Greenfield Arts at Greenfield Community College is the proud host of the SOLE Room 13 space, one of 7 in the world. We work with Greenfield Community College students and Professor Sugata Mitra, who won the TED prize in 2013 to explore self-organised

learning. Professor Mitra recently visited the space to see how our ground-breaking research was getting on. Two local primary schools visited to take part in SOLE sessions, Byerley Park Primary and Etherley Lane Primary, Professor Sugata and he gave them a real challenge and asked an A Level Humanities question! "Explain why traditional measures of economic activity such as GDP do not reflect the quality of life in a country.





Parliament Recognises S & D Railway Anniversary

Looking Forward to the 200th Anniversary

On Wednesday September 16th, 2015, Parliament recognised the importance of the Stockton and Darlington Railway to the world, and looked ahead to its 200th anniversary in 2025.

At the request of Phil Wilson MP, with the support of Helen Goodman MP, an adjournment debate was held in the Houses of

Parliament to celebrate its 190th anniversary. Phil said: "The Stockton and Darlington Railway was important to the economic success of the North-East and to community pride in 1825, and with the right support and action, this world-class heritage site can be as important again. Work has already begun, with huge community support, to rescue the remains of the line and give it the international recognition it deserves. Over the next ten years,

culminating in the bicentenary in 2025, there are aspirations to create a long-distance walking route along the original line. This will link up a number of excellent museums and provide heritage-led economic regeneration for the area. In that same year, the Tees Valley hopes to be awarded the capital of

be awarded the capital of culture accolade." Helen Goodman spoke to argue for Shildon's claims to be recognised for its importance and that Timothy Hackworth and that of to the story. Jenny Chapman MP spoke on behalf of Darlington and Alex Cunningham MP spoke on behalf of Stockton. Junior Minister Tracey Crouch praised the 'fantastic' work of volunteer groups such as the Friends of the Stockton and Darlington Railway to preserve the track bed. She gave every indication that we have government support for what we are all trying to do, and that there would be support for another debate in ten years' time for the 200th anniversary. She said: 'It is great that

so many local people are engaged with this fantastic site and realise that it may well importance have far beyond their local community ... I congratulate all those involved in the 190th anniversary of the Stockton and Darlington Railway and wish them every success with their efforts to celebrate, preserve and promote this important aspect of our national story'. Next week the Memories section of the Northern Echo (Saturday's edition) will look at 'The First Five Miles' – a new book and guided walk about the Witton Park end of the line. The book will be launched next Saturday with an accompanying exhibition. Councillor Trish Pemberton, Deputy Mayor and Chair of the Friends of the Stockton and Darlington Railway who asked Phil Wilson and Helen Goodman to arrange the debate said: "I cannot tell you how happy all of this



makes me. All the community groups working so hard to preserve and protect and interpret the line now have recognition at the highest levels in parliament which will help us achieve our long-term goals for the line. The economic regeneration it will bring should benefit everyone in our local area, as well as Darlington and Stockton.

Anyone interested in 1 getting involved in one of the groups can contact me and I will point you in the right direction. There is a huge amount to do over the next few years and there

is something for everyone. Shildon's long established Local History Society and the Brusselton Incline Group will be at the heart of it".

Committee, reported "many younger people were reluctant to stand in local elections average age of a councillor being about 60". So what can we do to

attract younger members to mainstream political parties? Of course with age comes experience; but with age also comes death! The problem in Newton Avcliffe is not that we have a dominant Labour Party; we have cemented that dominance with good governance.

The problem is that we are all growing old together. The surge in Labour Party affiliate membership (those who wished to vote in the Labour Party leadership election) led to some becoming full members, but few are interested in spending two or three evenings a week closeted in meetings with

their elders. One needs to ask is it rational to expect youngsters to want to spend their evenings discussing financial planning. Or to assist and empathise with upset constituents complaining about cars parking on grass verges. Realising that that is a battle long lost, however distressing. Putting one's head above the parapet is not every ones idea

of public service. Committee Select The considered increasing councillor allowances. attract prospective

councillors. That would not be popular with the electorate. For those interested in serving their town, here is how things work. The town is divided into three, for electoral into three, for electoral purposes viz. Aycliffe East, North and West. Those are the town's County Council

boundaries. There are branch meetings nearly every month. Each area is also subdivided into Town Council wards. There are Town Councillors (30) and County Councillors (7) elected every four years. We are paid an Attendance Allowance. Town Councillors receive about £70 a month. Councillors receive County about £300 a week, plus other benefits.

County Councillors become increasingly anxious about reselection. Some who join the Party just wish to be a member having no wish to attend branch meetings nor stand for election. I the current Avcliffe am Membership Officer. East This role has never been considered to be of any importance. There has never been any genuine desire to attract new members. I wish to change that.

If you wish to join the Labour Party and you live in the East, please contact me and I will guide you, personally paying 50% of the first years subs for the first two bonayounger townspeople join us. Why has the fide who membership been allowed to decline? I offer an honest opinion about that.

It has never been in the interests of councillors to attract new members. Too many new members would






CDFHS are delivering Welfare Support now directly on behalf of Durham County Council, taking service to those needing the most support, who are pointed to us by a referral mechanism. Staff and work experience placements from a variety of providers grew to a high point of 75 in May. Part of the strategy is to develop partnerships such as NE First Credit Union and Cornforth Partnership. Every penny of our turnover has to be accounted for and our





financial management has been restructured to match and support aspirations and legal responsibilities. CDFHS has a retail venue in

CDFHS has a retail venue in Chester le Street and works with Steve Wright the owner of Silver Fox to introduce a dozen local unemployed to this new venture.

We have formed a close association with NE First Credit Union firstly to test the response to our joint service offering and we worked together in the shop environment and


