I haven't written to a newspaper before but I would like to mention a few things. In your edition of the Newton News w/e 29th April 2016 I

noticed that Wilmott Dixon propose to build 450 houses on the former Equestrian Centre site and there is to be a public hearing at the Agnew Community Centre on the 24th May with no time given. Contacting the Agnew Centre I am informed this Hearing has been cancelled and they have no information on an alternative date. They are not given prominence? Perhaps it might be an idea for all planning applications to be listed in your paper on a weekly basis so that the public

have the chance to comment on such matters. The Council are unlikely to shout it from the rooftops and the housing presently under construction adjacent to the Agnew Centre is a prime example.

I only found out about that consultation when I went along to vote a short time before. If I remember rightly, you yourselves were not aware of the consultation until the last moment when you printed it only a few days before the meeting. Residents living nearby had not been notified either. If the Council are not forthcoming we could do with our local paper pursuing such matters on our behalf as in order to object/comment on matters we need to know about them in the first place.

When is enough - enough? Surely with all the new houses at Cobblers Hall, the 125 at Agnew and the prospect of hundreds more between Aycliffe and Middridge not to mention the possibility of yet more near at the A167 and some on the golf course! We do not need another 450 and I don't know if that includes the playing fields that Woodham Academy were looking to sell off. Newton Aycliffe's infrastructure certainly can't cope. Just try

getting a parking space when you have to visit the Doctor at Cobblers Hall and parking in the Town is getting more difficult. Whilst looking for further information on this matter I came across an application for a replacement of the telecommunications mast at Woodham Way. It is proposed that the 11.7m high monopole be replaced by one at 12.5m high (three feet in my 'language') which is quite a jump as well as the installation of 3 no equipment cabinets and associated development.

It is not clear whether these cabinets are extra or replacements but there are already eight cabinets of some sort and a second mast already in place. They are not painted green to blend in with the surroundings and are an eyesore standing alone on the verge when lamp posts are green. How does the public become aware of these things if they are tucked away on websites? Not everyone has a computer nor the time to trawl. I am sure the people in the properties nearby won't be best pleased. We need someone fighting our corner and your newspaper is

just the tool we need. We need to be able to look at the Newton News and see at a glance what is being proposed and how it will affect us in order to have our say. With regard to the public hearing, how are people meant to comment – where are the plans, you cannot voice opinions without first seeing what is proposed and certainly not just at the Hearing itself.

A previous application on this site was turned down because it would have meant access onto the A167 which was considered dangerous (today must be worse), so on that basis where would access be now – through a current estate?

I might be an old pensioner with nothing better to do, but it would be appreciated if you could follow up such matters and advise the community of what is going on in and around their Town. Starting first with prominent information on the proposed development of 450 houses and the revised Public Hearing date and time (hopefully not the afternoon as in the case of the houses adjacent to the Agnew Centre when people are at work). If I hadn't contacted the Agnew Centre, I would be turning up with nobody there! Jennifer Whatley

Dear Sir, On the 23 June we will go to the polls with the chance to take back control of our country - and stop being told what to do by un-elected and unaccountable foreign bureaucrats.

For too long, we have been a member of this diminishing European club - a club that doesn't serve our interests or listen to our demands.

On 72 occasions since 1996, we have opposed EU policy in the Council of Ministers. On all 72 occasions, we have been outvoted. This statistic proves what pitiful influence we have as a member of the EU.

The message from the Brexit side is very simple. The UK will be safer, stronger, and more prosperous, outside of the EU

British taxpayers' money should be spent, or saved, in a way that is decided by elected Britons - and on our own priorities.

budget The recent highlighted the willingness of the government to inflict yet more austerity on the British people. We should all be asking ourselves - what could we do with the £55 million a day we currently give to the EU? How much public investment,

or how many tax cuts for hard-working families, could we introduce if we had control of our own purse strings.

We also want to make our own laws in our own Parliament. The British people should be able to elect a government that has the power to make, amend, and scrap legislation. That same population should have the power to vote in a good Government, and vote out a bad one. This is the definition of a parliamentary democracy.

But, while we remain a member of this unreformed European Union, 75% of our laws will be made abroad where un-elected officials have the sole power to propose and scrap legislation. At the same time, we should also have the power to sign our own trade deals - trade deals that would boost jobs and investment in the United Kingdom, whilst establishing trade links and relationships

the world over. So, the time has come for us to rejoin the wider world and have a truly global outlook. We are the fifth largest global economy, the second most important defence player

within NATO, a country with an incredible history and a fantastic future. A UK outside of the EU would still be a permanent member of the UN Security Council,

be America's strongest and closest ally, retain our seat in the G7 and the G20, and remain at the fore front of the Commonwealth of Nations. Far from being a leap into the dark, as the 'remain' camp would have you believe, the United Kingdom leaving the European Union would be a leap into the light - into a

more prosperous, brighter, global future. I believe we are good enough, strong enough and significant

Generally speaking Aycliffe is a great place to live and has one of the lowest crime rates in the country. We have to accept there are people who cause a nuisance and we have to rely on our local police and the courts to deal with them.

Aycliffe's Front Line NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING By T/Inspector Mark J Edwards

Mark Edwards here again folks and as I write this report it's a pretty nice sunny morning in Newton Aycliffe, hopefully this is the build up to a glorious summer (if the reports are to be believed!).

Anti-Social Behaviour

I am sure many of you will have seen the recent media attention with regards to the Horndale area, with sensationalist comparisons been made to a certain fictitious televised housing estate. The issues highlighted consisted of anti-social behaviour, activities of unruly tenants, littering and rubbish disposal, amongst other things. I would like to take the opportunity this forum allows me to provide an update from a Policing perspective – a 20 second piece to camera on 'Look North' didn't quite capture the full scale

of work ongoing in the area. Firstly, as the Neighbourhood Inspector for the Newton Aycliffe area, I do not underestimate the impact that the behaviour and issues described have on local residents. The Neighbourhood Policing Team have been engaged with our partners and local councillors for some time working to address the problems.

A multi-agency group was established - that I am part of, and meets regularly to discuss, implement, review and refine strategies and is made up of NPT Officers, representatives from 'LIVIN' Housing, Durham County Council, and County Durham and Darlington Fire and Rescue Service. Community Walkabouts have taken place in the area, there has been enforcement action taken against those engaged in anti-social behaviour which has seen the imposition of a Criminal Behaviour Order against one youth, and another who was made subject of an anti-social behaviour order.

There are engagement events planned for the near future and details will be publicised very soon. In the meantime I would like to try and reassure residents that there is much work ongoing behind the scenes between partners and whilst - on the surface, it may seem little progress is being made, the reality of the situation is that many things are taking place.

I am not a lover of stats as a rule however I would like to add that anti-social behaviour levels for Newton Aycliffe as a whole in May so far have been significantly lower than in May last year. In fact – at this time, they are down by 27%, and the current figures for Greenfield and Middridge Ward are currently the greatest in terms of recorded incidents with a 46% reduction in comparison to last year. That's the boring stats out of the way. Crime and Community Safety

Crime and Community Safety was voted in as a priority for the Great Aycliffe and Middridge Partnership (GAMP) AAP to focus upon for the year 2016/2017. For those not in the know Area Action Partnerships (AAP's) were set up to give people in County Durham a voice in influencing local matters. The local GAMP AAP board meets a number of times a year and consists of a number of elected members who discuss and review how the AAP is performing against identified priorities whilst managing spending through project approval and evaluation, and working with other partners – the board is made up of elected members from Durham County Council, the GATC, health, Fire, and Police.

Usually there are around 3 priorities identified per year for the AAP to address, with each one having its' own Task group established as an 'off-shoot' from the main AAP board itself. At this time the local Neighbourhood Policing Team are working with several local educational establishments working to understand why many young people (who made up a large percentage of the votes) deem crime and community safety an issue. The group will meet regularly to discuss local issues around this

priority and to help implement projects within the area. If you have ideas for projects which relate to this priority, we would like to hear from you. To find out more about GAMP follow the link http://www.durham.gov.uk/gampaap or follow them on Facebook. #respectvourstreet

Quite a punchy hashtag don't you think? But it's more than that it's Durham Constabulary's awareness campaign in the arena of criminal damage. When we talk about volume crime, crimes of damage make up a significant percentage and - certainly from a Neighbourhood perspective, it's important to us that we bring

home the consequences of engaging in reckless acts. A one-off reckless act when young (such as throwing a stone through a window) can have an impact later in life in terms of job opportunities, overseas holidays to countries with strict restrictions in terms of offending history. #respect your street hopes to heighten awareness and hammer home the impact that criminal damage has - education is key. This isn't just specific to Newton Aycliffe - it's County wide, so if you do the whole social media thing check out the hashtag on Twitter and get a flavour of where we're coming from. Think this report is quite a lengthy this time so I'll bid you all

Investigations indicated the group responsible were from Darlington and seemed to think that by saying the perpetrator had special needs, excused the attack.

I related this tale to acquaintances and surprisingly learned this was not an isolated incident and It would be interesting to hear about other similar instances of lack of supervision.


