

Giant Wind Farm Near Aycliffe Cancelled

Delight as Eon Withdraws Application

Eon made the announcement week thev this week they were cancelling their wind farm project near Aycliffe, much to the elation of many local people including those living next to the proposed site in Morden and Bradbury villages.

They have been fighting for over three years to stop the intrusion of the largest turbines in the country in a region already with more than its fair share of this supposed renewable energy source.

The Government's decision to axe subsidies for onshore wind farms has obviously led to the cancellation but it is also thanks to the fierce local campaign that first changed the proposal from 45 turbines to 24 and then caused the delays through planning procedures and efforts of our MP.

Phil Wilson said: "Eon's announcement is excellent news. County Durham has played its part in windfarm development. I am not opposed to such development in principle, but the Isles Windfarm was a step too far, and was inappropriately I'm pleased EON has finally listened to the forward arguments put by local campaigners and have now withdrawn their

planning application.'
TICTAC the local anti Isles Windfarm campaign group sent the following letter to Newton News.

Dear Sir. I am delighted that Eon have withdrawn their application to erect 24 wind turbines on the Bradbury, Mordon and Preston Carrs. (The Isles) Whilst the reductions in subsidies and the changes in government policy no doubt influenced the decision, I am certain that the campaign coordinated by TICTAC and supported so strongly by local communities also had a part to play. If TICTAC and their supporters had not held EON to account and delayed their plans, highlighting the flaws in their application. the turbines would have been erected 2 years ago and recent government policies would have come too late to help us. There are so many people to thank but on behalf of TICTAC, I especially want to thank the people of Newton Avcliffe and surrounding communities who supported us. If you came to one of our meetings or our exhibitions. If you helped us out financially or did some work for us. If you put a poster up in your



window. Thank you.

I should also mention Phil Wilson and the many councillors who supported us. Thanks to all of you, we have stopped the vandalism of an historic landscape. We have protected both the wildlife of the area and the health of residents who would have had to endure the effects of flicker and noise. We have also kept our roads safer from the huge amount of construction traffic and massive loads that were going to be needed to build the turbines.

This campaign was always about protecting the communities surrounding the Isles and focussed on why it

Students Give MP Tour of STUBBING OUT SMOKING IN BUS STATIONS

crackdown is launched on smoking in County Durham bus stations. Durham County Council officers are teaming up with bus companies Arriva and Go North East to send out the message that smoking will not be tolerated in the county's stations.

The campaign, which runs until February, will see our staff visiting bus stations and issuing fines to anyone caught smoking. Since 2007, almost all indoor public places and workplaces, including vehicles, have places been required to be smoke free by law.

Smoking is also prohibited in all enclosed or 'substantially enclosed' public places and workplaces, including bus stations. But despite the law, some people continue to smoke in and around county stations.

We recently carried out a survey at some of the county's bus stations which revealed that over 71% of people surveyed have seen smoking in or around the



Our Public Protection Officers and Neighbourhood Wardens will be visiting stations at Durham, Consett, Stanley, Peterlee and Bishop Auckland. They will be reminding people that it is against the law to smoke bus stations, issuing fixed penalty notices to anyone caught doing so and providing advice and guidance on smoke free issues. Information posters will also be displayed in the stations.

Arriva and Go North East are supporting the campaign by spreading the message among their staff, especially those who work in county stations.

Joanne Waller, our head of environment, health and consumer protection, said: "Smoking in bus stations is illegal and yet some people

continue to do it.
"It is a health hazard and a nuisance to other station users and we will be taking action against anyone catch flouting the law."

CONSULTATION ON FUTURE Recycling Scheme Raised Honest John **OF YOUTH SERVICES**

Parents, children, staff and councillors are all to be asked their views on the future of Durham County Council's youth service.

Across the county the council funds a range of activities, groups and youth centres - but where that support goes has been based on historic agreements and not where it could have the most benefit.

Now, following a review of the service, a consultation is to be launched on proposals that would see money and resources targeted towards those young people who need it most, stronger links with the voluntary and community sectors, and youth centres transferred into the hands of local people.

Councillor Ossie Johnson, the council's cabinet member for children and young people's services said: "At a time of continuing financial pressures, with £124m in savings to be found across the council by 2020 on top of the £153m we have already found, it is more important than ever that we make every penny count.
"I believe these proposals to

develop a targeted approach, which aims to ensure we reach those who are most in need, are long overdue.

"I hope as many people as possible will take part in this consultation and help us to modernise the service and make it fit for the 21st

Overall it is hoped the

improved school attendance and grades, and fewer exclusions: fewer young people not in education, employment, or training (NEET); fewer referrals to children's services; and fewer teenage pregnancies.

Councillor Lucy Hovvels, cabinet member for adult and health services said: "I believe the proposed new of providing these services would be the right thing to do.

"An awful lot of time and energy has been put into these proposals because people recognise how important it is to keep providing for young people, who are our future.

"Hopefully when this process is all finished it will be better for the people we represent."

council's Cabinet discussed the review at its meeting on Wednesday 13 2016, and agreed to conduct a public consultation on the plans, which will run from 1 February to 27 April 2016. Following feedback from that consultation, final proposals will then be developed and presented to cabinet in autumn 2016.

Carole Pavne, Durham County Council's head of children's services, said: "Across County Durham there are nearly 18,000 children living in areas that are among the most deprived in the country.

"Yet currently, despite prioritising and protecting youth services for as long as possible, the service is in regular contact with only 7 per cent of all young people and 9 per cent of those in the most deprived areas.
"Other authorities in the

North East have cut their budgets for youth services. in some cases by over 70 per cent, while Durham has reduced its funding by less than one fifth.

"However, with continued budget pressures we face some difficult decisions and it is important that we ensure every penny we spend has the greatest benefit.

'With this in mind a review of youth services has been carried out and a series of proposals have been drafted that would see a new approach introduced to identify and help the young people and families who would gain the most from our support.

"No decisions have yet been made. The results of the review will be presented to the council's cabinet on January 13 and, subject to approval, the recommendations it contains would be put out for a full 12 week public consultation beginning in February."

In County Durham there are 17,987 13 to 19-year-olds living in households in areas that are among the top 30 per cent most deprived in the country.

There are also 7,670 children from homes whose income is at least 60 per cent below the national average.

Only 9 per cent of young people from the least well off areas have regular contact with the council's vouth service.

It is believed that - despite the council having to find £1m of savings from its £8.67m One Point budget – the service can have a bigger impact by redistributing funding across the service's 10 areas, and targeting services to young people who need them most.

The consultation is also looking at the funding given to more than 50 youth projects through the Youth Work Support Grant.

Currently groups receive grants ranging from £430 to £27,768, but again this is based on what each historically organisation received and not on where needs are greatest. In 2015/16 the budget for

the Youth Work Support Grant is £194,684, but after meeting savings targets that will be reduced to £138,000. It is proposed to reassess where grants are made, and to transfer control of this funding to the council's Area Action Partnerships, which are better placed to

identify local priorities. As well as this, discussions already underway over the possibility of transferring youth centres in Fishburn, Newton Aycliffe, Peterlee, Seaham, Newton Spennymoor and Stanley to community ownership through the Durham ASK

we have to move forward





Max Holdstock, AA patrol of the year, says: "The of the year, says: "The arrival of more typical winter weather will have many of us reaching for the thermostat but it's not just us who feel the chill. The cold can cause problems for your car too, and in more ways than many people

"Breakdowns can double in very cold weather but up to half are potentially preventable through regular servicing and maintenance checks. The most common call to the AA for help is a flat battery.'

He advises keeping an ear out for local traffic and weather reports and driving in severe winter weather only if it's essential.

"The vital thing is to drive smoothly, keep your speed down and avoid sharp acceleration, braking or cornering as far as possible by keeping plenty of space between yourself and the car in front. Be alert to black ice particularly on unsalted roads - it's difficult to see as the road will simply look wet. On an icy road, start in second gear or engage winter mode if an automatic and keep in as high a gear as possible.
"Prepare for the worst but

hope for the best: keep warm clothing in your car, first aid kit, personal medication, energy refreshment such as chocolate, drinking torch, keep your water, phone charged and take a

AA patrol of the year Max Holdstock's winter tips are: Battery: keep it charged up and if its old, get it checked and changed

Short, stop-start journeys especially during winter when the battery is under additional strain and doesn't get a chance to charge up is a recipe for an electrical 'coronary'.

If your car has been having problems starting and the battery's more than five years old, get it tested by a garage and replaced if necessary. Cold weather reduces battery efficiency so it it's already tired, it might not start your engine. Coolant: check and make sure it has correct anti-

Engine coolant also needs checking. It should be a 50/50 mixture of water and antifreeze but people make the mistake of topping up with plain water over the year, so it gets too diluted and can then freeze in winter. This can lead to the engine damage and a very large repair bill.

On most cars the coolant shouldn't need topping up, so if you're losing coolant, you know you have a problem. If you are concerned, a garage can quickly check the concentration.

Windscreen wash and wiper blades: keep them sparkling

low sun and dirty roads, it's obviously very important to maintain clear vision. Top up the windscreen wash with a good quality, purpose-made additive to reduce the chance of freezing. While you're at it, run your finger down the wiper blades to check for nicks and tears. If they are two years old or more they should be replaced, a quick and easy job on most cars

Also give the windscreen a thorough clean, inside and out, as a layer of grime quickly builds up and you'd be surprised what difference it makes at

reducing dazzle. Lights: keep them clean and replace blown bulbs

Walk round the car and make sure you have no cracked lens or blown bulbs and don't forget to check full beam headlights, fog lights and indicators. Keep spare head- and tail-light bulbs in your glovebox and make sure you know how to change them - check your car's handbook.

Tyres: check tread depth. tyre condition and pressure. Think about winter tyres

Check all tyres condition, pressure and tread depth. The recommends at least 3mm tread for improved grip during winter, so if the treads are getting low seriously consider buying new tyres.

winter Consider tvres. particularly if you live in a rural area, as they offer significantly better grip and braking performance snow, ice and on wet roads in cold conditions.

drivers believe reducing air pressure gives better grip in snow and ice – it doesn't and can adversely affect performance and braking, as well as more quickly wear your tyres

Screen chips and bodywork damage: repair chips on glass and body

In cold weather windscreen chips can grow and become irreparable, so it's important to act quickly. Also, the salt deposits on the roads will attack any bodywork chips. so touch them up to avoid bigger problems later.

Be prepared

Holdstock "Winter is a punishing time for your car, so it's important to make sure it's up to the job. If your car is due its annual service. get it done sooner rather than later and get into the habit of doing these regular maintenance checks.

"For additional peace of mind, many garages offer free or cheap winter car checks, which are good for flagging up potential problems. Best to get them sorted now than at the side of the road on a cold, dark evening."

Max concludes: "Not only is keeping your car in good working order essential for its continued reliability and safety but it also helps protect its resale value, so it's something you can't afford not to do this winter."

Rebecca Coates, Auckland Castle Trust's Human Resources Director, who is leading on the partnership with Bishop Auckland College, said: "What we will be able to give the students is a better opportunity to find other

In January 2015 Spennymoor Town Council approved a proposal to designate a room in The Bob Abley Gallery to be called the Norman Cornish Room in memory of Norman Cornish MBE.

The purpose of the room will be to exhibit the Permanent Collection of work by Norman Cornish with Cornish additional support from The Permanent Collection of his work at The University of Northumbria.

Northumbria University's Associate Dean of Business and Engagement for Arts, Design and Social Sciences, Dr Heather Robson, said: "The University has a strong relationship with the Cornish family – through its collection of Norman's work, which has a permanent home at Northumbria - and we're delighted that this will continue into 2016 and beyond, starting with this first-rate exhibition

"We're excited discussing future opportunities to support the legacy of the Cornish collection - including a PhD studentship; work with Beamish Museum and other partners; conservation and heritage research linked to the University's Northernness programme; forensic support; and the ongoing care, stewardship and impact of Norman's work - which will mark a new and exciting phase in our partnership."

The dedicated space provides an opportunity to exhibit the work by Norman who spent his entire life living and working in Spennymoor. It is quite possible in the history of art that no other town has received so much attention by one artist in his lifetime. Norman Cornish is Spennymoor's most famous son and he has taken the cultural landscape of Spennymoor to a global audience, not only via his paintings but also in the many documentaries which have spanned his lifetime.

John Cornish: As an artist. my father's vision was only focused on Spennymoor; to him it had everything he needed. He was able to record every aspect of Spennymoor life with great skill and empathy because it was the community in which he lived and worked - a world he knew well. The town's rich social, cultural and industrial heritage can never be forgotten now. This 'slice of life' has been captured perfectly in his artwork and the Cornish family is indebted to Spennymoor Town Council who have provided an exhibition space in his honour to display his exemplar work.

The development is also part of his legacy which has also been supported by Beamish Museum, Durham County Council and The University of Northumbria.

It is hoped that the feasibility study of the Norman Cornish Trail by Durham County Council will also enable replicas of his iconic work to be shown to visitors in their actual locations as well as visitors also seeing the other



Say NO to North East Mayor & NECA says Councillor

Dear Sir, On the 23rd October a devolution agreement to transform the North East economy and bring new opportunities for businesses and residents was signed between members of the unelected North East unelected North Combined Authority and the Government. To devolve funding and responsibilities to the region in respect of transport, investment, funding, skills training, business support, housing and strategic planning.

If agreed and approved by councils, The North East Combined Authority controlled by a newly elected Mayor would take control of the new devolved powers in 2017.

In the preamble it says The deal would enable the Combined Authority to create an Investment Fund focused on supporting the North East to compete in international markets, worth up to £1.5 billion, with an initial allocation of revenue funding for capital financing of at least £30 million a year for 30 years. The incoming Mayor would also have the option, with business support, to raise up to a further £30 million a year through a business rate supplement. The North East would in addition benefit from access to Local Growth Funding, from new

Enterprise Zones, through the current bidding round, and from local leadership European funding. over Further details would be set out at and following the spending review through a place-based settlement and a single capital programme, demonstrating fair funding. A Mayor for the North East would be established, working as part of the Combined Authority and and with a strong partnership with business. Elections would take place in 2017. We will together review the appropriate relationship between the mayor and the role of police and crime commissioners.

Final agreement remains subject to the Government's spending review and the legislative process, and is also conditional upon further public consultation and the agreement of the seven local councils which make up the combined authority. Durham County Council Leader Simon Henig has indicated that Durham County Council will seek the opinion of County Durham residents through a poll which will be held by 8th February 2016. This will be used to guide Durham County Council's decision with the Combined Authority. There is a huge question mark hanging over whether there is any appetite for a mayor in the North East.

Hartlepool voted to keep a council leader and cabinet model in 2012, abolishing independent Mayor role. Newcastle rejected the chance to have a mayor the same year. The North East, by and large, did not vote Conservative or for George Osborne's devolution Bill and that the mayor could be used as a buffer for government to shift blame on to for cuts.

The Chancellor's Northern Powerhouse plan also places significant focuses on boosting cities but the North East Combined Authority covers the largest area of any combined authority in the country, and a good portion of it is rural. Is it realistic to assume one mayor can represent the NECA area? The role proposed would represent the cities of Newcastle and Sunderland, as well as the counties of Northumberland and County Durham - an area stretching from Berwick to Newton Aycliffe.

This consultation exercise will cost County Council tax payers approximately £230,000. Durham Durham

University is to examine the responses and analyse it for the Council will then make the final decision.

In question 1, I recommend you vote "Be the wrong thing to do'

Questions 2, 3 and 4 are not

relevant to a No answer. In 2004 77% of the electors in the North East rejected a Northern Assembly

In County Durham the seven district councils undertook a referendum in June 2007. There was an excellent turnout, with nearly 40% of the electorate voting and, of these, 76.4% voted against the idea of one large unitary council, but it still went

A clear two thirds of the electorate voted against a Northern Assembly and a Durham County Unitary Authority. I have no doubt that electors will once again reject a North East Combined Authority when they get the chance and it remains to be seen if their vote is respected by Durham County Council. The £40 million a year Public Health budget which was devolved to the County Council three years ago looks as though it is to be phased out altogether, leaving the County with the responsibilities, but no money.

Nowhere could I find how this NECA and North East Mayor would be paid for, or any borrowing except putting up Business Rates, nor how the up to £1.5 Billion Investment Fund would be financed, it does not explain how "subject to local democratic scrutiny," would work.

Report from the Front Line



it's Mark Edwards here from the Neighbourhood Policing Team. For this article I would like to stay with the subject of PACT (that's Police and

Communities Together). By now you may have seen or heard of 'POP IN PACT'. This is a forum that does exactly what is says on the tin – it is a new initiative that launched in the town centre on Wednesday 20th January 2016 and – for that particular location, is essentially a drop in venue where the NPT have use of a shop unit (the former 'Select' store) and shoppers, retailers, partner representatives, and local residents can 'pop in' and speak to Officers about problems they may experiencing or to raise awareness of other issues. The event is monthly and

the sessions will last three hours, details will be circulated via social media and other local media such as the Newton News.

This ties into the review that we have been doing of the PACT process as a whole and you may recall from earlier bulletins my statement that we are in no way withdrawing from community engagement.

In the town centre historically, there has been a regular meeting (monthly at first, then moving bi-monthly) which tended to receive poor attendance levels. By removing this one hour session and replacing it with a three hour drop in forum we hope to see a more effective means of engagement. means of engagement. Naturally this will be subject to review.
Similar ideas will be getting

rolled out across the rest of the town in the coming weeks although some areas will see no change at all to existing structures. The 'POP IN PACT' will be making an appearance in Woodham as of the 9th February 2016 at the Community Centre on St. Elizabeth's Close at 10.30 am. Likewise this will be a regular fixture.

TELLING THE UNTOLD STORY OF THE GYPSY HOLOCAUST

The harrowing, and often unheard, story of the gypsy holocaust during the Second World War will be told at an exhibition to raise awareness of the atrocities

Durham County Council is hosting the Gypsy, Roma Traveller Service's display entitled 'Porrajmos - Through the Eyes of Children'.

It tells the widely unknown story of the deaths of hundreds of thousands of gypsies at the hands of the Nazis during the Second World War.

The Porrajmos, translated as 'the devouring', is the term used to describe the genocide of Europe's Roma and Sinti (gypsy) population between 1934 and 1945. Up to 500,000 Roma and Sinti

were killed or died as a result of starvation or disease and many more were imprisoned in forced labour camps and subjected to forced sterilisation and medical experimentation.

However, despite the atrocities the story remains largely unknown.

The free exhibition, which will be held weekdays between 19 and 29 January from 9am until 4pm in the Durham Room at County Hall in Durham City to coincide with Holocaust Memorial Day on 27 January, aims to change that.
It will include a short educational

documentary produced by the Plymouth and Devon Racial Equality Learning Council/Devon and Development Partnership as well as additional information about the genocide. The aim is to play a part in helping to ensure that lessons are learned from the past in terms of exclusion, discrimination, racism and hatred of other religions, beliefs or ways of life. The Porrajmos exhibition is part of the Safer Communities Awareness event and staff from the Safer Communities team will be on hand to provide information about wider community safety issues and support to those who need advice or assistance.

Cllr Joy Allen, Cabinet member for safer communities. Durham County Council, said: "This important exhibition will tell the story of the Romany victims of Nazi persecution.

"We hope the event goes some way towards promoting community cohesion encouraging visitors to reflect on the impact of unchecked discrimination and hatred.

"There will also be an opportunity to find out more about wider community safety initiatives and access advice and support from partners."

A separate exhibition organised by the Gypsy, Roma, Traveller Education Service is being held at Durham Cathedral from 25-29 January during opening

It is being hosted by pupils from The Hermitage School in the Chapel of Nine Altars and will

secondary school students from the area. There will also be a speech by holocaust survivor Zdenka Fantlova.





Neighbourhood wardens Durham County from Council handed out 77 Fixed Penalty Notices throughout November for offences such as littering and untidy back vards.

The council's neighbourhood protection teams work with police and other partners to improve the environment promote and communities.

under the Using powers Behaviour. Anti-social Crime and Policing Act 2014, they tackle nuisance issues that affect people's quality of life, including persistently straying dogs or anti-social behaviour.

In November, 66 Fixed Penalty Notices were handed out for littering, one for dog fouling, nine for untidy yards and gardens and one following a waste carrier stop and check operation.

A further 64 Community Protection Warnings were issued to properties with untidy gardens or vards.

Wardens removed 110 stray dogs, a total of 173 antisocial behaviour incidents investigated were the council's Civic Pride team educated more than 500 children and young people about caring for the

environment.

Meanwhile, as part Operation Stop It, a multiagency taskforce set up to tackle flytipping, six people were prosecuted for offences around illegally dumping

More than 560 flytipping incidents were reported and investigated in November and 12 CCTV cameras were deployed in areas know to attract flytips.

Seven stop and check operations were carried out one failed to produce waste transfer notes and was issued with a notice, known as a producer, requiring them to provide the documents, one person was referred for prosecution and two people were prosecuted.

Cllr Brian Stephens, Cabinet member for neighbourhoods local partnerships, and Durham County Council, said: "It has been another busy month for neighbourhood protection teams who have been working hard to tackle those issues that cause a nuisance in people's everyday lives. "When enforcement action

is needed we will not hesitate to use the powers available to us but our aim is always to educate people from an early age about the importance of looking after the environment.
