 1975.

In the Newton News for week ending 24 July Peter Beaty announced he was being forced to retire from managing the Neville Community Centre on Doctors orders and he appealed for someone to take on that role. Councillor William (Bill) Blenkinsopp answered that call and was invited to attend a committee meeting of the Neville Community Centre on Saturday 15 August to be considered for the role of Chairman of the Centre. He was accompanied to that meeting by myself, David Lewis (Trustee and Treasurer of The Cubby).

Following discussion it was agreed that Peter Beaty would resign immediately as Chairman and Bill was duly elected along with Margaret Robson as the new Treasurer, Anne Hardy as the new Secretary and myself as a new committee member A new bank mandate has been completed and submitted to the bank with the account to be operated by any two of the three new signatories. The account has been operated solely by Peter Beaty. I am only aware of The Friends of Senior Citizens having one bank account.

I was concerned that the Friends of Senior Citizens charity only had one trustee and the new Treasurer, Secretary and their husbands and myself asked as an interim measure for our names to be submitted to the Charity Commission as new Trustees of Friends of Senior Citizens. The Cubby will close its doors on Saturday 5 September and operate its provision of food and drink as a drop-in centre from Neville Community Centre from Monday 7 September. Minutes were taken for that meeting and are available for inspection.

With regard to the Great Aycliffe Old Peoples Welfare Committee charity and The Friends of Senior Citizens charity coming together this was discussed as a future aim but will not take place until the ownership of the building has been clearly identified by solicitors and a public meeting called.

With regard to the comment made that The Friends of Senior Citizens charity is being operated illegally as it only has one named Trustee; why have GAMP not raised this matter with The Charity Commission if concern has been raised on several occasions? The writer of the anonymous letter is obviously very familiar with the Friends of Senior Citizens charity why has he/she not raised the matter with The Charity Commission if concerned?

With regard to the 2008 funding in the region of £48000 I have only seen statements of income and expenditure for the last three years and cannot answer that question. If the writer knows that the £48000 has never shown in the accounts why has he/she not raised the matter before now?

The statement of Income and Expenditure for the year ended 28 February 2015 has not vet been finalised and the accounts are being closely scrutinised.

The Cubby's Income and Expenditure totals for the last five years are available for anyone to see on the Charity Commission website and I am happy to supply the writer with a copy of the latest accounts to 31 March 2015. The Cubby's accounts are healthy and as someone who has been a Treasurer of various organisations over the last 35 years I am more than capable of bringing guidance to the financial running of the Neville Community Centre.

With regard to The Cubby collecting money for "The Kool Red Bus" in 2008; neither, Bill Blenkinsop or myself were involved with The Cubby at that time. Why has the writer waited 7 years to raise questions about the money that was apparently raised? If the writer cares to contact me mv phone number is 319196 and I will be happy to look back through historical records to try and answer the points raised. David G Lewis Trustee & Treasurer



BURIED DOG TO BE RECOVERED MP's Talks with Water Authority Brings Closure to Dog Owner

will remember Readers the story we carried early in the year when a dog fell down an open drain and drowned. The tragedy was compounded by the hole being filled in and the dog left buried.

This has tormented the owner since as she wanted the dog to be recovered and properly cremated so that she could keep the ashes in memory of her beloved pet. You have to accept the hole needing to be covered immediately to prevent further accidents to humans but to leave the dog buried is a bit distasteful and one can uderstand the owner fighting for her dog to be recovered. Miss Daniels of Clanny Road has tried without success until she contacted our MP Phil Wilson who took up the case, with Northumbrian Water who have agreed to remove the animal from the watercourse for cremation. The following is an extract from the letter from Northumbrian Water:

"I can only begin to imagine how distressing this situation has been for Miss Daniels and would like to pass on my sincere condolences at this very difficult time.

We first became aware of the situation on 18 May 2015 when we received a report that a dog had possibly fallen into a manhole located

in a field near to Gilpin Road, Newton Aycliffe. Our sewerage team attended site the following day to inspect the area in an attempt to locate the missing dog. We checked the manholes on the public sewerage system and although we did find a defective manhole cover which we repaired, we do not believe that it would have been possible for the dog to enter the sewerage network at that location. We carried out further investigations on 24 and 25 August 2015 which included closed circuit television inspections (CCTV) of the public sewerage system in the area and did not find any evidence of the missing dog. On 26 August 2015 we carried out a joint inspection ofa wider area with Durham County Council and identified a culverted watercourse in the field which is the responsibility of Gleeson Homes. Upon further investigation,

the officers from the council identified that the missing dog was inside a manhole chamber which is part of the culverted watercourse. I understand that arrangements are now in place to safely transport Zack to the pet crematorium and I hope that this will bring some closure to Miss Daniels".
